
the auto-towners

NOTES FROM

THE SECRETARY

Quartets and choruses should plan to enter the contest to be held April 28 at Benton Harbor, sponsored by the Fruit Belt Chapter. This will determine which quartets will represent the Michigan District in International competition in Kansas City in June, and the District and Junior



championships will be decided for choruses under the new setup.

At this time of year when the new administrations are taking over on the International, District and Chapter level, special emphasis should be made of the duties the new officers are assuming. Your District officers are anxious to help the chapters in every way possible, but must know what your needs are, therefore the importance of chapter secretaries submitting quarterly reports can not be stressed too strongly. Significantly, it is often the chapter that fails to communicate that falls by the wayside. The Chapter Activity Reports also provide the basis upon which the Achievement Awards are determined.

It is suggested and recommended that chapters plan in advance and set up a complete program for the year, including as many inter-chapter activities as possible so as to stimulate interest, as well as planning events to include the ladies. It is advisable to schedule parades well in advance. Chapters are reminded that requests for clearance of parade dates should be directed to the District Secretary's Office, who will notify the International Office and the Troubadour for listing in the Coming Events. The 5% sanction fee payment on the gross receipts of all chapter parades, which was adopted by the delegates in 1955, should also be remitted to the District Secretary's Office. It was felt that this fee was more than offset by the obtaining of an extension of the blanket exemption for all chapters from the payment of the Federal Admission Tax, which is obtained annually by the District Secretary for the benefit of all chapters. This now becomes the only source of revenue received by the District since the International abolished the per capita rebate.

Chapters are urged to extend every courtesy to the Area Counselors and District Officers visiting them who are giving their time to be of help.


