This skimpy issue of Troubadour is the result of your editor becoming so involved with his job of keeping the wheels of the Chrysler Corporation turning, that there were not enough hours left in the day or night to make the trips, phone calls, etc. needed to produce the type of publication that benefits a district. Your editor also observes that many others must have found themselves in the same situation. I don't know about you, but I, for one, am thankful that I am not a turkey. Seriously, during this busy time of year for me, I will appreciate all the help I can get in my efforts to put out a presentable publication. Copy deadline for the next issue is December 3. * *

One man who did find time to do a bit of work was Ted Verwey, Windsor Chapter, who presented to Troubadour a "delegate's eye view" of the recent meeting held in Battle Creek. It follows:

"The key note speaker was R. A. "Reedie" Wright, International P-esident elect. Some of the highlights:

Society is not in favor of high prices charged by some quartets. Services should not be for the money but for pride. Of course quartets should not be out of pocket.

Vice presidents reported on their respective zones. District Secretary, Louis Harrington, asked for bids for the Spring Convention in 1966. Fall Convention will be in Holland, Michigan. He stated this is his 15th report as District Secretary and 2 years District President.

Bill Hansen, International Board Member for Michigan District asked if there were any questions on his report as it was printed in the last Troubadour. He stated the lack of public relations has been in apathy. The ever occurring question of the limit of 25 members to retain the charter was again brought up to our International Board Member. As usual the same limit for smaller towns than for larger cities was expressed as being unfair. The opinion was voiced again from the floor that smaller towns should be given a break.

President Al Burgess pointed out and asked for correction if wrong, that the motion, directed to International at a previous House of Delegates Meeting, to lower the 25 member limit, had been defeated. However it is within any chapter's or member's right to make any protest or recommendation through their Internation Board Member. (Bill Hansen has on more than one occasion taken up this matter at the International Board Meeting without success.) He stated his feeling that someday we may come to this, also, that this is his personal feelings. In reply Reedie Wright stated that statistics had proved that a less than 25 member limit is not successful, in view of the fact that statistics also bear out an approximate regular attendance of 60% of the membership. A membership of 25 is required to obtain a charter.

Committee reports: Achievement awards: Ted Verwey, chairman reported the total points of the top five chapters in each division as follows: Gold Division (50 or more members): Jackson 955, Dearborn 945, Muskegon 650, Grand Rapids 465 and Oakland County 425, Silver Division (under 50 members): Battle Creek 745. Saginaw 465, Greenville 420, Wayne 420 and Windsor 375.

Public Relations: Bill Hansen, chairman: There has been too much negative thinking on this highly important phase. Definition: Public relations is selling one's self or one's product to the public. It is the answer to our membership problem. We will have to sell ourselves or stay status quo or lower. He urged members to come up with simple ideas to sell our product to the public and to forward them to him. Recognition will be made for worthwhile ideas. Bill Hansen again emphasized that if we don't sell ourselves and our Society we have had it. He asked visitor Hugh Ingraham, International Director of public relations, if he wished to say something.

Hugh said that public relations begins at chapter level and added his definition of public relations as: "Doing something worthwhile and telling people about it."

Don Funk, President of Lansing chapter, advised that the best public image of Society is conveyed by the second or revised Logopedics film and suggested chapters to arrange for a showing to other community service organizations in their localities. While on his feet Don Funk added the remark that the House of Delegates only meets twice a year and we should not hurry the meetings to a

close before business at hand has been taken care of. He added that this is the place to air your chapter's and your own feelings and gripes.

Area counselor award of the year 1964 in the form of a plaque was presented to Bob Tracy, Mackinaw City,

(areas 7,8 and 9.)

Al Meyer, Redford chapter, asked the perennial question: "What about integration?" Reedie Wright answered as follows: "Local option at chapter level." Subject closed.

District President Al Burgess brought up the most important item of business on the agenda: The proposed society wide liability and property damage insurance policy to go into effect, upon a majority vote in the House of Delegates Meeting of the 15 districts, on January 1, 1966.

Bill Favinger, Detroit #1, asked if anybody had seen a sample copy of the policy to find out all the clauses and warranties contained therin. District Secretary Louis Harrington stated that he had requested such a copy from Barry Best, International Executive Director, who informed him that no copy was available. Someone stated, since a considerable amount of money in premiums is involved, much more information should be supplied. To bring to the effect that the issue be tabled until a copy of the policy is made available for further study. Motion was seconded and carried.

Chase Sanborn, Pontiac, was of the opinion that this action would have the results of a no vote. Therefore, when votes of the 14 other districts are tabulated after November 15, being the date of the last district convention, the issue could be defeated or become law, without the chapter's in the Michigan District being able to make their wishes known. The motion by Chase Sanborn instructing the District Board to obtain a specimen copy of the policy within thirty days and twenty days after receipt of same, a mail-vote of chapter delegates sent to District Secretary Harrington to be undertaken, carried after being seconded by Gerrit VerVeer. To make the mail poll legal a quarum of 30% of chapter delegate's votes will be required before a decision can be made.

Chase Sanborn, chairman of nominating committee presented the slate of 1966 district officers, which is contained in last issue of Troubadour. Complete slate elected on motion by Bill Favinger, duly seconded and carried.

President Elect, Reedie Wright, presented District
President Elect, Eric Schultz, with the District President's Pin. Some of his remarks included these gems:
"Think of ways to do something, instead of thinking it can't be done" and "Have I done everything to help my chapter and my new District Board that I could have done?"

WILLIAM HANSEN

During the many years I have served the Michigan District in various capacities, I have often been asked, in effect: "What is happening to our district?" These questions have been posed by interested barbershoppers who expressed concern over the apparent lack of spirit and, more lately, a decline in membership.

If there is a lack of spirit in the Michigan District, and I firmly believe this to be true, there are many underlying reasons. My analysis of the situation has convinced me that attitudes of indifference and selfishness are primarily responsible for any decline of our district.

If we are to have a successful district we must have a membership which is ready and willing to do whatever is necessary to cooperate and maintain silidarity. There should be no room for the member who could care less about his own chapter, the district, or the Society as a whole. Refusal of membership to this type of individual will result in chapters having members who are genuinely interested in the future of barbershopping.

Selfishness, as applied to our situation, is entailed with the attitude of some barbershoppers toward their fellow-members. I have seen too many instances wherein barbershoppers, during chapter and district functions, have openly ignored others. There are also those barbershoppers who indicate by their actions that they have no desire to associate with those outside their own cliques. Such attitudes certainly do not foster a sense of fellowship which is supposed to be one of the prime attractions of our Society. Webster defines fellowship as: 1. companionship. 2. a mutual sharing. If we accept Webster (and most people do) it would seem that many of our members fall short of what is expected.

In connection with the attitude of selfishness, it might be well for quartets to evaluate themselves in terms of service to chapters and the district versus monetary gain. I do not advocate free quartets; however, I honestly believe that quartets should be as tolerant as possible when their assistance will benefit those who are deserving.

There are those who will argue that the majority of our members do not fall into the categories described above. I'm inclined to agree; however, I also realize that a small minority can spoil it for the majority.

The wholehearted application of the Golden Rule by our entire membership will work wonders for our district. When do we start?


We would also like to thank the Battle Creek chapter for all of their efforts for S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. during the past year.
