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

#### "Sing Into Spring" Theme Of Regional Convention April 29-30: Dearborn Inn Headquarters Hotel

Friday and Saturday, April 29 and 30, will see most Michigan District barbershoppers at Dearborn for the "really big" Sing Into Spring International Quartet Preliminary and District Chorus Contest. Are you going to be there too? Judging from the great number of choruses already registered to compete and the many quartets, this promises to be everything the Detroit and Dearborn chapters started out to make it.

The efforts of this fine group of men are going to pay off for all of us in the district for both this and for future conventions. You're going to see a new feeling built into local barbershopping.

All chapters are reminded that the House of Delegates meeting will be held at Dearborn Inn on Friday evening, April 29, beginning at 8:00 p.m. Although only delegates are entitled to the privileges of the floor, everyone is welcome to sit in as an observer.

Several questions have been asked by chapter officers regarding the income tax forms which have been forwarded to all chapters. Your district secretary will be available after the formal delegates meeting to answer any questions and explain the intricasies of internal revenue form 990-A which must be filed on or before May 15.

Chapters interested in entering competition in the BETY contest which will choose the best chapter publication in the Society (the contest being held during the International Convention at Chicago) are requested to immediately send six copies of three consecutive issues of their bulletin. published anytime between January 1965 and February 1966 to the district secretary's office, 2361 First National Building, Detroit, Michigan 48226 or bring them to the spring convention at Dearborn.

Michigan District 1966 directories have now been mailed to all members in the district and to officers of other districts. Several corrections should be made to bring them up-to-date:

Page 2 - Vice president Vande Zande of Zone II has jurisdiction over Areas 13, 14, & 15 only. Vice president Lucas of Zone III has jurisdiction over Areas 10, 11, & 12 only. Vice president Gillem of Zone IV has added to his jurisdiction Area 9 in addition to Areas 6, 7, &8.



SING INTO SPRING APRIL 29-30



A meeting of the Michigan District Board of Directors was held at the Dearborn Inn, Dearborn, on Sunday, March 20, 1966. President Eric Schultz opened the meeting at 12:15 p.m. Also present were vice presidents E.E. (Pat) Ryan, E. A. Vande Zande, treasurer Schied and secretary Harrington. The chair announced that during the past week the charter of the Three Rivers chapter, which had been revoked for failure to meet minimum charter requirements, was reinstated. This reinstatement was effected by International President Wright with the consent of the the International Executive Committee in view of the fact that the International Board did not have the benefit of information regarding the actual status and the efforts being made by the chapter to reach the minimum membership required.

The Board then reviewed the Chapter Quarterly Reports. It was apparent that many of the chapters are not submitting the reports as required. It was recommended that an effort should be made to contact men who were members of suspended chapters so as to get them back into active chapters. It was brought out that several outstanding past District and International officers no longer held membership because of the fact that their chapters

were no longer in existence.

President Schultz announced that the new International representative, Carl Steinkamp, will be in the Michigan District from May 15 to 29 for the purpose of working on extension. Inquiry was made as to the possible location of new chapters. It was the concensus of the Board that efforts should be made to strengthen existing chapters and to bring back former members. It was urged by the chair that we make every effort to take full advantage of the International representative's visit.

Vice president Ryan recommended that newly registered quartets be urged to compete in various contests.

It was also brought to the attention of the Board that the Michigan District chapters submit bulletins for the International bulletin contest to be held at Chicago and the respective vice presidents were requested to give this matter their attention.

It was then announced by Vice president Ryan that past International President Wayne Foor would be the official representative of International at the Spring convention in Dearborn. Secretary Harrington was assigned as host to Foor. A long discussion ensued regarding the expenses of the judging panel at the contest. Vice president Ryan stated that the approximate cost at this Spring's convention for judges would be \$700.00...considerably more than anticipated, and he pointed out that this was creating a hardship for the host chapter and that this is one of the features discouraging chapters from bidding for conventions. A suggestion was made that the district consider subsidizing judging expenses at the contest. No action was taken on this suggestion.

A suggestion was made that district spring and fall con-

ventions be assigned to certain zones and that the vice presidents therein be responsible for obtaining a site for the convention. This suggestion was referred to the Convention Committee and efforts will be made to put this into practice if possible.

The treasurer's report was presented and accepted. It was also brought out that many chapters were inquiring as to the preparation and filing of their annual income tax, and secretary Harrington offered to meet with representatives of the various chapters at the conclusion of the meeting of the House of Delegates of Friday, April 29, to instruct them.

The meeting adjourned at 4:00 p.m.


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### Sault Chapter Sports New Meeting Place
