### "Sing Into Spring" Theme Of Regional Convention April 29-30: Dearborn Inn Headquarters Hotel

Plans have been finalized by the convention committee which is made up of members of the Detroit and Dearborn chapters for what we are sure will be the greatest spring convention ever held.

With the beautiful Dearborn Inn serving as headquarters hotel for the convention, it is expected that well over 1,000 barbershoppers from all over Michigan, the Windsor area and some parts of Ohio will attend.

Pat Ryan and Carl Dahlke, co-chairmen of the "SING INTO SPRING" convention, are pulling all stops to make sure this convention will be one that Michigan barbershoppers will be talking about for many years to come. Carl says, "Our goal this year is to encourage quartet competition from every chapter in the Michigan District." The co-chairman for this year's fabulous event went on to say that he felt at least one quartet should be entered from each chapter.

In addition to selecting the two quartets which will represent Michigan at this year's International Convention, the Michigan District Chorus Championship is up for grabs. Because the chorus contest is always one of the highlights of any convention, it is expected this spring's event will leave the chords of some of those wonderful songs still ringing in the ears of everyone in attendance. A special treat for those fortunate enough to get tickets for the Saturday night show will be a combined chorus of 100 voices made up of the Detroit Motor City Chorus and the Dearborn Chord-O-Matics under the direction of Bill Butler and Carl Dahlke.

The contests will be held in one of the newest high schools in the Dearborn area, the Edsel Ford High School. This school auditorium is noted for its acoustically perfect sound and its beautiful seating arrangement. It is located just a short distance from the headquarters hotel. Plenty of parking facilities are available.

Also available for everyone will be tours of the world famous Greenfield Village and Edison Institute Museum. Many landmarks of American history are collected at Dearborn's Greenfield Village. Founded by Henry Ford, it is now the greatest collection of Industrial Americana that can be seen anywhere in the world. Among some of the attractions are over 165 early automobiles. The museum contains a gallery of fine arts, a street of shops, (which incidently includes a fine old barber shop) historic old airplanes, steam engines, old carriages and many other interesting exhibits.

Greenfield Village displays a collection of old historic houses from all parts of America. Among some, The Court House from Lincoln, Illinois where Abraham Lincoln practiced law, Edison's Menlo Park Laboratory where he invented the world's first electric lamp, the first phonograph and many others.

Also available close to the convention headquarters are several fine motels and eating places (more about those later).

The schedule of events for Friday evening starts off with the Michigan District House of Delegates Meeting at 8:00 p.m. All evening a special room has been set

aside for the wonderful event we all know as WOODSHED-DING. About 9:30 p.m. all barbershoppers will be gather ing for a real blast to start the real fun with a bang-up PRE-GLO. The next morning, following the quartet briefing at Edsel Ford High School, the quartet preliminaries will start promptly at 9:30 a.m. This in it self should prove to be a wonderful contest with between 15 and 20 quartets competing for the right to sing in the evening finals.

At 1:30 p.m., after everyone has had his lunch, back at Edsel Ford High, the chorus contest will get under way. As you know the Michigan District chorus championship will be decided at this year's "SING INTO SPRING" conventionand you can bet the chords will be ringing in ole Edsel Ford for many days after. What a show and contest is planned for that Saturday night. This is the time when all stops are pulled, butterflies start in the stomachs of everyone as they listen to the best singing of the contest. Everyone hangs on every note looking at the judges, trying to guess if their favorite quartet is going to be one of the lucky ones to go to the International contest in July in Chicago, to represent Michigan. After the suspense is over and the guartets have been selected, the evening will hold a surprise for everyone, a special treat. The winning chorus will thrill the audience with some special renditions of barbershop songs. (Don't miss this for sure.)

Now, in the meantime back at the ranch or the hotel, those workers from Detroit and Dearborn chapters who had to leave the contest, will be busily preparing the Inn for the fantastic AFTER-GLO. O.C. Cash once said, "anyone who misses an after-glo is out of their cotton pickin'
mind." He didn't have any idea that what he said will be
the under statement of the century. If you get to bed at
all that night you are sick.

Sometime the next morning, a breakfast will be held at the Inn for all those who can make it. Following this wake-up session will be the quartet and chorus clinic.

The hardest part of the planning of the "Sing Into Spring Convention" was the establishment of the price for all these wonderful events. And now the biggest treat of all... the all events ticket is going to be priced at only \$4.00. That's right...only \$4.00. Now for those wonderful people who make it all possible, the contestants, the price is just \$2.50. (All registered contestants will be required to purchase an all events ticket.)

Let yourself go and SING INTO SPRING at Dearborn on the weekend of April 29.

The convention committee plans to see that you are welcomed into Dearborn as you have never been before. Members of both Detroit and Dearborn chapters will be on hand to see that you have the greatest time of your life, even the Mayor of Dearborn and the Governor of the state have been invited. Mayor Orville Hubbard has proclaimed the week "Harmony Week" in special honor of all Michigan District barbershoppers.

All reservations will be handled by the individual barbershoppers Stone said. A letter will be mailed to all Michigan District barbershoppers around the middle of March, giving them more details on the convention, housing and tickets. 

### Szabo Expounds On Contest Judging

Just a couple of notes regarding the forthcoming contests in Dearborn:

The drawing for order of appearance in the big contest will be drawn about one week prior to the contest. Late entries will sing first in the order in which they are received. I, myself, can comprehend no reason why a quartet needs to enter late. We should urge all quartets to get their entries in now. It certainly would not reflect unfavorably on the quartet if they have to drop out of the competition for some reason.

Judges for the contest will be: Loton Willson on voice expression from Boyne City, Tom Grove on harmony accuracy from Dowagiac, Rush Wyman on balance and blend from Akron Chio, Cliff MacLean on stage presence from upper Michigan and Sherman Crawford on arrangement from Denver, Colorado. Candidate judges who plan to sit on the practice panel should communicate with O.B. Falls or myself as soon as possible.

It is doubtful that at this late date, new candidates can be readied to serve on the practice panel at the Dearborn contest. The district is sorely in need of additional judges and judge candidates. We cannot promise you anything in the judging program except hard work and long, busy hours. There are no rewards like travel to exotic places (unless you consider Holland or Indianapolis exotic). However, as a judge candidate you will learn much about barbershopping that will make you a better quartet and chorus singer or chorus director. As a judge, you will meet more wonderful barbershoppers than you thought possible and, best of all, experience the satisfaction that comes from the knowledge that you have really helped a quartet to find the way to better singing and greater enjoyment of our hobby. Can there be any greater reward in a singing society?

If you think you may be interested in the judging program, write to Gb B. Falls or to me immediately and get started soon. If you need to be "sold" on the pleasures of being a judge candidate, look up Lowell Wolfe (of the Harmony Hounds) when you get to Dearborn.



We signed up seven new members in January and four more applications are out and we haven't even started our membership drive yet.


