Past International President, Wayne Foor and his lovely wife, attended all events with Mr. Foor giving inspiring talks at both the delegate's meeting and the evening finals, during which he congratulated the Michigan District for their work in the logopedic field.

The contests were well attended. The quartet contest found 12 acts competing. After the Auto Towners it was a close race. What can you say about the Auto Towners? They have all the poise, polish and talent it takes to go all the way and I for one pick them as our next International Champions. The Four Fits sang their usual fine performance, and won the second spot as our representatives in the International Competition. The Close Chorders sang very well but lost points on a time penalty. The Trebleshooters, with Bernie Smith filling in the bass did a very commendable job, and placed as alternates. The Wonderlads sang very will in the preliminaries but faltered in the finals. Also singing very well were the Motor City Slickers, the Key Rings, the Imperials, the Aftershaves, the Aging Four, the Country Gentlemen and the Mello Aires.

The chorus contest found 12 chapters vying for the District Championship. Detroit won it going away with Bill Butler waving some 60 men into first place. Kalamazoo sang very well as did Oakland County.

The Muskegon Port City Chorus, our International chorus representatives, sang three numbers on the evening show. The combined choruses of Dearborn and Detroit joined up to fill the auditorium with some great sounds with Butler and Dahlke both taking a crack at directing.

BUSH LEAGUE RESULTS



Something we Michigan barbershoppers have always known is that "The Singing's Fun In Michigan" but have we convinced enough of our audiences of the fact? Why not do the convincing in song. Enclosed in this issue of the Troubadour is an effort to do just that. It sure looks good on paper but the proof is in the singing. Pull out the center pages and take it to your next chapter or chorus meeting and put the thing to use. There is a lot of good rhythm in it and the message is just what we want to tell everyone.


The most important thing to remember when singing this song is to pronounce Michigan as "MichiGUN." (Now you just gotta do that or nothing rhymes.) After you have accomplished that feat have some fun with the introduction which is a parody of "Christmas Tree, My Christmas Tree" and many other songs. Tenors and baritones get some real kicks on the end of this. Put a little hold on the word "love". Then you leads can take right over by setting up the chorus with some lively pick-up notes on "We're proud to". Basses come into their own pretty soon with some short (but beautiful) solos and away it goes. The whole tune should move moderately fast and should sound rhythmical at all times. (Come on you guys don't sing like a bunch of stiffs; loosen up.) Once the chorus starts, keep the tempo constant right to the last

You will notice that I probably left your chapter out of the lyrics. Now there are only so many notes in the song so don't blame me. You hereby have the author's permission to insert your own chapter's name anywhere it fits best. (Go on...be a composer.)






