

The House of Delegates meeting will be held on Friday evening, September 30 at 9:00 p.m. Registration will be at the Civic Audutorium. Don Lucas, 1439 Eastern Avenue S.E., Grand Rapids, is general chairman and announces that there will be a Gay 90's theme at the convention. For housing and ticket information, write Norman Bredeweg, 655 Hazelbank, Holland 49423.

The quartet and chorus contest will be held on Saturday, October 1 at the Civic Auditorium. Preliminaries are scheduled for 10:00 a.m., the chorus contest in the afternoon and the Finals at 8:00 p.m. At this time, the District champions will be chosen as well as winners in the junior and novice classifications, and the chorus will be chosen to represent our District in International competition at Los Angeles next summer.

Chorus entry blanks have been mailed to chapter secretaries and quartet entries to the respective contact men. Additional entries can be obtained from the District Secretary's office. Among the early entries are the Food City Harmony Hounds of Battle Creek, Motor City Slickers of Detroit, The Con-Chords of Oakland County, Notations of Battle Creek and the Arbor City Four of Ann Arbor and the Jackson and Oakland County choruses.

Bob Johnson, the Society's musical director, will visit Michigan during October conducting clinics and a chorus director's school. This is a splendid opportunity for everyone to learn barbershop craft. The chorus director's school is primarily for directors and assistants and aspiring directors. Your chapter is invited.


In all it was a great evening of feast and fellowship. Twenty-five dozen ears of corn and twenty-five pounds of kilbasa was consumed.

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Minutes

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING

A meeting of the Michigan District Board of Directors was held at the Pantlind Hotel, Grand Rapids on Sunday morning, July 31, 1966. President Eric Schultz called the meeting to order at 10:55 a.m. Present were Vice presidents Lucas and Ryan, Treasurer Schied, Secretary Harrington and Immediate Past President Burgess. Also present were Jack Oonk and Chet Oonk of the Holland chapter convention committee.

President Schultz announced that Floyd Steinkamp will be in the Michigan District from August 27 through September 9 and requested the vice-presidents to furnish him with the addresses of the persons to be contacted to work with him on extension or any other phase of promotion. A schedule was to be set up and sent to Steinkamp in advance of his arrival.

President Schultz also brought up the subject that area counselors are not submitting reports as required.

A discussion was had relative to the development of choruses in the Michigan District, and it was pointed out that there seems to be a shortage of competent directors and that many chapters have difficulty getting anyone to undertake this task.

Chet Oonk and Jack Oonk, along with Don Lucas, reported on the plans which have been made for the Fall convention to be held at Holland on September 30 through October 1, 1966. Don Lucas is to be general chairman. The headquarters will be in the Civic Auditorium due to the fact that the Warm Friend Hotel has been converted into an apartment hotel. Ample motel space has been reserved so that all visitors will be housed properly. It is planned that the general theme of the convention will be Gay 90's, and that the chapter is working with the local merchants to publicize the theme. An antique auto tour is being arranged to further promote the convention. It was also announced that Jim Steedman, International president-elect, will be the official International representative at the convention.

Advance plans were also announced for the chorus directors school to be conducted by Bob Johnson in the Michigan District. The Board voted to authorize Burt Szábo, District C and J Chairman, to purchase four stop watches to be the District's property.

Treasurer Schied gave his financial report, indicating that there was approximately \$6,850.00 in the District Treasury.

Vice President Ryan announced that the Zone I Association of Chapters had been organized and is now functioning as an entity to promote activity in that zone.

It was also announced that Big Rapids, our newest chapter, is now functioning.

The meeting adjourned at 2:00 p.m.


We had picnics, outdoor meetings, gang sings, lots of wood-shedding and even a cruise to Bob-Lo, sponsored by Detroit #1.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Ed

To the members of the Michigan District:

As the shadows of the past close the windows of our memories, and the ship sinks slowly in the West..we notice the flag on the mast bears the colors of the Port City Chorus and the Michigan District. Post mortems are never pleasant, but they are revealing, sometimes, to those who care to hold them.

First, let us go back to the contest at Philadelphia. The chorus is second place was undoubtedly the best allaround musical group, but someone got 150 men on stage and who could deny this great achievement as a winner? Not the judges, certainly. Since then, size has been one of the principal ingredients for chorus competition at the International level. No Michigan District chorus had 55. The thirteenth place chorus had 35, the fourteenth place chorus had 38 and the fifteenth place chorus had 30. All other choruses put about 50 men on stage and one put 80. Also, in some of the large choruses, as many as 15 to 20 men appeared to be moving their lips without making a sound. I later confirmed this observation to be true. I will not debate the merits of the point raised here, but the fact remains that size has become an undeniable factor.

However, the chorus with 80 men did not win, so there must be another factor. As I see it, the second ingredient is stage presence, but this stage presence must be spectacular. I prefer to see stage presence that has something to do with the words of the song, but much of the movement now seems to be movement for the sake of movement. I will not stress this factor at length, for its implications are obvious.

A third factor is interesting, if discouraging. The lowest scoring category for ALL choruses was that of voice expression. Poor attacks and releases, sloppy word-lindeage and poor use of dynamics were common throughout the contest. Other musical shortcomings were there in abundance...loud, out-of-tune chords, chords with five part harmony, erratic breathing points within the phrases, etc. Enough said.

The Port City Chorus had hoped to put 45 men on stage. We lost 15 potential participants between January and May and competed with 30. The losses were mostly bonafide... job conflicts, moving, illness, etc...but the losses still hurt us. We did bolster our stage presence on one song but our other song did not lend itself to such treatment and we were severely penalized. It is interesting to note however, that had we scored the same points per judge at Chicago that we scored at Battle Creek, the Port City Chorus would have won the International contest.

Well, what conclusions can be drawn from all this? First, when a chorus wins our Fall Contest, neighboring chapters should put the best men from their chapters at the disposal of the winning chorus. Dual membership is a requirement, of course, but it is a technic used by many competing choruses and it seems essential to recognize the fact. Next, a chorus coach should be contacted, preferably a certified judge from an adjoining district, to come and analyze the choruses progress several times... in November, January and March perhaps. Certified judges from our own district should be invited to do the same at other intervals. In this way, the Michigan Dis-

trict may once more be able to make its presence felt in chorus competition.

In conclusion, I wish to thank those who supported us during the year and at Chicago. The Port City Chorus will not be competing in October because I had to leave for summer school on Monday after the contest and the Fall Contest at Holland is too soon after Labor Day to allow sufficient time for preparation. Good luck to all of you and I will see you in Holland.
