
OCC's aiming for October for our first big show in years. Bob McDermott's in charge. He will be feeding us full details in coming months.

Looking Up

All judges and candidate judges will be notified of a Judging Seminar to be held in Lansing in late February or early March. Plan to attend. This seminar will consist of category discussions in general and discussions of fine points withing the categories. I hope there will be two or three quartets on hand to act as guinea pigs for the judges and candidates. Of course, the seminar will be open to any interested barbershoppers in the Michigan District.

Now that the holiday season is past and the new year is well underway, many quartets and choruses are beginning their preparations for the Spring Contests in Jackson in the month of April. I wish I could say that most quartets and choruses are starting preparations for these contests, however it is a sad fact of barbershopping life in the Michigan District that most of our quartets and choruses do not enter the contests. The 1966 Michigan District Directory listed 44 quartets. Only 10 quartets actually competed in Holland at the last contests. Allowing for a few past district champs and some quartets who are no longer active, this means that over two-thirds of the quartets in the District did not enter that contest. Why should there be so many quartets who do not care to enter contests?

I am sure that some quartets from the eastern part of the District might say "It's too far to travel to Holland for a contest". These same people might think nothing of traveling just as far to go fishing or bowling. How far is "too far"? With a highway system such as we have in Michigan, it is possible to make the drive in less than three hours. I recall contests I have judged in other districts where quartets and choruses traveled five or six hundred miles to sing in a contest simply because they enjoyed singing and looked forward to seeing and hearing other quartets and choruses. In addition, I believe these con testants felt that they owed something to their chapters and didn't want them to not be represented in the contest.

I have heard quartets say, "We aren't good enough to win". Although the idea of winning (championships, contests, games or whatever) has infiltrated and now appears to dominate almost every aspect of social and recreational endeavor, I cannot believe that this philosophy should be allowed to dictate our Society's activities. Sure we have contests to select quartet and chorus winners, but since when has the winning of a contest become so all-important that those who might not win shouldn't participate. If the Society is to endure as a singing organization then the emphasis must be placed on singing for one another and for the public with the contest idea less important, if not secondary. But, I digress. If there is enough chapter spirit in the hometown and if the chapter attends the convention to give their support to its quartets, then I expect the quartets will compete and in addition, the chapter will compete as a chorus, whether they are good enough to win or not.

"Aw, those clinics don't help." Or, "Those judges know who will win before the contest". Could it be that some of us have thin skins and don't want to be told that a little practice might help us sing better, that we sing a little sharp or flat, or that we should select songs more suitable to our capabilities?
