Where do our future Barbershoppers come from? Barbershop quartet addict "Webb" Scrivnor of the DUNE TONES and sometimes director (although not at present) of the Muskegon Port City Chorus (a public school vocal music teacher in Grand Haven along with Al Burgess and some other fine teachers), writes that an officer in another musical organization, known as the Michigan School Vocal Association, phoned him and asked him to help organize a male chorus festival for high school boys. One thing led to another and this is what's going to happen:


There will be a Male Chorus Festival (for high school boys) at the Northwestern Junior High School on Saturday, May 10, in Battle Creek. In addition to about 12 to 14 competing choruses (not barbershop, of course), there will be a mass chorus of all the boys attending--hopefully, about 1,000 boys. The mass chorus will sing three songs, one of which will be barbershop--namely, the "Honey-Lil Lize Medley"--which is being furnished by the International office in Kenosha. In addition, Bob Johnson is coming to Battle Creek to help judge the contest and will direct the mass chorus in the medley. The Wolverine Chorus from Oakland County Chapter is coming across state to put on a demonstration-performance for the boys to let them see how it's really done.

This is a daytime (9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.) festival; there is no public performance and no admission price. If anyone wanted to walk in and hear a little, they would be welcome to do so. However, this is NOT a barbershop festival. There are three mass chorus numbers--one of them is barbershop, one of them is a motet in Latin, and a third is a contemporary church music composition. Moreover, the competing choruses will be singing one serious (long-hair) composition and one light or comedy number. Bob is scheduled for early afternoon with the barbershop number.

Where do our future Barbershoppers come from? The answer is obvious: From our youth of today--our men of tomorrow; and "Webb" must be congratulated for his fine work. We can just imagine the thrill that a bunch of high school boys are getting out of his (and our great Bob Johnson's) introduction into our kind of harmony.

When these youth grow up, they will become eligible to join one of the greatest fraternaties in America--S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. Here they will be able to enjoy the friendship and fraternal kinship of over 35,000 men who believe that "If you have a song on your lips, you can't have hate in your heart"; who "sing, that others may speak" through Logopedics; who are the biggest bunch of "patriotic, sentimental, generous, fun-loving, hams" in the world; and whose motto "Keep America Singing" has become a way of life.

Personally, we are proud as punch to be a part of this wonderful fraternity, long may it grow with more and more men of good character and a love of good music joining our ranks. Thanks to "Webb", and others like him, we are sure that it will be so in the future.




# **PIONEER DISTRICT** THE

# HAS MUCH TO BE PROUD OF -

As compiled by Carroll P. Adams

- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT was the First District to be organized, (Detroit, Lansing, Flint, and Grand Rapids) and once contained over 1/3 of the membership of the entire Society (15,000). We had 65 chapters and over 5,000 members.
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT once had the Society's largest chapter: Oakland County, with 302 members. Chicago was second with 298.
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT chapter of Detroit is the only city to have hosted 3 International Conventions --1944, 1945 and 1953. Michigan is the only state to have sponsored 4 International Conventions (Detroit 3 and Grand Rapids in 1942.)
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT was the first to have District Quartet Contests, Grand Rapids in 1940 and 1941.
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT was responsible for making our Society international when the Oakland County Chapter sponsored the Windsor, Ontario Chapter early in 1943. Up to that time, we were just a national organization.
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT originated the term "Parade" when the Detroit Chapter had its first quartet show in the ballroom of the then "Book-Cadillac" Hotel.
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT has had 4 International Presidents -- Clarence Jalving of Holland, Wes Meier of Grosse Pointe, Ed Smith of Wayne, and Carroll Adams of Detroit,
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT'S Joe Wolff designed the Society's official emblem.
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT'S Joe Wolff drew up the Society's Code of Ethics. Joe was, at that time, International Vice President and bass of the famous Ambassadors of Harmony,
- \* THE PIONEER DISTRICT'S Bill Diekema of Holland wrote and arranged the Society's theme song, "Keep America Singing."



#### To The Pioneer District Barbershoppers:

I think that they really are the losers if they don't follow the precedent that has been set. This is as much fun as any convention with a lot less pressure. Also, we aren't the only ones to lose -- Lee and Rich lose a lot also.


He is a certified judge in the Harmony Accuracy category and for some years served as Chairman of the Society's Contest and Judging program.

# **Guide Lines For Quartets**

There recently came to my attention an interesting four-page paper entitled "THE SPEBSQSA SWIPE", date January 10, 1942, furnished by Len Horton of Muskegon, a member of the original "Sawdust Four" quartet that took honors in the early days of the Society.

A spirited contest raged over which city should host the 1942 International Convention--Chicago or Grand R.pids. After the usual wire pulling and politicking, Grand Rapids was declared winner by one vote. The "Swipe" was the organ which played up the convention, all stops pulled out. The front page depicts the likeness of a gay young blade by the name of Carroll P. Adams, who, incidentally, happened to be International President at the time. With this dynamic organizer at the helm, nothing of importance was omitted from the paper which would add to the importance of forthcoming convention.

It seems that at the few previous conventions competing quartets had no particular rules or guide lines but each quartet worked out such harmony as best fitted the taste of its members. The record shows that the harmony produced by many quartets was of the highest barbershop caliber. Some would agree today that the plan was not too bad, but if standards were to be improved and some degree of uniformity should be set up, there should be guide posts to help quartets achieve a higher proficiency in framing harmony.

To attain the desired standards, Adams, with the aid of Hal Stauh polled the country through a questionnaire as to the best methods to follow. The rules compiled from a survey of the questionnaires provided that 100 points or per cent should form a perfect performance. The points were awarded as follows:

HARMONY ACCURACY	25
SONG ARRANGEMENT	25
VOICE EXPRESSION	30
SONG SELECTION	10
STAGE PRESENCE	10

These categories would not mean much to the average Barbershopper unless they were defined and this was done.

HARMONY ACCURACY--This shall be defined as "Absence of Discord". Discord is produced when one or more voices are off pitch, or when a chord is sung, the notes of which do not produce pleasing harmony.

SONG ARRANGEMENT--This item shall be judged according to the degree in which a quartet effectively includes pleasing, difficult, and original chords and combinations of chords, as opposed to simple straight harmony.

VOICE EXPRESSION--This item shall cover the quality of the voices, the blending and balance of voices, use of volume, phrasing, precision of attack and release, enunciation, pitching of the song within the limits of the quartet's voice range, and pitch maintenance. STAGE PRESENCE--Excellence of poise and personality shall be the main consideration in judging stage presence. Acting, "mugging" and injection of comedy are immaterial. Four men neatly dressed in any costume, except regular street clothes, will not be penalized over four elaborately-dressed singers.

Some modifications have been made over the years but the ground work was laid twenty-seven years ago. It is now assumed that quartets know the difference between good, old fashioned Barbershop numbers and those not so classified, so "Song Selection" has been displaced with Balance and Blend, which fits in with the other categories to round out a complete ensemble of harmony. Quartets, whether in contest or not would do well to acquaint themselves with these fundamentals for it is upon these categories that judging is based.






