

A Jackson Chordial. That's not a drink, and its more than a feeling. It was a life style from October 10th to the 12th. The Jackson Chapter chordially hosted 600 Barbershoppers at the Pioneer District Fall Convention. For those fortunate enough to have been there, it was a weekend of singing, sociallizing, singing, seeing old friends, singing, competing, and singing.

There are 1,464 card-carrying members of the Pioneer District. Of this 460 or 31% participated in the competition Saturday (either chorus or quartet). I am confident there is not another organization in this country that realizes a 31% participation at their functions.

We have every reason to be proud of our memberships response to conventions. Seventeen quartets (count em, 17) competed for the title of 1969-70 Pioneer District Champion. And ten choruses competed for the privilege of representing the Pioneer District in International competition in Atlantic City next June. Some men were fortunate enough to participate in both the quartet and chorus competition.

The Vagabonds won the quartet competition and the Wolverines won the Chorus competition. But the other quartets and choruses did not lose. They won too because they had the thrill of being on stage singing to ten critical judges and an auditorium full of not-so-critical fellow Barbershoppers. And they had the satisfaction of knowing they participated, that they fulfilled the ultimate responsibility to their membership.



They are active participants in the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America.

No, the real losers are the 800 card-carrying members of the Pioneer District who did not attend the convention, who did not partake of the Jackson Chordial. They are the losers. They stayed home and watched a good football game on television. Or got the yard ready for winter. Or did one of a hundred other things that were more important to them. They are the losers.

And what is our responsibility to them? As much as it is to Tony, Norm, Ken, and Denny. We invite them into the Society and make them aware of the benefits, and the responsibilities, of membership. The extent to which they participate is up to them. They can sing in organized quartets and choruses and realize the full measure of the benifits of SPEBSQSA membership. Or they can woodshed and sing tags and realize the same benefits. Or they can become active in administration and realize the same benefits. Or they can stay home. And realize no benefits.

So this article is an appeal to those card-carriers who are Barbershoppers in name only. Re-discover what it is that brought you into this Society. Re-discover what it is that challenges men to reach for that ringing 7th chord.

And the way to do it is for you to make a personal commitment to attend the next ten functions of your chapter - chorus rehersals, chapter meetings, visitations, shows, etc. Then you will remember the benefits to you in Barbershopping. I'll see you at your chapters next meeting.

Heritage of Harmony

This is the second article in the continuing series that was written by Mark Roberts in 1963. All of the articles will be reprinted for the benifit of thise of us who were not sround to read the original printing. This Month's offering:

MICHIGAN GAINS STATURE

Michigan had no quartets in the National Contests of 1939 and 1940 but in St. Louis in 1941 Michigan's two top rated quartets, the District Champion Saw Dust Four and the runner-up Detroit Turners competed. While our two quartets did not come back bemedalled, they were finalists and we garnered both the National Presidency and the National Convention and Contest for 1942. Carroll Adams of the Detroit Chapter was our man who took over the top S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. job and Grand Rapids was awarded the convention and contest. We also placed three men on the National Board of Directors when Roscoe Bennett, Ed Schwoppe and Joe Wolff were elected to this high office.

Grand Rapids staged the biggest and best convention yet held and filled their Civic Auditorium with listeners for the big show. Our District also advanced musically when we placed five quartets in the finals. These were the Detroit Turners, Hall Brothers of Grand Rapids, Accoustical Persecuting Four of Jackson, Port City Four of Muskegon and the Gay Nineties of Kalamazoo. Other Michigan Quartets in this contest were the Pleasure Four, Strollers, American Legion Four, Banner Four (later to become the Progressives and Frankenmuth Quartet) and Dubious Four, all of Detroit, and the Old Timers, Muskie Musikords and Saw Dust Four of Muskegon; the Roundhouse Four and Dreamers of Grand Rapids, the State Highway Four of Lansing, the Ballad Benders of Charlevoix, the Variety Four of Birmingham, the Four Jewells of Flint, the Owosso Elks and the Four Oaks of Royal Oak. The reader may wonder how we got so many District quartets into the National contest. In those days

there were no elimination contests and any quartet was eligible to compete. While this system quite obviously, did not upgrade the standard of contest singing, it was more fun for everyone and particularly for the many quartets which entered merely for the fun of competing and not with the idea of taking honors. In some ways this system served the purpose of "preserving and encouraging" our kind of singing much better than the present arrangement because it provided fun, fulfilment and fellowship for a greater number of society members.

The Ten Year History of the Society states that the dearth of top tenors made it necessary that we have a rule barring anyone from singing in more than one competing quartet, but this rule was not adopted until after the National Contest at Grand Rapids where the writer sang with two competing quartets, the Dubious Four with Tim Weber, Mort Gittleman and Joe Wolff, and the finalist Detroit Turners. Maybe the officials decided that I was singing tenor but I thought it was baritone. In any event, being the only Society member to sing with two quartets in the same International contest has not brought me a Nobel Prize. either for promoting harmony or interfering with it, and I mention it here merely because it is necessary nowadays to cling to whatever small distinctions that are left. Another incident at Grand Rapids that year was that Jim Creed, well remembered for his high lyric tenor voice, sang in the prelims and finals without a tooth in his head. Jim's new dentures were not ready but he was, so he became the only "toothless

tenor" on record in an International contest. I never did find out how the Stage Presence Judges scored this lack of uniformity - three guys with teeth and one without but an obvious correction under these circumstances would be for the other three members of the quartet to have all their teeth yanked out.

One of the best decisions ever made by S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. was to appoint Carroll Adams as International Secretary following his term as International President in 1942. While most of us were too busy singing and enjoying ourselves to pay much attention to the administrative problems created by the rapid growth of the Society, Carroll was well aware of them and he proceeded to bring some order out of chaos by organizing an efficient International office. In the process, Carroll moved the Society, lock, stock and barrel to Detroit and established headquarters there and made Michigan the center of Barbershopping. While Adams was surrounded here and assisted by a group of Barbershoppers who were second to none in numbers, enthusiasm and dedication, it still was because of his vision, enterprise and hard work that Michigan became the leader in all things Barbershop. While we have every reason to be proud of the history of the Michigan District and the many great Barbershoppers who have contributed to this history, let us reserve a special niche for Carroll Adams, a truly great one.

At one time, Michigan was the leader in membership, in number of chapters, in number of quartets and in just about every facet of Barbershopping that could be counted, weighed or measured. have hosted four International Contests and Conventions, ours was the first District and we had the first District contest; our Detroit Chapter held the first Parade of Quartets and we were the first to have a local association of chapters (now called areas.) We have produced more than our share of International Officers and Board members and Committee heads. Even today the Michigan District rates high when the ratio of Barbershoppers to the general population of the District is considered. A District with a population of twenty million should have more Barbershoppers than one with eight million.





Many of us sing and never really think of what our special sound consists of.

Well. We find at the top of a Chord, at the Directors left the Tenor. (The Director is the guy who is dedicated to standing in front of a group raising and lowering a forefinger of each hand in a ritualistic beat of some sort and frowning and grimacing at the poor fellows before him.)

Now the Tenor, poor fellow, suffers from constricted throat muscles caused by one reason or another and is unable to lower his voice range. He will be forced to stand at the Directors left forever or until he heals and can, joyfully, move to the Directors right any given distance.

At the Directors right we find the Basse Basses are big guys with big voices. I guess EVERYTHING grew. I recall a moose in the Northcountry which sat on a thorn and ran raging and bellowing thru the bush. That's the Bass. Now if he could constrict his loose throat muscles a little he could escape from Directors left to freedom.

Between the Tenors and Basses, we find the leads.

The leads throat musles are constructed some to keep him out of the bass section but not enough to put him with the Tenors. He has a sad part. It requires no thought or special skill. Many leads, while singing Mother McRee, might be thinking of football scores, overdue bills, or what's for dinner. His main duty is to set the pace and volume of the group. He stands

in front of the Director where a watchful eye can be kept on him.

Now if he could overcome his handicaps he may progress to the ultimate.

The BARITONE. Oh Joy. Doesn't the thought bring tears and a swelling to your heart. The Baritone. This beautiful, delicate, skillful, technician of song. His role is to establish the fabulous Barbershop Chord. When you get home from a great Barbershop event and you lie in bed, too keved up to sleep, you'll be rehearing all those endearing rafter ringers bouncing around your skull and you'll say a little prayer for the Baritone, for it was his hard work and skill and fabulous vocal chords that supplied the exquisite final finenes that created all those rafter ringers in the quality that is unique to our own fine organization


