We are in the process of starting a brand new year of Barbershopping in the Pioneer District.

Even though we have had a very good year in the realm of new charters and our retention has been very good, we should still look forward to even better things for the coming year.

The Spring Convention will be held in Bay City April 25-26-27. This, in my estimation, is a good barometer as to the interest that is held for this great hobby of ours by each and every member. We all know it is impossible to attend everything that goes on (how well I know) but this is your convention and you can show your interest by your attendance. It is your convention; and like your District or your chapter, it is what you make it.

Even if you are not connected with a quartet or chorus, just your being there to cheer the chorus or quartet of your choice is appreciated and lots of fun.

While on the subject of conventions and contests, I might mention that due to numerous requests and, yes, some obvious complaints to the effect that we should have a 10-man panel of judges--I checked with other Districts (all) and we are the only one that is not using this system at present. There are arguments pro and con concerning the necessity of this, however.

Your District Board, after much consideration decided to utilize this for both the Spring and Fall

Conventions of 1969. At the same time, we would like to use it as a test to determine if there will be more quartet participation and better attitudes on the part of all quartets and choruses.

I might add from figures just received recently, we had 11 quartets in Spring Contest and only 8 in the Fall Contest out of 37 registered in the Pioneer District. Let's see this figure raised if possible in 1969. It will make for more interesting contests and, of course, more and better competition.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome the four new chapters taken into the fold in 1968. They are:

1969 looks like it's going to be the best ever for O.C.C. We started the year with 104 members, and we're aiming our sights at a modest 21-member gain for the year.

Our first-Friday-of-the-month chapter meetings will include the EVERSHARPS at our January meeting, the WONDERLADS at our February meeting, the CHORD REPORTERS at our March Greenhorn Quartet Contest (they were last year's winners), and the KASUAL D's at our April Pre-Boyne Contest. Pre-registration blanks are available elsewhere in this Troubadour issue.

It is entirely possible that O.C.C. will have five quartets entered in the Spring contest. 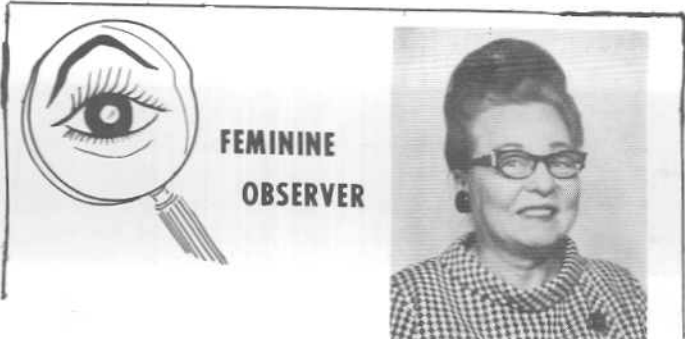
The new slate of officers was introduced formally on Ladies Nite and new President, Jim Smith, was officially tendered the reins. We're going to give him full support and back him in every way.
