


That was in 1925, thirteen years before SPEB was born. The following "P.R." release was sent along with the picture by the father-coach of the Little Shavers: The Little Shavers from Owosso, Mich. are Randy 10, Craig 8, Tim 6 and Kris 4, all sons of Sandy and Don Horton of Owosso. Don is a member of the Lansing Chapter.

The boys got their real start last Sept. at Harrisville. Since that time they have officially organized. The group has entertained for a number of groups in Owosso, Corunna, Lansing and Grand Rapids. These sing-outs include singing for the American Bus Womans Assoc., the Nurses Christmas party, a retirement party, a couple of Y.M.C.A. functions, a rest home, Chapters Ladies nights for Lansing and Grand Rapids. Jobs coming up for the Little Shavers include singing for the Shia. Co. Dental Assoc. and the Metropolitan club ladies night.

The real joy of this group is that it is a family project. The boys do all the performing, mommy takes care of the costumes and the scrapbook and daddy does the coaching. The boys have started a bank account at the Owosso Savings Bank where daddy works. Randy is the Financial Secretary and spokesman for the quartet. Already the boys are asking if they will ever be international champions.

So far the Little Shavers have earned enough to outfit themselves with matching suits, shirts, shoes and puff ties. Now they are starting to work for a tape recorder to assist them in learning new songs. And improving old ones.

The Little Shavers performance consists of a mixture of barbershop songs and kid songs with a little comedy worked in for variety. The act is about 25 minutes long and includes the following songs: Its Barbershop Harmony Time, Bill Grogan's Goat, Along Came Jones, Brown Squirrel, and Six Little Ducks and others.

One job the boys sang was for a \$20.00 donation to The Institute of Logopedics made by the American Business Womans Assoc.


