

MINUTES OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING AT BATTLE CREEK JUNE 12, 1971.

Meeting was called to order by President Tom Damm at 1:30 P.M.. All officers were present except Executive Vice President Ron Gillies and Vice President Cliff MacLean. Also present was C & J Chairman Merle Clayton. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as read. Secretary also read the minutes of the House of Delegates meeting of April 25, 1971.

A discussion ensued relative to the publication of the District By-Laws. Pres. Tom Damm appointed a legislative committee to consist of Brad Laughlin of the Oakland County Chapter and Secretary Warner to review and bring up to date the By-Laws to incorporate all the changes to date with the thought of publishing them for distribution to all chapters. A copy of the revised By-Laws is to be furnished to the Board of Directors by the next meeting so that distribution might be made prior to the next House of Delegates Meeting.

A report by Treasurer Gillespie was read and approved as read. Treasurer Gillespie further advised that the Federal Tax Form 990 had been timely filed as well as the 5 month report to International. Vice President Funk advised that to date there had been no final report received from Traverse City relative to the spring convention and that in view of their absence at the meeting, he would be in contact with them on Monday and attempt to get a final accounting.

It was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the Traverse City Chapter should be complimented on their convention - that it was one of the finest that the members of this board had ever attended.

C & J Chairman Merle Clayton advised the Board that he was in the process of preparing a convention manual to be used by the Chapters as a guideline for the conduct of future conventions. This manual will be made available to the host chapter well in advance of its convention date.

IBM Gene Gillem reported to the Board on the agenda for the upcoming International Board meeting in New Orleans. The Board discussed the agenda proposal that would limit the license of a chapter to 6 mos. with the possibility of one three month extension before chartering would required. The Board also discussed the proposal to impose International COT School on every District at a cost of \$15,000.00 to be paid for by International. The Board recommended that IBM Gillem vote to maintain International COTS on the same voluntary basis as at present.

The Board also discussed the nominations for International Office, noting that Johnny Cairns from Toronto had not been nominated for vice president for the coming year. A discussion ensued relative to the possibility of making such nomination from the floor and it was agreed that we should contact Mr. Cairns and that we would initiate such action if he would be willing to accept.

Pres. Damm reported on the proposal from International offering Society lapel buttons that designate first, second, and third place quartet winners in the district contest at a cost of \$7.50 each. After considerable discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that these buttons would be a waste of money. Both Tom Damm and Tom Pollard, who are members of past district championship quartets, agreed that individual trophys would be much more acceptable.

Zone Reports:

Zone I: Vice Pres. Tom Pollard advised that two successful Auditions for Admissions had been held in his zone. One at Wayne and the other at Grosse Pointe.

Zone II: Vice Pres. Dick Simpson reported that Tecumseh put on a successful show. It was noted that the Tecumseh chapter and Three Rivers Chapter were both on associate status as of this date. V.P. Simpson reported that Benton Harbor has a new chorus director.

Zone III: Vice Pres. Funk reported on the Holland Tulip Festival and Lansing Fish Fry. He discussed the chorus director's school that had been held at Lansing and Bob Johnson's disappointment in the poor attendance. Sec. Warner advised that the poor attendance was not due to lack of publicity since a direct mailing explaining the school, the date, and location was made to every chapter president, secretary, and musical director in the district prior to the school as well as notification in the Troubadour. The associate status of the Big Rapids chapter was again discussed and it was noted that V.P. Funk had been directed to make one more attempt to help them bring their membership up to the required 25 level before suggesting that International revoke their charter.

Zone IV: In the absence of Vice Pres. MacLean, Sec. Warner read a report which had been forwarded to him by V.P. MacLean prior to the meeting. There are no special problems in Zone IV chapters. Boyne City contest was great but saddened by the death of one of their staunchest members. AuSable Chapter put on a successful show. There still appears to be some interest in Alpena for the extension committee to work on. Change of address was noted as follows: Capt. Cliff MacLean, Rt. 1 Box 208, Cedarville, Mich 49719

Zone V: Vice Pres. Bud Carpenter advised that the Holly-Fenton Chapter is having its problems membership wise, otherwise everything else in his zone is progressing smoothly.

Treasurer Gillespie was directed to prepare a check to the Wolverine Chorus for \$1,500.00 and to the Gentlemen's Agreement and the Vagabonds for \$200.00 each as the Pioneer District contribution to their respective International Competition travel funds.

It was noted that as of this date there has been no location picked for the Spring 1972 Convention.

The next board meeting was scheduled for noon on Saturday, Sept. 4, 1971 at Tom Pollards house in Harrisville.

Meeting adjourned at 5:30 P.M.

MERLE CLAYTON, District C & J Chairman, gave me some filler material to answer some common questions about the C & J system. Here are some of them - you'll also find them scattered about in future issues.

- Q. How late can a quartet register and enter either the International Preliminary or District Quartet Contest?
- $\underline{A}$ . Right up to the time the Chairman of Judges calls the  $\overline{Q}$ uartet Briefing Session to order.
- $\underline{\mathbb{Q}}$ . In what order do late entrants sing and who determines this?
- A. The Chairman of Judges has the sole authority to decide when late entrants will sing. In the Pioneer District the Chairman customarily has ordered late entrants to sing first so as not to put undue pressure on those who have cooperated by entering well in advance of the date of drawing for position.
- Q. How is the Official Panel of Judges selected for each contest?

A. The District Associate Contest and Judging Chairman (DAC&JC) must use Certified Judges for each official contest. First he tries to select one from each category in our own District. Next he tries to select the best man available from nearby Districts. The DAC&JC does this on his own for the October contest.

In the case of the April contest, he nominates Certified District and out-of-District Judges and two alternates in each category to the International Contest and Judging Chairman. The International Chairman recommends the Official Panel to the International President who makes the official appointment.

# THE EIGHT APTURES LANTEST




