

MINUTES OF PIONEER DISTRICT BOARD MEETING Lansing, Michigan January 23, 1972

The meeting was called to order by President BILL WARNER at 10:00 A.M. All officers were present except Treasurer BOB DRABIK. Also in attendance were DOUG BEAVER and LARRY KING, of the Saginaw Bay and Detroit Chapters, respectively.

President Warner reported that Treasurer BOB DRABIK had written him, regretfully resigning as District Treasurer due to being transferred to Knoxville, Tennessee. President Bill stated that LAWRENCE G. (LARRY) KING has agreed to accept the District Treasurer position. It was moved by I.B.M. TOM DAMM, seconded and unanimously passed that LARRY KING be appointed District Treasurer for 1972.

The minutes of the meeting of November 13, 1971 were read and approved.

Zone Reports:

Zone I - TOM POLLARD reported that the Zone is healthy and that there has been a lot of activity since the first of the year. Several Chapters have new meeting places and these were all reported for inclusion in the new District Directory.

Zone II - DICK SIMPSON reported that the Tecumseh Chapter Char ter has been formally revoked. He reported that all Chapters are going strong. Area Counselor HERM DYKEMA_has been very active and reports that those Chapters in the southwest part of the state have been active, including a planned tri-chapter meeting among Battle Creek, Kalamazoo and Three Rivers on February 28th.

Zone III - DEL DOCTOR reported all things quite good in his Zone. Both Muskegon and Holland are holding their show the same date this year. Del has spoken to the Chapters about this and has requested Holland to clear future show dates with the District to avoid this conflict hereafter. Holland and Muskegon are exploring the possibility of a joint Afterglow this year.

Big Rapids' associate status was discussed. It was agreed that an additional extension should not be requested for Big Rapids, therefore their charter will be revoked at the January International Board meeting in San Diego. V.P. Doctor also reported that John "Mike" Simpson has accepted the position of Area Counselor for Zone III.

Zone IV - MAX CARTER reported that Captain Cliff MacLean has accepted an area counselor position. Au Sable Chapter is still below the membership level needed for chartering, and an extension has been requested by the District.

Zone V - V. P. BUD CARPENTER reported that Area Counselor DOUGLAS has been very active. Gratiot County and Holly-Fenton Chapters are holding their own. Pontiac, Saginaw Bay and Flint are strong.

Executive Vice-President DON FUNK reported on his activities. He has been meeting with Saginaw Bay on the Spring Convention plans. He and DOUG BEAVER then gave a report on these plans. The Convention financial budget was presented. A long discussion ensued regarding the Convention budget and plans. A motion was passed that the District Board recommend all-event ticket prices of \$5.00 for competing members and \$7.00 for non-contestants at the Spring Convention. Also the individual ticket price schedule as presented by Saginaw Bay was recommended.

The District financial statement for the year ended December 31, 1971 was presented and approved.

A tentative District budget for 1972 was presented by Secretary GILLESPIE.

President WARNER announced a tentative schedule of Board meetings for 1972.

President Bill suggested that the Fall Convention Committee from Flint attend the May Board meeting to cover Fall Convention plans on a preliminary basis.

President BILL WARNER then read a letter from ROGER LEWIS suggesting the appointment of a District Public Relations man and outlining suggested duties of such a position. The Board agreed that the District is in need of such a position. President WARNER stated that he would seek a good man to handle this job. He welcomed suggestions from the Board members.

Plans were formalized for the 1972 International Send-Off Show. It was moved, seconded and passed that the report of the International Send-Off committee be accepted and that this fund-raising show be held in Lansing on May 26th, with ticket prices established at \$3.00 per person.

International Board Member TOM DAMM read a letter received from the International C. & J. chairman regarding action taken at the Fall House of Delegates meeting dealing with eligibility of Pioneer District members competing in International chorus competition. It was unanimously agreed that the International committee has apparently misinterpreted the District Delegate's action and I. B. M. DAMM was instructed to request re-examination and clarification of this eligibility point by the appropriate individuals at the mid-winter International Board meeting.

TOM DAMM then reported on the agenda items to be covered at the Mid-winter San Diego meeting. A long discussion took place regarding these items, including the proposed \$1.00 per member dues increase. The District Board was unanimous in its feeling that there should be no dues increase at this time.




