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


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


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ORIGINAL CHOICE HANGS UP PITCHPIPE

The meeting was called to order by President Bill Warner at 1:00 P.M. All officers were present except Vice Presidents Dick Simpson, Max Carter and Noel "Bud" Carpenter. (Bud joined the meeting at 1:55 P.M.) Also in attendance were Merle Clayton, District C & J Chairman, and John Noteware, Au Sable Valley Chapter Chorus Director.

The minutes of the meeting of June 25, 1972 were approved as read.

The District financial report for the eight months ended August 31, 1972, showing total District assets of \$8861.29 was presented by Treasurer King. He also presented a final accounting of the 1972 International Send-off Show, showing a carryover balance of \$1,534.61 (included in total district assets above). Both reports were accepted as read.

President Bill Warner reported that Detroit No. 1 Chapter had accepted the District's request to host the 1973 International Send-off Show. The show will be held at Ford Auditorium on June 23, 1973. President Bill stated that he would soon appoint a committee to plan this event.

Tom Damm reported on the results of the Atlanta charter flight. The flight was very successful financially, resulting in refunds to passengers of \$729.00 and a carryover to the 1973 District Charter Contingency Fund of \$195.69.

A District C & J report was rendered by Merle Clayton. He presented the tentative roster of judges for our Fall 1972 Convention.

At his time (1:55 P.M.) International Field Representative Lloyd Steinkamp joined the meeting.

Merle continued his report, now as assistant to Troubadour Editor Roger Lewis, reporting on the publication's problems. He stated that it was his understanding that an issue would be published before the Pall contest.

Each of the Zone Vice Presidents in attendance reported on the chapter activities in his respective area. V.P. Tom Pollard also reported on the successful Harrisville weekend.

Executive V.P. Don Funk reported on International Music Services Assistant Mac Huff's forthcoming District visit.

E.V.P. Funk was requested to check out the possibility of arranging a Mac Huff quartet and coaches clinic in Grand Rapids on October 21, 1972 at the Hotel Pantlind. If such a meeting can be arranged, then direct mailings will be made to District Quartets advising them of the clinic.

A discussion ensued regarding our Pioneer District COT school to be held in Lansing on November 11 and 12 by an International faculty. President Warner stated that he would send out a mailing to all chapter presidents regarding COTS, in addition to any mailings by International Headquarters. International Representative Lloyd Steinkamp reported on his Pioneer District Chapter visits during the past week.

An I.B.M. report was rendered by Tom Damm. He covered the new International Board ruling that the sale of records or other items at Chapter and District functions is prohibited unless prior clearance has been granted under rules established by that District. It was agreed that in the Pioneer District, the rule would be that such sales are permitted at Chapter and District functions, provided that prior permission is received from the host chapter board, or in the case of District activities, the District Board.

President Warner requested a report from the International Send-off funds distribution and Convention Manual Committees that he appointed at the last board meeting. Neither committee had a report to render at this time.

A report of the District Nominating Committee was given by committee Chairman Tom Damm. The report was accepted as given.

It was moved and passed that Cliff Douglas be named 1971 Area Counselor of the Year, and therefore recipient of the Chase Sanborn Area Counselor Award.

Bill Warner announced the results of the 1971 Chapter Achievment contest. The Gold Award was won by Oakland County Chapter, and the Silver Award by Pontiac Chapter.

The next meeting will be held Friday evening, October 13, in Flint. The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 P.M.




