### PIONEER DISTRICT HOUSE OF DELEGRATES' MEETING Briarwood Hilton Inn, Ann Arbor, Michigan April 26, 1980

The meeting was called to order at 9.05 a.m. by President LaBumberd. The invocation was offered by IBM McTappan. EVP Junes led the delegation in "The ON Sovice."

The Treasurer's report was distributed to those present. A balance of \$12,879.12 was shown as of March 31, 1980.

IBM McTaggart automated a written report reviewing action taken at the Mid-Winter convention. Among items covered were. The abulishment of the Associate Status Chapters: Stage Presence Category scoring changes; an explanation of the reasons for the dues increase and the optional surmonth dues payment plan for new members.

The wanten report submitted by EVP Jones indicated that the Lanung Chapter had submitted a hid for the 1982 Spring Convention. The delegation victed to accept the bid. Both Spring and Fall Conventions for 1983 are open and bids are solicited, he also solicited additional increasions for the Hall of Fame.

Engagedics Owemen Burham's report showed that \$14,785.54 was contributed by the Chapters and Quartets in the Destrict in 1975, well above set \$12,000 goal. Setteen Chapters qualified for the Harmony Foundation Award, in addition, he reviewed the Engagedics Sermine haid at the Instruct Destruct, raying greater paintippson in the Legopedics meetings at District Conventions, and outlined plans for the Legopedics activity in construction with the 1981 International Convention in Detroit. President LaBumbard commenced Durham for his successful efforts on behalf oil Engagedics.

88 Warner. Charman of the 1981 International Convention, presented a written report indicating that charmen for the standing committees have been selected and committee members are being solicited. A notion was then made and seconded to refer the proposed realignment of chapters within divisions back to a committee.

IBM McTaggan's report highlighted action taken at the International Board Meeting in July. The selection of St. Lowis, MD, as the size for the 1984 International convention. Bort Huish elected 1981 International President, Planeer District's John Gillanges elected to the International Board as Vice President-Transiers. Society membership is over 800 members above a year ago, Mid-Winter Convention sizes were selected for 1982 and 1983 (Tucson and Saresota, respectively). Harmony Hall West income from rent is \$1,000 annually. A problem exists with Divie. Ontaxio, Johnny Applicated, and Paineer Busticts all fever conventions on the third waveland or October.

EVP Junes' report indicated 1983 convention area are still open for Spring and Fall and bids are being solicited. - DVP McFaidyer read a letter from the Southeast Michigan Association of Chapters (SMAC) which included a peragraph that

  discussion on the function and jurisdiction of SMAC. No action was taken.
- IBM McTaggan indicated the Enday, June 12, 1981, had been reserved for the Sent Off Show at Caboro Hall in Windsor, it
  was suggested that he endeavor to reserve Seturday, June 12% in deterence to those who must travel from out-of-state, EVP
  Jones motioned that the Sent-Off Show be hald on the second weekend of June, Seturday if possible. Treasurer Schneider
  seconded: Miction passed.
- Secretary McCinchey asked what body, in fact, was to be host to the 1981 International Convention in Despit, it is the
  understanding of the Board that this or a function of the Materpolitais District Area Chapters and volunteers from throughout
  the District. IBM McCinggan stand that he would statust the District Chapter to remove their reference to being facts of the
  convention from their chapter stationery.
- DVP NetI relevant the need for chapters throughout the District to apontion and support towel fund resing events, he asked that Board Members consider ideas in this vein and ouggested that if it was done on the divisional level, some success might be realized, it was provided out by Peasadria. LiBumberd that the Provisor District is in the upper strate regarding per capital contributions by Districts to their respective travel funds.
- Because the Associate Status Chapter category has been eliminated by the International Board they have prepared evaluation sheats to be reviewed by DVP's and Ame Counselors regarding chapters of concern. President LaBumbard distributed these forms to those DVP's present.

He was very active in helping to organize new chapters during the 1940's and 1950's, such as Niles, Sturgis, Marcellus, Three Rivers, Benton Harbor, Big Rapids, Ionia, Belding, Greenville, Ithica, Alma, Cadillac, Traverse City, Beulah, Manistee, Ludington, Hart, Whitehall, Mackinaw City, Sault Ste. Marie, Alpena, Reed City and Petosky.

Bob initiated the Barbershopper of the Year Program in the Grand Rapids Chapter. His Travellers Quartet spent many hours in World War II entertaining wounded servicemen at Percy Jones Hospital in Battle

Creek, Michigan.

He served as President for the Grand Rapids Chapter in 1960, and was a big help with getting chorus competition organized. For many years he was a top ticket seller for the Great Lakes Invitational.

A true Salesman of Barbershop was Robert H. Walker. He will be greatly missed by his family and his many friends and as-

sociates.


