In a contest that brings together the best of our sixteen districts in the SPEBSQSA, we begin with 16 winners from chorus competitions and, depending on medalist quartets, there could be two or more quartets representing each district. No contestant, be it a quartet or chorus walks away from such a quartet the only winner.

Our Society awards medals to those who excel in their abi-

from taking part in the International competition. The top sixteen choruses would be selected according to their scores in the International preliminaries. Quartets would, I would suspect, be chosen in a like manner. Based on our own Pioneer District preliminary contest scores, according to Squires, we would NOT have sent a chorus to compete in Minneapolis.

This Barbershopper would like to go on record expressing his opposition to this line of thinking. It could turn out to be counterproductive, in that many

In order for our craft to continue we must all be concerned with a better performance than the one before, because it is through these fund-raisers that we are able to make enough money for new music and equipment and also to build on our current membership. If we cannot be crowd pleasers then we will cease to exist.



Bob Squires, editor of the written voice of the West Towns Chorus (Lombard, Illinois) wrote an article, recently, on the subject of chorus and quartet selection for International competition. He wrote of a selection process that would, for example, eliminate some Districts

chorus members throughout the Society would be denied the thrill of International competition. Having had the honor twice, it is truly something to remember for the rest of my life. It would discourage many, instead of encouraging choruses to get involved. To some, it would almost be like someone was trying to eliminate the World Series or democratic representation.

The thought of something like this taking place really is quite upsetting. It is agreed that we should continue to strive to better ourselves in our craft through the continued use of schools and the visits of the best that Kenosha has to offer, but there should be other alternatives to this recommendation. We should not run the risk of alienating anyone but continue to encourage our quartets and choruses to compete under the present system.



When Sam Kennedy, Society field representative, placed an ad in the local papers in the Port Huron area announcing his intentions to hold a meeting in that city for the purpose of organizing a Barbershop Chapter, many eyebrows were raised in the southeastern sector of the Pioneer District.

By the time Sam had left town most of the eyebrows were drooping back toward a more normal half-mast, and the fruits of his mission were very much in evidence in the Blue Water Country.

Port Huron is well on its way to becoming a charter holder in our prestigious Society as a result of this bit of spadework.

It didn't just happen.

Real organization never "just happens". Someone has to make it work. But before "someone" makes it work, a lot of planning and calculation goes into the hopper.

Thus the newspaper ads, with accompanying stories; day and evening appearances on radio and TV; the splendid kickoff show that featured the BOONDOCKERS, BACK PORCH MAJORITY and the vibrant Lakeshore Chorus from Grosse Pointe. And, of course, Sam Kennedy and the staff from Kenosha.

One of the first contacts Sam made was with Pat Yacques of the Grosse Pointe Chapter. The fine baritone

of the BACK PORCH MAJORITY was asked to become the musical director and help guide the work in its organizational stages. This proved to be a wise choice as the work evolved.

The organizational meeting was held at the Fogcutter, a restaurant on top of the Peoples Bank Building in Port Huron, Wednesday September 26. President Bill Warner, who was invited to be on hand for the occasion, found himself pressed into serviceas the master of ceremonies for the event, and those present were treated to an evening of Barbershopping not soon to be forgotten.

The net result of this initial effort was the signing of 24 members who paid their initiation dues that evening.

The fledgling chapter has been granted a license, and according to Pat, hopes to charter within the year. "There is little doubt that we could not attain the 35 members necessary for chartering a chapter right away," Pat says. "However, we want to be sure it will be a sound chapter and capable of retention of its members before we take that step, and I'm sure we will make it."

For those Barbershoppers who have been around for a few moons, you know that the Port Huron Chapter has been around a lot longer than 10 months. The lead paragraphs came from a 12/73 TROUBADOUR article entitled "PORT HURON--AN EXAMPLE OF 'ENCOURAGEMENT,' DEDICATION, ORGANIZATION AND MUCH HARD WORK." This was forwarded to me by our own Art Schultze, our official Pioneer District Historian.

It should be noted that the Port Huron Chapter was chartered not only once, but twice. First formed on May 14, 1943 at a meeting held in the Hotel Harrington, and chartered officially on May 23, 1943. The charter was eventually revoked on November 1, 1948.

Like the proverbial Phoenix rising out of the ashes, the Port Huron Chapter experienced a "rebirth", or "reincarnation", on September 26, 1973 when they had their organizational meeting mentioned in the article. They were officially chartered once again on May 22, 1974.

From the information on hand, the chorus was named the "Huron Harmony Chorus." It was organized before the incorporation date and chartered \underline{ON} STAGE at Traverse City in competition and finished 10th of 14 choruses competiting! At the time of the new charter, Lyle Lee and Mark Older, members of the original group, were still active.

This is being brought to you as a tribute to some very dedicated Barbershoppers who were not content to stay silent. Their voices were silent as a chapter for over twenty-five years, but the will to belong to our worthwhile organization never disappeared. The dedication of Society field representative Sam Kennedy, Chapter President Gerald A. Schultz and his staff, as well as Pat Yacques will long serve as an example for all of us to follow.
