IN MEMORIUM

Fred Steinkamp, bari of the GEORGE BAGGISH MEMORIAL QUARTET, collapsed backstage after performing an accordian solo during the Westchester Chapter Annual Show on March 13, 1986.

Attempts to revive him by a physician chapter member were futile.

A long time professional musician and arranger in the New York City area, Fred got the Barbershop "bug" about 20 years ago and was considered "Mr. Barbershopper" of the Westchester area. He had held every position in the chapter, including President, and at the time of his death was Bulletin Editor and Co-Director.

Late in November, 1985, when it was determined that Frank Lanza, "Doc" Sause, and Ed Keller were planning to be at the Tucson Mid-Winter Convention, the foursome decided to enter the first Seniors Quartet Contest just for fun.

Because of Fred's striving for excellence in everything he did, and because of his outstanding creative showmanship ability, the new quartet, after five intensive rehearsals in White Plains, N.Y., entered the competition, and to everyone's surprise except Fred's, they won!

The quartet had several engagements booked, but their only public performance after Tucson was a "guest night" for the Westchester Chapter.

Fred, who was 65 at the time of his death, leaves his immediate family including his wife, and his brother, Lloyd Steinkamp of Phoenix, current Arrangement Category Specialist.

HARMONY OUTREACH IS BORN

Jim Stephens, District Director of Music Education, made a statement before the Board of Directors and the House of Delegates that Society-wide interest in the "Young Men in Harmony" is, and has been decreasing. Very few chapters in the Pioneer, in fact, have not made any effort in this direction. According to monthly figures put out by Internation, the Pioneer District is constantly losing its membership.

At the Board of Directors meeting, Jim read some very impressive credentials belonging to Gil Anders who had talked to him earlier of making an effort to reach more of the general public.



Pioneer International medalist Glenn VanTassell, made a formal presentation to both the Board of Governors and the House of Delegates on the subject of one of his past articles, that of encouraging chapters to take advantage of colleges and universities that might be close by District chapters.

President McDermott mentioned to those assembled that the messages of Gil Anders and Glenn VanTassell were much the same and asked that the two join forces with Clay Jones to launch "Harmony Outreach" (a suggestion of VanTassell's). The committee was given encouragement my the District Board and will be wasting no time in giving the District its recommendations to make our membership grow.

Bob McDermott has reason to be quite pleased, as much of what he has written in his articles and in his presentations before the District as to his hopes and aspirations for the Pioneer were brought to light.

It is one thing to be pleased with these signs of things to come, and another to do whatever is necessary to see these turn in to reality. Bob McDermott, Glenn VanTassell and his committee, Bill Lang our new District P.R. Officer and many other dedicated Barbershoppers are going to call on you to do your part, the future of the Pioneer will soon be in your hands.

QUARTET PERSPECTIVE

The Board of Directors and those who attended the House of Delegates meeting at the Spring Convention voted to carry the new policies and procedures voted on by International at the Mid-Winter one step further. Past International President John Gillespie mentioned to those assembled that the "No Late Entry" policy only applied to International quartet preliminaries. District President McDermott and others made the recommendation that the rule also be applied to International chorus preliminaries as well.

Beginning with the January 1, 1986 for all registered quartets, and effective immediately for District choruses, all those competing in International preliminaries will be notified by the District within forty-five days of the contest. All contestants MUST have their entry blanks postmarked fourteen (14) days prior to the preliminaries. NO MORE LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ALLOWED!

Please consider this your first official notification of the changes in International and District policy and procedures regarding International preliminary quartet and chorus contests. The minutes of both the Board of Directors and House of Delegates will be printed in the next edition of the Troubadour.

It seems as though the District leaders are in tune with the message, will you be able to hear their message?

So you've formed that new quartet you've always dreamed of and you recognize that it is time to make some decisions. How good a quartet do you want to be? How good a quartet do you expect to be? Does each member have the same range of expectations for this combination and is he willing and able to commit the time and effort to accomplish your mutual goals? Without having discussed these other areas, there really isn't much point in going further.

Assuming that you have determined your goals and priorities, it is time to discuss schedules and methods of getting the greatest use out of your available rehearsal time. It is wise to map-out a tentative rehearsal rehearsal schedule covering the next three to six months. Identify specific target dates, chapter shows, sing-outs, contests, schools, Recognize coaching sessions, etc. that you need to work toward a certain state of readiness for each different event.

Be willing to study your music in your own time and in your own way, but come to each rehearsal as well prepared as you possibly can. Don't waste time together in learning notes. Make use of recordings to learn new music by reading through new songs together, getting the basic notes and tempos on tape. Bear in mind that in this process, you are simply getting the notes and the form of the song. You will polish and enhance the song later as you become comfortable with it. Individually, as you rehearse at home or in your car, think about the song. What does it say to you. What insights can you take to the next rehearsal that will make it easier for all of you to feel more "into" the song?

Divide the organizational work among the four of you. Include your wives if they would care to get involved. Someone needs to handle bookings/scheduling, finances, costumes, music selection, publicity, quartet history and many other details. Share the work of the quartet and, without fail, share the decision-making pro-

cess. Don't set goals that are not mutual goals and don't accept commitments which have not been discussed. A time for business matters to be discussed, perhaps midway through each rehearsal while you take a coffee break. And take time to communicate. Use that same time segment to air any differences or problem areas before they develop into larger difficulties.

As much as possible, include your families in the activities of your quartet. Plan non-quartet outings together and get to know each other better. Ask the advice of families on the non-technical aspects of your quartet performance, but guard against the confusing effects of their possibly non-expert personal preferences. People close to you can unwittingly undermine the quartet with well meant, but ill-timed, comments. This is especially true at contest time.

Musically, you will want to stretch yourselves constantly. You can learn to sing longer phrases, sing more softly with quality, sing more loudly with quality, move comfortably and effectively while maintaining your music and on and on. None of this will happen, though if you don't challenge yourselves to be better.

Get out and perform for your chapter and for other chapters as soon as you can. Don't worry about a few possible mistakes. These folks will be incredibly supportive and the experiences will make you grow. You learn very quickly where your performance weaknesses are when you sing for people. You then can go to work on these problems and expect to be better next time.

Most Barbershoppers, I think, would love to sing in a quartet. You have reached out and have done it. That makes you special. You are a living example of what our Society is all about.

For a while, I didn't relate the Au Sable Valley Chapter with the Grayling area, nor Swan Valley with Saginaw. I'd like to know these things so I can answer those who come and ask me.

We were saddened during the month of April by the passing of LEE SELLS, one of Muskegon Chapter's staunchest supporters and a 1005 Barbershopper. He helped in many capacities since entering Barbershopping in the 1940's as a member of THE PARAGONS. Lee was an active member of the chapter board until his sudden death.

He wrote recently in our "Port City Beacon" that one of his greatest thriTTs was to see his son, ADAM, develop a love for Barbershop and sing in a quartet and chorus. (Adam is now directing a chorus out in California!) We will miss Lee, but we know that when he joined that great Barbershop chorus in the sky, the first thing he did was to make sure they had a good place to rehearse and then he offered to help set up the chairs.

The Muskegon Chapter is happy to have placed first in the Achievement Award again--in the division for chapters our size. We are a busy chapter, and our members do participate in District activities. We now have three quartets in the chapter: the TRI-CITIES FOUR, the LUMBERTOWN CHORDSMEN, and, more recently, the SHORELINE FOUR.

Our main weakness, like other chapters, is our membership. We gain a new member and one moves away. We hold our own, but we have a tough time gaining an actual increase.

We attract men to the AFA and guest nights, but very few are interested in membership. Often, the same men come again to other guest nights and enjoy themselves. Some even just drop in because they are in the neighborhood, but they don't seem to want to take the time that a membership implies. However, we haven't given up. We're still trying to reach the fifty mark, and we have hopes that we will make it this year.

We enjoyed the District Convention at Saginaw this time, and we had a great time with our new sea-motif uniforms. Although we would liked to have placed higher (and who wouldn't), we felt good about our performance, and the judges had many helpful suggestions whole complimenting us on our steady progress.

Our annual show is scheduled for Saturday, May 31st at the Muskegon Frauenthal Theater. In addition to our Shoreline Chorus and chapter quartets, we are delighted to have the TOUCH OF CLASH and THE INTERSTATE RIVALS on the show.

After the show many people came up and said they didn't know Barbershop singing could be that good. One man said you know who got the most applause---"You darn Barbershoppers!"

Numbers help but if you hit the chords, sing good songs and put on a little showmanship in it, we can compete with anybody.

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EVER HEAR OF A GUEST NIGHT CHORUS REHEARSAL? by Bill Myers.

Burt Szabo recently told us about attending a guest night at the Orange Park, Florida (1986 International contender) chapter, where the chapter went through their usual chorus rehearsal on the risers and invited guests to sing along, also on the risers. They never changed a thing from the usual routine of preparation for their next big event. Music was wellknown to the guests.

Each guest was picked up at his home by a chapter member and escorted to the meeting, encouraged to par-ticipate in everything the chorus did throughout the meeting, taken to the pizza parlour afterward for some woodshedding and elbow-bending, and then driven home. There was never a doubt in any guest's mind as to the direction, motivation and commitment the chapter was making to their Barbershop singing hobby. Of the 27 guests that night, over half signed up. This type of guest night may not be your cup of tea, but it drives home a point. Let's be up-front and honest with a guest as to our chapter's goals, the dedication and time commitment needed, and what will be expected of him once a member. But, most of all, let's invite singers to join our organization. It should be the challenge of the chapter musical leadership to mold the average singer into the chorus man they want him to be.

WHERE DO WE GET NEW CHORUS DIRECTORS? or "WHO'LL TAKE HIS PLACE WHEN HE'S GONE...GONE...GONE" by Mel Knight

Probably the single most serious problem we have in the Society today is locating and developing new Chorus Directors. When a chapter is in difficulty either musically or member-ship-wise, the lack of a qualified director is usually the key. How can we improve this situation? Where do we find qualified men to lead our choruses? Are our directors concerned enough about who will take their place if, for some reason, they leave the chapter or are unable to direct?

Potential directors can be found in a number of places. Many of our musical leaders come from the public school music area. Elementary, junior and high school vocal music instructors are a steady source of recruitment. We even have a handful of University professors in our midst. Instrumental music teachers at all levels are also good possibilities. Private vocal teachers. music store operators and salesmen, ex-music teachers and amateur theater participants may be potential Barbershop music directors. Church choir directors often are capable of leading a Barbershop chorus as well. How about the college ranks? Senior music majors and graduate students could do the job, and often need a job. All these sources are well and good, but how do we educate these excellent possibilities once we've signed them up? Very often even the

most talented professionally trained musician knows little about the Barbershop idiom. We know that Barbershop is different from Bach or Sousa or Mozart in many ways, but they might not. How often do we hear a chorus performing to perfection, with not a semblence of Barbershop style apparent? It could be a "professional" musician at the helm who hasn't yet completed his Barbershop education.

Experienced Barbershoppers, judges, board members and quartet men within each chapter must take it upon themselves to help this type of man "find" himself in the Barbershop world. When hiring a new director, develop a contract which insists he attend Division, District or Inter-national Chorus Director's schools. Supply him with all the Society publications that might be helpful. Get him to every chapter show and competition in the area. Visit other chapters with successful, helpful directors. Submerge him in 4-part harmony. Drown him in expanded sound. If he doesn't respond, hegin looking elsewhere.

Potential directors need to be men who have a desire to direct and a commitment to the time and effort to accumulate knowledge and experience in Barbershopping. Then someone needs to recognize their talent and encourage it. And most of all. potential directors need to be given the opportunity to practice directing and coaching skills as they gain them. They must be given a chance to


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
