




THIS ONE WAS A WINNER!


The last weekend of September, 1987 will be another date to put on your calendar as one to remember. This will be the date for the next Division IV Logopedics Spectacular.

'Tis the season for fall conventions. The month of September will see the beginning of five weeks of back-to-back convention weekends throughout the Society. Our best wishes to all the competitors.

Chapter presidents are reminded that 1987 officer elections are approaching. Be sure your nominating committee is functioning for October 15 elections. Nominations are a three-week process followed by the election. Also, be sure the current chapter secretary handles the distribution of the chapter officer manuals (arriving in October) and reports the new officers to the International Office.

Special reminder to Canadian chapters about Institute of Logopedics contributions. These contributions are the ONLY payments that can be in Canadian dollars...all others are in U.S. funds.

ATTENTION BULLETIN EDITORS! ATTENTION BULLETIN EDITORS! The long awaited Limerick Book is available from the Barbershoppers' Shop. The more than 300 limericks contributed to last year's competition are separated into topics and are COPYRIGHT-FREE for reproduction in chapter bulletins. THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES A NEW PUBLICATION - A Music Team Leadership Manual. Officially released at Harmony College, this "everything you want to know" manual details how to set up section leaders, teaching quartets and a chorus director under the leadership of a Music Vice-President. This method has been highly successful in many chapters - and we want to share the success with every chapter. The manuals are for sale through the Order Desk, ask for Cheryl.

PLANS ARE UNDERWAY FOR THE SARASOTA MID-WINTER CONVENTION. Two special items deserve attention:

 Seniors Quartet Contest - A popular event last year, this contest involves registered quartets whose

cumulative age is at least 240, and each quartet member must be a least 55 years of age. Society quartet contest rules, as modified by the C & J Committee, apply with no A & R sessions. This is a finals only contest, no preliminary eliminations are scheduled. Entry forms are available through the International Office for November 1 entry - limited to 20 quartets. (Contest is scheduled for Friday, January 30, 1987 at 2:30 p.m.)

2) FOOD FOR THOUGHT BREAKFAST - a great way to collect ideas for your chapter, participants exchange ideas through one-page essays. If you want to contribute, please write or type your idea on a single sheet of paper and mail if to Bill Fitzgerald at the International Office. Materials will be printed and distributed at the breakfast. The deadline for the essays is December 15.

MANY ARE CURIOUS about Salt Lake City video tapes of the convention film and we'll have them. Price is \$35/tape. Delivery date for tapes is scheduled for November.

AS WASY AS 1, 2, 3...is the extended "Three For One" dues incentive plan. The International Board of Directors approved a resolution stating that any member enrolling at least three reinstated and/or new members qualifies for an International dues waiver (\$33) for the next enrollment period. He is still liable for the District and chapter dues (NOTE: Members enrolled in 1985 cannot be carried over to 1986!).

TWO PUBLICITY TIDBITS TO PASS ALONG. U.S. Air magazine mentioned the Society in its August in-flight maga-zine. The Manhattan, New York Chapter was mentioned in a telephone bill brochure insert (with contact phone number) that averages five to ten inquiries per day. Interested chapters are encouraged to contact their utility companies (telephone, electric or gas) and inquire through the public information office.



THE QUARTET PERSPECTIVE

Glenn VanTassel

You have just arrived at your quartet rehearsal, and you want to get right to work, so you blow the pitchpipe and "bust" one...right? Wrong! PLEASE, PLEASE do not allow yourselves to get into that routine. It can be greatly harmful.

A warm-up should consist of very gentle humming, breath support drill along with exercises and vowel work combined with scales. There are many specific vocal routines available. In all cases, give your vocal mechanism adequate time to truly warm up. You will receive a pay-off in quality and durability of your voice

Make use of the warm-up routine to check and improve all aspects of your voice production. A warm-up is not a mindless process in which, with use, you raise the temperature of the vocal mechanism. It is, in fact, a time in which you can set the habits of proper breath support, voice placement/projection, pitch accuracy, metric accuracy, transition from con-sonant to vowel to consonant, vowel match with attention to vowel migration, facial warmth (smiles and pleasant demeanor), and physical attitude (carrying your weight forward on the balls of your feet with a posture that says, "I'm ready to get into this!). Do you still think of warm-ups as a somewhat mysterious but preferably discardable preocess?

Establishing a routine, a discipline of incorporating all of those good positive elements in your warm-ups, will build for you a base in the fundamentals without which you cannot expect to exhibit real progress. I don't know many of us who would not like to be able to perform better today than yesterday and better tomorrow than today.

EDITOR'S NOTE

Glenn, with his lovely wife Donna, will soon be leaving the Pioneer District and moving down to Sarasota, Florida. He will not be retiring, just changing his base of operations. He plans to remain active in the Society, he attended the C & J School in Philadelphia this past summer.

Chapter "Crows" are given jobs that minimize their opportunity to sing. One such job, reserved for the very worst singer, is that of Chorus Director. Because he spends most performance time with his back to the audience, the chorus director must have a backside that is less ugly than his front side. explains why most chorus directors are recruited from the bass section.

typical chorus director sprinkles musical terminology throughout his conversation, eg. "ritardando" (used when tenors' IQ's "accelerando" discussed), (describing basses heading for the after-glow bar), and "crashend-oh" (what happens to a lead trying to sing any note above an E). The terms employed when discussing baritones are best left up to the imagination.

Directing styles vary widely. Instantly recognizable are "Pumphandle", "Little German Band", and "Drum Major". There are also several variations of the "Saint Vitus", the ever popular "Wind Mill" - refreshing for both chorus and audience during the summer concert series, and the "Sudden Attack by a Swarm of Killer Bees" technique. This last is particularly interesting when the song being sung is a ballad. A strong positive correlation has been found between arm length and directing success. This may explain why many International-class chorus directors have callouses on their knuckles from walking.

It's an unwritten rule that a chorus director should not be so "largo" as to hide more than 4 of the chorus from view at any one time - this rule is frequently violated. Most chorus directors are irascible disproving the old adage that fat men are jolly.

It is a challenge to a chorus member to sing an entire song while keeping his eyes rigidly on the chorus director, and smile rather than laugh or cry.

Quartets also have directors - they call themselves "Leads", face the audience and fool SP judges into believing that their directing is simply "Presenting the Song". (Fooling an SP judge isn't much of an accomplishment.)
