



Dr. Fran Durham on LOGOPEDICS



1988: \$1,000,000 FOR

This is the first in a series of articles about the upcoming million dollar campaign fund for the Institute of Logopedics.

Over the past two years barbershop-pers have raised \$600-700,000 a year for our International Service Project, the Institute of Logopedics. In commemoration of our 50th Anniversary year, and because of a special program to be put in place in 1988, we have been challenged to raise \$1,000,000. The additional \$300,000 will make it possible to serve three times the number of children present-ly being served. It will be used for the following purposes:

- 1.) Establish and staff a new WATTS phone number at the Institute to receive inquiries about children with special problems. The Institute will become a clearing house to process these calls. If the child can be better served by another program, the caller will be provided with the necessary information about it.
- 2.) Staff and train additional Institute personnel as the need arises, to actively recruit children for the Institute. One such recruiter, Maria Morgan, is already on staff. She has made several trips around the country, seeking sources of referrals -school districts, Special Education Directors, hospitals with programs for the communicatively handicapped, parent groups, etc. These staff members will also go to the homes of potential referrals and do the prescreening there rather than the parents having to bring the child to the Institute for an evaluation. Maria's work has already borne fruit, as some children have come to the Institute because of her efforts.
- 3.) Special cards will be printed and supplied to all barbershoppers to be given out at shows, performances, and whenever the Logopedic's story is being told. The card will contain all of the necessary information on how to contact the Institute, explains its functions, and includes the all important toll free number.
- 4.) Expansion of the Public Relations program about the Institute of

Logopedics, including its mission, and its staff. Barbershoppers need to

be better informed about our International Service Project, and they also need to become active recruiters for the Institute. Public Relations materials will be designed to that end. Next to parents and relatives of children at the Institute, barbershoppers represent the largest single source of "word-of-mouth" endorsement of the Institute and its programs. That message has come from song and rom prideful support. Now we must do more. We must become active recruiters for the Institute of Logopedics.

ELIGIBILITY: All Pioneer District chapter bulletin editors are eligible to compete, provided they have published a minimum of SIX (6) issues on a monthly or a bi-monthly basis by the same editor, or SIX (6) issues during the year by the same editor, other than a monthly schedule. To be eligible for the International Award, however, the editor must have published TEN (10) issues of a monthly bulletin, or TEN (10) months of bulletins on other than a monthly schedule, during 1987.

JUDGING PROCEDURES: Editors shall submit for judging THREE (3) copies each of THREE (3) CONSECUTIVE issues published during 1987. ONE (1) copy submitted must be RUN-OF-THE-PRESS ORIGINAL PRODUCTION COPY, the remaining TWO (2) may be photocopies, although originals are preferred. If you are eligible for the International Contest (10 Issues), it might be wise to submit FIVE (5) copies each of THREE (3) CONSECUTIVE issues, so that you can receive critiques on issues not previously marked on the first judging.

SUBMISSION PROCEDURES: Entries must be mailed in a strong manila envelope to Roger Morris Sr, 325 E. Wardlow, Highland, MI 48031, not later than January 15, 1988. The top two scorers will be announced during the Pioneer District Convention at Battle Creek, Michigan, on April 23, 1988, and will represent the the Pioneer District in the International Bulletin Contest in 1988. However, editors who have not published TEN (10) bulletins during the year will be eligible only for the District award. The other top two bulletins who have published TEN (10) bulletins during the year will be submitted to the International.

Entries submitted will be judged by a single panel of THREE (3) judges, with ONE (1) judge to be assigned to each of the three (3) categories as follows: CONTENT (1,000 points), LAY-OUT & REPRODUCTION (600 points), and GRAMMAR & STYLE (400 points). Judges will use the Society's International judging forms in rating entries. Judges will be selected by the International PROBE Vice President for Bulletin Editors (Bob Arthur). Ties will be broken by the Content Category scores and second by the Layout and Reproduction Scores.

The main object of the Pioneer BETY contest is to promote improved communication at the chapter level by encouragement of better bulletins. As in the case of musical competition, each editor should recognize that comments, critiques and suggestions

Remember When!

HOW IT ALL BEGAN!

(A continuation of the series of articles on the history of the great Pioneer District, in recognition of next year's 50th Anniversary of the Society.)

It appears that the Windsor Chapter did receive their charter prior to the June, 1944, International Convention, which was held in Detroit. There was a question in your editor's mind concerning this fact, as mentioned in the last issue. If anyone can shed any further light on this, please do!

At the 1944 International Convention, Michigan once again reigned supreme when the HARMONY HALLS from the Grand Rapids chapter won the International Quartet Championship. They were the very first International Champions, since all previous champions were National Champions. Thought you might like that little

gem, you trivia fans! The quartet, composed of Ed Gaikema, Bob Hazenberg Ray Hall, and Gordon Hall, had previously won the District Championship. (See article by Dick Williams in this issue under the Grand Rapids News heading.) In Chicago, the year before, they had won fifth place, thereby becoming the Michigan (now Pioneer) District's first medalist quartet.

The splendid cooperation displayed by Michigan at this convention (still true today!) resulted in the International Board voting the 1945 Convention and Contest to Detroit. One factor which affected this decision. and it's an important one, is that the United States was still at war. Michigan was pretty much the hub of barbershopdom, and travel, being restricted a great deal, forced the Board to consider Detroit as its selection. (Your editor often laughs when people, involved with making In-ternational Convention site bids, make the statement that Detroit has had the convention five times (1942, 1944, 1945, 1953, 1981). What they don't seem to understand is that three of those years were during wartime, so they should not be counted against Detroit in their present bids for the Convention, but they always do!)

Information obtained primarily from past Harmonizers and Troubadours, which your editor has accumulated from district members who have generously contributed. Any letters and other mementos which can shed some light on our historic past would be greatly appreciated. Check with me first, however, as I do not care for duplications. 
