

Motor City Metro "City Lights" Chorus wins big in prelims & it's on to New Orleans! Macomb Harmony Heritage finishes second, Holland Windmill third in close competition...

For the first time in many a year Pioneer has succeeded in producing what should be a viable contender in International level competition. A new chapter and a new chorus under the direction of former Gentlemen's Agreement's bass, Bob Whitledge, have made their presence known by scoring an outstanding 1172 points in their first outing and outscoring Macomb County's Harmony Heritage Chorus, our 1991 international chorus representative, by 48 points. Macomb, under the direction of Jack Slamka, scored their highest total ever with 1124, but it still wasn't enough. The Holland Windmill Chorus, under the direction of Myke Lucas, finished a close third with 1082 and they

showed signs they are to be reckoned with in the future.

In total, sixteen choruses competed in the contest which was exciting from beginning to end. Every chorus can be proud of their performances.

The Holland Windmill Chorus won the Most Improved Chorus Award over the seven other eligible entries. This was a new award which will become a part of the fall contest regimen.

Judging from scores coming in from other districts in their international prelim chorus contests, the score of 1172 should (Continued on page 8)


Mark your calendar for Sunday, August 9, 1992, as the next PIONEER-ONTARIO DISTRICTS' DAY AT TIGER STADIUM. The game will again be between the Toronto Blue Jays and the Tigers.

Our 1991 excursion was a success in every way, with the exception that there was no Tiger victory. There were 1,783 persons who acquired tickets through the district, and we estimate another 100 or so who obtained tickets on their own. We can only guess as to the number of barbershoppers on the field, maybe 400 to 500. We didn't have any way of ascertaining the exact number of singers. Next year, provisions will be made to count the number of barbershoppers attending the game. Between the two districts, we can foresee a total attendance in excess of 2,500 people.

I will contact each chapter president around the first of March with ticket information, etc. In the meantime, have a great holiday season and a Happy New Year!

International Executive Committee recommending cuts in PROBE budget

A 23 percent cut has been proposed in the budget for PROBE. This would include cutting the quarterly PROBEmoter publication from 16 to 8 pages. PROBE is the official Society affiliate for communicating and sharing ideas among all PR Officers and Bulletin Editors. All are members and all get PROBEmoter, the only direct way of communicating with all of them.

The cut is part of Executive Committee budget recommendations. The International Board will act on them at the mid-winter convention in January.

Other budget items also would be trimmed, including Music Department staff travel and the number of Harmonizer pages.

The budget is being tightened because of falling membership, said Ray Heller, Society Manager of Communications. However, tightening PROBE might be false economy. The PROBE budget is \$5,200 — only 13/100 of 1% of the Society's \$4.1 million budget. The cut would be \$1,200. That's 3/100 of 1%. The cut would drop the PROBE outlay from 15 to 11 cents per Society member.

The effect might be much greater than the amount of the cut. PROBE hasn't been very effective in recent years. And PROBEmoter has been mostly for bulletin editors, because PR people weren't participating much. So it's easy to understand why some people feel PROBE can be cut.

But the cut comes as work has started to reinvigorate PROBE and make it an effective part of Society PR efforts. Goals have been set by the new PROBE officers, PROBEmoter this fall had more material of use to PR officers, a new PR award has just been instituted, a new program of sharing the "how to" of chapter PR successes through PROBEmoter is being prepared, more effective PR and BE manuals are being considered. And all this has been done in just a short four months.

Also, PROBE officers are communicating more among themselves, and with the International staff and the PR Committee. This is necessary for effective planning and coordinating efforts, and for effective external PR and marketing.

A PR Study Committee is expected to recommend continuation of PROBE and better coordination with the PR Committee. The International Board will also consider this in January — even as it considers cutting PROBE's budget.

The budget also includes expenses for the Bulletin Editor of the Year contest. Will this be trimmed, too?

The cut comes amid growing awareness of the need for good PR and marketing to stem membership loss - the very cause of the budget problems. International staffer Gary Stamm, in a thesis on marketing, has proposed that hiring a marketing director might gain the society \$37,000 -- 7 times the amount of the PROBE budget, 31 times the amount of the proposed cut.

The cut comes at the end of a year in which International President Bob Ceamal has promoted "PRogress begins with PR." PR begins with internal communications. And that's PROBE's job.

The cut comes as 1992 International President Terry Aramian wants us to "Discover a New World." It takes money

to travel to new places. But it's only 15 cents per member. What do you think? Are you concerned by a 23 percent cut for PROBE, a half-size PROBEmoter, a smaller Harmonizer? Or wouldn't it make any difference to you?

New award offered in communications

Chapter Public Relations Officers now have a new chance for recognition. The new PR award was endorsed by District Communications Officers at the fall Leadership Forum.

Guidelines are loose, to encourage recognition of good communications or marketing jobs, whether internal or external. The new "Award of Merit in Communications" (that's a broader term than "Public Relations") will be presented to any member deserving of recognition, but not so often as to make it commonplace.

There are no deadlines. Nominations from anyone are encouraged. This award also could improve internal communication, by encouraging chapter PROs and other members to let the district know of PR activities at the local level.

The award, in two-color script, will refer to the specific activity for which the recipient is honored, and will be prepared by the International communications department.

This will supplement the District PROTY award program. Any winners of the new communications award will automatically be eligible for the PROTY award.

The award is to be presented at a gathering of other members, including the general public if possible. Presentation will be made by both the Director of Communications and the District President whenever possible.

The district will work with the local chapter in making sure area media and the district bulletin get a story on the winner. Winners also will be recognized in the Troubadour and periodically in PROBEmoter.

The award was instituted partly in response to some PROBE members and PR officers saying good PR should be recognized. The award eventually might lead to a new PROBE international PR award. Study is beginning on new guidelines for that. The PROBE Public Relations Officer of the Year program was discontinued two years ago.

If you know a member or activity that might be considered for this new award, please call or write Jim Styer, Pioneer Director of Communications.

PROTY entries are due by February 15

Entries are being accepted for Pioneer District's 1991 Public Relations Officer of the Year. It will be presented at the spring convention. You also can get a professional evaluation of your work and it could be used as an teaching example for other PR Officers.

The entry can relate to a single project or a program comprised of several different activities. Compile your clippings, letters, brochures, audio and video tapes, etc. Submit them with a description of your PR program (because all your behind-the-scenes work probably isn't obvious) and why you're proud of what you accomplished. No minimum or maximum length on this.

Mail entries as soon as possible. Deadline: Feb. 15, 1992. Get started before the Christmas crunch.

All DVPs, assistant DVPs and chapter presidents are urged to help identify good PR and encourage PR Officers to participate in this award program.

Singing order for choruses in New Orleans announced

Beginning with the 1992 international chorus contest, there will be up to 20 choruses competing. These include the top-scoring chorus from each of the 16 districts, plus any choruses invited from affiliate organizations.

If any open slots remain, and there are three for 1992, top-scoring choruses from SPEBSQSA are invited to participate. Therefore, the *Mainliners* from Bryn Mawr, Penn.; *West Towns* from Lombard, Ill.; and the *Pot O' Gold* chorus from Bay Area Metro in California, will be competing with the 16 district winners and the chorus from Sheffield, England.

Listed below is the order of appearance and their preliminary scores (if known).



Detroit-Oakland Benefit Show

The Detroit-Oakland Chapter held a benefit show for the Stroke Survivor Unit at Beaumont Hospital which has units in Royal Oak and Troy, Michigan. It was held on Friday, October 25, 1991, at Birmingham Seaholm High School.

As you may know, there has been much discussion at the international level about supporting local charities along with continued support of our unified service project, the Institute of Logopedics. The show came about because a former Oakland County Chapter member, Ray Strachan (who used to sing with the *Wonderlads*), suffered a stroke at age 52 and was treated at the Stroke Survival unit. The therapist used music as part of Ray's therapy.

Ray was and is communicatively handicapped, so doing a show for the unit complimented our support of the Institute of Logopedics. An important point to be made is that doing the benefit did not detract from the chapter's financial support of the Institute. I would encourage other chapters in Pioneer to consider supporting worthwhile local charities. Such activity is good for the Society and is good for the local charity, and in addition gives the chapter local PR which certainly can't hurt. Be sure going in, however, that such support is over and above your commitment to the Institute.

With DOC's Benefit Show, all talent was donated. The show format was kept simple with expenses kept to a minimum. Proceeds, after expenses, were turned over to the Stroke Survivor Unit through the Beaumont Hospital Foundation. Beaumont printed the flyers, program, and tickets. They also handled the publicity. I think you'll find that any charitable organization that you may want to work with will be able to do whatever they can to help promote the activity. I will discuss this at COTS in more detail. You'll find that supporting a local charity can be mutually beneficial.



College-age Quartet Contest scheduled for July in New Orleans

An idea long overdue!

A barbershop quartet contest for college-age men is scheduled to take place as part of the 1992 international convention in New Orleans. This will be an event for men 23 years of age and younger, residing in the United States and Canada. No Society registered quartets may enter and no more than two Society members may sing in a competing quartet.

A cash prize of \$4,000 will be awarded the winning quartet, with additional cash prizes awarded to quartets finishing in second through fifth places. Prize money will be raised through ticket sales to the final event and from a portion of proceeds from preliminary contest rounds held at the district level.

This event is the brainchild of Pete Neushal, baritone of the 139th Street Quartet. Pete is chairman of the event; registration and coordination will be handled by Lani Dieter at the international office. If you have comments or suggestions about the contest, contact Pete at (213) 639-4920 during the day, or (213) 541-7452 in the evening. Information about the contest is being mailed to college and university music departments, music fraternities and college MENC chapters. The success of the event will depend upon the efforts of barbershoppers in our districts and chapters, however.

Al Fisk, our district YMIH chairman, has been selected to chairman this activity for the Pioneer District. His primary job will be to encourage the formation of quartets through contact with chapters, and with college and university music departments. In addition, he will have charge of the contest at our spring quartet preliminary contest.

Chapters are encouraged to seek out members who are college students and encourage formation of quartets. They can also contact colleges and quartets directly, working in cooperation with the district college chairman, Al Fisk. Music can be provided by chapters and qualified barbershoppers can serve as coaches.

Demonstration quartets visiting college music departments can generate enthusiasm for the barebershop style. Individual students or embryonic quartets can be invited to chapter' meetings to hear examples of quartet singing. Once they have ewxperienced participation in a barbershop chord, these young men will be ready to form quartets.

Posters, informational materials and entry forms can be obtained from the Communications Department at the international office in Kenosha.

This activity can be beneficial to the Society in a number of ways. Most important, it can introduce barbershop harmony to musical young men who have not heard it before.

But also, local publicity can be generated as a result of formation of quartets and presentation of these quartets at contests or shows. Local fundraising events can be held to help college quartets get to New Orleans, and these can also generate favorable publicity for barbershopping. Departure of these young men for New Orleans can produce local publicity, as well.
