THE NEW JUDGING CATEGORIES MUSIC - PRESENTATION - SINGING

Note: Our DACJC, John Bauer, has well and carefully prepared a review of the new judging categories, much too long for a single issue of the Troubadour. It will be presented in a series of three articles. This initial segment will be followed, in the June/July and August/September issues, by the remaining segments. It is our intent to be sure all Pioneer contestants are well informed relevant to the new categories in time for the fall competition. Thank you John, for a job well done - Ed.

All Pioneer Barbershoppers will have an opportunity, at the convention in Lansing later this month, to attend a special presentation centered on the new, 3-Category Judging System. The Saturday morning event will focus on the new judging system, agreed to, in content, by the International Board meeting at Mid-Winter in Corpus Christi, Texas.

The action culminated approximately 4 years of study, planning, application, testing, selection and continuous training of candidates in the 3 new scoring categories, plus the *Contest Administrator Category*, which replaces the present Chairman of Judges and Secretary categories.

It should also be noted that all quartet and chorus competitors at our spring contest will receive a combination "A&R/Coaching Session". They will have these new scoring categories explained in detail, in preparation for the fall contest, when, it is expected, the new scoring system will take effect throughout the Society, for all competition.

What follows is a synopsis of the "Introduction to New Categories" presentation to be offered at the Pioneer Convention, Saturday, April 24, and from four previous articles appearing in the Harmonizer.

Background: The contest & judging subcommittee that met in March 1989, recommended the International Contest & Judging Committee study a new judging system that would better support the preservation and perpetuation of the Barbershop style, and increase the enjoyment and growth of the society's membership.

Following this study the new 3-category system evolved, and is an effort to respond to some problems in the current system, as follows: (on page 4)

If you have a moment, please; Is there something we could do or offer at a convention that you'd really be interested in doing? Let your mind wander and feel free to suggest anything. The District Officers and Convention Committee are open to consideration of any and all ideas!

If you have ever been to a convention, what did or didn't you like? Is there something we should add or delete? Is there some "convening" part of the weekend that is missing? (I avoided the words contest and compete intentionally).

Cost is a response I anticipate, and I'll take the liberty of a couple of observations. The Sweet Adelines amaze me. At a convention, 4-6 of them may share a room, making the individual cost "dirt cheap". Sometimes they even bring enough food to feed the entire chorus, making the entire weekend very inexpensive.

Back in 1962, four of us drove to Kansas City for my very first International! We stayed in dormitory style rooms at about \$7.00 each, a night. We didn't eat any steaks, but ate reasonably and well. I doubt the entire 5 days, including gas, cost over \$100.00 each. Sure, costs have gone up, but it is yet possible to get a group together, share costs and save money, and have a wonderful time.

Since then, I've missed only 6 international conventions, the last in 1974. Since 1961 I've missed one district convention, as I was singing in Florida.

Maybe my questions seem obvious or dumb, things I should already know. But since conventions are a way of life for me, I just don't know the answers. That's why we would like your help. Please let Michael Ciritto or I know how we may make conventions more attractive to you.

The New Judging Categories, continued from page 3

- 1. The preservation and perpetuation of the style, with a balance between each of these.
- Elegance and naturalness. At present we divide the scoring into the four (4) separate categories, and assume the adjudication of these will add up to a summary of the overall performance.
- An emphasis on arrangements that are easily singable and will create the opportunity for good sound.
- 4. An emphasis on freely produced, resonant sound.
- An emphasis on an authentic presentation one that is from the heart and that results in appropriate moods and emotions that arise from the vocal and visual presentation.
- 6. A balance between the vocal and visual presentation.
- 7. An emphasis on the overall effect, rather than individual devices.
- 8. A small number of highly-trained judges who score with consistency.
- 9. Contest preparation that will support the growth of our chapters.
- 10. Broad participation.
- 11. The joy of participation in competition.

The new categories which evolved ask the judges to take a broader view than they do now - one more like a member of the audience might have. Even while evaluating a performance from a particular perspective, an audience member will experience the total performance.

This 3 part series in review of the New Judging Categories will be continued in the June/July issue.


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Ed. Note(s) -

If you personally, or your chapter by poll, have not yet responded to Mike O'Donnell's

plea for help on page 3 of the Feb/Mar issue, do it. If you haven't read his article, do that. Mike wants to know your feelings about changing Society rules to allow non-member female chorus directors. He is opposed to the proposed change, but seeks your guidance, before the board meeting in Calgary.

We wrote him, in support of his views. We have travelled a lot of barbershop miles since 1960, in car-loads and bus-loads of guys and have roomed with the same guys, and always with the wife's blessing. We're not sure she would have been as agreeable, if our's was not an all male singing society.

If you missed it, or even if you read it earlier, read again the last paragraph, column one, of Russ Seely's article in the Feb/March issue. Or we'll refresh your memory. "...there is life in barbershop beyond the chorus", he wrote.

Also in that issue, in the Battle Creek Chapter news on page 20, Jim Styer describes the chapter's "Harmony for Lunch Bunch". "Eating, singing, tags, woodshedding, whatever", he wrote, "With no director telling you what to do". "Just fun!", he concluded.

We will also refer you to Myke Lucas' quote on page 11, in reference to "...putting the "Q" back in SPEBSQSA."

All reminiscent of the wonderful growth era of barbershopping when the chorus was a sub entity of the chapter, when quartets were prevalent, when members enjoyed monthly chapter meetings. Meetings which were not devoted to chorus rehearsal, but did include activities with emphasis on the "Q", on "barbershop life beyond the chorus", "singing" and "fun".

We certainly don't advocate the elimination of barbershop choruses. They are an integral, important part of many member's barbershop lives. Conversely, we advocate a return to weekly, hard working chorus

rehearsal, devoid of interruptive activities which could be better undertaken at reinstated monthly chapter meetings.

Monthly chapter meetings, not rehearsals. Meetings which could include much that has been lost. Much that ought to be restored to ensure the enjoyment and "...Preservation of Barbershop Quartet Singing..."

We phoned a member the other day to ask him to write a story about an event of which he has unique knowledge. "But I can't write", he protested. He then began describing the event, using wonderfully expressive language. We interrupted him.

"Please, just put those words on paper", we requested. We ask the same of all who believe they can't write. If you can talk, you can write. And it is the editors job to fix anything that is not right. If you have a special barbershop experience or knowledge of a special event, write it! Mail it to the Troub! Other Pioneers will likely enjoy reading it, especially those you write about. And this is not the Times, Herald, Chronicleor Tribune! This is your Troubadour!

Attention Show Ticket Chairmen: We received a nice letter from Roger J. Clifford, 310 W. Grove Street, Apt. A, Greenville, MI 48838. He wrote to renew his Troubadoursubscription and said one of the reasons he subscribes is to keep informed of the chapter shows. Public Relations officers have several opportunities this spring to promote chapter activities and in the process, possibly encourage new members.

Tell the public your participating in the district convention in Lansing this month. Let them know what it takes

to prepare for competition. Invite some friends to have some convention fun with you. Tell the media how you improved in competition.

Hold a spring or post-show membership drive. Invite all the show-goers to have fun singing at a meeting or two.

Arrange a Sunday Singers chorus that can fill in for vacationing local church choirs. Invite all male singers in the community - including church choir members - to rehearse and perform with your Sunday Singers. Don't require membership right off; just let them experience the joy of barbershop singing.

Invite other singers to join you on the field at Tiger Stadium. Again, don't require membership to sing; they'll join if they have enough fun. Consider a Tiger guest night before this month is over.

Contact community groups that sponsor summer fests and fairs. Offer to sing at the events. Where appropriate, invite listeners to your meetings and hand out brochures. hang around afterward and talk to fest-goers about barbershopping; invite them personally.

These ideas all can involve media coverage, but newsprint isn't the only aspect of PR. Please call me for how-to tips.

Let me know what you're trying to do so we can help you and so we can share your success with the other chapters who would like help. This year, I've only heard from one chapter PRO - Jackson's Dale Barrett, who sent his news releases and asked for comment. I sent back several suggestions. I'll help you too. Just ask.

Bulletins I've received this year include Holland and Windsor for the first time in two years or more. Holland's Windmill Blade, by Editor Art Lane, has a great masthead, very appropriate. And Co-Editors Ted Saby and Ron Atcheson's Windsor Chordster, had a green shamrock - without a color printer. Someone spent a lot of time coloring that eye-catcher.

Milford is publishing again. Roger Morris is publishing again, after 15 years. He claims he has a "lot to learn." How so Roger? You've spent decades telling the rest of us how to do it.

Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Lansing and Rochester have also sent bulletins. That's seven chapters. Congratulations, chapters and editors.

We'd like to see your bulletin too - and Roger, who also has "a lot to teach," will help you. If you ask.

Jason Fox, recently named district Public Relations Officer, is moving. He's been Kalama-zoo Chapter PRO for a year. Now, a new job is taking him to the Huron Valley Chapter area this month. We'll publish his new address as son as it's confirmed. Meanwhile, you can call me for details.

PSSST: This isn't necessarily a PR story, but it does show the need for paying attention to details. You see, there was a Pioneer District chapter that registered for convention last fall ... and forgot to register the director. No, we won't say who. Maybe they'll fess up themselves.

HARMONY ROUND UP MINI-HEP SCHOOL MSU CAMPUS, MAY 21-23



The new full name of the former Institute of Logopedics is "Heartspring... a Life Skills Learning Center."

A name change had been discussed for several years, primarily because the word logopedics is meaningless to most outside of the profession and because of the expanded programs.

Heartspring services now include three major programs. The school, They include: offered both as a residential and a day care program, serving children with multiple The Hearing disabilities; Center, providing hearing services for people of all ages, including indigent persons served by donor hearing aid programs; and The Assessment and Treatment Center, offering evaluation and therapy to children, from newborn to 21 years of age. The center provides treatment in the area of communication, education,

motor development and behavioral and psychological needs. In addition, outpatient speech as well as occupational and physical therapies are available through the center.

Marketing experts advise "If a name tells more about where an organization has been, instead of where it is going, the name ought to be changed." Heartspring symbolizes caring services delivered from the heart. The change is also symbolic of new starts for children, starting over in their educational experience at the Heartspring School.

It's going to take awhile to get used to the new name. Let us remember however, the Society motto remains the same, "We Sing That They Shall Speak." Heartspring still has as part of it's mission, working with communicatively impaired children. That will not change. We need to continue Society support based on that mission.

Chapters must check charters

It has come to the attention of the international office that some chapters may not have properly registered their corporate papers with the appropriate office in their respective states. If this happens to any of our chapters, the tax exempt status of that chapter could be in jeopardy.

Most states require the filing of an annual report, or statement of continued existence with respect to non-profit corporations. Failure to file the required report may result in the revocation of the corporate charter.

Chapter secretaries are requested to check chapter charter documents (Articles of Incorporation, Corporate Charter, or whatever the original legal documents are called) that makes the chapter a legal entity with the state and ensure that they have been officially registered with the state and are current. Be sure your chapter has not lapsed or expired because your chapter has overlooked something required by law, including the filing of annual reports.

If the documents are not in the current secretary's possesion, make every effort to locate and them and verify that all required filings are up-to-date. If they cannot be found, contact the Secretary of State or other state agency that registers corporations and obtain a copy. If you need assistance, contact your district Laws & Regulations chairman (Ed notein Pioneer that is: Marvin Skupski, 34430 Spring Valley, Westland, MI 48185, Ph (313) R 525-2968 B 425-3434).

All chapter secretaries should report findings to their respective district Laws & Regulations chairman or district president immediately.

Chapter audits required

Last July, the interanational board mandated that each chapter conduct an annual audit and submit a copy to the international The deadline for forwarding the information to Kenosha is the same as that for filing chapter tax returns-May 15.

Institute of Logopedics is now "Heartspring"

The Institute of Logopedics has changed its name to Heartspring. The details and explanation of the move are the March/April Harmonizer. (Ed Note- See Dr. Fran Durham's column, page 7, this issue.)

Pioneer District Chapters may use Association of Chapters certification for purchase of sales tax exempt supplies.

Renewed tax exempt purchase forms good through May 1998, are now available for chapter use. Chapter supplies may be purchased exempt of state sales tax, by use of the District Association of Chapters certificate, Treasurer, Stan Williams reported. This eliminates the need for individual chapters to apply for exempt status. The certificate, with an explanatory cover letter is all that is required. Michigan no longer uses tax exempt numbers.

Stan will have an initial supply of certificates with sample cover letters for each chapter, at the House of Delegates at Spring Convention. Pick-up there will save mail costs.

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CITY LIGHTS OF MOTOR CITY METRO, HOLLAND WINDMILL CHORUS IN TOP 40, OPENING NIGHT SIXTH AMONG QUARTETS - FOLLOWING FALL COMPETITION

Two of Pioneer District's choruses are among the top 40 in the society, based on their scores in fall competition.

City Lights from Motor City Metro Chapter was 17th among the 40. Holland's Windmill Chorus, second in the district, was 34th.

In a tight race, City Lights last fall scored one point less than Tampa's Heralds of Harmony. City Lights led by 14 points in sound and 2 in interpretation. Tampa led by 15 points in stage presence and 2 in arrangement. The choruses were just 7 points apart at New Orleans last summer.

The top 40 choruses are listed below, ranked by their fall scores.

It looks like it'll be quite competitive in Calgary. Only 53 points separate the choruses in 2nd through 10th place.

For those that competed in New Orleans last summer, the fall (double judging panel) score is followed by their summer placement and relative score (adjusted downward because a triple panel was used in New Orleans).

Choruses going to Calgary this summer are in boldface. These include choruses that won their district contest, plus four "wild card" choruses (asterisk) selected because of their high district score. Also competing will be the Rainy City Chorus from BABS and the Helsenborg Barberboys from SNOBS.

Two choruses that competed in New Orleans won't be in Calgary: Louisville, which was third last summer, and Sheffield, England, which placed 17th. Plus, of course, 1992 champ Cincinnati.



About the time of April's Pioneer District convention, a million tulips will be pushing out of the ground in Holland. The day after the show we will relax by serving 800 to 900 people at our Barbershop Barbecue in Kollen Park on Lake Macatawa. Strolling quartets will entertain. Visiting barbershoppers will be welcomed and urged to sing at the barbecue on Saturday, May 15, 5:30 to 8:30 p.m.

We are eagerly looking forward to returning to the Buckeye Invitational in Columbus, Ohio in August. Memorable impressions from last years visit must include our visit to Ameriflora, a large floral exposition in a big urban park. Barbershoppers were among many performing at Ameriflora. Our segment included a mass sing by several hundred barbershoppersfrom a dozen choruses which would compete in the Invitational. A musical skit of Columbus discovering America was presented by the Buckeye Chapter, followed by a number of top national quartets.

The Invitational format differs from the usual barbershop contest. Choruses perform for 11 minutes, singing as many songs as they can squeeze in, while quartets are allotted 12 minutes. Selected members of the audience join in judging the entertainment value of the performances. The emphasis on entertainment prompted choruses and quartets to compose scenes and skits, built around their music. The performances, in that reference, far surpassed the usual marching and movements of typical stage presence.
