As expected, Motor City Metro's City Lights Chorus will represent the district in Pittsburgh as a result of their usual first place, fine performance in the International Preliminary Contest October 16.


Gratifying, but not expected, was the record 19 choruses entered in the keen competition which saw several choruses improve their contest standings. Grand Rapids Great Lakes Chorus, in second place, are the alternates to international while the Capitol City Chordsmen from the Lansing Chapter earned the coveted "Most Improved Chorus" award, gaining third place.

In an incredibly close finish, only 1 point separated Grand Rapids and Lansing; both were but a few more than 100 points from the top.

Muskegon's Shoreline Chorus also improved upon earlier scores while Traverse City, Alpena, Huron Valley, Jackson, Cadillac and Boyne City returned to the contest stage.

Importantly - we saw 625 Pioneer District barbershop chorus singers obviously having a great time performing at the district convention!! Their fun was shared by the enthusiasticmore than 1200 conventioneers in attendance. one of the highest registration figures in recent history, Director Mike Cirrito reported.

some sincere barbershop Thanks:



handled it in great style.


\* Our attendance at conventions is increasing; we had a record number of competitors this fall. The spirit of "Lifeblood" was evident all weekend, unto the wee hours.


### Here's the Pitch!

"Membership Renewals"

Beginning with December '93 renewals, members of all U.S. chapters, and Canadian chapters that wish to participate, will be invoiced directly from International. And, members can select from two EasyDues plans, plus two exciting methods that make renewals easier than ever. For details on an individual program best suited to you, consult your chapter secretary or membership vice president.

"Membership and Holidays"

This is probably the best time of year to hold "Guest Nights" and to form "Men's Holiday Choruses." "Tis the Season to be Jolly" and the festive mood makes everyone want to sing. The "Holiday Singers" are potential members. Let's go out and find these guys. It only takes an invitation on your part.

"New Programs for 1994"

In '94 we will expand our recruitment focus to encompass <u>Recruitment - Orientation - Retention</u> and <u>Follow-Up</u>, (RORF). The concept originated with John Case, former IBM of the Ontario District and current COTS faculty advisor for Membership VP's.

Recruitment: In 1994 certificates will be awarded to districts on a monthly basis, and chapters, quarterly. Chapters meeting or exceeding 1993 end of quarter membership numbers will receive Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates, depending on their recruitment totals.

Orientation: We must orient new members in barbershop harmony. It's our responsibility to educate them as to what it is and why it works.

Retention: Besides orientation, a second key to retention is balanced programming at chapter meetings. By making sure that there is something for every member at each meeting, you practically guarantee attendance and participation.

<u>Follow-Up</u>: A phone call to each missing member will let him know he is missed. That simple procedure will go far towards retention.

It is finished! Twelve and one-half months after Bob McDermott's death, his daughter, Nancy McDermott Ward, presented his manuscript to the District at the fall delegates meeting. It was Bob's last dream: A History of the Pioneer District—The First Fifty Years.

We are not certain when Bob first had the idea of compiling the 50 year district history. His wife, Dottie, feels it was while he was district president (1985-86) or maybe during his tenure as International Board Member (1987-88). We know he started drawing tables by 1988 and even took a year off publishing his chapter bulletin, *The Gentlemen's Songster*in 1989, to devote more time to the history.

It was something he seemed to be preparing for, for a long time, with interviews of former International President Carrol Adams as far back as 1972, and it was something that kept driving him up to the month before his death. Towards the end he enlisted the help of his closest friends and finally, he turned the completion of the task over to his daughter, Nancy.

Now the manuscript is completed. Nancy presented it to the Pioneer District. President Russ Seely has promised to continue the project. The next step will be to determine printing costs and demand for the published history.

If you haven't been paying attention, you may be on the verge of losing a valuable resource to help you as chapter PR Officer or Bulletin Editor. You may lose your PROBE membership, or if you are new at the job, you won't automatically become a member, as before.

PROBE has become a dues-supported organization. But it's only \$5 a year, and your chapter should be able to pay that for you.

If you are not a member, you won't get the quarterly magazine, *PROBEmotor*. It's full of helpful tips on how to carry out your job as PRO or BE. It also includes stories on PROBE and how it can help you further. And it has clip art that helps brightening bulletins, posters and any printed material.

And it provides communication so you may share your tips and success stories with others.

Further, PROBE runs the PRO and BE of the year contests, which are other ways to get an evaluation of your work and tips on how to do better. And they recognize those who are doing outstanding jobs.

PROBE also speaks on behalf of PRO's and BE's before district and international officers.

How can you be sure you are a PROBE member? Your chapter secretary should have checked off a dues box by your name when he reported the new officers to Kenosha. Make sure he did. If he didn't, have him call Brian Lynch in Kenosha, 1-800-876-SING and ask him to get you on the list and bill your chapter. Or write to Brian in Kenosha, asking to get on the membership list, and send a check for \$5 payable to SPEBSQSA Probe dues.

Isn't it worth \$5 to get help in your job. Let alone to be represented in the big barbershop bureaucracy?

## Kellogg Foundation may support community music project

The Battle Creek Chapter and the Pioneer District plan to play a major role in 1994 in the Society's outreach to schools and communities.

The W. K. Kellogg Foundation, through it's "Expert in Residence" program, is considering support for a demonstration project for all chapters on how to carry out our Society's expanded vision statement. The statement says the Society will be a leader in "encouraging vocal music, in our education system and in our communities, as a lifelong recreational activity.

Russ originated the single site convention concept, with the district providing funding and allowing any size chapter to "host" for a fee. To facilitate, he proposed office of district convention chairman and spearheaded necessary change in by-laws.

No stranger to International competition; Russ qualified to sing at 8 contests, including one chorus appearance. He sang lead in four registered quartets, all of whom competed at International. And he sang lead in 3 district champion quartets as well as the first Senior Quartet Champs, the 4-FITS.

He and his wife, Shirley, have 3 children; Russell Jr., Matt, (a barbershopper) and Jill.

President and Board Chairman Seely, founded the Quality Bending and Threading Incorporation in 1960.

involvement of other community groups in planning the activities.

A top Society member or staffer, with extensive background in barbershopping and education, would stay at the original Kellogg home. He would tentatively spend the week of Sept. 18-24 teaching, coaching, demonstrating and discussing vocal music in Battle Creek and nearby communities.

His audiences would include students and teachers as well as church and community choirs, directors, the arts council, other arts and recreational organizations, youth groups, senior citizens, and service clubs. A full week of radio and TV appearances would be planned. Community singing would be encouraged throughout the week. A barbershop museum display is possible.

The Gentlemen Songsters Chorus with the Signature, Unlawful Assembly. and Crosstown Exchange quartets contributed their services for the show. We were pleased that over \$3,600 was raised for the center. It is important that the benefit was for an organization treating communication impairments.

The Society encourages chapters to support worthwhile local charities while continuing to support Heartspring. I believe any local charity we support should have communication disorder or impairment treatment as it's mission.

For a chapter to receive credit for such donations as a charitable contribution, the income and expenses must be run through the chapter books, and a chapter check issued to the charity. A record of the transaction must be forwarded to Frank Santarelli in Kenosha for recording as a contribution to a local charity. Such contributions do not count towards the Harmony Foundation awards program. The Harmony Foundation administers monies going to Heartspring and a record is kept of those contributions as part of the awards program.

Santarelli does issue a certificate to chapters contributing to a local charity providing they have observed the above stated procedures.

Effective January 1, 1994, I have been appointed chairman of the Logopedics and service committee, by International President, Ernie Former chairman, Nickoson. Jim Eldridge will remain as a committee member. Ernie also appointed a committee to study the Society relationship to Heartspring. They will make a preliminary report at Mid-Winter and a final report at Pittsburgh. The name and mission of the Logopedics and service committee remains the same, at least until the International Board acts upon the committee report. Meanwhile, there will be a Logopedics Booth, Breakfast and "Sing With the Champs", in Pittsburgh.

Contributions to Heartspring, Society wide, are \$75,000.00 less than at this time last year. I hope chapters will come through in December. Pioneer already has 12 Harmony Foundation Award winners this year and Huron Valley could easily be the 13th. Remember, it's the kids at Heartspring who benefit!

## Advice for potential judge candidates...

As some of you know by now, I have been asked to serve as the District Associate Contest and Judging Chairman (DACJC) for the next two years. I will be attempting to fill the shoes of John Bauer who did such a marvelous job during his years in this position.

One of my duties will be to assist those who wish to enter the judging program to do so. Having just returned from the Leadership Forum last week in Milwaukee, I have some news which you should know if you are thinking about

becoming a judge.

The International Contest and Judging Committee has decided to lower the number of men who will be certified from 45 to 40. This was done to assure all judges will have assignments each Spring & Fall allowing them to remain sharp in their particular category. Some categories have more than 40 now bit it is felt attrition will take care of that number.

The MAXIMUM number of applicants per category will be: Presentation = 3; Singing = 4; Music = 5; Contest Administrator = 6. These applicants will be chosen from across the whole Society membership. Each man will need a written recommendation from 2 certified judges in the Category for which he is applying. In addition, you will have to attend special classes to be held at Harmony College in 1994 and then to go to Category School at DePaul University in

Chicago in 1995 for final certification.

Does this sound like something you'd be interested in? If so, call me now because January is the only time applicants will be accepted. Do the rules seem a bit stringent for qualifying? Yes they are and on purpose. ### Bulletin editors contest is January 15; Pioneers top two eligible for awards

January 15 is the deadline for chapter bulletin editors to enter the Pioneer District bulletin contest. Winners will receive recognition as Bulletin Editor of the Year, with nice plaques going to BETY and second place finisher.

The bulletins will be judged by a society staff of certified PROBE judges and the top two scoring bulletins scoring the highest in the district contest will be forwarded to the International Bulletin Contest, (IBC). PROBE, for the uninitiated, is an acronym for Public Relations Officers and Bulletin Editors, and affiliate of SPEBSQSA, Inc.

Winners of IBC will receive recognition at Pittsburgh and will be given an appropriate award at the convention. Since 1979, when the first traveling trophy and awards were presented to PROBE by Roger Morris, a member of the Milford Chapter and Pioneers current Associate Director of Communications for Bulletin Editors, the permanent trophy has returned to the district only once. The late Bob McDermott, and Tom Uicker, editors of Detroit-Oakland's Gentlemen's Songster won it all in Louisville in 1991. Here are the rules for the 1993 district

Editors of monthly bulletins shall submit for judging three copies each of three consecutive issues published during 1993. One copy of each shall issue must be an off-the-press copy for the Layout and Reproduction judge. The other two may be photo copies. For weekly bulletins, submit nine consecutive issues: the first three together, the second three together, and the third three together. Bi-weekly publications submit six consecutive issues: the first two together, the second two together, and the third two together.

The top awards of a BETY contest will be announced at the district spring convention, with awards given at that time.

So, get your best issues together and send them to: Roger Morris, 325 East Wardlow Road, Highland, MI 48356 before January 15. The early date is essential since all bulletins must be judged and returned to the district before winners can be forwarded to PROBE in time for judging and selecting the international winners. ## Holland's "Diekema" donation appreciated

The Holland Chapter received a letter of appreciation from Society Director Joe Liles for the donation of material about Willis A. "Bill" Diekema to the museum at Kenosha. Diekema, who founded the Holland Chapter in 1945, went on to become a prolific arranger of barbershop music from the forties to the seventies. He composed the theme song "Keep America Singing." When he retired, a two day barbershop bash with famous quartets from all over the country, was held in Holland to honor him.

The Diekema material, including original sheet music and a photo of Bill, was selected by a committee of Dale Becker, Myke Lucas and Bart Tillitt and delivered to Kenosha by Becker, long time chapter historian. Dale Becker, newly named district historian, also made three large notebooks containing almost 200 songs to be put on display in the chapter hall in Holland, along with many pictures of quartets and numerous framed sheets of music written by Bill Diekema.

Willis A. "Bill" Diekema died in 1988.




