



Write a summary of what you did, what the results were and why you're proud of it. No minimum or maximum length; whatever it takes to help us decide you're worthy of recognition. Enclose any backup material you have, like information used in planning the activity, outlines, reports,

internal communications, letters, news releases, clips, tapes posters, programs, brochures handouts and ads.

That's your entry in Pioneer District's Public Relations Officer of the Year Contest.

Mail as soon as possible. Deadline: March 1. The award will be presented at the spring

convention.

Our district winner will be entered in the international PROTY contest, which requires entrants to be PROBE members.

Judges for the international award will consider your efforts and the results in chapter activity, membership, and a community awareness of barbershopping. Media coverage will be an indicator, but not a sole determinant.

Judges will consider the cover letter, supporting material, one-time PR projects, a year around PR program and involvement in marketing and community outreach. More points will be given entries that include a multiple of these.

The cover letter should summarize the work, its intent, how it was carried out and results. It should also include information on chapter size and resources and on area media to the extent that it affected your work and results.

Also include your name, address, phone number, chapter and title and a brief summary of your barbershop and PR experience that may be used for publicity.

Ed Notes: — One of the many bulletins received here recently advised, "If you have to recruit, you're doing something wrong." Well, maybe. The statement makes a potentially valid point and is of value if it only makes us think; to consider why we recruit.

If recruitment in certain instances, in some chapters, is an ongoing means of replacing drop-outs as the message seems to infer, then something is very wrong and chapters caught in that trap ought to look first to retention. If however we eagerly invite others to join us in the thrill of barbershopping, in a successful chapter, the practice is very worthwhile and can only lead to positive growth. Obviously, to expose a man to the world of barbershop, we must first extend an invitation and get him to a meeting.

What happens next? What will your guest encounter? Will he have a good time among sociable people? Will he meet several or all of the chapter members and have an opportunity to get acquainted. Or will a brief exchange of names of two people he will stand between on the risers be deemed sufficient to stuff him in that slot for the evening?

We were discussing this with a chapter officer sometime ago and he remarked that we must not show a guest "special" treatment that does not represent regular practice, or he will be disappointed on subsequent visits. Absolutely correct!

So, is recruitment more important than retention? We must not show members any special treatment either, huh? Just mount the troops on the risers and expect them to perform on command! No talking! No time for socializing or even for four men to sing a tag! With the present emphasis on chorus rehearsal, members sometimes belong to a chapter and sing in a chorus for a long-long time without really getting to know the people on the other end of the risers! And that is sad.

Another bulletin suggested that it is sometimes difficult after a hard day, to force yourself to attend a barbershop meeting. But you owe it to the others - you have an *obligation* to be there, it was stated. Maybe - but we think not! If the meeting is all that it can be and ought to be, every member will be *eager* to be there. The meeting will offer revitalization and a renewal of the spirit after the hard day.

Perhaps we can amend the original message from the other bulletin. We might suggest that if your chapter is a having a problem with member retention, sufficient recruitment for consistent growth will never be possible.

If members are eager to attend meetings, guests will be eager to return also, without any special treatment other than the "special" treatment afforded every member at each and every meeting!

Class Descriptions

100 <u>Vocal Production Techniques</u> - Jim Casey. This course teaches the singer how to become totally involved in producing good barbershop sounds. It combines all aspects of proper use of the articulators along with support resonance and breath management that combine to help the singer develop color and beauty in his voice. Jim's theory is that champions don't sing better, they sing smarter.

101 Fundamentals of Music - Al Fisk. This course is designed to teach the student how to identify various notes and their value. It teaches key signatures and how to identify the key in which the song is written. It touches on intervals and generally makes those dots on the paper more user friendly.

102 A&B Basics of Arranging - Burt Szabo & Bruce Evans. The class will give you a sound knowledge of basic barbershop arranging. You will learn to identify the musical elements critical to the preservation of the barbershop harmony art form. Be sure to designate (A) basic) or (B) advanced on your registration form. With sufficient interest and registration, we will develop two classes.

103 Apprentice Coaching - Faculty. In this class you will be assigned to one of the quartet coaches while he is working with his assigned quartets. Thus, you will observe but not be involved in the coaching. Following the coaching session, the coach will advise the apprentice of the weakest parts of the groups performance and what he did to help the group improve. You may wish to take notes for comparison purposes. You may be assigned to alternate coaches for P.M. sessions.

104 Quartet Workshop - Faculty. This class is organized for quartets only; who want extensive coaching to help improve their performance package. Each coach will work on your problem areas first, moving toward your strengths as the session progresses. Please advise the coach of your areas of concern at the beginning of the session.

105 Chorus Workshop - Faculty. This class is for chapter choruses only. You must have a majority of your chorus in attendance and supply risers to accommodate all in attendance. You will be coached in all areas of your performance. Be prepared for a strenuous days work. See

reduced price schedule for choruses below. You will be expected to perform on the afterglow.

106 - Joe Barbershop Chorus - Faculty. This class is designed to give you the same basic instruction as in the Chorus Workshop. You will probably learn one or two new songs and prepare to sing on the Afterglow. Vocal and warm up techniques will be emphasized along with basic introduction to the new judging categories and how to use them to improve your chorus performance.

107 On With The Show - Ev Nau. The main focus will be show production. The class will encompass staging, sound, lighting, format, use of M.C., use of scripts, assigning chapter personnel, use of guest ensembles and all else pertinent to show production.

200 Tag Singing - Al Fisk. Al has a compilation of about 180 tags from which to choose. The class is designed for full enjoyment in a very relaxed atmosphere for instant gratification.

201 Gang Singing - Al Fisk. You will relax and enjoy singing with members of other district chapters. This is a fun class.

202 Fundamentals of Directing - Faculty. You will learn the basics of arm waving, identifying key signatures, the differences in conducting 4/4, 3/4, or 6/8 time; how to start and stop the chorus and the various nuances necessary to direct louder or softer singing.

203 <u>Section Leader Workshops</u> - Faculty. Learn the basics of teaching parts to chorus members to help you be a more effective section leader.

204 How's and Why's of Warm Up - Casey or Faculty. This class will help you get your whole body ready to sing. It will include posture, the "warm air" concept and breath management.

205 <u>Develop Sight Singing Skills</u> - Jim Stephens. This class will explain what all the black dots and all the rest of the marks on the sheet music means. You will learn basic skills to help you learn music faster. You will receive hand outs to refer to when back home.

206 <u>Successful Chapter Bulletins</u> - Foxand Uicker. These two gentlemen each edit a monthly chapter bulletin filled with interesting news and information. They will share their skill with you.

207 "Can't Miss" Public Relations - Joan Kienitz & special media guest. To be successful in business you must market your product. Radio, TV and newspapers are wonderful tools to use in advertising and not expensive if used properly.

This class will help you learn how to successfully utilize the media in promoting your chapter specifically or barbershopping in general.

208 Master of Ceremonies - Fred Kienitz. The International has just published a manual on this subject. We will use it as a guide for this class and you may take it home for future reference. The class will focus on the manner in which the M.C. controls the flow of entertainment.


