Next January, a sure fire formula to cure you of the post holiday bills and blues is to pack your plane, train or automobile and head to the barbershop mid-winter convention. Sarasota's balmy 80 degrees would have been enough to put everyone in a cheerful mood after leaving the minus 8 in SE Michigan, but when you add old friends and old songs to the agenda, our winter seemed a million light-years away.

I lost count of the former Pioneer barbershoppers who are now citrus belt singers, but judging from how active those transplants are, I guess we can take some credit for the success of the Sunshine District.

Our first contact was with Al Rehkop and Glen Van Tassell, (2 time gold medalists - Auto Towners & Gentlemens' Agreement) whose current quartet, Shenanigans, (top twenty, 1993) entertained us at our District President's welcome dinner. They looked and sounded great and sent their best to all of you.

Your rep's in the International Seniors Quartet competition, *Rare Vintage*, (Wickstrom, Demchak, Stephens & Wisdom) done us proud with a 6th place finish in a very talented 20 plus field.

Possibly the most talked about issue in our society for the past couple of years has been whether we should allow "non-member" - OK, female - music directors. Last summer in Calgary, the issue was brought to a vote and defeated by your international board. It was presumably, laid to rest. However, not unlike issues that have high level many controversial/political overtones in our government, this item, following copied letters by over 80 for and against writers regarding the decision, was reincarnated in Sarasota for "new" deliberations. I'll just bet you're not surprised to learn that a number of votes changed and this time the "non-member director" issue passed!

Now don't get me wrong, my personal preference may or may not be in agreement with the decision. What is important, I believe, is that I convey the wishes of my constituents -you-(continued, see Seely, page 4)

Every year, the senior Contest gets better. The New and Improved Industrial Strength Mini Chorus, (Ray Henders, tenor, Bob Squires, lead, Jim Foley, bari and Buzz Haeger, bass) from Illinois won the top spot—with all the medals in that quartet, they'd need an industrial strength truck just to carry them!! Our own Rare Vintage, (Bill Wickstrom, tenor, Bob Demchak, lead, Jim Stephens, bari and Bob Wisdom, bass) turned in an excellent and entertaining performance that landed them a very respectable 6th place.

The International Board had a very full, sometimes controversial agenda, so my "rookie" meeting was a real "jumpstart" to my two year term. Here are the highlights:

Conventions and related items.
Sites for 1998, 1999 and 2000 were selected as follows:

1998 Atlanta, GA 1999 Anaheim, CA 2000 Kansas City, MO

A few new items were added for Pittsburgh—a general membership meeting by President Ernie Nickoson and Executive Director Joe Liles on Thursday morning; A "Masters class" by the Masters of Harmony on Friday morning; A performance by the Singing Angels, a chorus of young people singing barbershop prior to Friday night's contest. The chorus "walk—ons" were eliminated.

As chairman of the Convention Management Committee, I was privileged to make the CMC recommendations to the International Board, and I'd like to ask your input for one more item that was tabled for Pittsburgh. The CMC recommends "tiered pricing" for International convention (continued, see Lewis, page 4)

and vote accordingly. Your instructions, as polled in last spring's House of Delegates, was to vote nay. Interestingly, it was defeated in the district presidents meeting 9-6-1, which was the same tally in Calgary!! Well, lets hope this issue is finally put to bed and the real essence of this legislation is to "Keep the Whole World Singing" and maybe even preserve, in some form, the beauty of barbershop singing.

What impact will it have on the Pioneer District? For the moment, probably none, although certain coaches and choreographers will probably become more visible on chapter shows and the like. But someday we'll hear Doran announce a chorus under the direction of MS somebody at district contest. As our eminent Historian, Mr. Deak Martin so aptly writes; "the winds of change are blowing". Let's not have those winds become tornadoes.

Pioneer will send at least two quartets to International at Philadelphia, plus any other that scores at least 1800 points from a double for their presentation of four songs.

The Paragon Quartet, from Johnny Appleseed District has been granted district and International approval to sing in our spring prelims, for points only, to qualify for International. Let's give them a warm Pioneer welcome and offer them the same hospitality and recognition as all of our competitors.

A source of genuine excitement for me has been the imminent probability that Bob McDermott's History of the Michigan/Pioneer District will be published. The carefully conceived manuscript was presented to the district by Bob's daughter and widow, Nancy and Dottie, at last falls convention. After reading this marvelous documentation of all of us, I was inspired to locate a publisher who could do the job for a reasonable cost, so every proud, Pioneer barbershopper could enjoy this treasure.

We are very close to publication of this 300 page gem. It's possible we'll have the first edition ready for our spring convention.

seating starting with Salt Lake City in 1966. Briefly, prices would range from \$60 to \$125. The best 10% seats would be \$125; the next 15% \$100; 65% priced at the \$75 current price; and 10% at \$60. Most every other entertainment and sports program has tiered pricing and we believe this will give everyone the opportunity to have the best seats available based on their own value system. It will guarantee that they can avoid "nose-bleed" section seats, at a moderate increase in price. Registrations are usually a small part of convention expenses compared to hotel, food and activities. Please write or see me at the convention if you have input. Thanks.

Harmony Hall: A committee is in place to study Harmony Hall. It needs extensive repair, perhaps beyond our means, and we have had interest from prospective buyers from time to time. My own position is that we are preservers of music, barbershop harmony and old songs—not old buildings. I love the place dearly, but we should stick to our focus. We shouldn't divert our attention to become the restorer of old buildings.

Non-Member (female) Directors was passed by a vote of 14-11. Following the vote, a motion was made to remove the two year probationary period, which also passed. Will this make sweeping changes in our Society? I think not. At present, we have 6 chapters with female directors, of a total of 810. Even if it were to double or triple, it is not a major factor and does allow a chapter, especially one that is struggling, the options of making it's own decision regarding a director.

Changes in Board Structure. Eric Jackson is chairing a committee to look at the size and structure of the International Board. Basic ideas are to have a much smaller board responsible for the operations of the policy and a larger governing body responsible only for policy. This appears to be a long term project.

The Joe Barbershop Chorus will sing at 12 noon on Saturday, to begin the chorus contest.

Dr. Burt Szabo from International will be in our district for two weeks this year; May 18-24 and September 26 - October 1. He will be available during daytime hours to meet with service clubs. high school or college music instructors or classes, or others. He can do about a 20 to 30 minute program on Barbershop Harmony and perhaps show the "Barbershop Video" as part of the program.

our membership in ten years.

Among non-members aged 26-40, 74 percent are unaware of any singing organization they could join, Of the other 26 percent, half mentioned church choirs and only a few knew of SPEBSQSA, says a survey the Society just completed.

Those are our top concerns - stopping our membership decline and

increasing our recognition. It won't be done by just attending Monday meetings and holding an annual show.

"The changes we must make are drastic," says Bill Moreland of the Society's international marketing committee.

Bill gave the keynote address to the International Board members at the mid-winter convention, helping make them painfully aware of our need to get beyond our rehearsal halls. Otherwise, we won't survive.

Goals developed by the marketing committee include:

-We must increase participation by members and followers, the latter via a new associate membership.

-We need to be a part of, or originators of, a movement to make singing a part of the family and community. We need to get other music organizations to join us in this. This is part of our Society's new vision statement.

-We must expand geographically, just like Wal-Mart and McDonalds continue to look for new franchises.

-A national membership effort must provide support for chapters.

-We must really tell our story in the media, year around, not just announce our annual shows

We have to showcase our product and, to do so, Moreland said, "We have to improve our performance level so that we have something that we are proud of and something that's saleable to the public."

"We have so much to share," Moreland added.
There's a whole world of people out there who
know nothing about us, isolated in our meeting
halls, sneaking out once in a while for a brief
performance. There are thousands people who
come across us, but have no idea we're

barbershoppers. They have no idea of the fun we're having. They have no idea of the fun they could have.

That's our fault!

How can we change that? Can we get more members? Can we be recognized as one of the best singing groups in town? Can we have even more fun?

"Every great achievement was once considered impossible," Moreland said. He noted a Disneyworld sign that says, "If we can dream it, we can make it."

Where will our Society be in 2001?

Lets get the whole world singing," Moreland said. "That's the legacy you can pass on to the 21st century."

The logo will also be used in news releases, brochures, posters, banners and other promotional materials.

Bob Freed donated his time to create the logo. He's vice president and creative director at Nordstrom and Partners, a Battle Creek agency that develops marketing strategies and materials.

"A good logo is a distillation of complex ideas that you're trying to communicate visually," Freed said. "It should be a clear, simple, usually less-is-more graphic that is instantly associated with your group."
