New quartets will vie for International stage

Convention week-end, April 28-30, will designate International competitors and district chorus champs.

While some long familiar quartets have disbanded, last years Pioneer, International reps, Onyx, will compete in International prelim's in Lansing. So the field is open for new Pioneer quartets to qualify to represent the district at International competition in Miami Beach in July.

While quartet registration will continue beyond our press date, based upon last years

contests, top contenders will likely include Onyx, Genuine Blend, - current district champs, Firepower, - last falls runner ups, as well as Camaraderie and Beyond Measure.

And past surprises tell us we cannot predict the outcome of spirited district contests. You will simply have to be in Lansing April 29, to savor the

talent, share the thrill and support the victors as two or more Pioneer quartets qualify to share

the Society's top contest stage.

Younger barbershop singers are registering for the MBNA America 1995 Collegiate Quartet Contest. That preliminary competition, following Saturday evening's principal quartet preliminaries, will route youthful Pioneers to the collegiate finals in Miami.

The week-end will also produce a new district championship crown for a Pioneer chorus on Saturday afternoon. Competition will be keen among ambitious, improving district choruses. Growing Pioneer conventions offer harmony and much more. Join the springtime revelry April 28-30.

One thousand, three hundred and fourteen barbershoppers, family members and fans attended last October's Pioneer District convention. Over forty percent of the district's enthusiastic membership - 14 choruses and 17 quartets - sang on the contest stage, Convention Director Michael Cirrito reported.

Convention and contest participation have grown steadily in the district, offering proof of the barbershop thrills and fun in abundance at the well planned, smooth running events.

If you haven't attended a Pioneer convention in recent years, do it now! Renew and revitalize your esprit de corp; make new friends and meet

again with old ones. And bring lots of stamina - there is continuous activity.

Early registrations at \$15 are available until April 15. (See page 9 of the February/March Troub). After that they are yet a value at \$20.

While some of the hotels/motels book full early, rooms are yet available. District reservation service ended March 28, but you may yet personally contact the hotels/motels listed within the registration box on page 7 of the March/April Troubadour.

International Board at the Midwinter Convention. Beyond that I will keep my remarks to a bare minimum and give you time to make this your meeting, and to ask questions or offer input.

Nothing is sacred. Please feel free to ask about anything. I do realize I won't have



the answer to every question, but promise to find the answers and respond in my next *Troubadour* article.

President Russ has also invited any and all interested barbershoppers to attend the House of Delegates meeting. You do not need to be an official delegate of your chapter to attend. If you have question or are just curious, please feel free to be there. The meeting is at 2 p.m., Friday, April 28, at the Sheraton Hotel.

Board deliberations at Tucson.

Vision 2001. The board agreed with the proposals of 2001 with some slight modifications and directed President Shaw to put committees and budgets in place as necessary, to make them happen.

One modification was that SingAmerica/SingCanada was approved as an additional International service project. It is felt we can easily support this and Heartspring. Joe Liles has written a new song; "Teach the Children to Sing," that may be the SingAmerica/SingCanada theme song.

Lifeblood. The Dream Team made ten recommendations which were approved in concept and referred to appropriate committees for implementation. Chapter mission statements, Lifeblood Conventions, Music Festivals, Directors Workshops, chorus and quartet development and repertoire review were among the recommendations.

Cots, a new face lift, in 1995

In 1994 all members attending COTS were assessed a \$30 fee to help fund faculty and travel expense. In 1995, Kenosha will supply half an International faculty, plus a dean for every



COTS. To meet the budget requirements of the program in 1995, each member attending will be assessed a flat fee or \$15 to help cover Society expenses for faculty and dean. The Pioneer District will supply the other half of the faculty.

COTS will be held December 2-3 at Gull Lake. The Society will provide the following faculty; Dean, President,

Membership VP, Public Relations and Secretary. The district based faculty will handle; Program VP, Music VP, Youth Outreach (Opt.) and Treasurer.

The ongoing decentralization of the COTS program has offered considerable cost savings to the Society. In reducing the overall cost to chapter officers, they plan to continue the positive growth in attendance occurring each year.

Zipper Club Chorus

We are still looking for qualified members for the "Zipper Club Chorus." To date I have had six people respond to the call. All you need to qualify is to have had open heart surgery.

Our songs will be simple and our performance

will be fun!

We will sing at the convention on April 29 at the conclusion of the chorus contest, while the judges are totaling the contest scores.

Membership - from the beginning

I found great reading and some very interesting facts while reading Bob McDermott's "A History of the Pioneer District - The First Fifty Years, 1940-1990.

He reported that between 1945 and 1948 the "Michigan District" had 48 chapters totaling over

2,800 members.

I'm sure many conclusions may be drawn as to why barbershopping drew so much interest back then. But as the years passed, the decline in membership would become a constant concern.

Sometimes the losses were great in number. but mostly it was a gradual loss. From 1948 to the end of 1953 the district lost seven chapters

and over 1,000 members.

In 1943 Muskegon and Oakland County boasted chapters of over 300 members each. By 1956 there were only four century chapters in the district: Muskegon - 146, Dearborn - 130, Grand Rapids - 110, and Detroit - 104.

Today we have only one - Grosse Pointe with

106.

Blaming an economic decline, district membership took another dramatic nose-dive from 1956 to May 1958, when we lost over 400 members and stood at 38 chapters. By February 1960 our ranks had dropped to a low of 1,142.

In 1961 membership rebounded to 1,700 but slid back to 1,571 by the end of 1962. The large differences in year ending totals were mostly blamed on chapter negligence in handling renewals.

In 1965, and for the first time in 20 years, the year ending total had dipped below 1,300 to 1,274. By 1970 the total was down to 1,238.

By the end of 1972 membership had taken an upswing, as the district grew to 1,486 and the Society reached an all time high of 34,376. From 1972 through 1979 the district remained in the 1,400 range.

Not much is known about year ending totals from 1980 through 1982, but from 1983 through 1994 the Pioneer District averaged 1,342 members with a high of 1,379 in 1989 and a low of 1,308 at the end of 1994.

So this is where we stand... not in a great position.... nor are we in bad shape.

Chartering in September, 1973, the Port Huron chapter closed it's doors late in 1994. It was sad to see it happen.

Other chapters in the district are considered to be on the critical list. They will need some special T.L.C. to help restore them to health.

1995 can be a great year!

But to make it happen, we must work together as a team to help the hurting and enlist the new. If we do this we will grow and be successful.

All you need to do is ask

The above was the topic of one of my articles in the recent past and it seems to be paying dividends. Thus far Cadillac, Boyne City, Alpena,



Milford, Flint, Kalamazoo, Muskegon, Rochester Hills, Detroit-Oakland and Battle Creek have taken advantage of Pioneer people to help them produce a better product singing barbershop.

This represents about a third of district chapters and I am pleased at the

results. The D.M.E.'s from all 16 districts in the Society are pushing the same theme and the results have been tremendous for many. If you haven't taken advantage of this opportunity, let me encourage you to do so. Perhaps we could reach the two-thirds goal this year.

Plans for the 95 Harmony Round-Up are complete and offers another top quality faculty. The only thing left is registering enough people to make it work. The deadline (April 30) for regular registration is fast approaching. Get your application in soon and avoid the late penalty fee. We still have room for two full choruses and about eight quartets.

In a recent radio interview, the announcer asked me how barbershop harmony has changed since our inception. The question stopped me until I realized it hasn't changed at all.

Our founders had the insight to preserve the style and set restrictions that would guarantee it's pure form to the present. And yet, we still continue to produce better and better

International champions as our Society grow older.

the reason is that we have concentrated on upgrading the quality of production of this kind of music. We have looked at the professional singer and asked how they provide the quality to the voice and what is needed to provide unity in the ensemble of our quartets and choruses.

This boils down to about four simple rules, which, unfortunately, are difficult to attain without dedicated work. First, we must learn to sing with resonated voices at all times. Second, we must sing in tune. Third, we must learn to form vowels properly, and fourth, we must learn to do what we do at exactly the same time everyone else does it.

I kid you not gentlemen, that is how champions are produced. However, should a championship elude you, the secondary benefit will allow you to sing your very best.

appear first. If more than one chorus so requests, a draw for first position will be held, starting with the convention in Salt Lake City. Why? Sometimes a chorus winning the right to compete for the first time would like their members to see the contest.

The district presidents recommended that quartet medalists not be allowed to compete in the Senior Quartet Contest. It was referred to the Contest and Judging Committee.

For the spring contest, any quartet that scores 1,800 points or more will qualify to compete at Miami Beach.

Finally, Joe Liles plans to retire early in 1996. A search committee is working toward identifying qualified candidates to fill the post.

of DOC, Keith McClary of Motor City Metro and Dan Bezaire of Windsor, plus myself, Roger Lewis and Dick Smith in Battle Creek.

At the least, these addresses might be used to send messages back and forth among these seven people and their chapters. But these people may not be set up or able to get the information to others in their area.

Still not heard from are any district officers (except Ed Fritzen) and 21 chapters. Surely there must be more of you out there who have E-

mail link-ups, either at home or work.

Please help us move ahead on this project. E-mail your E-mail address to jim_styer @fc1.glfn.org. Also, if you have some knowledge of computer communications, let me know that too. I'm no expert and if this really takes off I probably won't be able to handle it all myself,

For those of you who aren't hooked up, ask your local computer buffs for information about the nearest BBF or FreeNet with E-mail capability. Or consider one of the commercial services like America On Line or Compuserve.

It's worth it. You can link up with barbershoppers in Kenosha and around the world, and Sweet Adelines, too. Read controversial discussions about competition vs. fun choruses, judges' decisions, beta blockers, even wind chimes constructed to sound barbershop chords. Get valuable information to help your chapter. Ask questions and get answers by everyone from Joe Barbershopper to Kenosha gurus.

I've found it a great help to my own chapter. I've asked for and received sample chorus contracts, guidelines for a new policy on singing standards and info on making legal learning tapes. I've been able help to others, too.

Executive committee, International board approve a second service project

In action taken at the International board meeting at the Midwinter convention, SingAmerica/Sing/Canada was approved as a second Society service project. The board also voted to continue support of Heartspring.

SingAmerica/SingCanada is an outgrowth of the Futures 2001 committee report which deals in part, with the marketing of the Society. It will include support of music programs – in the public and parochial schools, in colleges and universities and in support of community choral activities. This could take a variety of forms – such as sponsoring a high school or college quartet, offering scholarships or underwriting summer music programs. Tentative plans call for offering a summer program in 1996 for both music educators and students.

There will be separate accounts kept by the Harmony Foundation for the two projects. Checks should be made payable to The Harmony Foundation with notations "For Heartspring" or

"For SingAmerica/SingCanada."

While marketing is developing the SA/SC program, its business as usual for the Services committee. A seminar was held in January for all district chairmen and committee members. Of Interest; a generic plaque was approved as part of the Harmony Foundation Awards Program. The new program will eliminate duplication and unnecessary expense. There will be one plaque, instead of three. The numeral plate will be in the appropriate color, bronze for \$10 per capita, silver \$25, and gold for \$50. The existing plaques will be used until filled when new plaques will be issued to the chapter.

Each district chairman projected how much he thought his district could raise in 1995. There are some lofty goals and it is hoped each chapter will get behind the effort. Contributions were down in 1994, partially because of the confusion about our service project. We need to get the contributions back where they should be.

At our spring convention, Alex Willox will speak to the District Board, I will address the House of Delegates.

As I said at last years House of Delegates meeting, Heartspring is still our unified service project. The marketing committee is concerned about our declining membership and the average age of our membership. We recognize the need for an infusion of young blood in the Society. It is hoped the SingAmerica/SingCanada program will accomplish that end. We'll have to wait and see what program the marketing committee comes up with and how the money is to be raised.

Ed notes - Hopefully, you read in the last - February/Marchissue - President Seely's enthusiastic description of a "chapter meeting" he recently attended and his comments on the "fun filled evening". He said: "the main purpose was to get together... to sing and laugh".

"Gosh, doesn't that sound complicated?," he asked. "There is life beyond the risers", Chorus Director Seely stated, "and to me it's a pleasant change from the hard work we subject ourselves

to on a weekly basis".

Oh my, his words hit home here. I so fondly recall when my home town chapter used to hold a monthly chapter meeting in addition to the once a week chorus rehearsals. That was when the Muskegon chapter was most successful. That was when our Port City Chorus won district

championships and competed repeatedly at International. Several Muskegon quartets were also among the tops in the district. recall our chapter membership numbered 60 plus while around 40 to 45 sang in the chorus.

Importantly, the chapter and chorus were separate entities and if you compare the numbers

above it is evident not all chapter members sang in the chorus. Some sang only quartets while others confined their active musical participation to gang singing at chapter meetings. Some were likely what we used to call "crows". But all were happy, productive chapter members.

And to reiterate both the chapter and

chorus were successful. More successful and larger than either have been since we've become strictly a "chorus chapter".

Hard sell recruiting was not emphasized as much then as now - but wow, it was nice to be able to invite friends to a fun filled chapter meeting and witness their awakening to the wonderful sound of barbershop harmony while they simply listened or lustily sang along with the gang. Oh, sure - many joined the chapter; some also joined the chorus while others became one quarter of a singing foursome!

Usually, those new quartets first performed at chapter meetings, where they received lots of encouragement and often, friendly, helpful

coaching.

About those "crows", - we used to sell out the eighteen hundred seat Frauenthal Theater for our annual shows - with the help of those crows.




for the contest and an all-events ticket package.



Tots Room at conventions?


UPDATE from International
