

quartet (even that could be voided if 1560 points, based on a double panel are not achieved.) A total of 40 quartets, plus affiliates, will complete the field, meaning that 24 will qualify by a score of 1824 or better, 16 from the districts, plus 24 by highest scores.

The Thursday quartet finals will now be held in two sessions, formerly three. This not only insures a higher quality contest but loosens up the time constrictions on the conventioneer who has had to "live" at the contest sessions on Thursdays.

Major restructuring changes will take place this year which will include your chapter and district. Throughout the year, your chapter will receive data suggesting how to go about the process without disturbing your chapters operation. We think you'll be pleased with the final result.

Although not the result of the "Harold Hill" program, Gaylord looks to be the next community to hang our sign.

If you haven't become involved with the Harold Hill program, ask you chapter membership team, "Why not?"

Registrations to the Salt Lake City convention are nearing 6000. Give some serious thought to attending this year. The programs, contests and special events look fabulous.

Keep in mind, especially you chapter officers, that the big emphasis at this year's Roundup will be a Directors' Clinic for any Pioneer director,



assistant director, aspiring director, or "wanna be" director. You will all get a chance to learn, observe, and try your hand at directing. You will also be video taped and receive a critique on your performance.

Remember the key word for this class will be the same as the

third letter in our SPEBSQSA logo. One word of warning, however if you are told that you direct very much like our current D.M.E., I would suggest that you quit and never try it again.

Our Zone V.P.'s at the district level have been asked to contact all chapters in their respective areas and notify them of this fine opportunity to take out an insurance policy on their chapter chorus for a very low, one time premium. Your survival could very well depend on educating one or more of your chapter members in the art of directing a vocal ensemble.

We also have a fine staff of knowledgeable quartet coaches. So, district quartets are encouraged to enroll also.

The question of what you can get from this school will probably raise its ugly head while you are pondering registration. I have the answer which was passed on by Coach Lou Holtz of Notre Dame. "Ability is what you are capable of doing. Motivation determines what you do. Attitude determines how well you do it."

Those of us who can master all three can be responsible for creating a vocal ensemble equal to or superior to all other vocal ensembles in and around our area.

One final word, for those who want something other that these two afore-mentioned classes; we also have a selection of nine other classes listed in the insert. Remember that the classes that you choose will not be canceled this year. Your weekend will be filled with a musical education that you will never forget when you attend Harmony Roundup at Michigan State University.

Henry (Hank) Hedges has a degree in music composition from Northwestern University. Retired, he moved to Gaylord four years ago.

Herb Bayles returns as editor; PROBEmoter is back in business

From PROBE

1995 was a rough year for PROBEmoter, the quarterly bulletin published by PROBE-the association for Public Relations Officers and Bulletin Editors. There was a change of editors after the January-March issue and the new editor ran into some serious problems after he published the ensuing April-June issue. A change of jobs required him to move hundreds of miles and the move, plus unforseen new constraints on his time, prevented him from further work on PROBEmoter. So the publication went into hibernation for the last half of 1995.

Consequently, PROBE President Girvin turned, in early January, to PROBEmoter's previous editor, Herb Bayles, to see if he could

resume the job. He could... and he did.

In a couple of weeks Herb put together a January-March, 1996 issue in order to get PROBEmoter back on its calendar-quarter publication schedule. It is an abbreviated issue because Herb burned a lot of bridges and severed many lines of communications when he resigned the editor's job in December of 1994.

"Now," Herb says, "it's time to rebuild; to restore those lines of communication, because PROBEmoter's content relies heavily upon them" He is asking for every chapter or district bulletin editor who maintains a bulletin mailing list to add his name and address to that list. It is:

Further, Herb pleads with every public relations officer (chapter or district) with a success story to send PROBEmoter a brief description of the triumph.PROBEmoter's expressed aim is to provide "how-to" and "handy hints" articles for its readers, and certainly the best sources for such articles are the guys who conceived an unique public relations plan or project and made it work.

Finally, Herb urges that every bulletin editor and PR officer polls his chapter to see if there's a member with a computer, access to the so-called information super highway-the internet-and is willing to serve as the chapter's internet communicator. If such a man is found, his c-mail address should be sent to Herb, to Kenosha (Brian Lynch) and be listed in the

chapter's bulletin.

A footnote: Mindful that PROBE's members missed six months of PROBEmoter in 1995-the only tangible evidence of their \$5.00 annual dues payment-PROBE President Dick Girvin has extended all existing memberships for six additional months.

From Monday, May 13 through Sunday, May 19, the Pioneer District will be hosting our Societies Director of Music Education and Services, Dan Naumann. Naumann manages the operation of music education programs and activities relating to the preservation of barbershop harmony.

Naumann holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music Education from the University of Nebraska at Kearney, and earned a Masters degree in conducting and voice from the same institution. He taught vocal music in Kearney, Lexington, and Omaha schools for

16 years, and received several awards for excellence in teaching.

He has presented seminars at the Nebraska State Music Educators Conventions, and conducted a number of mixed choirs at various school conferences. He has also directed numerous church and community choirs.

A long-time Barbershopper, Naumann directed the Omaha, Nebraska, chapter and sang in a Central States District finalist quartet. He founded and directed the Lexington, Nebraska, chapter and the Kearney, Nebraska, chapter of Sweet Adelines International. In Naumanns last year at the helm, the Omaha chapter was among the Society's fastest-growing, registering an impressive 46% gain in just one year. He currently directs a Sweet Adelines chorus in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and sings lead in the Muckety-Mucks quartet.

While in the Pioneer District, Naumann will be spending his days talking to teachers in schools throughout Michigan. He will spend his evenings meeting with several district chapters in central locations.

To wind up his visit, Naumann will serve on the staff of the districts annual Harmony Round-Up. This years' school is being held from Friday evening, May 17 through Noon Sunday, May 19 on the campus of Michigan State University, in East Lansing, Michigan.



Class Descriptions

100 Chorus Directors Clinic - Nauman. This course is designed to focus on the new, young and/or aspiring arm waver. It will also aid present directors but will concentrate on the basics of directing. All students will "direct" and be critiqued by the instructor and peers. Individual sessions will be video taped so you may see your own progress.

101 Fundamentals /of Music - Al Fisk. This course is designed to teach the student how to identify various notes and their value. It teaches key signatures and how to identify the key in which the song is written. It touches on intervals and generally makes those dots on the paper more user friendly.

102 It Ain't Magic - Bruce Evans. This class will be great for the barbershopper who wants to know more about the mysterious phenomenon called music. It will touch on melody, harmony, scales, pitch, meter, half-steps, whole-steps, harmonics, and musical instruments, including your own; your voice. It will give a laymen's view of all the dots, squiggles and flags we see on the paper.

103 Apprentice Coaching - Faculty. In this class you will be assigned to one of the quartet coaches while he is working with his assigned quartets. Thus, you will observe but not be involved in the coaching. Following the coaching session, the coach will advise the apprentice of the weakest parts of the groups performance and what he did to help the group improve. You may wish to take notes for comparison purposes. You may be assigned to alternate coaches for P.M. sessions.

104 Quartet Workshop - Faculty. This class is organized for quartets only; who want extensive coaching to help improve their performance package. Each coach will work on your problem areas first, moving toward your strengths as the session progresses. Please advise the coach of your areas of concern at the beginning of the session.

105 Chorus Workshop - Faculty. This class is for chapter choruses only. You must have a majority of your chorus in attendance and supply risers to accommodate all in attendance. You will be coached in all areas of your performance. Be prepared for a strenuous days work. See reduced price schedule for choruses on page four. You will be expected to perform on the afterglow.

200 Tag Singing - Al Fisk. Al has a compilation of about 180 tags from which to choose. The class is designed for full enjoyment in a very relaxed atmosphere for instant gratification.

201 Gang Singing - Al Fisk. You will relax and enjoy singing with members of other district chapters. This is a fun class.

202 <u>Section Leader Workshops</u> - Faculty. Learn the basics of teaching parts to chorus members to help you be a more effective section leader.

203 How's and Why's of Warm Up - Faculty. This class will help you get your whole body ready to sing. It will include posture, the "warm air" concept and breath management.

204 <u>Develop Sight Singing Skills</u> - Jim Stephens. This class will explain what all the black dots and all the rest of the marks on the sheet music means. You will learn basic skills to help you learn music faster. You will receive hand outs to refer to when back home.

205 Your Chapter/Membership and Marketing - Wracan & J. Kienitz. This class will provide you some sure-fire ways to recruit new members and to market your chapter in you area. Both instructors will give you step-by-step instructions as to how to be successful in executing these tried and proven methods. Both instructors worked their magic with Flint, the fastest growing chapter in our district.

Dale Bekker named Holland Barbershopper of the Year

Dale Bekker hard-working show chairman, historian and secretary, has been selected as 1995 Barbershopper of the Year of the Holland Windmill Chapter.

During the busy year of 1995, Dale served as chapter secretary and historian and was co-chair of the Holland Windmill Chorus Tulip Time show. He also was co-chair of the chapter's 50th Anniversary Whopper Weekend held in October. Along with co-chair Dick Plaisted and promoter Jack W. Oonk, Dale helped plan a weekend full of anniversary activities, guiding many volunteers to get the work done. 
