
Goodbye to Another "Good-Guy"

The Pioneer District is moving into the computer age.

PioNet should be in operation by the time you read this. This is an automated listserv, just like the Society's Harmonet and using the same computer host, Humber College in Ontario, Canada. We have been offered use of this site at no cost to the district.

Any computer e-mail sent to the listserv address will automatically be sent to all other subscribers.

If you wish to send e-mail to individual barbershoppers in Pioneer, you will still have that option, of course.

PioNet can be used to share chapter, division and dis-



trict announcements, information and ideas with other barbershoppers and chapters in Pioneer. You can ask questions, get answers, bring up your concerns and praises, raise issues and get involved in e-mail chats about anything that affects your Pioneer barbershop life. You will also have contact with your district officers and they will be able to get info to you directly and quickly.

I expect initial subscribers to include our District President, Executive Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Troubadour editor. As this gets started, I had 40 e-mail addresses from members in 20 chapters. I suspect most will sign up for PioNet.

For this to be a fuller communications medium, we would like to have AT LEAST ONE representative from every chapter.

PioNet mail traffic at first probably will be slow as we get used to using it. Its success and growth can't be predicted, other than to say it depends on your participation.

After PioNet is running well, and after I get my new computer system, I hope to find time to begin setting up Pioneer District pages on the World Wide Web. These eventually will link to any Web pages your chapter may have now or develop later.

I would also like some input from you: How would you like to use. PioNet? What would you like to see on it that would benefit you and/or your chapter?

Gordon was a great Barbershopper.

THE EXPERIENCE OF C.O.T.S. 96

For those not familiar with this event, this is an opportunity for newly elected chapter officers from across the Pioneer District to be guided and trained by the best of our District and the Society.

The focus of our district and our Society has been changed. As chapter officers we were directed to view our individual chapter members as our customers. It is for them that we have been charged with the responsibility to help in the perpetuation of our craft. The traditional corporate organizational pyramid has been changed totally with the membership now being our prime focus.

- "We have to keep the art form pure...how we present it in a way to keep it current."
- "Barbershopping is not a hobby...it is part of my life...It is love, and depending on your commitment, it becomes a life style."
- "Barbershopping is done for me. It is a team sport, I do it for other people."
- "We all have to understand what is Barbershopping before we can perpetuate it."
- "Everyone needs a role. Understanding others' talents. We must all understand and appreciate the value they can be."
- "We must have a solid orientation of new members (i.e. 'You're a stranger here with us but once.'"
- "We must have a lot of time for fellowship - for members and our wives and friends and to make them all feel like part of our organization."
- "We have to be aware of our true customer: 'Joe Barbershopper.'"
- "Proper promotion is of brotherly love. There has to be a lot of vitality in every meeting."
- "We have to encompass all musical abilities."
- "We must perpetuate the art form and enjoy ourselves."
- "We need to encourage our own members and we must support them."

To promote and to encourage vocal harmony and good fellow-ship among its members and;

To serve the musical needs of all current and potential members by providing and actively supporting a wide variety of Barbershopping opportunities which may include organized quartetting, chorus singing, and group or 'gang' singing and;

To encourage and promote the education of its members and the public in music appreciation, and;

To initiate, promote and participate in charitable projects, and;

To promote public appreciation of barbershop harmony."

The new Standard Chapter Bylaws also state:

"Every chapter shall have a mission statement reflecting its own place in the community, and in the Barbershop Society."


NEW TROUBADOUR EDITOR

Class Descriptions

100 <u>Direct Hit</u> - Faculty. This course is designed to focus on the new, young and/or aspiring arm waver. It will also aid present directors but will concentrate on the basics of directing. All students will direct and be critiqued by the instructor and peers. Individual sessions will be video taped so you may see your own progress.

101 Fundamentals of Music - Al Fisk. This course is designed to teach the student how to identify various notes and their value. It teaches key signatures and how to identify the key in which the song is written. It touches on intervals and generally makes those dots on the paper user friendly.

102 It Ain't Magic - Bruce Evans. This class will be great for the barbershopper who wants to know more about the mysterious phenomenon called music. It will touch on melody, harmony, scales, pitch, meter, half-steps, whole steps, harmonics, and musical instruments, including your own; your voice. It will furnish a laymens view of all the dots, squiggles and flags we see on the paper.

103 Apprentice Coaching - Hanover. In this class you will be assigned to a quartet coach while he is working with his assigned quartet. Thus, you will observe, but not be involved in coaching. Following the session, the coach will advise the apprentice of the weakest part of the groups performance and what he did to help them improve. You may be assigned to alternate coaches for p.m. sessions.

104 Quartet Workshop - Faculty. This class is for quartets only; who want to improve their performance package. Each coach will work on your problem areas first, moving toward your strengths as the session progresses. Please advise the coach of your concerns at the beginning of the session.

105 Chorus Workshop - Faculty. This class is for chapter choruses only. You must have a majority of you chorus in attendance and supply risers. You will be coached in all areas of your performance. Be prepared to do a strenuous days work. See reduced price schedule for choruses. Your chorus will be expected to perform on the Afterglow.

106 Joe Barbershop Chorus - Faculty. Each man registering for this class will be given music and learning tapes for two songs the chorus will rehearse, be coached on and perform on the Saturday night show. A great class for everyone. Indicate your voice part when registering.

107 Barber Polecat Pick-Up Quartet - Faculty. An extension of the quartet experience class of the past. This is your opportunity to sing and be coached in a quartet. Indicate your voice part when registering and have all of the words and music of the polecat songs learned.

200 Tag Singing - Al Fisk. Al has a compilation of about 180 tags from which to choose. The class is designed for full enjoyment in a very relaxed atmosphere for instant gratification.

201 Gang Singing - Al Fisk. You will relax and enjoy winging with members of other district chapters. This is a fun class.

202 Section Leader Workshops - Faculty. Learn the basics of teaching parts to chorus members to help you be a more effective section leader.

203 How's and Why's of Warm-Up - Faculty. This class will help you get your whole body ready to sing. It will include posture, the "warm air" concept, and breath management.

204 <u>Develop Sight Singing Skills</u> - Jim Stephens. This class will explain what all the black dots and all the rest of the marks on the sheet music mean. You will learn basic skills to help you learn music faster and will receive hand outs to refer to back home.

205 Marketing for Members and Money - T.B.A. This class will provide some sure-fire ways to recruit new members and to market your chapter in your area. You will receive step-by-step instructions on how to be successful in executing tried and proven methods.

206 The Art of Woodshedding - Here is your chance to learn how to woodshed of become more proficient in the art. Every man will have an opportunity to sing in a VLQ and/or a quartet.

207 Judges, What do they really want? - Evans, Mills, O'Donnell. Have a heart to heart discussion with certified judges from the singing, music, and presentation categories. Find out how to recognize the "do's" and "dont's" of your performance. You will have an opportunity to use your new found knowledge. A great class for chorus directors and assistants, quarteters, and anyone else who performs.



TOP GUN '97

Free Trade Agreement and Cascade Connection to headline 1997 Harmony Round-Up

Two quartets will be featured at the 1997 Harmony Round-Up being held on May 16-18 at Michigan State University in East Lansing, Michigan.

Free Trade Agreement gets their name from the international accords reached in 1994 between the North American countries. (they didn't think NAFTA was very catchy!) It reflects the composition of the quartet, with two parts living in Pennsylvania, one in Maryland, and one in Ontario, Canada.

Lead singer Jay Butterfield, who is the head of the music department at Lampeter-Strasburg High School, has been barbershopping since age 10, winning a gold chorus medal at age 15 with the Dallas Vocal Majority. He also directs the Red Rose Chorus in Lancaster, PA.

Baritone Ron Knickerbooker had been a barbershopper for more then 29 years. He has been in a number of quartets to date finishing in the Top 20, Top 1 0, and Top 5 at International. His crowning quartet achievement came as the baritone of the 1974 International Quartet Champion Regents. Ron directs the Chordbusters Chorus of Chester County, PA.

Tenor Rick Taylor is a displaced baritone who has won a gold chorus medal with the Alexandria Harmonizers and has served as baritone section leader. He has also been an International Top 20 quartet competitor numerous times. Rick has been barbershopping for 27 years.

Bikes Al Baker (the Ontario contingent) has been barbershopping since 1960, has made multiple appearances in the Top 20 International Quartet contests, as well as having been a certified judge and Category Specialist in the former Arrangement Category.

All four are very active as coaches and instructors across the Society, and have served as faculty at many district and Internationally sponsored schools. As a matter of fact, singing together informally at these schools is what led them to organize officially as a quartet.

In their first contest, they won the right to represent the Mid-Atlantic District at the 1996 International Contest in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Back by popular demand, is the Evergreen District's, Cascade Connection.

Tenor Jim DeBusman, and baritone Mel Knight

are known to most of us because of their work on the Society's music staff (Mel is now retired) and because of their exceptional, and extensive quartet and chorus coaching they have done in the district.

Lead Reid Stewart and bass Jerry Harrison are known here because of the excellent coaching that they performed at the 1994 Harmony Round-Up. Both men are highly sought after coaches and when paired up with Mel and Jim, they make a great quartet. The quartet was their districts 1982 Champion Quartet.

Two of the men in the quartet are judges and the quartet recently toured Australia and New Zealand and headed the first "Harmony College" in the Southern Hemisphere!

Our goal is over 300 Pioneer barbershoppers in attendance for the 1997 Pioneer District Harmony Round-Up.

We are still negotiating with outstanding people to complete the faculty for the event, but we wanted to get this information to you now, so you may make your plans to be there.

The complete faculty roster for the Round-Up will be published in the February/Marchissue of the *Troubadour*.

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
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
