GR, Detroit Sound Co. winners at convention

Another successful Pioneer District Convention is now history with the Grand Rapids Great Lakes Chorus and The Detroit Sound Co. quartet coming away with top vocal honors.

Held again in Lansing, the Convention was hosted by the Battle Creek Chapter. In one of the closest chorus contests ever, the 56-voice Great Lakes Chorus edged Lansing's Capital City Chordsmen by four points to earn the right to represent the Pioneer District at the 1998 International Convention in Atlanta. Ann Jarchow directed the Grand Rapids contingent in performances of "You Keep Coming Back Like A Song," and "Rose Colored Glasses."

The 71-voice Capital City Chordsmen, directed by Jamie Carey, sang "Roll On Mississippi" and "Heart of a Clown." Finishing in third place was the Macomb County Harmony Heritage Chorus. Directed by Jack Slamka, the 41-member chorus sang "Opening Night on Broadway" and "Broken Heart For Every Light." They were named the District's Most Improved Chorus.

In quartet competition, the Detroit Sound Co., comprised of Rudi Krampf, Kelly Brummett, Jim Ryan and Al Fisk, was named 1997 District Champions. The quartet represented the Rochester, Huron Valley and Frank Thorne chapters.

Finishing second from the Grosse Pointe, Macomb County and Motor City

Chapters was the Resolution quartet of Tony Ales, Tom Conner, Steve Pauling and Pete Burns. In third place was the Lansing Chapter quartet Gallery, with Art Cardy, Dave Hundt, Larry Parker and Larry Wise.

Capturing the District Senior Quartet championship was the Grand Rapids quartet Flipside, with Al Walters, Terry Huyge, Gary Branch and Jack Sidor. They will represent the District in the Society's Senior International competition.

Meanwhile, the 1997 District Novice Champion was Never Be Four out of the Grand Rapids Chapter. Quartet members are Dave Szutkowski, Phil Johnson, Jack Sidor and John Baker.

Masters of ceremony for convention events were Battle Creek Chapter's Dave Eddy (Quartet Preliminaries), Society Board member Gene Court (Chorus Contest), and Windsor Chapter's Doran McTaggart (Quartet Finals).

A new feature to the Convention this year was Friday evening's 1997 Association of Pioneer District Quartet Champions Show. The show featured performances by the Quartet Champion Association Chorus; Onyx, 4 Fits, Power Play and Firepower. Master of ceremonies was Lee Hanson.

Plan to help celebrate Society's 60th Anniversary



Let's have a party! Sure as ringing a good a g everyone's in favor of that. And while we're at it, let's make it worldwide and include every

chapter. What a blast!

Well here's our opportunity, because next year - 1998 - our Society is celebrating its 60th Anniversary.

What a great vehicle to showcase our original American art form and to generate a whole lot of free promotion and publicity throughout the community.

Here's the plan our Society is suggesting and personally, I think it's a good one: Each chapter can offer their own community a gift as a part of the International 60th Anniversary. The plan is to offer free entertainment to couples having a 60th Wedding Anniversary in 1998 as a way for Barbershop chapters such as ours to get local media attention. Here's how you could work it, using your own variations:

Generally, local media likes to run "free" offers, and likes to do human interest stories. Each chapter would seek a media sponsor to make a public offer and have the media sponsor manage the drawing to choose the winners.

The number of entertainment offers a chapter could offer is up to the individual chapter (1 or 2 or 3, etc). Chances are, the more you offer, the easier it will be to find a media sponsor.

The offer is for the chapter to come in uniforms and serenade the winning couple at a mutually selected time. Your chapter does not provide the place nor food, but does give a free entertainment experience. The couple can invite as many friends as they wish to the celebration to hear the singing.

At the event, the chapter should include some love songs....and could include enough other songs to make it a "show" if it's appropriate. Your chapter's basic cost would be flowers, a card and perhaps an old magazine. Here are some suggested guidelines:

- * Enough flowers could be brought so that each singer can step forward and present some of the flowers.
- * Comments from the chapter could include reading some of the events from 60 years ago....sort of a "down memory lane."
- * If there is an "old book" store, or a "used book" store in town that has old magazines, you could provide a memorable highlight by purchasing a 60-yearold magazine with a date close to the couple's wedding date, and present that magazine as a souvenir.
- * A Congratulations Card should be presented, signed by all of the singers, as well as listing the Chapter's name and contact phone number. Guests could also be invited to sign the card.

Here's another idea to help promote our 60th Anniversary: Have a special ticket offer for your chapter's annual show. Again using the media, make the announcement that anyone having a 60th birthday in 1998 will get two tickets for the price of one, and anyone having a birthday during the week of the show will get two free tickets.

Even if you disagree with the judges, they still probably will have something to say that will get you thinking.

District winners will be announced at the spring convention. If you win either contest, you can be entered in international competition.

Bulletin editors

Jan. 15 is the deadline for the Bulletin Editor of the Year contest. Entries will be judged on layout and reproduction, content, and grammar and style.

Eligible bulletins must be published at least eight times in the year. Submit three copies each of three consecutive issues published during 1994. One copy of each must be an off-the-press issue; the others may be copies.

You don't need to be the very best to win. The top two entries in the district will be recognized, and both can be entered in the international con-

Public relations

If you're a PR officer, write a summary of what you did, the results and why you're proud of it. No minimum or maximum length; whatever it takes to help decide you're worthy of recognition. Enclose any backup material you might have, like information used in planning the activity, outlines, reports, internal communications, letters, news releases, clips, tapes, posters, programs, brochures, handouts or ads. That's your entry in Pioneer District's Public Relations Officer of the Year contest.

If you're not a PR officer, you can nominate your chapter's PR officer. But you also need to provide supporting material with your nomination letter. The cover letter also should include information on chapter size and resources and on area media to the extent this affected your work and results. Also include your name, address, e-mail address, phone number, chapter and title, and a brief summary of your barbershop and PR experience that can be used for publicity.

Deadline is March 1. But mail it as soon as possible, so you don't forget. The winner can be entered in the international PROTY contest, which requires entrants to be PROBE members. Also mail your entry for this to Jim Styer, at the address above. Call if you have any questions.

Holland

Among the dancers in the front row of the Holland Windmill Chorus is one man who memorizes all the moves, and doesn't sneak a look at the man next to him to see what the next step is.

Memorization has served him well, for in the recent contest in Lansing, Bob Eastman danced and kicked his wooden shoes better than some of the Holland dancers who could see what they were doing.

Eastman, 55, has been blind for more than half his life, but he hasn't let that get in the way of his enjoyment of music, particularly barbershop music. In fact, he learned the dance steps to "Wooden Shoe Strut" in the last three weeks before the contest. He was coached by fellow dancers Jack Oonk and Bill McAndrew.

The "Wooden Show Strut" involves striding back and forth on stage, doing a few steps of the Charleston, and kicking like a Rockette in the finale.

"I just figured I had to do it right or I didn't want to be there," he said.

One of the skills which helped him do it right is sharp hearing. On the contest stage he could hear the steps of the klompen-clad dancers on each side, and this helped him stay in line.

"It was a challenge. It was fun. It came off halfway decently," he said.

Bob has been a barbershopper since 1991, when he joined at the urging of members Kip Tillitt and Mike Oonk. Bob sees himself as "a vaudevillian who was born too late."

He likes quartet singing, and helped deliver Singing Valentines last February; he sings and plays the guitar, specializing in classical style pop music, and he plays the lute, doing hymns and Renaissance music at churches in the Holland area.

Bob is a Holland native who joined the Air Force after high school and was a jet mechanic. After he got out of the service, he had a hobby of making his own fireworks. He was working with a rocket one day in 1963 when it went off and the explosion blinded him.

After a rehabilitation school in Indianapolis he returned to Holland where he worked in the drapery business and finished a year of study at Hope College. Later, he studied classical guitar at Eastern Michigan University and sang in the EMU chorus.

About this time, he met Perry Bullard, a state senator who was sort of an anti-establishment activist from Ann Arbor. With Bullard's encouragement, Bob and other students from EMU, Wayne State University and the University of Michigan, along with a couple of professors, started writing the Michigan Civil Rights Code for the Disabled. It was adopted by the legislature in 1974, he said.

"Congress liked it so much, they pattered the Americans With Disabilities Act after it," he said.

Returning to Holland, Bob found it hard to get a full-time job. He sang at weddings. Taking a Community Education voice class in the mid-1980s gave him more confidence. He found work as a volunteer, teaching a guitar class for five years to prisoners at the Michigan Dunes Correctional Facility near Holland, until the prison closed.

He lives in his own apartment and often bakes chocolate chip cookies to take to meetings of the Holland chapter. During practices, his memory of notes helps keep the bass section in tune.

As for performing with the dancers of the Holland Windmill Chorus, "I'd do it again," he said.

> Friday Night. We sing through the set twice and run to the school. Some





new this year and is a work in progress with many more upgrades still needed. All of the other manuals will be rewritten and introduced at COTS-PLUS next year.



He can help you to interpret the Unified Chapter Mission Statement (UCMS) and assist you in creating your chapter's Unique Mission Statement. Time is provided to show how you can design your chapter board to meet your specific needs not only for 1998 but for 1999 and beyond.

No longer will chapters be told what officers a chapter must have and how to use them. There will be a minimum number of officers required for all chapters (four or five) and the rest that you choose will support your mission statement and your uniqueness.

Throughout 1998, the Society needs your input on the following five topics:

- The Manuals. Make changes that are needed to be consistent with the addendum and the new Society structure.
- 2. COTS Training. How can COTS-PLUS training be improved to help your future chapter leaders meet your goals and aspirations?





- Your Chapter Mission. Send us a copy of your mission statement and any comments you have about its formation.
- 4. Your chapter Board of Directors.
 How did you design your Board and why?
- 5. Your Chapter Coach. Tell us about your relationship with your chapter coach. By the end of 1998, every chapter will have been assigned a chapter coach.

Send your responses to any or all of these questions to me, your DVP-CSLT anytime through 1998. The input for the manuals is needed soon, for the rewrite will be accomplished before next July.
