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# Chapters use Singing Valentines as source of income, unique Public Relations tool

Chocolates or roses, they eternal question for many a lover. For many years, though, SPEBSQSA has been offering another option to would-be Romeos: Singing Valentines.

This year, as in the past, district chapters got into the business of delivering song on and around Valentine's Day.

One of the traps for choruses entering trying to sell the musical greetings is the orchestration of the event. For many, organizing who goes where, and when is an awesome task.

The effort seems to pay off, though. In this month's column, Pioneer District President Dave Cole suggests Singing Valentines as a recruitment tool. Marketing and Public Relations VP Doug Pearson calls Singing Valentines "one of the district's biggest PR activities of the year."

Many chapters participate in the event, with prices ranging from 25 dollars and up. The Rochester chorus, in its third year delivering the musical Valentines, charged \$35 for two songs, a long-stem rose, a Valentine card and a photo with the quartet.

Pearson also makes sure to capture the

moment on film and, being the PR man that he is, doesn't just give the photo to the lucky Valentine.

"I'm bringing along a camera which I'll throw to a spectator and have them get a shot of the quartet and the honored individual, said Pearson. "Then, I will send copies of photo to the individual and to the *Troub* and *Harmonizer* for PR purposes."

Grand Rapids president Dan Casamatta is a Singing Valentine supporter. He's seen the success his chapter has had, and encourages others to get involved, as well.

"If there are men's chapters not yet on the Singing Valentines bandwagon, jump on," Casamatta encouraged in a posting to the PioNet. "It's a great experience and the customers love it."

When she sang bass with the Great Lakes Chorus Sweet Adelines, Maureen Wickstrom loved to deliver Singing Valentines. It was the look on the recipient's faces that kept her coming back."

When I was active I was always in a quartet which went out and sang them-two days in a row," said Wickstrom. "(It was) such fun to see the delight and surprise on the faces of the recipients! Rain or shine, snow, ice or sleet, we did it and it gave us a lot of satisfaction."

Singing Valentines have become so popular, that last year SPEB-SQSA made a move from its tollfree Singing Valentine hotline, to an online list of choruses and quartets offering the service across the country.

Anyone who punched up the Society's website (www.spebsqsa.org) in the months prior to February 14 was able to browse an increasingly complete list, organized by region. The list gives a contact name and number, pricing information, dates and times, and details regarding packages available.

Nine of Michigan's chapters were listed on SPEBSQSA's site this year. Time will tell if the web presence is paying off in sales.

Last year, more than 285 chapters and quartets made use of the Society Valentine's Day referral service, and that number should be much higher this year.

# Directors' Workshop kicks off

By now, you should be sick of reading my reports on Chorus Director Workshop Intensive. Well, gentlemen (and lest I forget, lady), the workshop is now a reality.

The very first CDWI will be held in the southern corner of our district. There are 12 chapters involved and I have sent in 10 directors' names in random order to the International office. Five will be chosen.

A special thanks to Rochester Hills Chapter for agreeing to host this event. I will explain what is involved because I plan to hold four of these workshops as a minimum.

The areas will be southeastern area. southwestern area, including Swan Valley and Saginaw Bay, and the area north of M-55.

It is obvious that these zones with 12.

11 and six chapters respectively will be unable to take advantage of the training if only five "arm wavers" are allowed to participate. Thus, I plan to develop additional training sessions for all those people who didn't have the opportunity to attend the initial session in their area. In other words, we may combine all of the lower Pioneer Chapters and recruit the fourth workshop from those who weren't selected, but were still interested.

I also plan to solicit brief communique from all workshop attendees and get their permission to publish their reactions in a future Troubadour. This may help to sway some of the skeptics (whoops, I was thinking of another district... sorry) to go for a spot in the fourth workshop, or fifth

## A response to Russ Seely's dilemma

In the Oct/Nov issue, Russ posed this question --- taking his historical experience into consideration, "Would I join the barbershop society today?" He begs the question and doesn't answer it. I know exactly how he feels and from where he is coming.

I am also a product of barbershopping in the 50's. I think the major difference between Russ and I is as follows: The evolution from a strictly funfilled monthly experience to one of weekly all work and sweat has been slow and continuous for Russ, probably resulting in an easier adjustment. Not so for me. In the early 70's I took a long hiatus from our hobby due to work and schedule commitments. I decided to rejoin three years ago. It took a few weeks, but the shock to my system was intense. We had choruses in the 70's, but quartetting was still king. It isn't anymore. I too sit through these weekly meetings working our tails off to perfect a show "Theme" package or polish competition material. Most everybody heads for the door at rehearsal's end. In nearly three years at Rochester, I think I've heard their #1 quartet perhaps four times, and two of those times were on the annual show, as a step out quartet only, singing a song dictated to them by the show committee, the same being true of other chapter quartets. I guess to some, today's method is somehow better, but I long for the old "Parade of Quartets" where local quartets could strut their stuff in their own outfits before their family and friends in front of the big lights along with the big boys. Now, you have to be some kind of a winner to even get on your own afterglow.

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# GOAL OF 2000 by 2000 IMPOSSIBLE!

Our President, Dave Cole, has set us a goal of attaining 2000 members in the Pioneer District by the end of the year 2000. THAT GOAL IS IMPOS-SIBLE! Impossible, if we continue to do what we have been doing in the past. We have been growing slightly or staying the same in membership, each year. We have to do something different than we have been doing or we will not make it. I don't know one chapter that doesn't want to grow. So how do we grow? Well, we grow by having a product that people want and that's good singing. People want to be associated with something that is good. I think most of you will agree that by and large we have something that is good, but we should strive to make it even better. So how else do we grow? Usually we grow when we have membership drives. Wow! Quite a revelation. Some chapters have one, maybe two guest nights a year. You'll notice I said guest nights, not membership drives. There is a difference. Guest Nights are where just before we sing Keep The Whole World Singing, someone shouts "Hey! next week is Guest Night, so bring a Guest." Well, what if we had 4 (that's four) planned membership drives a year? I'm proposing that each chapter have four membership drives per year. Also, we don't coordinate our drives and leverage our clout in our district. If we all had a membership drive during the same period of time, we could create a media blitz all across the Pioneer District. That could benefit us all. For this reason, I'm proposing that we select May as our Membership Blitz Month. Each chapter should start planning it in their schedule now. Obviously, we should be planning the other membership drives as well, but let's give this a try and make May the Membership Blitz Month. Each

Chapter should plan a major membership drive for that month. This should include some heavy PR and advertising along with plans for the members and the guests. Make up flyers to hand out at Singouts. Set up contests within your chapter. Let your membership know the plan well in advance so they will feel confident that the guests will be focused on and feel welcome.

The following is a program that your District Board has agreed to sponsor called:

### PIONEER MEMBERSHIP 2000

Purpose is to have each chapter grow 12% and to establish two new extension sites in 1998 as we grow to our goal of 2000 members by the year 2000.

### **Products:**

- 1. 182 additional members in 1998.
- 2. Two new extension sites in 1998.

### Process:

- Request each chapter to hold 4 membership drives during 1998, utilizing such vehicles as:
  - Singing Valentines.
  - 2 for 1 Program.
  - Free Singing Lessons, with District help where needed.
  - High School Yearbook search.
- 2. Establish May as the District-wide membership drive month.
- 3. Provide recognition for the percentage growth over 1997 year-end figures (Based on Third Quarter figures). Recognition would be at the Fall Contest with trophies to the top three chapters. First place chapter will win the services of the District Champion Quartet, free of talent fees, for their next show.
- 4. Each chapter will receive plans and material to run at least 4 membership drives.

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




## B-Natural finds new bass, a former member

# An all-quartet chapter would get back to basics of Society

I'm not sure I'm having fun! My mind keeps straying back to those early funfilled, carefree Friday nights at Pontiac and around the district, a time when you knew everybody because you spent more time at other chapters monthly than you did your own. And the quartets! Quartetting was the name of the game. That's why you were in this society. I don't think I can recall a chapter meeting where one or more quartets didn't drop in to try some new material on the membership. Quartets were always on the go visiting chapters or singing on shows and ladies nights. We even took mystery bus trips to chapters like Jackson, Bay City and Saginaw, etc. I think my one saving grace is that I'm still quartetting, singing lead in B-Natural. Without quartetting I could not feel completely whole. I would hope that I might be ringing a tag with three other B'shoppers when the Lord decides to call me home.


Anyway, enjoy what's there and please contact us to let us know what you think of the site and if you have any suggestions.
