Power Play

Slamkas 2003 International Quartet Champs

Seabiscuit and Power Play share similar stories: the contender with the most heart wins.

The ones who look the most "right" or perfect on paper don't beat the ones with the most heart. July 5 proved: true love prevails.

Seabiscuit, the famous race horse in this summer's film, was written off as being too little but beat the odds. Jack **Slamka**, with 32-years in the Society, remembers being the "old guy" in top quartet competitions where the second oldest was 38. A father-son quartet had never won the top medal and a family quartet hadn't won in half a century,

Our International champs were the first Pioneer quartet to win Barbershop's highest honor since the Gentlemen's **Agreement** won the gold in 1971.

Like the little engine that could, the Slamka family began its quest for the gold back in the 1980s, slowly moving up and vowing not to stop trying until



they made it. They rose to fifth place in 2000 and 2001, moved to third in 2002 and finally won the biggest prize in July

A "power play" is a hockey term, denoting impact, requiring teamwork and resulting in an advantage. In Barbershop, it denotes "singing from the heart," family and now: a gold medal.

In winning the gold, Power Play tallied 8,088 points, its highest score ever, its highest percentage of perfection ever (90%) and 340 points above its score last year. Placing 2nd, 27 points behind Power Play, was Gotcha! from the Far West District.

Power Play was the most consistent among the top quartets throughout the competition, ranking among the top two in all of the three rounds

The improbable dream: 1st director recalls how father-son gold winners joined SPEBSQSA **By Russ Seely**

So this kind-of tough lookin' guy, complete with a pack of smokes rolled up in the sleeve of his T-shirt, tattoos and DA haircut, swaggers over and asks: "whadd' ya call this kind of music?"

"Barbershop," I said, and so began a long journey necessary to fulfill a dream.

The "tough guy" in this dream was, of course, **Jack Slamka**. He had recently discharged from the Navy and was urged by his young, very attractive, Irish wife, Kitty, to find out what the marguee on the Macomb Mall proclaiming, "Auditions for Admissions" was all about. (Throughout this journey, Kitty has become the Chief Prodder for the quartet). This took place over 30 years ago. As Grosse Pointe's Music Director, I explained to Jack that Barbershop singing was accapella, that is; no musical accompaniment.

Jack told me that his dad and uncle sang with the GM Glee Club, which used a piano in performances and he was considering trying out with them since he enjoyed singing almost as much as he did baseball (he's good at

Of all our prospects that evening, we must admit that we thought Jack would be the least likely to make a return visit to our next regular meeting. But visit us he did. He started in the Lead section and handled it quite Please see How it began, page 17.

For five of its six songs, Power Play's highest judging-category score was in presentation, compared with its music and singing category scores. (On the sixth song, the music scores tied the presentation scores.) Overall, the differences between the music and singing scores were quite small.

The repertoire was vintage Power Play: "Sunshine of Your Smile" and "Taking a Chance on Love" in the quarterfinals; "Time After Time" and "Side by Side" in the quarter finals; and "When There's Love at Home" and "The Best Times I Ever Had" in the finals.

The Slamkas' climb to the gold began with Family Forum in fall 1985, placing 5th in District competition. Members were brothers Jack and Mike and their sons, Mike and Don, respectively.

The family continued to compete, placing 2nd in 1988 as Power Play and becoming District champs in 1989. The quartet then included Jack's son Mark and Jason Ovler; they had replaced Jack's brother Mike and the latter's son Don.

Since then, the quartet has scored first in the District's international prelims every spring it has competed. With Oyler on tenor, the foursome came in 39th in international competition in 1990, and 24th the following year.

Don returned to replace Oyler in 1992 as the quartet placed 17th then 14th in 1993-94. After not competing in 1995-96, Power Play first climbed into the international Top 10 in 1997, placing 9th.

All told, Power Play has placed twice in the international quarterfinals, four times in the semifinals (11-20) and six times in the international finals (top 10). The quartet medaled in the last four outings: 5th, 5th, 3rd and now 1st.

Power Play was the first District quartet to reach the Society finals since The Ritz in 1987, with Clay Shumard of Grand Rapids on baritone. With a change in personnel, The Ritz went on to claim th international title in 1991 as a Johnny Appleseed District quartet.

Power Play is the first family quartet to win the gold since the Schmidt Brothers in 1951.

The only other father-son combination to win gold medals were Harlan Wilson (Suntones, 1961) and Todd Wilson (Acoustix, 1990). "Team Slamka" is the only quartet to have done it with dad and son in the same quartet.

Showing how long the journey was, Mike noted that Power Play was the only quartet in this year's finals that had also competed against the legendary Acoustix back in 1990.

Singing, living each day with heart: all or nothing at all...

It was October 1997, one of the best months of my life. A few special people reminded me of something I never again forgot: how to live and love every day with all your heart. You take nothing for granted, focus totally on what you're doing with all your heart, all or nothing at all.

I attended my first **Pioneer** Convention that month and was singing "Wild Irish Rose" in a quartet with the great Marv Burke. He told me to stop, asked if I had even the a clue what that song was about. He told me exactly what it truly means and it startled me.

> Ever since that day, I've constantly realized most of us sing songs without 'getting' the message, without really considering or knowing the meaning of the words. As if we were singing a Latin Mass without the translation. Most of us constantly say things without thinking of the real meaning of what we are saying.

> But the best singers, like the people who love with the most loving hearts, do sing and live with heart. At that convention, I first heard the Slamkas, who have made it their motto to sing with heart or don't bother. That

attitude won them our Society's highest honor and this issue is dedicated to that special family.

During that same month, I first saw someone else who also sang and lived his whole life with that same attitude. Someone asked "who's the guy with the earring?" Kelly Brummett always stood out in a crowd.

He was the lead in **The Detroit Sound Company**, which won the District championship that year. Kelly loved to sing and couldn't get enough of it. You saw Kelly and his quartet everywhere, heard them on the radio. They were true champs in every sense. My son had just become one of Pioneer's youngest Barbershoppers at age 10. At our first Uncle Sam Night, Kelly called him down at the end of the evening and asked him to sing

with the quartet for the show finale before the entire watching crowd of Barbershoppers. Eddie, too young to be scared or think of what just happened, ran right up and sang

with the champs. He never forgot that. I never forgot that and so I always paid attention whenever I heard about Kelly and The Detroit Sound Company, chuckled when a Pionet debate ensued over whether one man should be singing multiple parts in multiple quartets!

Well, we all knew who they were talking about. We all know that many of today's Barbershoppers have begun to shy Kelly (second from left) with the away from quartet singing preferring the safety in numbers of big choruses where one man doesn't have to carry the entire load.

Kelly carried more than his share of any load, singing in more quartets than most can remember including The Detroit Sound Company, Smorgaschord, LYRIC, Chordiology and





senior quartet qualifiers New Wrinkle (didn't he look too young to be in a senior quartet?). He wound up singing lead, baritone and tenor in those groups and he also sang in the gospel group, Cherry Hill Brothers and served as assistant director of Huron Valley, which won its first championship this past spring.

When the news of Kelly's death arrived recently, we were stunned. He seemed so young and to go so fast. But in the spirit of that youth, his friends gathered at an Ann Arbor bowling alley where we all sang karaoke in his memory. Four of those Barbershoppers shut off the music at one point, told the crowd a little about Barbershop and sang "Wild Irish Rose." I'm told that two karaoke guys who'd never heard Barbershop before came down to Huron Valley after that to learn more..

Can't think of a better tribute to Kelly than for Barbershoppers to start going to the karaoke bars and letting that large number of singers know what we have in our society... What a great place to find new guys.

The Slamkas had been competing on the International stage longer than all the other contenders, coming year after year, learning more each year, improving each year until they finally were declared this year to be the best Barbershop Quartet in the world.

The ones who give it their all, love with all their hearts, always are the best. At everything. More than you know.

Metropolis 3rd: Possible future champs also have Pioneer

Metropolis, from the Far West District, may be the next Society championship quartet with Pioneer District links.

With two former Pioneer champion quartetters in its ranks, Metropolis has medaled for the second time in international competition, placing 3rd this year in Montreal.

The quartet came out strong, placing first in the quarterfinals. It ranked 2nd in the semifinals and 3rd in the finals.

Metropolis lead **Bob Hartley** and bass **Brian Philbin** are former members of **Ivy League**, which won the Pioneer championship in 1985.

The quartet was known for its comedy routines, appearing variously as superheroes, nudists, nerds, Cub Scouts and tourists. It competed internationally four times. Ivy League members have held reunions periodically.

Hartley and Philbin now are members of the **Santa Fe Springs Chapter,** home of 2002 international chorus champions, **Masters of Harmony.** Both have been chorus section leaders.

The first medal for Metropolis was a 5th-place bronze last year in Portland, Ore.

In previous international competitions, Metropolis ranked in the top 10 twice and the top 20 three times

The quartet has sung on the network TV show "Diagnosis, Murder" with **Dick VanDyke**, an honorary SPEBSQSA member and celebrity spokesman for the **Harmony** Foundation.

In 1998, a year after Metropolis began competing internationally, it was the first Barbershop quartet to win the **National A Cappella Harmony**

Sweepstakes.

So how does a large group (60-plus-people) like this work together? We worked as smaller groups of seven to eight and then reported back to the larger group.

Each group was made up of a mix of individuals from the groups represented. After getting to know one another, with a brief exercise, we reviewed the Strategic Planning Guidance and recorded comments based on our experience as Barbershoopers that began with, "we always" or "we

Next we individually wrote what we called "Valentines" to each of the groups represented in the meeting. These were comments on what we thought the various groups needed to do differently so that we can work better together to achieve our goals in the 2004-2005 Work Plan.

Each group then met and reviewed their "Valentines" and then decided what they were going to do differently, based on this feedback.

Since I was in the Society Board Group, I will only report on some of the actions the board will take and they are as follows:

The themes we heard in our Valentines:

- 1. Connection to the member and his value
- 2.Effective communication
- 3.Unified Vision
- 4.Don't micro-manage
- 5. Succession/nominating planning

6.Hold people accountable The things we will do to help achieve our goals:

- 1. We will again make home phone calls to one third of the Chapter Presidents.
- 2. We will phone 150 Joe Barbershoppers in 2003 and 150 more in 2004.
- 3. We will provide a structured opportunity for Society BOD members and Joe Barbershopper to interact at District Conventions 4. Continue to support Marketing Taskforce study.
- 5. The BOD will change procedures and focus on policy. 6. Focus on each District's five to seven goals.

The other groups will hopefully report on the actions they will take. In the mean time, who knows you will have more say in what is happening in your Society.

Holland bulletin 20th

PROBE, the association of Public Relations Officers and Bulletin Editors serving the members of the Society, made two important changes during the convention in Montreal.

The annual contest for bulletin editors was expanded to include online bulletins starting in 2004. Entries of online bulletins will be invited starting Jan. 1, 2004, and the winners will be announced in July at the convention in Louisville.

Expanding the contest to the new electronic form of communication is expected to help make the bulletin competition more international, by encouraging entries from other continents.

The members of PROBE also changed to six from eight the number of bulletins that must be published annually in order to be eligible for the International Bulletin Contest.

Results of PROBE's contests for bulletin editors and public relations officers for 2002 were announced.

The International Bulletin Contest winner was John Conrad, editor of the St. Louis Suburban By-Lines in the Central States District. Second place went to Rich Nelson, editor of the Harmony Gazette of Northbrook in the Illinois District. The sole entry from the Pioneer District, Art Lane's Windmill Blade from Holland, placed 20th.

Public Relations Officer of the Year awards went to Philip Maxfield, Northwest Louisiana Chapter, SWD, for a year-long effort, and to Lee Roth of the Hunterdon Harmonizers in New Jersey, MAD, for a single event.

And a personal note to Power Play:

It was great to sit in the Bell Centre in Montreal and listen to Power Play continue to sing from the heart, to sing fully but not over the top, to sing meaningful songs that engage the imagination of the listeners, and, finally, to win. Thanks for representing the Pioneer District so long and so well.

Jeff Woodruff, director of the Ypsilanti **Motor City Metro** Chapter, has known some hard times.

We were the powerhouse a few years ago, an international competitor under director Bob Whitledge, said Woodruff, telling familiar tale. But a lot of guys left when Bob moved on, and we haven't ever\ recovered. Once a large chorus: now, we're not even large enough to compete at our Pioneer District competition. I became director after losing about four or fives

directors and inherited about five singing members. Desperate times called for desperate measures. placed an ad in the Talent Wanted section of a local alternative newspaper inviting vocal musicians to audition for a vocal ensemble

Brandon Mattson answered the ad and has been hooked ever since. Brandon has managed to bring in four new members in the last two years, including friend-of-afriend Aaron Wolf.

All three are here this week, meaning 30 percent of the 10 active member sare taking a step up in their Barbershopping skills.

This fits the Chapter's philosophy:

Build the individual singer, build the chorus. Because we only have 10 singers, there can be no learners in our chorus, said Woodruff. Everyone sings in a quartet at least once each week, sometimes more to give everyone a chance. No one refuses; as guests come in they don't know any different. Our guests sing in quartets the first day they visit. We stop what we are doing to teach them a simple song or at least a tag and they are asked to sing before the night is over.

We are building a chorus of men who love to sing in quartets and chorus, said Woodruff. Isn't that what it's all about?

Notice of Nomination Procedures

The election of the District Officers listed above will take place at the **House of Delegates** Meeting at the Fall District Convention on Friday, October 17, 2003. The President and the Executive Vice President each will be elected to serve a two-year term. Election of persons to all other offices will be for a one-year term. The Executive Vice President will be a separate office and will not be filled by one of the other Vice Presidents serving in a dual capacity.

The District By-Laws in effect since January 1, 1997 require that all nominations of persons for District office be reviewed by and be acceptable to the appropriate Society Committee. This procedure must be followed for nominations anticipated to be made from the floor at the fall House of Delegates Meeting as well as for nominations by the District Nominating Committee. Persons nominated for District office must be active members of a District Chapter. Persons who belong only to the **Frank Thorne Chapter** are ineligible to run for a District office.

Therefore, nomination from the floor at the fall House of Delegates Meeting of any person to fill a District office must be preceded by submission of the potential nominee's written permission, résumé and credentials to the District Nominating Committee by June 20, 2003 for forwarding to the appropriate Society Committee for review and acceptance. Nomination from the floor of any person for any District office will be disallowed if this procedure has not been followed. Additionally, nomination from the floor of any individual whose name has been submitted to the appropriate Society Committee and who has been found not qualified will not be disallowed, but the nomination from the floor must be accompanied by the Society Committee's reasons for disapproval and its recommendations, if any, as to what steps can be taken to make the proposed candidate acceptable to the Society Committee.


Finally, let's feature Craig Pollard, in his own words, in this month's spotlight.

An interview with Pioneer's own Roger Lewis, President of our Society

Pioneer's own **Roger Lewis** was with **Power Play**. He shared his thoughts with **Jim Styer.**

Describe what you saw in Power Play as the winner was announced.

Power Play was huddled with (Society music specialist) **Jim DeBusman** (and someone else?) with their heads down, waiting for the announcement.

I'm sure there was controlled jubilation: There were still six quartets backstage, and you can't count on it till the announcement. Then the announcement, and everything exploded.

It takes a minute to get on stage, as everyone wanted to hug them or congratulate them on their way.

When (Society Executive Director) **Darryl Flinn** and I went on stage to give them the trophies, I hugged each one of them. I thought Jack (dad, the bass) was never going to let go. Mark (son, baritone) had promised me at the Sendoff Show that they were going to do it -- and he reminded me of that when I hugged him.

What was it like to be the first Society president to present gold medals to a quartet from his own District?

Turns out that I'm not. In 1986, **Gil Lefholz** handed trophies to Rural Route 4, and they were all members of the same Chapter. Still, it's pretty exclusive company.

What can you report about the reception of Power Play at the hospitality rooms and afterglows after they won?

The first stop is the AIC (Association of International Champions) reception. Darryl Flinn, myself and our wives are formally invited to this ceremony. They serve champagne, and have special etched glasses for the quartet (without the name of the

quartet on them, of course) and for the Society president, AIC president, etc. I now have two in my collection.

Each of us presents a toast to the new champion. In spite of the fact that I had two years to prepare for this one, I really didn't have anything ready. So I took the tack of the Barbershop family, the AIC family and now a new family.

Needless to say, it was family night! The entourage was all of the family, and maybe a few more close friends (Slamka wannabees). Again, it took a long time to get through the crowds to the stage. They asked me if I had any request for them to sing, and I said "Jericho." They sang three songs, and closed with Jericho. All three songs got a standing ovation, of course!

You have been close to Family Forum, and then Power Play, from the beginning. What changes did you see during the long trek to the gold, both on stage and off?

A rising confidence level. Wednesday afternoon, they came on stage like champions, they sang and performed like champions, and left no doubts in the minds and hearts of the audience.

What remained the same?

They're just always the same four guys. Caring, friendly, outgoing, lovable. I don't think that will ever change.

Do you have any observations about the off-stage Slamka family (wives, children, etc.)?

Has Kitty (wife and mother) stopped crying yet? The dream came true. Yet, I'd venture a guess that they still have a hard time believing it

Any idea how they hung in there for so many years?

I don't know either. Family helped, I'd bet. Why do you believe Power Play won?

They were the best. They sung from the heart, and that fostered comparison to those quartets who didn't. I've never seen them so comfortable or so confident on stage. All of that came across the footlights in every set.

Any thoughts as a judge?

The basis of my category, presentation, is singing from the heart. No one does it better, and they walked away with that part of the category. It was also great that they sang Barbershop songs. Nothing that was pushing the envelope. Just great music.

What have they done for Barbershopping besides singing on stage and in shows?

Over the years, they've done a lot of school and college programs, festivals, in-service programs, etc.. More, too, I'm sure, that I'm not aware of.

What does Power Play's win mean for the Society?

Family is important. "Singing from the heart" is important. Singing Barbershop songs is important. Sincerity is important. They will be an exemplary champion that will set some new standards.

What does it mean for the Pioneer District?

The celebration will be years-long, I predict. No District has ever loved their quartet champion the way Pioneer loves Power Play. Only the **Gas House Gang** and **Rural Route Four** may have come close.

Any other thoughts?

I'm not sure they believe it yet. It's like a dream. Most winning quartets tell me it takes a couple months of wearing that gold medal 24 hours a day before you wake up and say "Wow! I'm a champion!" The post-convention Barbershop cruise must have been an incredible experience for them.

Pioneer's past champs get new company

other Society medalists have high praise for Power Play, the District's latest goldmedal quartet.

They include members of international champion quartets Gentlemen's Agreement (1971) and the Auto Towners (1966), and two medalists, Center Stage and the Vagabonds.

The other champion from Pioneer was the Harmony Halls (1944) of Grand Rapids.

GENTLEMEN'S AGREEMENT

The District's previous champion was Gentlemen's Agreement. with **Drayton Justus** as lead. In 1980, Justus replaced Bob Franklin as lead in the Suntones from Florida, 1961 champ and one of the Society's best-known quartets. Now living in Atlanta, he recently retired from a career in college administration. He joined the Society board last year and was just elevated to executive vice president; so, he may be in line for Society presidency in 2006.

Other members of Gentlemen's Agreement were Al Rehkop as tenor. Glenn Van Tassell as bari and Bob Whitledge as bass. Rehkop and Whitledge now are with the Cleveland, Tenn., Chapter, in which 2002 quartet champ Four Voices is involved. Whitledge in the 1990s directed the Motor City Metro chorus, City Lights.

Asked for his comments by e-mail,

"Hooray for Power Play! Hooray for Pioneer! Hooray for Barbershop!

In my mind, there are at least three reasons why our new champions are very special and will hold a special place in the hearts and minds of Barbershoppers for years to come: (1) They are a family, and personify the family values so

CENTER STAGE

Center Stage competed internationally for Pioneer five times, in 1981-1985. Bass Lee

Hanson wrote:

"The Montreal contest was the first time in many years all four members of Center Stage could be together: Denny Gore from Sterling Heights, Wendell Pryor from Pennsylvania, Glenn Van Tassell from Florida and myself from Port Huron. dear to us all, (2) there is no question that their primary focus is solid Barbershop harmony, and (3) the message of their songs is paramount -- they sing with incomparable heart."

AUTO TOWNERS

The Auto Towners (1966) included two members who later were in Gentlemen's Agreement, tenor Rehkop and lead Van Tassell. Others were bari Clint Bostick and bass Carl Dahlke. Dahlke now directs Macomb's Harmony Heritage Chorus, which competed in Montreal.

Van Tassell, after winning two gold medals, continued competing with another Pioneer medalist quartet, Center Stage, was an interpretation judge for 15 years,

that the success of the entirely musical Power Play this year bodes well for attitudes among the up-and-coming. I have for a long time contended that the quartet singers who hope to climb the ranks of quartet competition learn much from the contest and judging system.

Best coaches: Slamkas 1st family of Barbershop

Power Play has worked with some of the best coaches in the Society, including Darryl Flinn, Cindy Hansen, Joe Connelly and Ev Nau.

Flinn, the Society's executive director, raised a toast to Power Play at the AIC (Association of International Champions) reception during the Society convention in Montreal.

He said his toast "was a reminder that in our governing documents it is stated that singing Barbershop harmony adds value to a man's family life. I toasted not only the quartet but (dad and mom) Jack and Kitty and Grandpa

Jack as well. The Slamkas are truly the first family of Barbershop."

Before he became executive director in 1996, Flinn said, "my real passion in our hobby was coaching or mentoring quartets and choruses. Much of that has occurred at Society schools."

He has been on the Harmony College coaching staff for 31 years and this year also is coaching quartets and choruses at three District

schools. He hopes to continue this when he retires in August.

When he came to Society headquarters in Kenosha, Wis., he said, "We decided to open the doors to any quartet who wanted to come here for coaching.

We see the mentoring of our quartets as a very important part of our musical mission. Many staff guys are first-class coaches and are often a part of coaching groups who come to town. Power Play has been here often as have Metropolis, Freestyle, Uptown Sound, Revival and literally dozens of quartets not part of our top 10."

Also, Flinn and other Kenosha staffers "often venture out to mentor choruses," he said. "I have done so with many medalist choruses over the long years and many District level competitors who simply want to be better at

Flinn, who has had a personal relationship with Power Play for years, said, "I did my very best coaching with Power Play this past year."

But then he added, "I recommended to them that they needed to be in a relationship with Cindy Hansen, presentation coach extraordinaire. Obviously it worked per plan.

The guys looked smashing and had the best visual plan ever. Cindy has the answer to melding the visuals with the music in a way that is both natural and still very exact. She is the best and does her best work with groups

Ritz and Acoustix: medalists Riptide, Freestyle, Metropolis and Uptown Sound; and the two latest Sweet Adeline quartet champions, A Cappella Gold and Swinglish Mix.

She has been a teacher at many schools and workshops, travels to other countries to help in education and development of the Barbershop style, and works with organizations outside the Barbershop world, including Disney World and Mainstreet Entertainment.

This powerhouse coach commented: "In these last few years of coaching Power Play, one recurring issue has been, front and

> center, helping them reach that goal of A Gold Medalist.

That is: What do they do better then anyone else? to do? And what music do they love to sing? This past year, we only focused on songs they loved to sing, because they sing them more often and
