PUNTA CANA, Dominican Republic -- This is what it's like to travel 800 miles south of Florida with a group of 24 Barbershoppers lead by **Grosse Pointe's Russ Seely**.

You leave on a sub-zero Michigan morning and by lunchtime find yourself in a tropical paradise in 85 degree weather, You head toward the ocean and find Russ and a crowd of Barbershoppers around three tables pushed together.

Food and beverages abound as the guys are singing song after song or learning a tag. Strangers from around the world come up and listen, ask questions, stories are shared and music breaks down language barriers, a few more walls, brings a few more smiles.

Grosse Pointe member Al Cole, the consummate chorus manager, is asked by a member of the resort staff whether he can make it to that night's show and before you know it, Al has arranged for the Barbershoppers to be featured ON the show.

### Medals for Antiques Roadshow

Seniors win bronze at Midwinter

Antiques Roadshow, featuring Denny Gore, Lee Hanson, Raleigh Bloch and Roger Lewis did the Pioneer District proud by earning 3<sup>rd</sup> Place medals in the 2004 Senior International Quartet Contest.

Twenty seven quartets, from as far way as Australia, competed for those elusive medals at the **Senior International Quartet Contest** in Biloxi, Mississippi on January 31.

They missed 2<sup>nd</sup> by 12 points. Denny has 4 International second place silver medals (**Vagabonds** and **Center Stage**) and Lee has three (**Center Stage**), and both have other bronze medals plus a number of District Championships.

Raleigh sang tenor in the District Champion **Upstage Sound**. Although Roger has sung in the Harmony Hounds for over 40 years, this is Roger's first championship quartet.

Bringing home a medal fulfilled a goal of the quartet, and a lifetime dream for Raleigh and Roger, winning their first medal in an International Contest.

A benefit of "medaling" is that the quartet name "Antiques Roadshow" is now permanently preserved. The name of a medalist quartet can never be used again by any quartet.



### **President Smith: Our changing Society**

The Barbershop Harmony Society is undergoing more changes than at time I can remember in my 29 years as a



member. These changes are being undertaken to move the society forward and meet the

challenges of tomorrow.

Since they will impact us all, I thought I'd review some that may have the greatest impact.

Let's start with the retirement of Executive Director Darryl Flinn. Darryl has been the Society's executive director for the past eight years. As we thank him for all that he has done, we can be sure that change will take place under the leadership of his replacement, Don Harris.

Don brings years of association management experience as well as marketing and public relations experience to the position. He arrives as a new Society Board structure takes effect and as our new Society President, Rob Hopkins, offers this challenge: Look through new eyes, to see where we really are as a Society and where we would like to be - who we are and who we would like to become.

Looking through new eyes has begun. A society-wide **Envisioning Task Force** has enrolled hundreds of Barbershoppers in facilitated

small group phone meetings.

Their task is to define the

Society's primary purpose for existence, its core values. and its vision for the future The result of those discussions will be presented to the Society Board in

In a similar vain, an outside organization is completing a major marketing

March.

study looking at why men sing, the image of our organization, and demographic information that will help us better market the Barbershop Harmony Society and focus its growth and development.

Other changes include:

- -- The sale of Harmony Hall and the Sheridan Road building in Kenosha. The Society Board put the search on hold while it sought to define the Society's Mission and Vision.
- -- Clarke Caldwell, our new Harmony Foundation president, has recently announced that the foundation will move its offices to Chicago and that two new staff members have been added to aid in obtaining grants and gifts.

At the District level, we are

preparing to introduce a new district organizational structure. Name this quartet: July 2, 1907 Novi

This change is in line with, and as a result of the Society's organization changes.

Those changes arose from Roger Lewis's appointment of a "Government Management Task Force" which was chaired by Al Bonney (See a Pioneer foot print on our society). After a careful examination of the then existing structure, recommendations were made to improve our ability to:

- Maintain, support, and seek alignment throughout the Society for our vision and mission.
- Address fundamental member values.
- Have both an external and a long-term focus forcing forward thinking.
- Create an effective

organization that focuses on outcomes

- Allow the Board to solve the major issues and others, the minor issues.
- Enable proactivity creating rather than approving. The Society has challenged the Districts to examine how they are structured. To look at ways to organize to more effectively perform their primary tasks:
- Governance and leadership
- Creating and managing programs and services for chapters and members.


Each District has unique differences and the Society has wisely given the districts latitude in creating a structure that best serves each situation.


The Pioneer board is currently examining what changes we

### Want to be a judge?

So maybe you want to be a judge? This form letter will give you some idea of the process involved. Please don't let the form letter format overshadow the pleasure I have in answering your inquiry. You are about to enter a wonderful part of the Barbershop world.



The philosophy for selecting new applicants is to look for people who have the personal experiences and current activities that already qualify them to be judges and then train them in using those skills in the judging program. This mandates that you are doing your own preparation, that you are aware of what judges do and that you only need some technicalities

and some polishing.

Obvious qualifications are people skills and experience in coaching both quartets and choruses. Specific categories have particular concerns--for instance, MUSIC judges are often also arrangers.

Dennis Gore's – Barbershop Quartet and personal history

The next person who has a say in all of this is the Category Specialist, who is given the responsibility of shepherding and guiding his category. Finally, there is the Society Contest and Judging Committee who recommends you to the Society President, the one who actually signs the

What is the process? Well, here goes . . . The first step is for you to request two (2) judges in the category in which you are interested to write you a letter of recommendation. They should send those letters to

### Pontiac-Waterford suffers yet another tragic loss with death of John Smith

John "Smitty" Smith died of cancer January 30. To lose Smitty so soon after losing Chris Miller is heart-wrenching.

John had been part of Barbershop since the late 1950s and his influence on the **Pontiac-Waterford Big Chief Chorus** and the **Pioneer District** can be felt everywhere, not the least in the 11 new members he brought in as Man of Note.

Smitty made untold contributions to our BBS Society from singing in many quartets, directing, coaching, starting new chapters, serving as Pioneer District Area Counselor, and singing in more than one chorus. He was active in the Florida chapters at Cape Coral, Naples, and Ft. Meyers during the winter months. And the Big Pine Key Barbershoppers just established an annual John Smith Harmony Explosion Scholarship.

At his funeral service, members of **The Big Chief Chorus** and other Metro chapters sang "Shine On Me/This Little Light of Mine Medley" and "Irish Parting Prayer."

His wife, Karen, and his two daughters were John's life. His passion was Barbershopping but fishing was a close second. (He fished all the way from James Bay to Key West.)

Friends of Smitty contributed their memories to the February Smoke Signals (which can be read online at http://www.pontiacchapter.com/feb2004.htm), and which are excerpted here:

John joined the chapter in 1958, after getting out of the Navy. Barbershopping was primarily a "Quartet" hobby at that time, and John quickly took to Quarteting. "I don't think I ever knew him when he wasn't in a quartet." His quartets included The Drop Chords, Sunnyside, and B-Natural.

He loved tags. He spent many an hour at conventions in hallways, lobbies, elevators, etc. singing tags till all hours of the night.

"One year the District,

knowing a good talent when they saw one, asked him to be an area counselor. His area included **Traverse City**, and chapters up that way. He has often said that was one of the highlights of his Barbershop life.

If there was a meeting in his area, he was there. **Len Barnes** accompanied him often. They put many miles on the old car. John was always willing to go anywhere and do anything to further the cause, and get in some singing."

Later, he became interested in the **AHSOW** program (Ancient Harmonious Society of Woodshedders) and rose to the rank of District Certifier.

"John was a purist when it came to Barbershopping, a quartet man through and through but always supportive of chorus activities. If things were wrong, he told you they were wrong but when it was right there was not a person around that could present a bigger smile when the chord rang perfectly. Not many people within the Barbershop Society

promoted our hobby any more than John."

At the December year-end meeting of the Chapter, two awardees were announced.

Pete Mazzara was named as "Barbershopper of the Year," and Bruce Collins received the Rawley Hallman Music Man Award, established last year in honor of its first awardee, Bill Pascher.

Barbershopper of the month for January was Jeff Doig. Jeff has done so much for the chapter that he was an obvious choice as soon as he left the Executive Committee.

Dick Johnson's team has blessed us with several fine guest conductors as we search for a new director.
