Rancilio wins for third year

For the third year in a row,
Robert J. Rancilio, editor of the
Grosse Pointe Chapter bulletin,
The Pitch-Pipe, has been named
Bulletin Editor of the Year in the
Pioneer District.

The award was announced April 29 at the **House of Delegates** meeting during the district convention. The honor is for bulletins published in 2004. Rancilio and the Pitch-Pipe also won for 2003 and 2002. He shares the honor with his wife, **Dot**, who is associate editor of the Pitch-Pipe.

The judges commended Rancilio for the bulletin's attention to current events of the chapter and the district and the use of historical items. The Pitch-Pipe does a good job of recognizing the work of members, discussing Society problems, and has a story each issue about an old song. The judges also liked the Pitch-Pipe's color pictures and use of color in the nameplate.

The second place bulletin was Holland's **Windmill Blade**, edited by **Art Lane**. The Blade was tops in the category of Grammar and Style. The judges liked the Blade's coverage of the International convention in Louisville.

Third place went to John Cowlishaw, editor of the Pontiac/Waterford Smoke Signals. He was commended on the readability of his 5 ½ by 8 ½ inch bulletin. The judges liked the bulletin's reports of chapter meetings, history items, craft items and a humorous piece about a fictional contest of the Society for the Promotion and Encouragement of Italian Cooking.

Pioneer families win

Family is the keyword in Pioneer District. Pioneer's quartet and college quartets are related as were two of the top directors in the Spring chorus contest.

Infinity will represent Pioneer International competition for the second year in a row but they'll have family along for the trip.

Half the members of **Insignia**, the winning

college quartet, are sons of members of Infinity. Infinity includes lead **Craig Pollard** and **Scott Kitzmiller** while their sons **Wayne Pollard** and **Kyle Kitzmiller** are in Insignia, which was coached by **Mike Slamka**, lead of Pioneer's most famous family quartet, 2003 international champs **Power Play**.

Meanwhile, Mike's dad **Jack Slamka** is again coaching Macomb, Pioneer's representative in the chorus contest as well as winner of the spring chorus contest, which had 49 men on stage, more than any other chapter. Meanwhile, Jack's nephew **Don Slamka**, directed the rapidly growing Hillsdale Chapter, which had the second largest group on stage and tied with **Grosse Pointe** for sixth place. **Please see FAMILY**, **page 12**.

They intended to sing a couple of songs and then head out for home. A half hour later they were bowing to a standing ovation and trying to work their way out the door.






Carol Cook new director of Huron Valley

The Holland Chapter was honored recently by a generous gift from the estate of **Burton** and **Bea Eleder**, longtime fans of the chapter and of barbershop singing.



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Ups and downs

What a thrill to attend Mount Pleasants' **Mountain Town Singers** first show. On stage were Barbershoppers, new and old, relaying the energy of performing, and having a great time in front of an appreciative audience.



Driving home, still wrapped in the excitement of the show and the birth of a new chapter in Pioneer, my thoughts turned to my first chapter. Thirty years ago I joined the society as a charter member of the Mansfield, Ohio chapter, the **Fun Center Chordsmen**.

I thought of Mansfield and the five other chapters I've been a part of, and particularly of the **Lansing** chapter which is celebrating its 65th birthday. Of those six chapters, one no longer exists and another, with several gold medals to its credit, is currently much smaller and less vital than in its gold medal years.

Several others, including Lansing, are strong and growing, but all have experienced ups and downs. I began to wonder: Do all chapters cycle through the same ups and downs? What causes ups and downs? What keeps some chapters alive while others disappear?

Has my Barbershop experience given me any useful insight which can help others? I think I do have some insights, and hope they help chapters either put off or survive the down periods.

Do all chapters have ups and downs? I think all chapters go through a cycle of vibrant years, starting with their formation and chartering, and face down periods when membership and enthusiasm diminishes. For some, the time between cycles is long. The longer the down period the harder it is to overcome.

What causes down periods? The primary causes seem to be:

- 1. The director steps down and there is no qualified replacement.
- 2. The musical program becomes stagnant and repetitive.
- 3. There is no attempt to improve and grow musically.
- 4. Members haven't agreed upon the purpose and goals of the chapter and the plans to reach them.

How can the downs be survived?

Have as strong a musical team as you can create. Try to have assistant directors in place that can fill the director's role. Have a plan in place to keep the fun and singing going using every means possible.

That might include utilizing section leaders or quartets or an everyday Joe Barbershopper who has enough skill to lead singing.

Carry on with a varied program which might include quarteting, singing Pole Cats, a night of tags. Visit another chapter and have them visit you. We all joined to sing so keep singing alive. Commit to keeping the chapter alive.

survival depends on commitment of every member. Skipping meetings or coming late and leaving early is contagious.

Throughout the life of the chapter, constantly check to make sure that the purpose of the chapter and desires of the members aligned. That means that they must be discussed, agreed upon, and understood. Chapters lose fewer directors and members when all agree on direction and activities, and when everyone knows that their input will be heard and respected.

I hope my comments are helpful and will help your chapter survive to sing another show





Membership is everyone's responsibility

Every Chapter President has received a copy of the 20-page **2005 Marketing and Membership Recruitment Plan.**

This could very well be the instrument for the survival of our Barbershop Harmony Society. The target groups are: (1) men

35-54 with some background in singing or performing and (2) college aged men who sing.

Each chapter can participate in the plan by supporting it financially to the tune of \$2 per man. What a bargain! Many monetary and non-monetary incentives have been offered for individuals and chapters.

Individual cash awards from \$100 to \$5,000 and chapter cash awards from \$500 to \$10,000 will be awarded.

Individual non-monetary awards include a variety of things including VIP front row seats, hotel accommodations and round-trip airfare to the 2006 International Convention.

Other chapter incentives are music arrangements by an arranger of note and a weekend coaching retreat.

The eligibility period will be from August 1 through October 31.

The week of September 12-16 will feature our Society-wide "U Can Sing 2" Night at every chapter meeting.

Your Chapter Counselor is able and ready to assist your chapter in this campaign. You can expect a visit or telephone survey from your CC to evaluate what you need to be adequately prepared..

The Society, District and Chapters each have their area of responsibilities to make this undertaking a success. A month by month check list will outline the details that will assess our preparedness.

The **Troubadour** and the **Harmonizer** will continue to publish articles about "U Can Sing 2". As new media releases and Society downloads become available, your Chapter Counselor and I will continue to make you aware of these materials.

I am confident that Pioneer will jump into this Membership Recruitment Plan with both feet and we will be instrumental in doing our part to increase the membership of our Society to 31,500 by December 31, 2005.

After hitting the stage in your hunt for "Gold", you will continue your expedition while being coached by Power Play.


Saturday night tops it all off with Power Play and the newly crowned 2005 winners, plus runners up, putting it all together it a Super Show.

The bonds of Barbershop

On April 4, 2005 the Barbershop Harmony Society, Pioneer District and the Grand Rapids Chapter said goodbye to another great supporter and strong pillar of our hobby.

James C. Horton passed away to the GREAT CHORUS above after a long battle of neuropathy and MS. Jim was 74 years old (a Valentine Baby), seven years older than myself. Due to the age difference we did not have the opportunity to be close as brothers until Barbershop came into our family.

Jim became a member of the Society around 1948 in the former Owosso, Mich. chapter while he was in high school. He sang in a high school quartet and also sang solo for many weddings. I had the good fortune to sing in a college quartet. After graduation, Jim encouraged me to become a member of the Society. My other brother, Larry and I were able to charter another chapter in Owosso in 1967. After two years of struggling, the chapter closed and Larry and I joined the Lansing, Mich. chapter.

Through our membership in the Society, Jim, Larry and myself became much closer as brothers due to the bonding Barbershopping.

Each of us have sung in quartets and attended many campouts. The most fun camping times we had were at

Horsehead Lake where Jim and Larry camped every weekend.

Jim organized a mini
Harrisville campout that
ran for about 10 to 12
years with Grand Rapids,
Lansing, Holland and
Muskegon chapters all
having members attend.
We had potluck suppers for
50 to 100 family members;
mini shows on Saturday
night around the campfire
and invited the whole
campground.

The mass chorus would sing and quartets would visit other campground sites and entertain. We shared "great times" as brothers, family and have lasting memories through

barbershopping.

Jim became very famous for his "camping shirt" (which was really topless), which he always wore while camping.

Jim, Jackie, Sandy and myself have shared many great times together at District and International conventions singing, dining and just hanging out.

Jim was such a hard worker in the Grand Rapids chapter having been President on more than one occasion, served on the Board for many years, sang in the **Rafter Ringers** quartet, which is a past BUSH LEAGUE champion and the **Model A Flats.**

Jim sang bass and played the GUT BUCKET. The concept of the Grand Rapids "Corn Roast" hosted by the Herm Baker family was imitated by Jim.

Jim was the District's No. 1 Bass. If you didn't believe

that, all you had to do was ask Jim, he would inform you of that fact. If you sang Bass, you were automatically the No. 2 Bass. He was a "wanna be" bari, and if you needed a Lead to sing a tag or song, Jim was always there to fill the spot.

Jim was a promoter and idea man. He was instrumental in the Chapter purchasing an old movie theatre for use as a rehearsal hall. He and several other hard working chapter members remodeled the building to use for their barbershop needs but also rented out for wedding receptions, bingo, etc. The chapter later sold the building and broke about even but had free rent for their use.

Jim carried his love for Barbershop into the family as well. He loved his wife Jackie who devoted full time to his tender care for the past several years. His daughters Janis and Jane, his son Jeff and their two son-in-laws Rick & Bill along with their grandchildren all live within a half mile of each other. He was always there for his family and his family was always there for Jim.

On behalf of James C. Horton, his wife Jackie, his children and their families, sister Martha Gifford, brothers Larry and Don Horton and their families, we say "thank you" for your acts of kindness, sympathy and prayers during the time of our loss. We are all part of the Big Barbershop Family and we appreciate each and every one of you.

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


