
Lansing Chapter's 65th anniversary

On the chorus side of the contest, consider that the **Vocal Majority** will be seeking their 11th gold medal and showing us all why Barbershop choruses hold a back seat to no group of singers. In addition to the contests, you can attend classes, mass sings, chorditoriums, open chorus rehearsals, and afterglows.

Pioneer Barbershoppers have two premier events taking place on their doorstep in 2006. Don't let this opportunity slip away. Plan now to take advantage of one or both of these opportunities.

Detroit-Oakland returns to city in a big way








Greetings from the Quartet Champions Association http:// www.pioneergca.org/ With not much going on and having no OCA quartet/member bio submissions, we're stuck with ... err ... my bio ...;)

I started out as a child...(sorry, old Bill Cosby line). I grew up in Rochester, Mich. While at Rochester High School ('74), I sang in all the choirs (including Madrigals and Show Choir) and played trombone in all the bands (including jazz and marching band - drum major my senior year).

While at Michigan State University ('78 & '85), I majored in Choral Education, reformed/directed the MSU Handbell Choir, arranged and published handbell music, and marched in the band (as I still do every year with the alumni).

I have been teaching secondary vocal music in Hazel Park since 1979 with occasional superior performances at choral/vocal jazz festivals. I also ran a show choir at Oakland University, directed several church/handbell choirs in Lake Orion, sang





solos with churches and the Rochester Symphony Orchestra, sang with the John Smith Vocal Jazz Singers (Detroit), sang with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra Chorale, and directed the Rochester Community

Hobbies include sci-fi (Star Trek conventions), long distance cycling (either century day rides or several hundred mile-long trips), computers, and vocal jazz. I currently sing with PRime http: //prime-vocal-jazz.com/. Bonnie (my beautiful physical therapist wife - Beaumont, Royal Oak), Bob, the "Wonder Cat," and I live in beautiful Rochester. Drop by some time to enjoy the view and feed the wildlife.

My first real Barbershop exposure was hearing the Patch Chords during intermission at a cabaret concert I was doing with the MSU Chorale and Lansing Symphony.

I followed those guys (Gene Johnson, Don Horton, Doug Pearson, and Rich Harlow) around the rest of the day and joined the Lansing Chapter (Bob Winters directing) in '76.

I joined a quartet within the month - the Subtle Impressions (with Art Cardy, Jim Shewell,

and another Jim Miller) - and promptly finished 16th of 17 quartets at the "new" Dearborn Hvatt Regency (Grosse Pointe hosted).

After graduation in '78, I returned to Rochester and joined the Oakland County Chapter (Fred

McFayden directing). He groomed me,

stepped aside, and let me direct for a few years.

When the Utica Chapter moved to Rochester, I joined them to direct for almost 15 years (with several plateau awards and one bulletin editor award!).

I also joined City Lights as assistant director under Mike Slamka for a year to experience International - Pittsburgh in '94.

In fact, during that Civil War scene, Doc Gillingham arrangement, Mike turned to act out a scene and allowed me to direct for about 10 seconds. Thus, I can claim having directed on the Inter. stage...

My Rochester Chapter quartet, the Chordmeisters, with **Bob McCaffrey, Dan** Bajorek, and Kurt Kiesling enjoyed many years together and achieved mike tester status once. I've also served Pioneer as the head of

Young Men in Harmony, Assistant Director of Music Ed., and part of the Chorus Director Development team.

In '97, Rudi Krampf, Kelly Brummett, Jim Ryan and I rehearsed eight times in two months and won the district as The Detroit Sound Co.

Jeff Gougeon joined us shortly thereafter. Thanks, guys, I love you.

God Bless vou, Kelly. We sang for the Detroit Tigers, the Detroit Pistons, the Detroit Shock - WNBA basketball, the Detroit Vipers - minor league hockey, the Mitch Albom Show (WJR - twice), Michigan International Speedway, Fox 2 Television, most Pioneer chapters, etc.

I am a Certified Director, a district arranger, serve on the Mini-HEP faculty (tags, coach, music fundamentals, judge class, bottle washer), serve on the Harmony College North faculty (Ontario), a coach (many quartets, guys and girls, and choruses in and out of the district, officially and unofficially), secretary of the Quartet Champions **Association**, a Standing Ovation (show) reviewer, a Bush League judge/ coach, Director of Contest and Judging (Pioneer), and a Certified Music Judge.

I currently sing with Macomb (going on three Internationals and get to direct from time to time (thanks, Jack Slamka) and enjoy every minute of it.

Although my voice has been stilled to some degree (spasmodic dysphonia http:// www.dysphonia.org/), I enjoy my "hobby" (read obsession!).

I continue to experience Barbershop "highs," cherish my time with Bonnie (read angel), teach the leaders of tomorrow (umm...junior high kids...), and bless/ thank God for everything in my life. Peace.



What the Plateaus mean to your chorus

By Al Fisk Greetings:

Congrats to three gentlemen who have survived applicant school and are now Candidates in the judging program. For the next two years, they'll be on practice panels (including Pioneer) as they hone their skills toward Category School which takes place in August 2007: **Dorn Burrill** - Singing, **Ron Eubank** - Contest Administrator, and **Don**

Reddy - Contest Administrator.

FYI: Some folks have asked me how the chorus plateau levels work. **Steve Sutherland** has the explanation on the Pioneer web site, but I'll point them out here, too.

Plateau levels are designed to give choruses something to shoot for when they are not likely to win the championship. Instead of basing plateaus on the size of the chapter roster, we go by scores. This way, choruses that are singing at or near the same level are competing against others of their league. Here is a more detailed explanation off the web site:

Plateau awards will be given in the Spring and Fall contests. However, trophies will only be handed out in the Spring. A chorus is placed in a plateau based on its previous score whether it was in the previous fall International Prelims, in the previous year's

District Championship, or in either contest from the past three years. Average scores on multiple contests are not used.

Any chorus that has not competed in more than three years automatically gets placed in plateau 4. I have the scores on file, and they are on the Pioneer site.

Plateau 4 - scores at 600 or less (or not competing for over three years)


Plateau 3 - scores at 601 - 700

Plateau 2 - scores at 701 - 800

Plateau 1 - scores at 801 and above.

The District Championship Chorus or the International Reps can be the plateau winner, as well.

Continued from page 4 n spring 2004, I talked to Jack Slamka about our dilemma. We had a beautiful setting and a great stage and sound system, but we needed a big boost. The Arts Council gave each chorus \$200 to put on the show each year.

We had no budget and the Council seemed satisfied with the show, but offered no funds to bring in talent. Their funds went to bring in name bands and groups during the summer. Jack was sympathetic to our plight, but that June **Power Play** was getting ready for their performances at International and I knew they didn't need more on their schedule, especially when they weren't getting paid for it.

He did, however, go to Don, Mark, and Mike and they talked about it. They said they'd do the show if there were a good reason to do it. They agreed that if we would make a concerted effort to get young singers from the high schools and colleges in the area to come to the concert and experience Barbershop they'd do it.

We made the effort. We visited every high school in Saginaw and Bay Counties and talked to teachers in Midland. We played the Society's video and featured Power Play in vocal music classes. We talked the Arts Council into not charging students for entry into the concert and we asked them to charge \$5 for adults – a raise from previous years.





Historians Corner:

Windsor in the early years

Chapter historian and Pioneer District historian.

This is the first of series of articles from our district's past and sometimes from elsewhere. I thought I would start this off by referring to something I have been working on. Last year, Windsor Chapter celebrated 60 years as the first Canadian chapter and the first to make the SPEBSQSA an international organization.

Windsor Chapter was

chartered on March 24, 1944, and presented by National Presidemt Hal Staab of Northhampton, Mass. Present for the presentation were National First Vice-President Phil Embury of Warsaw, N.Y. and Molly Reagan of Pittsburg. All three came at their own expense. Carroll **P. Adams**, past president and later executive director of the Society, wrote in The Harmonizer, March-April, 1972, that Windsor was sponsored by the Oakland County Mich. Chapter.

Duane Mosier, district

historian, wrote in the January 1970 Pioneer Troubadour, that after the Windsor Chapter was chartered, "Canada added chapters in Fredericton and Harvey Station, N. B., (in Ontario): Amherstburg, Brantford, Chatham, Guelph, Hamilton, Kitchener, London, Paris, Sarnia, Stratford, Sudbury, Toronto, Wallaceburg and a second Windsor chapter at Assumption College".

The first charter of the SPEBSQSA to be given to a college group (in 1946), was Please see History, Page 16

presented at Assumption College by the international secretary of the Society, Carroll P. Adams to Ed Meade, president of the Assumption chapter. The chapter functioned for six years. The Windsor Chapter did not take long to get into the swing of

This quartet from the Windsor Chapter competed in the 6th Annual International Quartet Contest in Detroit, June 15-17, 1944, at the Book Cadillac Hotel. I think they were the Legionaires. Two other quartets from Windsor Chapter competed:

4 Canucks, Maple Leaf Four

Phil Embury was elected president (June 16, 1944) of the society. He appointed Lt. Col. G. W. Wilkinson, honourary president of Windsor Chapter, as an international officer, responsible for extention (formation of new chapters).

Windsor Chapter started out as a member of the Ontario Association of Chapters which later became the Ontario District. Given the distance between the Ontario chapters, frequent interaction was not possible.

Being closer to many Michigan chapters, Windsor transferred to the Michigan District in 1959, and a long and creditable relationship continues to this day within the Pioneer District.
