Macomb reaches a higher level: 932

For the past decade, **Macomb** scores reached a predictable range: they'd win the right to represent Pioneer usually with a score in the 800s.

Then along came the young new **Mount Pleasant** chapter, whose spring 2006 score of 917 was 24 points higher than Macomb's fall 2005 score of 893. Would Macomb be toppled?

Not this time. Mount Pleasant scored an impressive 899, six points higher than Macomb's score a year earlier. But Macomb hit a new level with a fun and entertaining **Please see 932, page 7**

Fermata Nowhere finally won the Pioneer District championship the same night the Detroit Tigers made it into the World Series.

For most of the past decade they'd set a record for second places including a one point loss and a two point loss. This time it wasn't even close.

The Grosse Pointe Chapter quartet won the elusive trophy that had been designed by another Grosse Pointe member with a score of 1,778 or 74.1 percent, a full 132 points more than the next closest quartet. **Please see CHAMPS, page 5**

Kevin Dunkel: Son does father proud

Last year, the Society introduced a new membership recruitment program for use in 2006, "**The 100% Club.**" In short, the basis of the program was: recruit five new members in 2006 and your Society dues would be free in 2007.

All 16 districts and most chapters soon bought into the program and agreed to match the free dues offer, so an individual who gets those five new Man of Note awards, also gets his 2007 dues totally free. Those who do not achieve all five, will still receive a 20 percent reduction in their dues for each new man they bring in during the year.

What is the purpose you might ask? One; to reward those who take new member recruiting seriously, and reward them for their efforts, two; to encourage our members to recruit new members.

Sadly, statistics show that only about half of our members have **EVER** received a Man of Note award. Is it any wonder that as a Society we continue to drop in numbers? Just imagine what might happen if we could cut that percentage!

In Pioneer, we have regularly shown **positive growth numbers** for many months per year. Yet we have failed to show a positive growth number for an entire year since 1996. Despite the Society numbers falling substantially, the last two years in Pioneer we have been so close- the December Membership Reports showed us with a loss of three men in 04 and a loss of one member last year, but they were still years we did not show growth!

At the fall Pioneer District Convention we honored an individual who set a goal for himself, to not only get a Man of Note award this year, but to become a member of the 100% Club.

At of the end of August, just 8 months into the year, **Kevin Dunckel** achieved that goal! And in doing so, became only the FOURTH man in the Society to become a member of the 100% Club.

As a result of that Kevin will receive his 2007 membership **TOTALLY FREE**!

His seven Man of Note Awards place him in the top 10 percent of all recruiters Societywide for their lifetime, and he's only a three year member!

But there is more than just member recruiting to this young man. He is a member of two chapters; **Lansing**, his home chapter, and **Mt Pleasant**, where he attends Central Michigan University as a technical theater **Please see KEVIN**, page 13.

was on the Harmony Round Up faculty for 15 years as a quartet coach, Fundamentals



What do they have to do?

It's really quite easy. Have the chapter secretary or some one else take a count or reasonable estimate of the audiences at each of your performances.

Record the date and reason for the performance with the number of people attending and report that to **Roger Lewis**, who is our new Director of Financial Development.

Also, get the quartets to report to the secretary the same thing for their performances. A simple form would capture it all. One additional thing would be very helpful.

Encourage and collect letters of appreciation and forward copies of them as well. They are very helpful in applying for the grant. Makes us credible.

That's it?

That's it.

What if they're paid performances?

Paid or unpaid doesn't make any difference. Actually, the state grantors expect artists to be paid.

Well I'm going to my chapter and I'm going to kick some butt and get it done. I don't want a dues increase just because we aren't communicating.

Thanks, now if we can just get the other chapters to do the same.

Second place went to this year's Bush League winner, **Something Big!!**, which scored 1,646 or 68.6 percent.

Third place went to senior quartet winner **Antiques Roadshow**, which scored 1,593 or 66.4 percent.

Border Crossing came in fourth with 1,556 or 64.8 percent while **Moxxy** followed with 1,530 or 63.8 percent.

Sixth place went to **Singing with Dad**, which scored 1,496 or 62.3 percent. Rounding out the top seven was **Grand River Serenade**, which won 1,338 points or 55.8 percent.

"Just wanted to say THANKS," Fermata Nowhere said in a statement to Troubadour readers. "The members and friends of the Pioneer District are the best. You people have supported us through all our competitions from the very start. We could not have finally attained this goal without your support.

Beween 2001 and 2004, Fermata Nowhere finished in second place six times. Three of

the four were members the quartet Resolution, which finished second in 1997 and 1998. The total: eight second place finishes to seven different quartets.

Then things got close: in fall 2004, they lost the district championship by just one point. In fall 2005, they lost by two points.

But just as 2006 proved to be a magic year for the Tigers, it was magic for Fermata Nowhere, which won its first contest in spring 2006, winning 1,770 points or 73.8 percent as they beat three recent district champs who had previously beaten them.

Their spring win against past champs gave them the right to represent Pioneer District at the 2006 International Convention where they finished 39th, winnng 2,298 points or 76.6 percent.

This fall's score of 74.1 percent was 2.4 percentage points lower than the summer score but three tenths of a percentage point higher than their spring 2006 score.

And finally, the District trophy, designed by a fellow member of the Grosse Pointe

Chapter decades ago, is there's for a year. **Party of Four**, which has its own connection to Grosse Pointe and narrowly beat them last fall. proudly handed presented them with the trophy then welcomed them into the District Quartet Champions Association. **Russ Seely**, also a Grosse Pointe member and president of the associtation, proudly welcomed them into the exclusive club.

His wife, Shirley, who has been coming to these conventions for four decades, called it one of the most emotional contests she could remember.

Fermata Nowhere bass **Pete Burns** pulled out a lengthy list of people to thank and repeated the line that they would win a championship when the Tigers went to the World Series.

At their chapter after glow, fellow Grosse Pointer **Al Cole** quipped that they will win the International championship when the Detroit Lions win the Super Bowl.


Also included in the program was an impressive presentation of the 60 year old Midstatesmen chapter's history by **Lowell Boyer**, 59-year-member and leading bass singer.

Where does all the money go?

We all ask this question a lot these days, I guess. At home, there is rarely enough money to do all the things the family wants to do. At work, somebody always wants to cut costs or increase sales because there isn't enough profit.



One would hope that in our barbershop lives we could be free of these questions and just enjoy singing.

Here's the deal – you know this but indulge me for a minute Running the district costs money and the

dues cover only about 57 percent of the total cost. We make up the rest from conventions, and grants. Indeed – for 2007, with a \$10,500 grant – we have a balanced budget. Nothing to worry about, right?

Sorry, it is not that easy. What if we don't get the grant next year? Well, there are several answers to what we might do. Consider these:

We could just charge participants more to go to the various schools we run and we could break even. That would be OK, wouldn't it?

We could raise the dues by \$10 and that would make up for the shortfall and we could do all the programs we had planned to benefit the chapters. (Note that our district dues are among the lowest in the Society today and that we have not had a dues increase for several years.)

We could raise the convention registration fees by about \$12 and that would make up for the shortfall too. (Our convention registrations are also among the lowest in the society today and we have not taken an increase for several years here either.)

To many of us (me included) none

of these is a good choice. I have better suggestions:

What if we could significantly increase the likelihood that we could get a grant every year? That would be good, wouldn't it?

What if, instead of a dues or convention registration increase, we could make a taxdeductible contribution instead? I would like that better, wouldn't you?

Both these solutions are available to us – if we decide that we want them to happen.

We have the most grantable arts story in the State!

Our 27 chapters sing for a larger total audience than any musical organization in Michigan – without exception.

Further, we sing for more underserved, disadvantaged and other deserving citizens that the State of Michigan wants to target also.

We add more value to the artistic and cultural fabric of the communities in Michigan than any other organization in the state through our work in the schools, nursing homes, community events and collaboration with other community organizations. You know what the problem is, we can't prove it!

IF we had information from every chapter about all the wonderful things they do and how many people they do it for and evidence of how much our communities loved what we do getting a grant would be a piece of cake. Nobody in the state could touch our story. We just can't seem to get every chapter to simply tell us what they are doing.

Contributions to Harmony Foundation are tax deductible AND support the Society's work to provide quite a number of extra services to our chapters and youth such as:

Harmony Explosion Camps

College Quartet Tour and Competition Director's College and Quartet College Scholarships Arrangers' Scholarships American Treasurers Documentary Film

Harmony Foundation provided over \$250,000 to these and other programs in 2005 and that number will go up to \$350,000 in 2006. These are programs that would never happen without Harmony Foundation because the Society can't do this stuff out of the dues and convention income they have to work with either. See, we are all in the same boat: raise the dues to do what we want or find other ways to pay for it.

Your tax-deductible contribution to the Ambassadors of Song for as little as \$5 per month can solve the problem. Here's how: (Now here is the magic part.)

If 75 percent of the district made this contribution to Harmony Foundation that would be \$56,000 towards these great programs.

If everyone participating chose the DONOR'S CHOICE option with Harmony Foundation they could designate up to 30 percent of their \$60 to come back to the district (or their chapter) which would mean almost \$17,000 would be available to the district through tax deductible contributions. Neat huh?

Like everything else in the world we have choices to make, but just don't let anyone tell you that the only choice is to raise the dues, because I am here to tell you that, this year, that ain't true!! YOU get to choose - I hope you join me in choosing to do it the easy way

Hillsdale scored 776 or 64.7 percent followed by **Traverse City** with 748 points or 62.3 percent while Holland finished in eighth with 692 points or 57.7 percent.

The remaining competitors were Michiana Metro, Grosse Pointe, Battle Creek, Windsor and Kalamazoo.

While Macomb will go to International, Hillsdate was voted most improved chorus. Grand Rapids was Plateau 2 champ and Holland was the Plateua 3 winner.



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

major.


He regularly and faithfully drives home to Lansing from school, to prepare for contests and their annual show with the **Capitol City Chordsmen.**

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Sing while you work?



Just do your best and take a rest and sing yourself a song." You might recognize that line from the Disney song, "Whistle While You Work" from Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs."

Now some London bsuinessmen are actually heeding the advice from the popular Disney movie and are using singing as a way to relax at the end of a stressful day.

Stressed-out London stockbrokers have been singing their cares away with professionally trained singer Karin Hochapfel, who teaches singing classes for workers in the city's Canary Wharf financial district. Those who find it difficult to switch gears and chill out at the end of the day learn to de-stress by mixing yoga, breathing exercises, and a relaxation method known as the Alexander Technique with song.

Hochapfel says the singing lessons, along with the accompanying physical and mental exercises, alleviate stress and reinvigorate the whole body, teaching the uptight to loosen up. Various exercises used by singers to warm up before performances can also be useful to those whose jobs or life experiences leave them tense and unable to unwind.


