Rancilio Wins 4th Bulletin Contest

For the 4th year in a row, Robert Rancilio has won first place in the Pioneer **District Bulletin Editor of** the Year contest.

Bob is editor of the **Grosse Pointe Chapter's** Pitch-Pipe. His wife, Dot, is associate editor of the Pitch-Pipe. The honor is for bulletins produced in 2005. Awards were given April 28 at the district convention in Kalamazoo.

Second place went to Art Chapter's Windmill Blade. In third place was John Cowlishaw, editor of the **Pontiac/Waterford Smoke** Signals.

The contest is conducted by PROBE, the Society's association for Public Relations Officers and Bulletin Editors. Judging is by experienced PROBE journalists throughout the Society.

The two top bulletins in each district are eligible to compete in the International Bulletin Contest, whose winners will be announced at the International convention in Indianapolis in July.

For the first time in three years, a Pioneer District quartet is among the 40 highest ranked barbershop quartets in America and the world.

Fermata Nowhere, in its first trip to international, finished 39th scoring 2,298 points or 76.6 percent among 47 competitors. That's the best the district has done since Power Play won the Gold in 2003 after years of competing.

The first time Power Play went to International competition in 1990, Power Play also came in 39th, the start of a long climb to the very top in 2003.

Fermata Nowhere's score was their highest ever smashing their spring score of 1,770 points or 73.8 percent. That win followed six second places during Pioneer competitions between 2001 and 2005. Three of the four were previously in Resolution, which finished second in 1997 and 1998 contests

"Even though I had competed 21 years ago (Saturday Night Feature, St Louis 1984) I felt like a rookie," said Fermata Nowhere bass Pete Burns. "You have a tendency to forget how big the arena is, and how bright the lights are.

The quartet met at 9 a.m. on Wednesday morning to warm up. We had not sung through (by choice) our set since the send-off show

"When we got to the arena the first quartet we saw was Power Play. Then it was time to go into our warm up room. Jack Slamka came with us and got us pumped up. The arena was so loud that we didn't hear our introduction so we walked on stage about 3 seconds later than we should."

As Fermata Nowere took its first bow, Burns recalled "I saw Russ and Shirley Seely, Al Cole, John Seeman and all of our wives sitting in the third row. It felt like I was back at Pioneer singing at an afterglow. I felt we really nailed the set and when we looked at the scores and saw that we had never scored higher just heightened the International



experience. Can't wait to do it all over again in Denver."

Pete's wife, Sally, was thrilled, thanking Seely and Seaman for securing her third row seats

"I never get to sit in the third row at District's let alone International!" she said. "It was such a thrill and to my surprise, I was not even nervous! I knew they had nothing to lose and everything to gain. Very different from the past five years in Pioneer. I knew

they weren't going to win or come in second!

"It was a bit scary however, when they announced their name and they didn't come on stage for a few seconds. Those were the *long* few seconds when I thought, "OH NO! What happened?" Then Jeff, Pete, TC and Steve hit the stage and I relaxed and enjoyed their wonderful performance. It was great to have so many Pioneer friends with us in Indy. The Guardians of Harmony welcomed us with open arms.

We were so proud of their performance and also Insignia's performance. By the end of the week, we were hoarse from cheering."

Macomb finished 27th in the chorus contest, besting three other choruses by scoring 2,285 points or 76.2 percent with 48 men on stage. In the college quartet contest, Insignia placed 17th out of 21 quartets, scoring 771 points or 64.2 percent.

Doug is a quick learner and we were able to perform a show package for the coaches. His background in community theater musicals is serving him and the quartet well.

The coaching was outstanding. Each quartet was assigned four coaches for the week. At the end of each day, the coaches would get together and discuss each quartet's accomplishments and the next day's plan.

Opportunities observed by one coach that were not in his area of expertise were handed off to one of the other coaches that could help. As an example, Hank Hammer was uncomfortable with a chord in one of our arrangements, even though it was being sung correctly. Jim Kahlke jumped in and made the changes to make it better.

The coaches were careful not to just tell us "what to do," but helped us to discover how to analyze what we were doing, and understand how to institute changes to make it better. This will help us improve in the future.

Friday night, the 13 quartets attending Harmony University for coaching were part of the show for the entire 600-plus students and faculty. Antiques Roadshow performed part of their "Music Man" package and it was a hit. Many students and faculty were very complimentary. The costume change, marching, etc. during the song, was met with enthusiastic applause. Between now and the fall contest, we plan to become more proficient with these and other songs by using them on our upcoming shows.

A solid week of coaching and singing for other classes at HU's Quartet College was certainly taxing, but we all agreed that we are definitely a better quartet as a result of the experience.

Doug, who organized COTS for Pioneer for four years, lives in Grand Blanc with his wife Laura and his two children, Becky and John. Doug's background is primarily as a soloist, performing in many civic theater productions, often as the lead in musicals.

He joined the Society in 1999, where he discovered the joy of quartet singing. His home chapter is the **Flint Chapter**, and he became a dual member in the **Macomb County Guardians of Harmony** in the fall of 2003.

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Help insure our future through Harmony Foundation

Harmony Foundation designs its fundraising programs to support the Society at every level. This principle led to creation of the Donor Choice feature in July 2005. The feedback has been very positive, and people view this feature as "the tide that raises all the boats."

Here's How It Works

Individuals make a gift to the Foundation general fund through the President's Council or Ambassadors of Song and designate up to 30 percent of their contribution to go back to their chapter or district or both.

In 2005, more than \$12,000 was returned to chapters and districts.

As the program gathers momentum in 2006, that figure is anticipated to exceed \$135,000!!!

Here are a few operating policies regarding Donor Choice:

• The Foundation holds the amount

designated for each district or chapter in an account for that district or chapter and sends a check in January and July for the amount received from the previous six months.

• Checks will be issued only if the account balance is \$50 or greater. If there is less than \$50 in the account balance, the account will be held until the balance builds up to that amount.

· Chapters and Districts are allowed to use this money to further the causes they choose. • Harmony Foundation includes with the check a list of the individuals who contributed to the Foundation and have chosen the Donor Choice option. They do not give out the amounts these donors gave.

Imagine if every man in the Pioneer District gave and average of \$5 per month next year. How much would that be? 1300 x \$5.00 x 12 = \$78,000 x 30 percent = \$23,400 returned to support programs in our chapters and in the district!!

Imagine what your chapter or the District

could do with the 30 percent share.

Why not include Harmony Foundation in your family annual giving plans this year, support the outreach programs that are of interest to you and to the Society like: Youth Harmony Camps (and this year the Harmony Happening in March specifically). Youth Music Festivals.

Collegiate Quartet Scholarships awarded as Prizes in the MBNA College Quartet Contest at International each year. **Quartet Scholarships to Harmony** University.

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

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
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
