Lansing takes Championship

One of the first times young **Jessica Thompson**watched a Lansing Chapter show, they were a fifth place chorus putting 30 men on stage. This spring they had 44 men on stage as they became Pioneer District champions for the first time in eight years.

For their first championship since 1999, Lansing stood in the winner's circle thanks to her powers to do what all great directors do: lead, inspire and move men to give their all and very best.

Lansing won by scoring 847 points or 70.6 percent singing "Louise" and "May I never love again" as Thompson's adoring eyes moved them to pour their hearts out to her and the audience.

Another chorus lead by a great young director, **Hillsdale**, scored 814 points or 67.8 percent with 40 men on stage.

Detroit-Oakland placed third with 786 points or 65.5 percent with



37 men on stage

Rounding out the top five were **Grosse Pointe** with 763 points or 63.6 percent and **Grand Rapids**, with 752 points or 62.7 percent.

Kalamazoo scored 750 points or 62.5 percent followed by host Traverse City, which finished the chorus contest with a touching "Thanks for the Memory" and scored 700 points or 58.3 percent followed by Michiana Metro with 679 points or 56.6 percent. Rounding out the top 10 was Windsor with 677 points or 56.4 percent.

Also competing were **Gratiot County** with 645 points or 53.8
percent and **Flint**, with 611 points or 50.9 percent.

Steve Pauling shows his stuff

Spring contest was a great one for **Steve Pauling.** His 2006 district champion quartet is representing Pioneer District at International for a second year in a row and the chorus he directs climbed from 10th to fourth place.

Fermata Nowhere scored 1,772 points or 73.4 percent, beating 2004 District champs **Wild Card** by 27 points.

Another former District champion, **Four Man Fishin' Tackle Choir** was one point behind Wild Card, with 1,734 points or 72.2 percent. **Rush Hour,** a new quartet of past champs rounded out the top four with 1,727 points or 72 percent.

The remaining finalists were the **Kevnotes**, **Something Big!!**, **Moxxy** and **After Intermission**.



Fermata Nowhere's score was 6 points lower than the 1,778 or 74.1 percent scored to win the district championship in fall 2006. They were at 76.6 percent in last summer's International contest and did 2 points better than a year earlier when they scored their first win in a district contest after years of second place finishes.

Earlier that day, Pauling's leaner and meaner chorus, **Grosse Pointe** soared from 680 points or 56.7 percent scored in fall 2006 to 763 points or 63.6 percent, an 83 point improvement from last fall. The chorus finished 10th last fall with

33 men on stage and leapt to fourth and a plateau championship with just 27 men on stage.

The chapter accomplished this higher score with six fewer men than they had on stage last fall and 15 fewer men then the chapter assembled on stage in fall 2005 when they hosted the district convention

when they hosted the district convention and scored 727 points.

As their higher score showed, sometimes less can be more. Certanly when it comes to racking up the points.


This year, Grosse Pointe was 84 points out of first place while the chorus was 252 points out of first place last fall.

Other quartets competing were Singing with Dad, Border Crossing, Harmony Transer, Weekend Agenda and Harmonious Shenanigans.

Michigan Harmony Brigade:

Inaugural Rally slated for May 2008 would, after registering, receive sheet

Once upon a time, there was a Lead (let's call him "Joe") who always enjoyed looking for opportunities to learn new songs and arrangements that were challenging. He enjoyed singing his part in unison with some of the Society's top quartets as he listened to their CDs in his home or his car.

He would always daydream about stepping in to replace the International Champs' Lead to sing one of their signature songs or being able to sing those songs with some of his pals in the Society, but it would always remain an elusive dream.

One day he passed a quartet in the lobby of the Pioneer District's 2003 Fall Competition that was singing some fantastic high quality arrangements made famous by medalist-level quartets.

After listening in a trance-like state for awhile, Joe wanted to know how he could learn those arrangements. The baritone (in most fairy tales it's a troll under a bridge, or an elf in the forest, but this is a barbershop fairy-tale – and besides, a baritone comes

pretty darn close – let's call him Mark) told

pretty darn close – let's call him Mark) told Joe the wildest tale about a magical weekend that was known as a **Harmony Brigade Rally.**

He told of how members of the Brigade and prospective-member guests totaling 120 strong (30 basses, 30 baritones, 30 leads, and 30 tenors) would gather annually for a Brigade Rally weekend by showing up on a Friday night and do nothing but spend the entire WEEKEND mixing and matching amongst themselves, singing songs like I was hearing in an endless number of quartet combinations.

They would arrive by planes, trains, and automobiles, and in some cases covered

wagons (but only if they came from Indiana). Mark told Joe that each participant music and a professionally recorded CD of a 10-12 song repertoire about 5-6 months in advance of the weekend.

Each person would have to learn the music on their own and when they arrived at the rally, they'd have to be able to sing their part COLD because if they came unprepared, there'd be nowhere to hide since the focus was just on singing in quartets!


Joe was dumb-founded! He asked, "Was this place somewhere over the rainbow? Could such a magical place really exist?"

- Form a Committee.
- Benchmark what other successful chapters have done.
- Gain support from civic government.
- Get a quartet to sing at council meeting.
- Select appropriate week for the event.
- In conjunction with a major chapter event.
- In conjunction with a major civic event.
- Invite other singing groups to participate.
- Contact high school and college music teachers.
 - PR blitz.
- Involve media early and often.
- Send quartets to radio stations.

Group Two

Ideas:

Membership in Local Arts

Council

- Provide National Anthem for College & University games.
- Sing at Council meetings.
- Get Mayor to open show.
- Sing in community churches.

Planning: Membership in Local Arts Council

- Locate head honcho (of the Arts Council) and determine what is needed to become a member.
- Send a check (\$) for personal/group membership.
- Barbershopper or Group becomes member and gets involved.

Your chapter can get started by forming a small group and brainstorming some ideas. Then put together a plan for the idea that you think

the idea that you think is best for your chapter. Then working the plan will lead to success and more visibility in your community.

At the Traverse City Convention, I set out some flyers about my barbershop arrangements, but I'm not sure how many of you saw them, so I'll repeat the message here.

You'll find a pretty diverse mix of arrangements on my web site - http://www.HatleyMusic.com.

These arrangements have been used in shows and contests by several Society choruses and quartets, and by women's quartets, as well as in my own chapter -Grand Rapids. On the "Classic" page of the web site you'll find arrangements of several songs that are highly contestable but which, as far as I know, have never been used in contests, so there's an opportunity to do something different. Arrangements elsewhere on the site range from pop, rock, and jazz to sacred songs, with everything in between.

Part-specific learning tracks with computer-synthesized voices are also available for all the arrangements: They ain't pretty, but all the notes and words are guaranteed to be present and correct. In addition, the "singers" never breath in the wrong place - in fact, they never breathe at

all!

You can buy the arrangements and learning tracks directly from the web site, or by contacting me

at <u>Derek@hatleymusic.com</u>. Some of the arrangements (but not the learning tracks) are also available from the Society through at 800-876-7464 x 8476. You'll find which arrangements are available there in the Society Music Catalog under my name.

If you are looking for custom arrangements to suit the style and skill level of your chorus or quartet, I can provide these for you. Since I'm right here in Michigan, it's quite possible I could visit you and go over your needs face-to-face.

Grosse Pointe loses Don Adams


Don Adams, longtime member of the **Grosse Pointe Chapter**, has passed on after years of declining health.



Sure, no problem.

One of the Muskegon Chapter's newest members, **Jeff Pierson**, stepped up to coach the kids and organize the boys ensemble. He spent many early mornings working with the young singers and suggesting stage presence and choreography.

He recruited the missing boys parts from the shoreline chorus and several of those chapter members worked many early mornings with just the young men. It all came together when the Muskegon Shoreline Chorus joined with the Norse Singers of the North Muskegon High School to ring lots of chords and put on a heck of a barbershop show to an enthusiastic, overflowing crowd.















