There was only one entry this year for the 2008 Pioneer District Seniors Quartet Champion which was won by Resisting-A-Rest of Grosse Pointe, Hillsdale, Lansing, Mt. Pleasant, and Pontiac. But this was no mere rubber stamp performance for this 1 year young quartet as they showed off the talent that also won them Silver in this past International Senior Quartet competition at the Barbershop Harmony Society's Midwinter Convention in San Antonio. bari Steve Warnaar, and bass Phil Haines had scored 862 points which was as high as the prelim scores of the top Pioneer quartets competing for International Rep.

There were two collegiate quartets both with members from Central Michigan University, home of Mount Pleasant Mountain Town Singers directed by CMU professor David Gillingham. It was inspiring to see youth of such great talent carrying on the barbershop tradition. Harmony 101 of Central Michigan University and Saginaw Valley State University with tenor Nathan Masterson, lead Garrett Gillingham, Bari Kevin Dunckel, and bass Mark Spring scored 721 and were named 2008 Pioneer District Collegiate Quartet Champion and qualify for the Bank of America Collegiate Contest in July 2008. 9th Chord Plateau of Central Michigan University put in a strong performance for 616 points.

Performing for Friday April 25th prelimi-

naries were 11 competing District quartets, plus the mic test quartet Weekend Agenda, and the three out-of-District quartets. Semi-Finalists included Singing With Dad, Full Throttle, and Barbershop Style.

Society Representative was Judd Orff. Speakers included the Battle Creek Host Chapter Chairman Jeff Woodworth who introduced Battle Creek Mayor Mark Behnke. Also up to the podium was District Housing and Raffle Administrator, and Past District President Roger Lewis, District Judges Services Administrator Al Fisk, and Judge Administrator David Kannberg.

The Friday night Quartet Preliminaries ended with a show by last Fall's awarded 2008 Pioneer District International Chorus Representatives the Mount Pleasant Mountaintown Singers directed by David Gillingham. Donations go to help funding cost of sending the chorus to Nashville for Internationals.

Pioneer District Quartet Finals were Saturday evening April 26th.

Master of Ceremonies and Former District President Doran McTaggart introduced the opening performance by 2007 Pioneer District Chorus Champions, Lansing's Capitol City Chordsmen directed by Jessica Thompson.

Quartet Finals competition was then opened by District President Jim Kunz.

Doran McTaggart then lead the entire audience in singing the international Pioneer District's two national anthems The Star-Spangled Banner and O Canada.

Mic testers were the Semi-Finalist Quartet Singing With Dad.

Wildcard of Grand Rapids won for PIO International Quartet Rep with score totals from Prelim and Finals of 1735.

Four Man Fishin' Tackle Choir of Frank Thorne, Gratiot County, Mt. Pleasant, and Traverse City scored 1728, a close second by only 7 points.

Moxxy of Battle Creek, Lansing, and Motor City Metro scored 1602.

Something Big!! of Lansing, Motor City Metro, and Mt. Pleasant scored 1582.

Chordiology of Huron Valley scored 1562.

Interstate Chord Company of Frank Thorne, Michiana Metro, South Bend-Mishawaka, and Valparaiso scored 1532.

Go 4 it! of Benton Harbor/St. Joe, Frank Thorne, and Kalamazoo scored 1516.

Harmony Transfer of Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, and Muskegon scored 1483.

A quick raffle drawing was held from stage for prizes including a digital camera and photo printer.

After the evening Quartet Finals the quartet winners were announced with lots of hugs and slaps on the back.

Following was some fantastic encore performances from all the winning quartets. More congratulations and good-bye hugs and handshakes in the lobby as we were humming those songs out the doors and into the city lights.

*A quartet that scores at least 76% of available points wins the right to compete at internationals. For Pioneer that is 1824 points since we use a six judge or 'double' panel. Six judges, four songs (two at Prelims and two at Finals), 100 max points per songs for a total maximum possible of 2400 points. Each District is guaranteed one quartet spot, if a District's quartets all score below 76% then the first place quartet becomes that District's only International Quartet Representative.

Chorus District CompetitionGoH Wins New Champs Trophy

Spring conventions don't just determine the quartet contests like International Quartet Representative.

At Battle Creek Michigan's newly renovated W.K. Kellogg Auditorium Saturday morning and noon April 26th 11 choruses competed for District Chorus Champion. In addition Mt. Pleasant and Lansing choruses performed but since they both won Chorus Champion within the last two years they were ineligible so had unpublished scores, singing for evaluation only.

This 2008 Pioneer District Chorus Champion was Macomb County Guardians of Harmony co-directed by Al Fisk and Glen Hipple. This was their first run for Champs after taking the required two years off since winning it in 2005. The chorus' music dazzled along with the gold neckties they wore with black suit jackets, shirts, and pants.

After Lansing's Capitol City Chordsmen had won Chorus Champion in 1973 they had purchased a trophy cup to be passed on to winning choruses. This year Lansing took the opportunity to retire that trophy that had over the years become dented and scratched. As the old cup stood in a place of honor on a pedestal beside the speaker podium, a three foot tall custom wood case was rolled out onto the stage in front of

the Guardians of Harmony chorus and opened to reveal the tall new Chorus Champion Trophy. Lansing Chapter Secretary/Treasurer, Former District President Larry Parker presented it to the smiling GoH President Dave Anderson. Then Dave and co-director Glen Hipple held the trophy up for all to see as it towered above their heads.

Saturday afternoon Pioneer District Chorus Finals April 26th were opened by Pioneer District President Jim Kunz. Then a few words by Chorus Contest Presenter Tom McCoy.

Mic testers were the open volunteer Joe Barbershop Chorus directed by Joe Liles.

Guardians of Harmony of Macomb County co-directed by Al Fisk and Glen Hipple won PIO Chorus Champion and Plateau 1 Champion scoring 887.

Great Lakes Chorus of Grand Rapids directed by Curt Struyk scored 795.

Town & Country Chorus of Hillsdale directed by Don Slamka won Plateau 2 Champion scoring 789.

Gentlemen Songsters of Detroit-Oakland directed by Steve Sutherland scored 744.

Cereal City Chorus of Battle Creek directed by Rob Halsey scored 725.

Cherry Capital Chorus of Traverse City directed by Jeff Cobb won Plateau 3 Champion scoring 724.

Lakeshore Chorus of Grosse Pointe directed by Steve Pauling scored 714.

Kalamazoo Barbershop Chorus of Kalamazoo directed by Dave Woolf scored 697.

Big Chief Chorus of Pontiac-Waterford directed by Thomas Blue scored 644.

Arrowhead Chorus of Flint directed by David Longroy scored 612.

Sun Parlour Chorus of Windsor directed by Dan Bezaire scored 599.

Announcing the winners was Chorus Director Development Jim Ryan.

Each chorus director was called out on stage and all were lined up with Former District President Raleigh Bloch presenting the plaques for the Plateau and District Champions.

After chorus evaluations and a break the evening quartet competition was held. Once the quartet competitions were over awards were presented but they weren't all competition awards.

Quoting Ron Seely the from 2006 May print Troubadour article, The First Van Tassell Winners, "(QCA Mission Statement) 'To provide quality barbershop entertainment, to encourage formation and coaching to quartet and to educate audiences in the art form of barbershop harmony'. In addition to that challenge, we felt that certain individuals should be recognized as outstanding in helping us serve the mission." Saturday night after quartet competitions QCA President and last year winner of the

Legacy Award, Russ Seely gave a touching speech and then presented the 2008 Glenn Van Tassell Legacy Award to Macomb County Guardians of Harmony Director Al Fisk. Left to say a few words the overwhelmed honoree gazed at the plaque then out into the audience and mustered up a heartfelt thank you before beating a quick retreat.

The evening competition ended with Master of Ceremonies and Former District President Doran McTaggart directing the audience to Keep The Whole World Singing.

But the night was just getting started as many went to the McCamly Plaza Hotel District and Chapter Hospitality Rooms for drinks, food, fellowship and barbershop singing into the wee small hours.



Friday the 25th the Quartet Champion Association officially inducted 2007 Pioneer District Quartet Champions Chordiology into their association. Along with plaques Chordiology received a personal performance by International Medalist Quartet SEP!

Member Jack Sidor had passed away the previous year. QCA President Russ Seely spoke of Jack's love and contributions to barbershopping including his coaching quartets right into his final days. He then presented Jack's wife Alverne (a Sweet Adeline) with a memorial plaque, "In Memory Of Jack Sidor A Champion Of Barbershop Harmony".

Next Joe Liles gave a Master Class-Tune It Or Die. Bio excerpt from BHS website, "Joe Liles is Music Publications Editor for the Barbershop Harmony Society, certified Arrangement category judge, is now serving in the Singing category and has taught chorus directing and chorus rehearsal techniques at district and international schools."

Joe gave a one hour intensive course on barbershop singing technique. He demonstrated by using the quartet Moxxy in front of the class providing a lot of instruction and insight. Then he gave some personal demonstrations and perspective, went over several vocal exercises and taught helpful warm-ups.

Friday night after Preliminaries and the fund raising show it was a nice Spring walk in the evening air back to the McCamly. Everyone was still pretty excited about the quartet Prelims and there was plenty of tag singing in the lobby. Oh, and an ice cream Sunday buffet, yum.

Later I went outside for a walk. Across the street from the hotel I hooked up with a large group singing tags out in front of a tavern. We were all standing in a large circle beneath street lights and flowering trees. A great way to end the evening.

Saturday morning we got up early for a barbershop buffet breakfast in the hotel restaurant.

Champion quartet has had a lot of success with a free audio editing software called Audacity. Even though it was early in the morning it was a packed room including several Society and District big wigs.

They use it primarily to supplement their group rehearsal time. When schedules prevent them from getting together they will record themselves, email the tracks, mix them together with audacity and have a recorded digital rehearsal. To demonstrate the editor for the class they used a projection TV hooked up to a laptop and then recorded some tracks live.

They also touted the benefits of recording themselves together with a multi track mixer and then with software isolating individual voices for polish. All four members contributed to the class discussion. More information is on their website Chordiology.com, go to their Blog page, the Archive link near the top, and then select, "the tyranny of the truth machine".

After the chorus and quartet Finals at the auditorium people began to gather in the hotel lobby and halls singing barbershop songs and tags. There were six Chapter Hospitality Rooms open to all including a huge one on the 16th floor for the District hosted by Detroit-Oakland Chapter. I hung out mostly in our Chapter's Hospitality Room but many people were working all the rooms. The hotel room bathtubs were filled with ice and drinks and there were lots of veggie trays, sweets, chips, sandwiches, meatballs, etc. Many quartets made the rounds, moving from one Hospitality Room to another, singing songs and toasting the event. It's really amazing to sit in a small hotel room with friends while quartet after quartet sing to you from only 5 feet away, including quartets of International caliber.

Sunday morning there was even a worship service with quartets singing gospel followed by a recap meeting.

What a fantastic weekend and I even learned an important lesson. Apparently sound travels to all the floors from the stairwell so no quartet singing in there or a nice young man in a blazer from hotel security will ask you to stop.

By all accounts, webcast or live in person, the BHS Nashville 2008 Internationals were very exciting. The new BHS head-quarters in Nashville proved a wonderful host for Internationals. There were many positive reports of the venue and of the eateries within walking distance. Nashville lived up to its reputation as the Music City with music pouring onto the street from a myriad of taverns and restaurants. The competition was July 2nd-5th at the Sommet Center, Nashville Convention Center, 601 Commerce St. Nashville, TN 37203

Representing the Pioneer District was the Grand Rapids Chapter quartet Wildcard, tenor Peter Westers, lead Dave Miller, bass James Masalskis, and bari Curt Struyk competing for their first time at Internationals. In the quartet quarter-finals they scored 2215 points for a 73.8% average, placing 49th of 51. They had a sensitive and beautiful blend singing their songs It's Only A Paper Moon and Always (I love that tender tenor post).

Wildcard baritone Curt Struyk is also director for the Grand Rapids Chapter Great Lakes Chorus. At the GLC rehearsal following Internationals Curt regaled us with the excitement of the 'big' stage, its blinding footlights, and all the talented barbershoppers he met.

He relayed to us of the well deserved BHS Dave LaBar MC of the Year Award presented to Doran McTaggart of Pioneer's Windsor Chapter and of a fun 'groaner' Doran told while emceeing there.

Curt said he was impressed with the professionalism of all the performers. Especially the chorus who didn't miss a beat while the Independence Day festivities boomed in through their set and even declined a 'do-over'.


He was pleased his top two picks were right, although it was really close. The top five quartet finalists were...

The convention included an honorary induction into the BHS for the Oak Ridge Boys who accepted on stage and sang a moving gospel, a-cappella of course.

Along with the competition there was the American Harmony - The Movie -Viewing, seminars, slide show tribute plus meet and greet with Gaynotes and Side Street Ramblers, AIC show, and Harmony Foundation Presents Show.

Wildcard lead, Dave Miller gave the following report.

It was simply a joy to be able to represent the Pioneer district at the international competition. I really appreciate all of the support that we have received from our friends in the district and the Grand Rapids chapter. They have been very supportive of their international reps in the past and continued to do so for us. We have an AWESOME district

and chapter.

Being on the international stage was not as stressful as we had expected. We couldn't see the crowd because of the bright lights. We knew they were there, but couldn't see them.

The crowds at the international are very supportive of the competitors. Everyone in the audience wants the competitors to do well, without exception. It doesn't matter from which district you come or who your favorite quartet is, when they are announced, you cheer for them as loud as you can and support them. When the quartets do well, the audience always wins because they have received the gift the quartet/chorus was there to give, that of song and beautiful harmony.

My favorite moment was when Doran McTaggart received the Dave LaBar MC award. I was so happy for Doran. He is such a good friend and talent, it was great to see him recognized publicaly for his efforts. We spent some time with Doran in Nashville, and it was very clear the amount of time and effort he puts into his seemingly effortless delivery. He was always trying out new material

to get a reaction. He is an awesome talent.

Singing on the Larry Ager fundraiser was a thrill. Being on the same stage as all of those great quartets and being roasted by Kenny Hatton was fun. It was great to be able to give back to a cause which has helped so many barbershoppers in the past.

Next year, I look forward to competing along side more of my friends from Pioneer as we strive for the magic 912 points.

I love barbershop and am thankful for the opportunity to represent the District, my chapter and perform for such a wonderful audience.

"big boy's" contest. And, the chorus contest is like watching you "show of shows".

The MountainTown Singers have made tremendous strides in their three short years of existence and plan to continue to improve and grow in barbershop craft and singing excellence. The international contest was a breath taking experience. Most of the guys, including me, thought of our time on stage as a "blur". I wasn't even sure how we did..... most people asked each other.."did we do well"....four to five minutes on stage felt more like 30 seconds. I have watched the replay of our performance on the webcast and it is really good. In my opinion our average score should have been closer to an 80 considering the improvement we have made from the fall qualifying contest. However, the stigma of the seeded points you enter the contest with seem to be a better predictor of how the chorus will rank.

We went into the contest seeded last and came out last. With the exception of only two or three choruses, most all of the choruses fared just the way they were seeded. That being said, we will take a deep breath, swallow our pride and work even harder for the fall contest in Battle Creek. We know what we have to do, and we are up to the task.

The best part of international for me was just watching and hearing the contest. It is like going to a barbershop show where all the quartets and choruses are "headliners"!! The only "downer" for me, was when the buses picked us up at the hotel for contest. They were 30 minutes late as they thought we were in a different hotel. Thus, we were literally rushed through the process getting to the stage. However, a less rushed schedule would not have changed the outcome.

I should especially note that this was an experience of a lifetime for our 16 college students who sang with us. Their

feedback about the contest has reflected "awe" and disbelief at how very refined this art form is. The society will reap the benefits whenever they can get college students to attend international, much less have them participate in the contest. They are tomorrow's barbershoppers and we want them to be "bitten by the bug" and sustain the hobby for life.

It has been a supreme honor to represent the Pioneer District in this year's international contest and a personal dream come true for me.

Webcast Parties Of Int

For those of us unable to attend the competition in Nashville TN the webcast provided the next best thing. The audio quality was wonderful and with the video using both stationary, panning, and zooming boom cameras with a full screen viewing option it was the best seat in the house (except maybe for the judges). There was the option of paying only for specific days' live and archived performances, the full package being \$150, or for just the archived performances, and there was even the option of audio only for free. Performers were interviewed briefly in a studio between competitor's sets which included interviews with 2008 Pioneer District Quartet Representatives Wildcard, Collegiate Quartet Champions Harmony101, and Chorus Representatives MountainTown Singers.

There was a number of webcast service interruptions July 2nd-4th during the Quartet Quarter and Semi-Finals and during the Chorus Finals due to server/carrier issues. The webcast team worked valiantly to overcome these technical difficulties. BHS Events Committee Chairman and Webcast Executive Producer Murray Phillips reported, "...there are six different companies that have to work together to bring the magic of our music from the stage out to your homes

or offices. The process is significantly more intricate and intertwined than it would seems like needs to be the case. When you create this environment every year in a different location, with a different set of variables, we can test the feed and the technical machinations behind it as much as we like, but when the actual stream provider has a routing issue, there's nothing we can do about it except ride them until its fixed."

However, any parts that were missed to paying webcast members were also available in the archives for one week. Fortunately there were no mass interruptions during the Quartet Finals Saturday July 5th. Here's a webcast party report by Pioneer District's Pontiac-Waterford Chapter from their 2007 PROBE editor awarded August newsletter the Smoke Signals www.BigChiefChorus.org.

Eleven of us gathered at Jim Owens' home, Saturday night, July 5, to watch and listen to the Quartet Finals from Nashville . (Owens, Doig, Melkonian, Mann, Cowlishaw, DeNio, Pioch, Butcher, Frye, Shantz, and Jamison). All voice parts were present for one round of My Wild Irish Rose, but after all the pizza (supplied by Doc) and ice cream topped with fruit (supplied by Jim) we were mostly content to sit and listen to the eleven best quartets in the world compete for top honors. And criticize! Why did State Line Grocery and Storm Front use THIS venue to criticize the new judging rules? And fly in the face of them with long periods of non-singing?

We were worried at 7 pm when the webcast didn't start, until we realized I had forgotten it started at 7 pm CDT. Award-winning Doren McTaggart gave away the emcee role to a groaner. Most of us liked OC Times, Crossroads (Mike Slamka's new quartet), Metropolis (with old PIO members Bob Hartley and Brian Philbin), and Glory Days. Bob Butcher nailed the top two – OC Times and

Crossroads. The next three were surprises – State Line Grocery, Redline, and Old School.

In addition, did you know about Art Lane being inducted into the PROBE Hall of Honor?

Also here's a report from quartet Chordiology bass and blogger Dave Spizarny.

Every once in a while Rob has a great idea, and Saturday evening was a once in that while, as Rob (and Greg Humbel) put together a webcast party for the International Quartet Finals at the Duderstadt Center where Rob works (at the University of Michigan). Big screens, good sound, pizza, munchies, and other refreshments go together as well as singing barbershop goes with watching barbershop, so I knew that we were in for a fun night. After all, how often can you listen to 11 different high quality quartets in one night? Once a year is the right answer......hopefully someone will explain it to the baritones.

The group met at 6:30 for some fellowship and singing, as well as some chorus contest watching, while I waited for what we were all waiting for, the quartet finals. We watched three different chorus sets, and just to prove how bad I am at names, I'm going to call them the winners, the second placers, and the penguins. I'm only going to make some general comments, because I don't want to start Barbershop Wars, as I'm not sure that the force is actually with me.

First, the 'Penguins'. Amazing doesn't seem to do it, but it's what comes to mind right now. These were the fish guys from a previous contest, so I guess the fish have evolved into penguins – very entertaining penguins, I might add.

Will they climb another rung in the evolutionary ladder next year, perhaps singing as some lower form of mammal? Hey, how about a chorus of baritones? Or is that taking a step down the ladder? (As Jim Carey pleaded when he was that green guy, "Somebody stop

Pride and humility. A remarkable com-

bination for a remarkable event, don't you think?

Fall 2008 Convention Preperations



2008 Fall Pioneer District Convention is October 17-19. Fall Competition determines which quartet will be District Quartet Champs and which chorus will be Pioneer District Chorus International Representatives. Only quartets who haven't won Quartet Champ in the past are eligible. All choruses are eligible as International Reps.

SPECIAL HOTEL NOTICE by Roger Lewis

Because of some changes to McCamly Plaza Hotel, and there is another small convention in the hotel (who was booked before we were), there are limited sleeping rooms and hospitality rooms. Here is the situation:

McCamly Plaza Hotel

The 16th floor hospitality rooms will be open Saturday night. The largest room is the McCamly Room (the old restaurant), and the District Hospitality room will be there, hosted by DOC. Food will also be in this room, plus a cash bar.

The former bar is the Hamblin Room, and Macomb County will be in this room.

The former cigar bar is the Jackson Room, and Battle Creek (host chapter) will be in this room.

The Miller room, in the plaza area, may be available. There will be no room charge, and a cash bar is required. Not sure if we can bring in our own food, but it's negotiable.

The rooms on the 6th and 8th floors that we used for hospitality in the spring are remodeled into sleeping room, and are not available for hospitality.

The Presidential suite on the 14th floor is used by the other convention.

We will still have the second floor for the Dis-

trict President and the judges.

Holiday Inn Select:

CONVENTION REGISTRATION

Members need to pay their All-events Convention registrations. \$25 in advance or \$30 at the door. Early registration must be received no later than Sep. 26, 2008 for \$25 price. Pioneer Treasurer Robb Smith, "You can still mail registrations to me, but (after Sep. 26th) the price is \$30.00. Registrations I receive after I have completed the paperwork will be taken to the on-site registration to be printed. Remember to allow for the mailing time. 

In regards to Ebiz, here is where we stand: ebiz.barbershop.org. Login troubles are the biggest deterrent right now. Please read carefully how you can bypass this, WITHOUT having to contact us. (that said, PLEASE DO contact us if you must! We're glad to help.)

There is a brand new feature, which will allow you to click on forgot User ID or Password, enter your 6-digit Member Number, and then click a link to send you your Activation Code.

This Activation Code IS NOT YOUR PASS-WORD, but is your Password Hint answer. When you put that Activation Code into this spot on the webpage, then click Submit,

you THEN CREATE a new password. (see the screen-shot below)

Provide a Chapter with ideas on how to build a performance resume and to build a larger fan base and roster to pull from to make future events more successful.

Show people how to utilize the FREE yet powerful recording software Audacity to rehearse without having to meet with your chorus or quartet and thus not missing a "beat" (hey, I thought it was cute). Or how to simply utilize it to record yourself singing with a learning tracks and learn your part. Chordiology has used this to sing one part, email it to the next Chordiologist have them record their part with it and then send it on to the next member, et cetera, until you have a full quartet singing the song without ever having met to sing it. Visit www.Audacity.com and Rob at Rob@Chordiology.com would be a great person to contact for additional information.

Talk about multi-track recorders and vocal mics for recording or performing such as the SM-58 or the SM-57 depending what you are trying to accomplish. For more information on the multi-track recorders Rob would be the best contact and on the mics, Paul would be the best suited.

Anyway you get the idea.

As you can see, the potential for ideas is possibly endless. What it again comes down to is "How can we help?". We understand that we will not be able to accommodate every request, but we'll do our level best. So bring on the ideas and let us know. Did the last quartet competition have you all geared up about the future of the Pioneer District? How would YOU like to be a part of that future? Have you always wanted to get up on the contest stage (or get back on it), but don't have a quartet?

Well, now you DO! Chordiology is offering to sing on the contest stage this October with ANY man that would like to, but doesn't have a quartet.

Think about it! Think about what it would be like to enjoy the rush of being introduced in a quartet and walking out from behind the curtains, to live out all of the fun that goes along with being on the stage with a true barbershop crowd behind you every moment of the way and enjoying all of their supportive applause, to hear the music you are making being amplified throughout the auditorium, to see your face up on the big screen (and don't forget that you can even get the video of it), and to enjoy the camaraderie that takes place between the quartets behind the scenes both beforehand and afterward! --- This could be and should be YOU!

We're not aware of this ever having been done in Pioneer before, and you may have some questions, so we have created a "Q&A Section of Sorts" to help and explain a little bit about becoming a "Contest Chordiologist":

Q&A Section of Sorts

Comment: "This is really different."

Response: "It's supposed to be different.

Our goal is to see more people enjoying singing and quarteting at convention than ever before, and this will be a great way to get that started."

Comment: "But, I'm a chorus man."

Response: "Great! We don't want to take anyone away from chorus singing. Choruses are vital to our District, and to our Society. But, did you know that quartet singers are among the most sought after chorus members in the Society? Ask your director about this phenomenon. So join us in the fun and raise your chorus member 'stock'. Be careful though, you may soon find yourself moved to the front row in your Chorus!"

Question: "But, won't there be additional costs at the convention if sing on the stage?"

Answer: "Nope. If you register for convention and are a member in good standing there are no additional fees for entering the quartet competition.

A registration is the same price whether you chose to sit in the auditorium, or join some friends on stage and sing. So increase your 'fun to finances' factor and join in!"

Comment: "But, I'm worried about our scores."

Response: "Nothing to fear. All scores will be non-published and for evaluation only. No stress. No worries. The only one that will know your score is you, that is, unless you want to share it with others. It's all about the fun and camaraderie of singing and quarteting. Yes, we always want to sing well, but it's more about just enjoying the quarteting experience!"

Question: "By the way, what does the term 'Contest Chordiologist' mean?"

Answer: "Well, strictly interpreted the term Chordiologist means a person that studies "barbershop chords". So a Contest Chordiologist is someone that studies those barbershop chords for the purpose of singing them on the contest stage and having a lot of fun while doing it!"

Comment: "But, I might sing a wrong note."

Response: "Hey, nothing we haven't done."

Comment: "But, I'm left handed."

Response: "Now, you're just looking for excuses. You know you want to sign up, but are not sure how it all would work. Trust us. We'll get you the information you will need. And just for the record we will not discriminate based on your dominant hand preference or any other criterion for that matter. I mean, look at the four of us. Clearly we aren't picky."

Comment and a Question: "I'm intrigued and want to learn more. What do I do next?"

Response: "GREAT! Read below!"

What To Do Next?

- * After you send us the email you will be teamed up with at least 2 members of Chordiology in your quartet. 





For more than half a century he has been the soul, spirit and guiding life force of the Grosse Pointe Chapter and one of the greatest and most powerful voices of the Pioneer District. I could fill many paragraphs list-

A Real Champion Tribute To A Barbershop Hero

It would take reams of paper to allow just the people within the barbershop community to explain what Russ Seely meant to them. To the brethren of singers he was many formal things, President, Director, Champion and Leader, but to them he was also a father, brother, and friend.

To me he was "Papa Russ" and our relationship started by pure happenstance back in 1988. I was fresh out of college and working in downtown Detroit setting rates for Blue Cross' Chrysler account. Each day I would pack my lunch and walk across the street to eat it somewhere in the Renaissance Center. There was nothing really remarkable about my mid-day jaunts over to the 300 Tower of the "Ren Cen", until the day I met Russ.

Like other days, I sat down and began unpacking my lunch when I heard this beautiful music being sung. It was bouncing off the unusual lines of the tower's cement walls so it was difficult to tell where it was coming from. I left my lunch on the balustrade and followed my ears. I turned the last corner and saw just four guys making all of this music. I was enthralled. I was indeed the proverbial "portly kid in a candy store". I couldn't get enough of it. I listened to song after song. I got to talk to the guys at the end of the first song. Russ answered eager ques-

tion after eager question of mine. Yes, I went to college and high school, but neither had any music programs to speak of. I grew up in a farming community and my high school gym teacher was also the music teacher. In college I went to a technical college in Sault Sainte Marie (Lake Superior State) where the focus was on engineering, mathematics, science and hockey which was also the closest thing we had to "the arts" at the time. So, getting to hear music like this being performed right in front of me was something like I had never seen nor heard and I was absolutely thrilled.

I alternated between not being able to wait to hear the next song and not being able to wait to ask my next question. And Russ obliged me at every turn. As I said, I met each of the men in the quartet including Russ' son Matt, but Russ stuck out from the others not only because he was singing lead, but because he was supremely confident (and if you weren't sure on this point you could have just asked him - he'd have told you), direct, engaging, and most of all sincere. It was clear to me right then and there that he had a real passion for his hobby and he told me about all of these different places that people met to learn to sing this "barbershop" music. He said they called them "Chapter meetings" and that there was a chapter that met right in Ypsilanti (adiacent to Ann Arbor) where I was living at the time and said that I should check them out. Wow! Right in my home

town. I couldn't believe my luck! They sang a few more songs and then Russ invited me to join them in getting something to eat. "EAT!! What time is it?", I said. They gave me the time and not only was I late, but I also hadn't eaten a bite of my lunch as it was still sitting somewhere several corridors away. I was so enthralled with Russ and his music that I lost all track of time. I look back on that day and think again about how kind he was to this young kid that was wide-eyed and so green behind the gills when it came to singing and music. I am so thankful for that day and as you can imagine, I will never forget it.

I got back home and could not find the Huron Valley Harmonizers as they weren't listed in the phone book and this new-fangled thing called the Internet was only just starting up so no real information was to be found on them. But, as luck would have it not too many months later, I happened to catch the Huron Valley Harmonizers performing a Christmas set in the center of a mall in Ann Arbor. I remembered what Russ had told me about these "Chapter Meetings" and I couldn't wait for the last song so I could talk to someone and find out where they meet.

Then the last song came and one of the gentleman (Lyle Hanson) stepped forward and said, "If there are any men out there that would like to learn to sing this style of music just stop up and talk to one of us, we won't bite." Remembering the music I heard Russ singing, I couldn't get up there fast enough. And quite honestly, I wouldn't have cared if they did bite. I was going to learn to sing barbershop!!!

That day, I met my other barbershop mentor, Kelly Brummett. Kelly asked if I could sing, and really I had no clue as it had alwavs been a real struggle for me to sing if someone was singing different notes than I was singing. Kelly was not dissuaded by my misgivings and grabbed 2 of the other guys from 'Smorgaschord' (Dave Conrad and Steve Heald) and he taught me the "Sleepy Time" tag. I did my best to glom onto my two solitary notes in the tag. When we made it through the series of chords Kelly told me how good it was and although I'm not sure on the point, I am sure that I was hooked! I wanted to sing barbershop and I wanted to sing in a quartet! Little did I know that in the not too distant future that I would be singing lead in Chordiology with Kelly Brummet singing tenor, Rob Pettigrew singing baritone and that "Long Drink of Water", Dave Spizarny, singing bass --- and all this thanks to Russ' prompting.

Year after year Chordiology would go to Convention and it was always exciting for me to see Russ there. And even though Russ was revered by many and also was one of the Big Men on Campus, he always had time for me and always remembered our conversation that day in the Ren Cen. He would ask how I was, would want to hear a song and would always be so complimentary. And I could tell that he took joy in seeing me having the time of my life. And I'm also quite sure in the beginning that he recognized that I had no clue what I was doing. I always wanted to sing my best for Russ as he was the man that I looked up to the most in barbershop. He was my barbershop dad. It was great to sing for him as he would always listen intently, and much like a father would he'd compliment me and give me well-placed suggestions of things that I could work on to improve so I could get just that much better. I always looked forward to his suggestions and really took them to heart. Because of who he was to me, there was no greater authority in barbershop than Russ.

As much as I looked forward to singing for Russ and receiving his nuggets of wisdom in return, I looked forward even more to seeing him sing lead in a quartet. You couldn't take your eyes off of the guy. Heck, he wouldn't let you! He was the consummate showman. People would always say, "When you sing lead, you have to command that stage". Now I'm still not completely certain what it is that you have to have to command the stage, but whatever it is Russ had it in spades!

Time went on, as time has want to do, and Chordiology continued to have a great time singing together and in between laughs and jokes we worked at this tough thing called singing. Cliff Dake had joined the guartet and we were actually a 5 man quartet for a while and we really thought we were getting somewhere when we lost Kelly to a short, but hard fought battle with cancer. It was tough but we picked ourselves up and began plugging away at it again. We saw Russ at convention and he was so supportive and gave me a hug like I was family and expressed how sorry he was to hear about Kelly and expressed how pleased he was to see us still singing.

After this we took a couple of years off from competition, but when we came back, Russ was right there in the lobby as if he had been waiting there for us. We hadn't done much more than walked through the door when he hit us with a barrage of about four or five heartfelt insults as to where we'd been and why we hadn't been around lately.

For those of you that knew Russ, know that he never picked on anyone he didn't like and the more cutting they were, the more he cared about you, so I was always proud when I received a good healthy dose of Russ' ribbing. After he had roasted us so we were good and toasty, he referenced that night's contest and said "Now, give 'em heck boys!" But, of course it wasn't "heck" that he said.

Well, we sang our Friday night set and we felt pretty good about it and then in the hallway outside of the auditorium I got the best compliment I'd ever received for singing. Russ found us and came up to me, looked me square in the eyes, gave me several light fatherly taps on the face with his open right hand and said, "Good job, kid. Real --- good --- job." I was on cloud 9. Or was it cloud 10? I had just received the best compliment that I could have imagined from my barbershop hero. Although I never told this to anyone, I played that compliment over and over in my head and found a place in my memory to frame it. For me, it was the highest honor that I could ever receive for singing.

After singing Saturday night, out of the group of great quartets that had sung, our name was the last to be called off. We had won. But it was like the evening had been set up by an out of work writer of Hollywood scripts that had written one too many cliche Hollywood endings. We had won on the 10th anniversary of The Detroit Sound Company's win (one of the many quartets that Kelly sang lead in while he was a Chordiology member) and we had received the exact same score to the point as they did. But the irony didn't stop there. The moon and planets decided to align themselves in just the right formation to allow things to come full circle for me, because when we were invited to join the OCA on the stage the man directing the QCA chorus was none other than Russ Seely. The man that had given me the gift of music in a chance meeting almost 20 years prior. Russ Seely --- my mentor --- my barbershop father --- my hero --- my friend.

I'd never sung with more intensity, more passion, more fervor, more commitment, or more pride than I did that night when I sang for Papa Russ. I have a picture of me singing behind Russ as he was "sending" those last chords out to the audience and I will always cherish this picture and am thankful for the person that sent it to me.

And all this would not have been possible if a knowledgeable barbershop sage hadn't taken the time to answer the questions of a wide-eyed kid that loved a cappella on that

day 20 years ago. Russ was never too busy to spread the word of barbershop or to encourage others.

I was always thankful to Russ for getting me into barbershop and in singing in general and I told him so almost every time I saw him. But this year in several hospitality suites after the contest I was able to share my story of thankfulness for Russ having taken the time with me at the Ren Cen and of what he had done for me in sharing the joy of song and how he had mentored me over the years. In one suite, Russ was in the room. I acknowledged him as my barbershop hero, my mentor and my friend. I couldn't begin to capture that moment in writing, but suffice it to say that we were both found ourselves with "something in our eyes" and this was the only time I ever saw Russ Seely actually speechless.

Russ and I were supposed to have lunch together this week to talk about new ideas for promoting quarteting in the District. I was looking forward to having time with Russ. I looked forward to more nuggets of knowledge and fatherly advice. I looked forward to hearing what he thought and how I could do just a little bit better. And in turn I looked forward to giving Russ tickets to this Saturday Night's show, a show that we had developed to spread the word of a cappella singing to a non-barbershop audience. I think he would have been proud. This Saturday night, those tickets will still be sitting at the "will call" window for Russ. If there is a means, if there is a way, if there is a loophole in the cosmos, I hope Russ will find a way to watch me sing for him.

In Russ' absence, I hope someday to become just a hint of the mentor that he was to me even if it's to only one person. And, over time, if I accomplish that, I will feel that I have truly accomplished something worthy of Russ' approval. And if I succeed, when I see him again I hope that Papa Russ will find me, look me square in the eyes, give me those light fatherly taps on the face and say to me one more time, "Good job, kid. Real ---good --- job."

MI Brigade May 2009

The Harmony Brigade has been around for awhile now (the North Carolina Harmony Brigade is 15 years old) but has recently received a lot of attention including a cover page write-up in the Barbershop Harmony Society's publication The Harmonizer's July 2007 issue article called Extreme Quartetting.

It's described as 'extreme quartetting'. Everyone arrives to a Brigade rally fully versed in about 10 preselected songs, are teamed up with strangers, and then with little or no practice time together sing one song in competition.

There are 3 affiliates including one in nearby Indiana. A 4th is being organized here in Michigan and generating a lot of buzz in the State. The 1st Michigan Harmony Brigade Rally was scheduled for May 2008. I heard at Pioneer District's 2007 Spring Competition that you could sign up as early as then on their MIHB.org website. Music was expected to be distributed around December 2007 but then the announcement was made that, "We have decided to postpone from the May 2008 date in order to provide the best possible product for all participants." With that the first rally date was postponed one year to May 2009.

Here is the announcement...

Many of you have been inquiring about a variety of points regarding where things stand on the inaugural rally for a Michigan Harmony Brigade (location, dates, music, etc.)

At this time, we've decided that it would be better to reschedule the inaugural event from the original plan of May 2008.

For those that haven't had the pleasure of attending a brigade, quite a number of things have to be arranged in advance (hotel accommodations, 3-4 meals for 120 men, a venue for a Saturday evening chorus performance to the general public, music (Continued page 35)

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selections, associated arrangers fees, copyright royalties, CDs, etc.). Ticket and Ad Sales

Myth #4 \$18 is too much money. Too much money for what? A tank of gas?

When selling you have to communicate to the buyer the VALUE of what your selling. 18 dollars is 18 dollars. \$18 for a

hamburger is not a good value, \$18 for a tank of gas is a good value. The tried and true way of doing this is to break down the components of what is being purchased. In our case I would start with the chapter chorus. We are a very good singing chorus that is working very hard to give the customer every bit of his money's worth. We are the reigning district champions. We are worth coming to see all by ourselves. Emphasize the fact that we draw large crowds

Next is our chapter quartets, each of which is

throughout the year, all by ourselves. (We

had hundreds at the Lake Lansing Park).

doing a mini-show of their best stuff. These quartets are hired by community groups to come and perform and your customer can see both them and the chorus, each a value in their own right for one price.

But wait, there's more! Our Headline Quartet, Nightwatch, is an national known comedy quartet. They are energetic and hilarious.

But that's not all! All this high powered, energetic, thoroughly rehearsed and professionally performed entertainment is brought to you from the most comfortable, and best designed venue in the Greater Lansing area-The Warton Center. Only the best groups get to perform there.

By the time you are done, your customer should think the ticket price a bargain for all that they will get, and truthfully, I think it is. I've asked some of our seasoned members if they have ever had anyone say that they thought the shows in the past were not worth the ticket price, and the answer has been no. So sell value.

With only about five weeks left until our show,we're seeing that ticket sales are not moving nearly as fast as we want. Don Horton gave a 10 minute presentation on how to SELL more tickets. Our chapter budget is approximately \$35,000 per year and the Wharton Show is our main source of income. In order to maintain the level of expenditures we have enjoyed, such as having our ticket to contest paid by the chapter, paying for coaching, sending members to Harmony College and COTS, buying music, etc. etc. etc. which ALL member benefit from, we need to sell another 500 to 1000 tickets between now and show time. If each chapter member sold 10 to 20 more tickets in the next 5 weeks over and above what you have already sold, we could raise another \$10,000 to \$15,000. Current ticket sales are only slightly above our show production expenses.

Don presented a plan and a challenge that he used successfully a few years back, which was the only time this chapter ever sold out the Wharton. Don discussed the fact that SALES are made by personal contact with prospects and that most sales are made on the 3rd or 4th time you ask for the order.

The challenge was presented to each member to make a prospect list of 25 names and phone number (see attached work sheet).

Call these people the first time and tell them about the show, the date time etc. Normally they have to talk it over with their spouse (but they seldom call you back) So, you make the next (second) call. They normally admit they forgot to discuss it with their spouse but they typically will promise to do that and call you back. They normally don't call you so you have to make call number three, and occasionally a fourth call. Usually, on the second or third call they will tell you they have another commitment that night or they will place an order for some tickets. If they only order two, suggest they invite some friends to go with them. Many times they will call you back and order more.

Don calls it the 20/3/20 Challenge: Call 20 people 3 times and you'll sell 20 or more tickets.

Don has asked each man in the chapter to accept the challenge and collectively (as a team) we can put more people in the audience which is more FUN for us to sing to. It will also put more dollars in the chapter treasury so we can continue to enjoy the current level of expenditures. One thing Don forgot to mention is that it may help to break it down by weeks so it does not seem to be so overwhelming.

Make 5 calls each week along the follow up calls as needed. Every man should feel the excitement of the show, the responsibility to learn the music and sell tickets for the show to reach it optimum success. Don gave us a handout to help us have the necessary tools for success in selling. Get excited before you dial. Enthusiasm sells.

Prepare a positive mental attitude.

As you make your calls, consider the following to build a good positive attitude as to "why" people (your friends, neighbors, coworkers, relatives) may want to attend our show "Have Harmony Will Travel".

- 1. You joined the Barbershoppers for fun & fellowship. Are you fulfilling that desire?
- 2. You enjoy singing and you want to share your hobby and talents with others. (Like the person your calling)
- 3. You heard a barbershop chorus or quartet

or both before and you liked it.

- 4. Remember the thrill of competition or your first show? Get that excited when your selling tickets.
- 5. Remember how good you looked and felt and how proud you were in your new tux!!! Show this enthusiasm when making your calls.
- 6. Let your friends and neighbors know you've got something you're happy about sharing with them
- 7. The Wharton center is beautiful & has GREAT acoustics and virtually no bad seats. If they have been there before they know this. If not, encourage them to come one time and see if they agree!
- 8. The Chorus which you belong to has vastly improved over the past year We Are currently the 2007 District Champions and you want to share your talents with them.

Remember 80%-90% of our audience comes because they want to see their friend or relative perform. Sure they will be impressed with our headliners but they are really coming to see you.

9. Our talent is come of the best in the world. Our Guest Quartet is a great comedy quartet called "Nightwatch".

They are past Buckeye Invitational Comedy Quartet Champions.

10. Our shows are strictly family entertainment. Bring mom, dad,grandma, grandpa, and all the kids.

The Show is March 8, 2008, 7:30 p.m. To Beat the Rush for Parking they should be in their seats by about 7:00 p.m. Suggest they ask friends, neighbors, and co-workers etc. to come to the show with them. Maybe even go out to dinner prior to the show.



High-Tech Tips Singing In The 21st Century

Many quartets and choruses use Learning Tapes or CD's to help them learn a song. Chordiology has been doing that for years now. We especially love any Learning CD put out by Tim Waurick, and we think we've learned to sing better, not just learned the notes, by listening to Tim sing and

trying to match him. Nearly all of the learning tracks available through the Music Premiere series (available through the Society barbershop.org) over the last couple of years have been produced by Tim, in addition to the tracks available through his website www.timtracks.com

But there are a couple of more "geeky" things we're doing.

Audacity

If you are not familiar with the Audacity software here is a rundown of what the software is, how much it costs (by the way Chordiology will be picking up the cost of this software for ANY-ONE that would like a legal copy), and how it can be most effectively utilized by anyone regardless of their technical abilities.

Recording software allows us to individually record ourselves singing along with a learning track, and then we send those recordings around to each other for comments. We use Audacity from audacity.sourceforge. net to do this, but nearly any audio editing application can do the trick, as long as it can play and record at the same time. We like Audacity because it's FREE and works on Mac and on Windows. It does a lot of things,

but we really just use it for recording. With this software you will never miss another rehearsal!

Audacity is very powerful and best of all its FREE TO EVERYONE!!! And given that it is free, again C4 is more than happy to pick up all of the costs for purchasing this free software. :) It allows you to pull in LEGAL learning tracks and then do all of the things that you would normally like to do such as listening to your part solo'd, part predominant or missing from the mix altogether allowing you to sing in a "quartet" environment.

However, with Audacity, you can now take your rehearsing several steps further. With any kind of microphone plugged into your computer, you can now record yourself singing along with those tracks. You then can replay your "performance" and determine what area(s) you'd like to work on in your next "performance". You can rehearse in either a "quartet" or in a "sectional" mode for hours on end with no scheduling conflicts!

And there's more. Now when you're done, you can then email it out to others to either listen to or allow them to record their part along with yours. If you do this, congratulations! You

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may have just had your first "virtual rehearsal"

You need to have a microphone that you can hook up to your computer (either through the Line In port, or if you're really fancy you can buy a USB microphone), and some headphones so you can hear what's being played without playing it over your computer speakers (where it might get picked up by your microphone). Paul uses a nifty USB headphone/mic set. Open the learning track in Audacity, press "R" to start recording and it will play the learning track and you can sing along and record yourself. Press the space bar to stop recording. You can play around with switching the Left/Right balance so you can hear yourself singing with the trio, or singing along with just your voice part. The latter is a really good way to see how well you've learned your part -- are you singing all those pitches just like the guy on the learning track? For me, this is equal parts "immensely valuable" and "exceptionally depressing".

There are many good tutorials for Audacity available from the Audacity web site. It's fairly intuitive and among the most downloaded software in the country! Again, Audacity is a very powerful, very useful and very FREE tool!

*If you're using Audacity to export MP3 files, you'll need to download an additional file. The link for the file is available through Audacity link or Chordiology.com

The Truth Machine

We use Audacity outside of rehearsals to learn our parts and to get feedback from the other guys on how we're singing. During quartet rehearsal, too, we're recording ourselves fairly regularly. To do this, we purchased an audio interface device that lets us connect up to eight microphones (yes, we only use four) and send the signal into a computer where we use audio recording software to capture each channel (each microphone) separately. Then we can play it back as many times as we'd like, listening to all four parts together, or dropping out one or more of the parts to isolate individual voice parts to find where we're having problems.

This is by far one of the most useful things we've started doing in the last few years. So many times, we have been practicing a tune and thought, "There's something wrong with that chord", but we just can't figure out what it is. Recording this way lets us go back and really examine a section, down to individual voice parts, and see where the trouble is. At the end of a rehearsal, we can email the good recordings to the group.


It's another one of those "valuable depressing" things. Every scooped interval, flat pitch, and flubbed word is right there, crystal clear and waiting for each of your buddies to hear. No matter how well you think you sang it, there's gonna be something embarrassing in there, I guarantee. At one of our rehearsals this summer, we were getting a little goofy and slap-happy over some of the things we were finding in our recordings, and the entire rehearsal came to a rollicking, laughing collapse when we replayed

a part where one guy muffed some words which came out as "I water myself"... It was at least twenty minutes before any of us could compose ourselves long enough to sing a single chord. For ten bucks, I'll tell you who it was. For twenty bucks, Cliff, I won't tell them it was you...

The device we purchased is an Alesis iO|26 (pictured above). As I mentioned, it has eight microphone inputs (XLR or Phono), and connects to your computer via a FireWire cable. Looking at the Alesis web site now, it does appear they also have a similar device with only four inputs (the iO|14), which would probably work for a quartet and would be cheaper than what we got -- it costs about \$200. As an added bonus, both devices have MIDI jacks so you can connect a MIDI keyboard to a computer to use it with music notation software if you wish.

Any multi-track audio recording software will work with this device. Cubase LE is the application that comes with it (Mac and Windows). I already knew how to use GarageBand (Mac only), so that's what we normally use during rehearsals. Unfortunately, as far as we can tell, Audacity doesn't do simultaneous multi-track recording. We have four Shure Beta 58 mics, and mic stands. We plug speakers into the Speaker Out port on the computer, so we can listen to our recordings.

Recording ourselves -- individually outside of rehearsal, and as a group during rehearsal -- has improved our ability to find problem spots. Painful as it can be, hilarious as it can be, that's what we do.



Blogging Pioneer

Pioneer is a relatively small District with members throughout Michigan and the Ontario boarder. We don't have a big internet footprint but still a respectable public online presence of official publications such as with the Troubadour PioneerDistrict.org/ Troubadour, the 2007 PROBE editor awarded Pontiac-Waterford Smoke Signals www. BigChiefChorus.org the Detroit-Oakland HiNotes Newsletter (no archive) www.Harmonize.com/doc/doc.htm the Grand Rapids GLC News and photo albums GreatLakesChorus.org and the Lansing Woodshedder Weekly CapitolCityChordsmen.org All very informative with official reports and area news put together by hard working and dedicated members.

And now we have a new resource. If you

want an informal first person account and not just for a chorus but also quartetting, not just for a Chapter but throughout the District, if you want to take a real pulse for the health of barbershopping then read the missionary work by 2007 Pioneer District Champions Chordiology.

Follow their spread of the barbershop brotherhood under their new mantel as District Champs that they're reporting in their online blog they started last Fall.

They've written stories and provided insights for Uncle Sam Night in Windsor Canada, Canada Night hosted by Detroit-Oakland Chapter, COTS in Lansing, their home Chapter Huron Valley, a Chapter show in Monroe, a Chapter show in Wayne, the District

competition in Battle Creek, and they're only halfway into the year.

The Chordiology members contribute to the blog but Dave writes the lion's share as well as edits and posts the pics with the snappy captions. The writing style is the same entertaining wit and humor that the quartet displays in it's act on stage. They also cover many practical matters such as warm-up techniques, rehearsal tips with multitrack mixers and new recording software. They talk about coping with judge's critiques and even provide ideas for resolving quartet disagreements.

Saturday, November 10, 2007 A Moving And Reflective Rehearsal (Dave) "If we still don't agree, then we go around the table again, mirroring what was said in a respectful way. If you use this strategy, you will be amazed at how often the heat comes out of any argument. Then, after all the discussions, after all the listening, after all the mirroring, we do whatever Paul wants."

They also bring moments of poignant reflection talking about their loss of Chordiology member Kelly Brummett to cancer and the recent death of their Chapter Director Paul Hansen.

They have been reporting frequently, usually weekly. It's intended as a temporary project with Chordiology retiring the blog with the next District Champs but I hope it doesn't end there. This will be a rich record of a year in Pioneer from a quartet's eyes as they travel the District. Read it, visit often for the latest news, and support the guys who are out there supporting us.

Monday, October 29, 2007 Monday Morning Thoughts (Dave), "I sat down next to a stranger to watch the chorus competition. In between choruses, this guy I never met before leaned toward me and said, 'We've missed you guys on the stage the past couple years. I'm glad you're back'. He was so sincere that I believed him, and I was flabbergasted that anyone could miss our 6th place performances. Then it hit me, he's a barbershopper. The amazing brotherhood, the unending good will, the appreciation that we have of this very difficult craft is remarkable. And it really is sincere. That guys could 'miss' our 6th place efforts says a lot about our society, our district, and our members."



Getting Your Group Online

For fun I was blogging our chapter, posting photos and reports about our rehearsals and shows. Like most blogs it had very little traffic and was mostly just my personal barbershop music log, weblog, blog. Then I was approached by my Grand Rapids Chapter and now we have a new official website for the Great Lakes Chorus and there's even an online version of the Pioneer District's publication of the Troubadour (nicknamed e-Troub).

OK, so that sounds cool but what good is it, would you want it, and how would you get it?

- 1. Audience
- 2. Features
- 3. Webmaster
- 4. Server
- 5. Domain Name
- 6. Software
- 7. Web design
- 1. Audience. Who's your audience and what do you want to accomplish? For the internet if your looking just to keep members updated then email or an email newsgroup will work well and is free. The Grand Rapids Chapter has all the member email addresses on a Yahoo newsgroup with weekly automated rehearsal reminders and the rehearsal report Chorus Notes by Chorus Manager John Trestrail. But if you want to put a shingle out for the cyberspace public to see for learning about your group and activities then you want a website.
- 2. Features. There are several levels of online presence. I've made up these distinctions but they seem to encompass what you will generally see.
- a. Contact Page. the most basic website is just a Contact page with your group's photo, location, and contact info. It requires very little expertise or maintenance. But it's usefulness and traffic is limited. A visitor might view it only once and not return. It's essentially an online flyer.
- b. Plus Event's Calendar. Next level is a site that also provides an Events Calendar. It can either have just a simple list of scheduled performances for the year or a little trickier

using software with some kind of calendar like pages. This requires some maintenance for updating events. It gets a little more repeat visit traffic by fans tracking upcoming performances and audiences confirming show times.

- c. Plus Public Relations. A full blown website with multiple pages like the group's history, a page about the group, a page how to join, a newsletter, etc. By including current photos, audio, and video clips this encourages visitors to explore the site. This gives prospective members, audiences, and clients a more complete picture of your group. Plus it's a nice morale boost for member's able to see photos of their recent shows and share with family and friends. This means an online photo album and considerably more time spent in website maintenance.
- d. Plus Marketing. Providing online ticket orders for attending shows, online forms to contract the group like for Singing Valentines, music CDs and any other merchandise. Lots of Maintenance for this too.
- 3. Webmaster. If your hiring a professional webmaster they should be able to set up any website feature level (provided the server is equipped for it). The upside is usually a professional and reliable site. One downside is expense. I haven't priced it myself since I had no money to spend anyways but I got a friend who charges minimum \$1,700, but I assume there are prices both lower and much higher. Another downside is maintenance. Typically once your website is set up (Continued page 39)

it can be tough to get a webmaster to update it in a timely manner. And your group still may be expected to maintain things that require frequent updates such as a photo album.

Using a chorus member provides easier access to the webmaster but not always more reliable website maintenance. In either case having two webmasters with at least one from your group as maintenance backup might be helpful.

If thinking of using a chorus member as webmaster their level of expertise will be a big part in determining the website features. For just a Contact page a simple documents program can be used. Most computer users are familiar with document programs like Microsoft Word which may already be available on their system. Word is not only good for composing letters but for flyers as well, just like in a Contact page. It's saved as an html file for a web page instead of doc file as a printable document.

The Calendar page level can be added in the same way and Word can produce web links connecting the two pages. Some sites also combine the two pages on one.

If your using a group member for a webmaster then going much beyond the Contact and Calendar pages they will need to be VERY computer savvy and prepared for the steep learning curve and time. I have to say when I made the leap from simple blogging to webmaster it was a lot of work but rewarding. The exposure it has provided the group and access to the public has proven to be a significant contribution. Many of these features do require considerable maintenance, updates, and time. A photo album can be very time consuming so if this duty can be split between the group's webmaster and a photographer that would be helpful but in my experience they are often the same person.

4. Server. The IP/ISP (Internet Service Provider) is the company you use to get online using your cable tv lines, phone lines, or some area wireless provider. But a SERVER is the company that hosts your website, allowing internet users to access your website online which is stored on the server's own computer system.

Many chapters and quartets are using the server Harmonize.com It's a fairly basic setup with a few feature limitations. It's generously provided for free to any barbershop music group by Steve DiNino from the 2002 Silver Medalist quartet Uptown Sound out of Ohio.

For a server with additional services like email, running of certain software for music or forms, and to pick or reuse your own domain name Harmonize.com/services. html recommends Virtual Creations, "A web development and hosting company run by Mark Virtue, a Barbershopper singing with Sydney Harmony and Ignition quartet, and provides commercial hosting solutions for many Barbershop groups." I believe Virtual Creations' prices start around \$60 per year. www.virtualcreations.com.au/

Our chorus website is using the server ipower.com The cost is \$70 a year and comes with many useful features but their tech support right now is spotty at best.

The Pioneer District website and online Troubadour publication are using server space donated by Matthew Tipton, the Pioneer District Director of Music & Performance, lead with Macomb County Chapter's Guardians of Harmony Chorus and the quartet Border Crossing.

The Pioneer District website was designed and is managed by District Webmaster Steve Sutherland, Musical Director of the Detroit-Oakland Gentlemen Songsters and baritone for the quartet Night Shift.

www.harmonize.com/NightShift/ Night_Shift.htm

5. Domain Name. This is your web address, your url, what you type into your browser to get to the website, like PioneerDistrict.org for the PioD website. Many server websites have a search feature allowing you to type in a domain name you would like and it will tell you if it's available.

Don't be surprised if your first choice is taken. A small yearly fee of about \$7 is required to purchase and maintain your domain name.

6. Software. If doing your website in-house your going to want to use some real website editing software, I think a popular one right now is FrontPage. Or if your adventurous and have no budget (like me) there's all kinds of free software (freeware) online. Some are no good and some come with trial periods or limits on features that you won't find out about until after it's installed. But then your not stuck with them and you do

get to experiment with different software until you find one your happy with for free. I've been using a freeware WYSIWYG, What You See Is What You Get, (barbershoppers aren't the only ones who like long acronyms) the website editor Nvu (N-view). It's pretty bare bones.

To upload your new website online sometimes the servers with the extra features provide an interface you can use. But another useful method that is usually faster is FTP (File Transfer Protocol) software. A lot of times typing the FTP username, password, and address provided by the server into an Internet Explorer browser will work like a Windows Explorer screen to your online directory but not always or sometimes with limits. There are a lot of free FTPs but I've had trouble getting some to work with my particular system. What has been best for me so far is the freeware FTP Core Lite.

To reduce photo files sizes for online upload I use the free program Easy Thumbnails but have also heard recommended the free Fast-Stone Image Viewer. If the site doesn't come with a photo album feature then I use free program Web Album Generator.

There's all kinds of other software but these will get you up and running.

If you have any trouble using ANY software the best place for answers is the software's online forum if they have one. But even then half of the time you'll have to figure it out for yourself.

7. Web design Style. What do you want your website to look like? Best way to answer this to take a look around. Go to Harmonize.com and view all the other group's, list your favorites, then pick and choose what you like about them and try incorporating them together. If you right click on the webpage you like and from the drop down window select View Source (or however you Mac users do it) you'll actually see the code being used, then cut and paste the part you like into your editor. It doesn't hurt to also take a look at some brand name sites and see what the big money is doing. Use a template that comes with your editor or find one online either free or for a fee, or if your server provides one use their template for a starting point and add the code you like to it.

What to expect from your site. You won't see a big jump in ticket sales for shows, membership, or even website visitors. For any of that to happen the website has to be part

of a corrordinated effort. The web address has to be on your business cards, your flyers, posters, show programs, MC announcements, and any ads. Group members have to be encouraged and repeatedly reminded to forward the website address to friends and family announcing upcoming shows. Send out email announcements about the latest site updates of photos, news, etc. Combine fundraisers with online visits. Offer a draw-

ing for a free Singing Valentine for having ordered online, or have a drawing for a free barbershop telephone message for an online ticket order, etc.

Be proactive. If you never change the site then don't expect people to return. Put your next performance on the main home page and a link for a map to the location. Change the photos. Add photos to a photo album, a Newsletter, a members only page.

On a personal note. I have been blessed by a very supportive Chapter who gives me loads of attboys and they go a long way to making it all worthwhile. Our donated server guys and webmasters put in a LOT of hours and typically gets very little feedback so be sure to give them a pat on the back.

DIGITAL FORMS

There's an interesting variety of approaches of how chapters are doing Singing Valentine orders online. The three main tactics are offering contact phone numbers and/or email addresses, a combination online form and payment via phone or email, or both order and payment done online.

For the contact information a slick and easy idea is having the www.SingingValentines. com banner ad (not the one pictured here) on your home page with the default link taking you to their main information page which a visitor can then use to look up the chapter in their area. Or it's a simple matter for a webmaster to change the link to go directly to your chapter's contact page at the SV.com site.

Their pages look good done up in pink and white, hearts, information about the Singing

Valentine, and how to contact the chapter. The banner ads are available for download at the Barbershop Harmony Society's Barbershop.org site. I saw some good examples of these at Hillsdale Chapter's website http://www.geocities.com/nvance97/Barbershop. html for the SV.com main page and Huron Valley Chapter's hvharmonizers.org for their specific SV.com contact page.

A convenient online option is just a short announcement and contact information on the chapter's Home page. Or go a little fancier with a separate page set aside with this information. A nice example is at Wayne Chapter WeSingBarbershop.com website's Singing Valentine page, http://www.wesingbarbershop.com/page5.html and on Lansing Chapter's CapitolCityChordsmen.org

One combination is to order over phone or email while paying online. The e-pay method PayPal is easy to establish and a popular online payment method but another one is Google.com like being used by Macomb Chapter's GuardiansOfHarmony.org website. They've even made their own version of the Singing Valentine banner ad and linked it to a nice photo and flyer contact page.

A reversal of this approach is to order online and to make payment arrangements via phone or email like my Grand Rapids Chapter GreatLakesChorus.org website. Our form includes photos, has several days to choose from, three prices, and variable time slots. It has been tailored so when received via the email like form mail by our order guy Derek Hatley it's easy to cut and past into an Excel type program. We have a photo linked on our home page as well as set the SV.com banner ad to redirect visitors to our form.

Then there's offering the whole thing online like Kalamazoo Chapter's BarbershopHarmony.org website. Their home page has a link to a form with a neat graphic and photo and allows four time blocks for Valentine's Day and two packages to choose from.

There's the online option to use the e-pay system PayPal or to postal mail check or money order.

DIGITAL PHOTOS

Frequently the person purchasing the Singing Valentine can't be there to see their sweety's expression. So both sweethearts are usually pretty excited about getting a photo of the Valentine with the quartet. In the past we've been using Polaroid cameras both because you know quickly if the shot is good and because you can just hand it to them and not try to sort and postal mail them all after the fact. But there has been difficulty in keeping track of the chorus Polaroid cameras afterwards as well as film issues.

This year the GLC is going digital with each quartet bringing it's own digital camera instead (no cell phone cameras). The photos are to be burned to CD (preferred) or emailed to the webmaster to be loaded on the chorus website's photo album. Customers can then find their photos in the album, download, and print or email to share their fun. No having to print, sort, or snail mail photos. Last year I was taking backup photos with my digital camera and had one customer ask for the digital copy, she said she was the one wearing red. You can see what a nightmare that could quickly turn into.

If emailing, due to some email client/server limitations total email file size maximum is limited to 10M (Meg, MbPS, or megabits per second). It might be necessary to email the photos in batches. A quartet name and total photo count should be included in an email so webmaster can confirm all photos received.

A name should be assigned the quartet and told to the customer so that they may more

easily find their photos in the online album. If the quartet doesn't give me a name I'll name them after their lead like The Baribeau Quartet (Oh, I like that!)

If unable to burn or email then the webmaster will try to download at rehearsal to a laptop directly from the camera.

In my case as webmaster I'll probably have to reduce most of the photo files to be able to upload them all. I got a nice free program that does it quickly called Easy Thumbnails but have also heard recommended Fast-Stone Image Viewer.

This means more work for the webmaster (or whoever you use to upload photos) but

it's great for providing traffic to the website and gives a little more value to the customer by providing the versatility of digital copies.

Should be interesting, we'll let you know how it turned out.



What's Up With The Troub'?

Did you see the Troubadour print issue Aug/ Sep '07 with the Bush League competition invitation as the front page headline? Did you notice it was after the competition had already been held and wondered, 'what's up with that'? And what about the decline in the number of issues per year? I know I puzzled so my first job as the new Troubadour editor was to get up to speed on the wonderful world of subscription publishing.

Our previous Editor Joe Serwach and Marketing PR guy Rick Anderson have been a big help explaining it all. First thing I learned is that there's some great people who volunteer a lot of their time doing a demanding job to get the Troubadour out and deserve a tip from our collective straw hats.

As to the Bush League question there was a snafu with the membership mailing labels received from the Barbershop Harmony Society that go onto the printed copies.

When the count didn't come out right it was discovered they were the wrong labels and had to all be redone. The Troubadour apologizes to the Bush League organizers and anyone else for any inconvenience this may have caused.

But there's a bigger difficulty for the publication, money. The 'free' issues are paid for with membership dues and advertising but the cost to produce issues has been rising faster. This has caused a gradual reduction in the number of issues published per year

from 6 to 4.

And then another blow, because Pioneer District membership dues are not paid directly to the Pioneer District but through the Barbershop Harmony Society, the United States Postal Service decided to pull the Troubadour's temporary non-profit discounted 2nd Class mailing status.

What to do? Most districts have gone to using the internet to distribute publications online while reducing or eliminating entirely their printed publications. The Pioneer District leadership has expressed a desire to have printed publications available for non-internet users and for those who simply enjoy reading off paper and keeping their Troubadour library collection current. Copies of the Troubadour have been available online for some time as pdf files thanks to District Webmaster Steve Sutherland but those online copies were only available when the printed versions were completed and ready for mailing.

So, we're going to reverse the process. We're putting out a monthly online publication not constrained by mailing costs or the volume of articles and then, pending the results of the District's Troubadour survey, consolidate those top stories for a printed quarterly or triannual version (since the original online release of this article we are now looking at biannual publications). It's possible the printed publications will no longer be free and will have a subscription fee for those who want to continue receiving them (since after this article the biannual publications are currently sent to all members covered by membership dues and ads). The price will be kept at a minimum (again, currently covered entirely), offset with advertising both in print and online and membership dues. The details are still pending, as some surveys have not been returned yet. The next printed publication will probably include details for continuing the subscription.

Okay, so it's both exciting and disconcerting. We all liked getting that familiar Troubadour

issue in the mail as part of the membership and not have to worry about it. But we have delayed this change for as long as possible and need to adapt like other Districts have in order for the Troubadour to survive and thrive.

*Update since the online article, we are currently submitting monthly webpage Troubadour issues online, eTroubs, which are then consolidated into biannual unabridged downloadable pdf editions that can be printed from home and also abridged versions for the print Troubadour publication distributed via postal mail to all members and paid by membership dues and ads. The eTroub webpages may eventually only be available as pdf files and it's expected some years in the future the printed Troubadour will be phased out entirely opting instead to print from home the online version to keep membership costs down.

- 4. Do you have an e-mail account? Yes, 74%. No, 26%.

Pioneer has 1736 members 2008. 462 of them, or 26.6%, didn't list an e-mail addresses.

On this date barbershop chords will ring again in Rivertown at the acoustically perfect Cheboygan Opera House. 





perform for the peers and a very receptive large audience.


The finale of all the choirs joining with the Midstatesmen as the entire group sings two appropriate compositions en masse. The combination of the youth and mature male voices is very special.

Departed Jack Ware

Jack was not much of a chorus guy, but, loved quarteting. He sang Lead in the "Smoky And The Bandits" for over 20 years. He was one of those singers that become a total different person once he stepped on stage. Normally a quiet unassuming guy he became a whimsical fun loving personality when he got behind the mic.

The "Bandits", as he called them, derived their name from the fact that he was a State Police Trooper and he said the other three guys looked like bandits. The quartet traveled all over the State and ventured into neighboring States on occasion and was one of the longest standing Registered Quartets.

As a comedy quartet a couple of their feature songs were the "Side By Side Parody" and his solo rendition of The Ink

Spot's "If I Didn't Care".

He had been battling with Cancer for several years and it took it's toll to the point that he pretty much had to give up one of the activities he enjoyed the most, four part harmony singing. Jack had just over 20 years as a member of The Society while other members of the quartet; Albert (Doug) Beaver-Bari 57 years, Bill Grumbley-Tenor 63 years, and Bob Deming-Bass 46years. 

My First Singing Valentine

Here is the story of my experience this year.

I decided that I would add to the experience by being the person booking the telephone orders. It was really interesting to talk to the givers and hear some of their stories. It brings the singing to a more personal level. There were quite a few that I wanted to personally go to because I knew their stories. Taking the orders also ended up involving me in scheduling the 4 groups we were going to send out. I say groups because we only have 2 actual quartets in our chorus. Since we had 12 other guys who wanted to

sing, we ended up having 2 sextets instead of just quartets. I was to be with the group Mark Pritchard (our president) had originally named Four Instants thinking we would only have a quartet. We decided to stick with the name anyway. Singing in our group were Mark (T), Jerry Beamish and Jim Farkas (L), Tony Pyrkosz and I (Ba) and Charles Nalbandian (Br)

I got my tux and all the accessories and patiently awaited the big day. I wasn't disappointed. We met at 8 A.M. at the church where we rehearse. Everyone was busy getting the roses wrapped in cellophane and ribbons, looking at their schedules, making last minute adjustments and putting on their boutonnieres. You could feel the excitement in the air.

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At last it was time to leave. Our first assignment was to sing to Mark's mother-in-law. Mark went to the door and rang the doorbell. Nobody was answering but he did notice that the TV was on so we waited a few minutes and she finally came to the door. Wouldn't you know it, she had been in the shower. We waited for her to get dressed and then sang to her. She was really thrilled to have her son-in-law sing to her.

Our next job was at a facility called ARC. It is a place where they try to help the developmentally disabled. We knew that this was going to be a fairly large group so we had one of the quartets (3D's & W) join with us. Along with the usual songs, we sang a few additional upbeat songs. We were really amazed at how well behaved these people were and how much they enjoyed the music. Some of them can't talk but you could see it in their faces. The director of the facility asked if they could take a few photos of us and a bunch of the disabled came and got in the pictures. When we were leaving, they wanted to shake hands with us and thanked us in their own special way for singing for them. This is the type of assignment that makes us feel really good about what we do.

Mark's wife is a teacher at Divine Child High School in Dearborn. We entered the building just as the students were changing classes so we were waiting to go to her classroom as they walked by and we got a lot of really curious looks. One of the classrooms was directly across the hall from the lobby and they were all congregating by the door and asked what we were doing. We told them we were going to sing a couple of romantic songs to one of the teachers. One of the girls asked if we could give them a sample. So, being the gentlemen that we are, we sang one for them. After we were done, I heard one of them say how "cute" we were. It made our day.

Now it was time to go to Karen's classroom. We entered and lined up in front and started to sing. She introduced us to them and told them that Mark was her husband. Again, it's amazing how our type of singing is enjoyed by even the younger generation.

Now it was time to go sing for Tony's wife. She wasn't home so we decided to go to lunch. As any of you have done Singing Valentines know, when you walk into a restaurant, you really draw a lot of attention. We ended up singing a few songs for the waitresses and the customers.

Tony's wife still wasn't home and we still had some time to kill so we stopped at another restaurant for a cup of coffee. This time the owner bought our drinks for us after we sang a few songs.

We finally got to Tony's wife and sang for her (and their dog).

The next stop was at the Livonia City Hall where we had the other sextet join us. We go there every year. The ceiling of their lobby area goes all the way to the 5th floor and is open to each floor with a balcony. The acoustics are great.

The receptionist calls up to each floor and everyone comes out and looks down from their floor. It is really a lot of fun. It's kind of like Romeo singing to Juliet. The ladies throw dollar bills down to us as we sing (sometimes even a five will show up).

As I said earlier, when you take the bookings over the phone, you sometimes get into a conversation with the giver and find out some interesting things about the recipient. The guy we were to sing to next had called his wife on there first Valentine's Day together and sang "I Love You Truly" to her. He has done this every year since. This year she wanted to turn the tables on him and have it sung to him. He is working 2 jobs and she wanted us to come when he was

home for supper. As soon as we pulled up, she was waving for us to come in in a hurry. He was in the shower. We waited quietly in the living room as she called to him to come in there. He walked in wearing his bathrobe and was quite stunned. For a few seconds we thought he was going to kick us out. We sang "...Sweetheart" first. Then Mark told him that we understood he had a song that had a special meaning to him and began "I Love You Truly". That brought a smile to his face as well as his wife's. It even looked like his eyes got a little wet. Another job that made our day.

The next gig was for a young guy who was taking his girlfriend out to dinner. The restaurant was fairly dark. She was engrossed in conversation with him. We walked up to the table and she still hadn't noticed us. Finally she turned her head and saw us. I asked her if she was Karah. She said "NO! (pause) Yes". I think she was so surprised that she didn't know who she was for a moment. Either that or she thought that by denying it, we would go away. This was the only time throughout the day that I was the only bass.

We concluded our day with most of the Renaissance Chorus meeting at the Livonia Senior Center. There was a Parkinson's Disease Support Group having their meeting there and we sang a few songs for them after their meeting. We always feel a special warmth when we are able to entertain groups like these.

"Singing Valentines" was one of the most enjoyable and entertaining experiences I have had since joining the Wayne Chapter of the Barbershop Harmony Society. It was really a lot of fun bringing these special one-of-akind gifts of love and affection to these people. The ability to sing together with a group of guys all day long and contribute to the sound was a whole new adventure for me. I am already looking forward to next year.









