# Chorus Competition Mt Pleasant International Reps

October 17th-19th 2008 McCamly Plaza Hotel and the WK Kellogg Auditorium Battle Creek MI.

I've often wondered about the chicken and the egg question if whether having a small chorus can create a scoring disadvantage or if scoring disadvantages can create small choruses. But then comes along the Mount Pleasant Chapter's MountainTown Singers directed by David Gillingham with only 24 on the risers, about half their number as last year, and yet winning for the 2nd consecutive year, as Pioneer District International Chorus Representatives. They scored a 906 with an 89 point lead from the next closest chorus. They scored even higher than last year although the smaller chorus was still within the scoring range of their larger group's short 4 year history.

There was a total of 15 choruses competing including one out of district.

MountainTown Singers of Mount Pleasant Chapter County directed by David Gillingham won as 2008 Pioneer District International Chorus Representatives and Plateau 1 Champion scoring 906

Guardians of Harmony of Macomb County directed by Glen Hipple scored 817.

\*Valleyaires Chorus of South Bend-Mishawaka IN competing out of District for International Preliminary's qualifying score only and scoring 809.

Gentlemen Songsters of Detroit-Oakland directed by Steve Sutherland won Pioneer District Plateau 2 Champion scoring 785.

Holland Windmill Chorus of Holland directed by Kirk Wood won Plateau 3 Champion scoring 784.

Town & Country Chorus of Hillsdale directed by Don Slamka scored 782.

Great Lakes Chorus of Grand Rapids directed by Curt Struyk scored 766.

Lakeshore Chorus of Grosse Pointe directed by Steve Pauling scored 751.

Kalamazoo Barbershop Chorus of Kalamazoo directed by David Woolf scored 718.

Cherry Capital Chorus of Traverse City directed by Marty Chirgwin scored 706.

Lighthouse Chorus of Michiana Metro directed by Gene Hanover scored 704.

# **Seniors** Competition Resisting-A-Rest International Reps

Winning the 2008 Pioneer District International Senior Representatives was Resisting-A-Rest of Grosse Pointe, Hillsdale, Mt. Pleasant, and Lansing Chapters with tenor Bruce LaMarte, lead Tom Connor, bari Steve Warnaar, and bass Phill Haines scoring 899 points. There was a total of 5 quartets competing in the Senior's with Resisting-A-Rest winning with a large 115 point lead. This is the 2nd year in a row this fledgling quartet will be representing Pioneer at the Senior's International, the Barbershop Harmony Society's Midwinter Convention. This Fall District Convention they beat their own last year's score by 36 point. At the BHS 2008 Midwinter Convention in San Antonio, Texas they took Silver missing 1st Place by 49 points so one has to wonder, could it be them grabbing the Gold in the 2009 Midwinter Convention in Pasadena, California January 27th - February 1st?

\*A couple weeks after this competition there was this announcement by Director Contest & Judging Ron Eubank, "Please join me in congratulating the members of Showtime! They have been invited to compete in the Resisting-A-Rest 2008 Pioneer District In-International Seniors Quartet Competition at our upcoming midwinter convention.

Jim Johnson, Tom Weidner, Wayne Hodgson and Allan Smith will be traveling to Pasadena, CA, to compete against 24 other senior quartets at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium on Friday, January 30, 2009."

Showtime was selected by Barbershop Harmony Society wild card process to also be competing in Pasadena detailed in this notice to Showtime by BHS Music Administrative Assistant Becca Box, "Congratulations! Based on your score, you are eligible to compete as a "wild card" quartet at the International Seniors Quartet Competition. Each of our 16 districts have chosen their representative and the next nine quartets with the highest score are being invited to complete our slate of 25 quartets."

# District Quartet Competition Something Big!! 2008 Champs!

Fall Conventions include a quartet competition that has a special place in the hearts of quartets and audiances. Held each year, it can only be won once by a quartet, forever recognising them as District Champions. This year's 2008 Pioneer District Quartet Champion is Something Big!! of Lansing, Mt Pleasant, and Motor City Metro Chapters with tenor Don Terpe, lead Jason Kerschke, bari Steve Warnaar, and bass T R Gerard. As with previous years' close scores this competition was no exception with Something Big!! scoring 1646 points just ahead of Interstate Chord Company by 4 points. And wow were they smokin'! In fact there was an urgent investigation backstage trying to locate the smell of smoke. But there was much relief when it was determined that it was coming from a nearby neighbor burning leaves and the smell was being sucked into the auditorium ventilation system. Autumn time in Michigan. Windsor Chapter's Doran McTaggart showed why he was recently awarded the BHS 2008 International MC by entertaining the audiance during those several minutes with his good nature, charming humor, and apparently endless supply of jokes.

Burning leaves weren't the only snag. The Moxi quartet had to be moved to the end of the competition lineup when all but their lead were trapped in a road construction traffic jam on i-94... backed up 2 miles before their planned detour exit.

On stage Something Big!! were presented with the District Quartet Champs trophy by the 2007 winners Chordiology who had it refurbished.

Jim Ryan, President of the District's Quartet Champions Association (QCA) announced on the PioNet newsgroup, "As is the practice of the QCA, a member of the quartet (Something Big!!) is invited to serve on the QCA Steering Committee during their year as reigning Champions. We wish them a very exciting year. I encourage the Pioneer District Choruses to invite our new champions to Guest nights and performances as well as include them in your Annual shows."

This year's District Seniors Quartet Int' Reps and the District Quartet Champs not only have in common winning their respective competitions but that they also share the same bariton, Steve Warnaar. New to barbershopping Steve has hit the ground running, a member of 2 quartets, interim director for the Lansing's Capitol City Chordsmen, member of the 2008 Int Chorus Reps Mt Pleasant MountTown Singers, and at this convention was inducted as a member of the QCA as are the rest of his fellow Resisting-A-Rest quartet members.

After the Friday night Prelims was the donations supported QCA Show. The chorus consisting of QCA members was directed by retired 2003 Int' Gold Medalist Power Play member Jack Slamka and by Grand Rapids Director and 2008 Int' Rep Wildcard member Curt Struyk. Performing QCA quaretets were 1998 Pioneer District Champions Upstage Sound, 2003 Champs Infinity, 2007 Champs Chordiology guest staring MC Doran McTaggart from Windsor Chapter, Resisting-A-Rest 2008 Pioneer District Senior Quartet Champions, plus the 2004 Champs and 2008 International Reps Wildcard.

There were 17 quartets competing this Fall, 3 of which only competed in the International Senior Reps portion. The lineup also included the 3 unusual entry names of laintimology, Billchuckology, and Frankjeffology listed to compete "Friday night only for unpublished score with evaluations". This was the result of an experiment by 2007 Quartet Champs Chordiology called Contest Chordiologist to encourage quartet formation and participation in competition. They posted an announcement on the PioNet newsgroup offering up to two of their members to sing with district members unable to assemble their own complete quartet. They based their learning and performance technique on the one developed by the 'extreme quartetting of the Harmony Brigades. They all learned their music from learning tracks and scores and didn't have any real rehearsal time together untill their warmup the day of competition. The participants performed admirably, enjoyed their opportunity to sing on the District competition stage, as well as

the judges were excited to be part of this novel experiment.

The Contest Chordiologist experment wasn't the first example of extreme quartetting on the Pioneer District competition stage. At the Spring 2005 Convention the Brigadeers first competed in Pioneer District. Each member was from different states and had met at Harmony Brigade Rallies. Using the music and same Harmony Brigade extreme quartetting format they worked hard on the Brigade learning tracks. They also didn't rehearse together for competition till the warmup at the District Convention. In 2005 they took 5th place and scored 1527 points. They didn't compete in Pioneer again until this Fall Convention coming in 4th place scoring 1576 points.

Competing without rehearsing with your quartet?! Extreme quartetting indeed!

Something Big!! of Lansing, Mt Pleasant, and Motor City Metro won as 2008 Pioneer District Quartet Champions with score totals from Prelim and Finals of 1646.

Interstate Chord Company of Michiana Metro, South Bend-Mishawaka IN scored 1642, missing 1st Place by only 5 points.

Moxxy of Motor City Metro scored 1624

Brigadeers of Frank Thorne, Central Carolina, Iroquois Valley, and Rocky Mountain scored 1576

Singing With Dad of Macomb County scored 1558

Showtime of Grand Rapids scored 1553

Small Town Sound of Kalamazoo won Pioneer District Novice Quartet Champion scoring 1503

Shades of Grey of Grand Rapids scored 1474

Semi-Finalists included Integrity, Border Boyz, and Four Decades.

Friday Night only unpublished scores quartets were laintimology, Billchuckology, and Frankjeffology.

Mic testers were the Semi-Finalist Quartet Integrity.

# Becoming A Contest Chordiologist

This summer on the PioNet and in the Troubadour the 2007 Pioneer District Champs

Chordiology made the following offer.

"Did the last quartet competition have you all geared up about the future of the Pioneer District? How would YOU like to be a part of that future? Have you always wanted to get up on the contest stage (or get back on it), but don't have a quartet? Well, now you DO! Chordiology is offering to sing on the contest stage this October (2008) with ANY man that would like to, but doesn't have a quartet."

And with that they got 6 barbershoppers who were without a quartet willing to participate in their experiment.

They used the same extreme quartetting format used by the Harmony Brigade organization found currently in 3 states. They ordered excellent learning tracks and scores and practiced diligently with those alone during the summer. Except for the off chance meeting they wouldn't rehearse together as a quartet until warm up on the day of the competition. The competition stage can be intimidating for even a seasoned

quartet but imagine the excitement of walking out with just an interim untried quartet under the bright lights!


Although the Contest Chordiologists members were of various experience levels they received enthusiastically supportive applause from the audience and positive feedback from the judges as well.

Ed Fritzen, singing judge (and formerly of the Pioneer District) commented, "I first want to say when I first heard of this program, I thought it was a great idea. I wish I had thought of it! If I were still in Pioneer, I would've signed up to sing. Congratulations!! From a judges' standpoint, I think the program was well received. The important thing is that there were some men who had a chance to sing on the contest stage with some pretty accomplished singers. I'm sure they were thrilled. The only negative with the program is that we could not do evaluations on any of these quartets, and coach them just a little bit. It makes it pretty hard

when the members of Chordiology are singing in two or more quartets. If you were to do the program again, perhaps you can talk with the judging panel and the contest administrators to arrange for a special group evaluation for all the participants. Overall I was impressed! Great program, and I hope Pioneer gets some new quartets as a result of this experience."

I finally got together with my fellow quartet members for the first time. It was early afternoon on the actual day of the competition. How could four guys who had never sung these two songs together expect to actually get on the stage later that day and perform together as a quartet? I couldn't believe that I was actually going to do this. After singing the songs together many times, we felt we were pretty much ready. Paul even implemented a suggestion I had.

Since I had never been to a convention, Paul and Cliff walked me through the presentation procedure. Then the call came. As I listened to our introduction, I tried to tell myself, "just relax and enjoy the experience". (Where have I heard that before?) We entered the stage and I was blinded by the bright lights, which actually made it a little easier. I was able to imagine that there were people out there just like at any of our chorus shows. Paul blew the pitch and we were off and running singing It's A Brand New Day. It was amazing! We really hit the tag and received a huge round of applause and some cheers. At least that's how it sounded to me. Song #2, I Don't Mind Being All Alone, went just as good and I was ecstatic. When we exited the stage I felt like I was 10 feet tall. Paul and Cliff were patting Jeff and I on the backs and congratulating us on a job well done. To come from these guys, it was really something special. We hurried into the auditorium to catch the last two quartets and everyone around me was congratulating me. I felt like a celebrity.

This was a great experience for me and one that I will treasure forever. C4 did a wonderful thing in providing this opportunity to me and the other Chordiologists.

# Harmony Brigade

Extreme
Quartetting
In Michigan?

The Harmony brigade is located in 3 states including neighboring Indiana which for over the last 6 years has drawn in several members from the Pioneer District. So there has definitely been an interest for their style of 'extreme quartetting' here in Michigan. Other examples are the 3 Contest Chordiologist quartets (see Fall 2008 convention article and October Extreme Experiment article) and the Brigadeers in the Fall Convention. These quartets all use the Harmony Brigade extreme quartet model of rehearsing only with learning track recordings and scores and then not singing with the rest of the quartet until the performance warm up (except in the Harmony Brigade you also don't know who your quartet members are

The quartet the Brigadeers http://www.cs.indiana.edu/~sbogaert/brigadeers.html competed in Pioneer in 2005 and this Fall 2008. They have members from all over with tenor Steve Bogaerts of Rocky Mountain NC, Bari Mark Ream of Central Carolina, bass Rick Mangas of Cardinal District's Iroquois Valley and lead Joe Queen of Frank Thorne from

Detroit. This makes rehearsing together near impossible so not only did they meet at Harmony Brigade rallies but using the same Brigade techniques allowed them to compete together without rehearsing together.

Their lead Joe Queen, so inspired by the excitement of the Brigade rallies along with Rob Halsey of lead of Motor City Metro's Moxxy, have been working hard trying to organize a Harmony Brigade for Michigan. An enormous undertaking it has proved to be a real logistics challenge and difficult to find time to spearhead such a project. Although their MIHB.org website says the first rally is May 2009 it will be necessary to delay a Michigan Brigade for yet another year. But hopes and enthusiasm is high for an eventual MI Brigade if the Fall District Convention was any indication.


Fortunately, Pioneer is filled with many great guys willing to lend a helping hand to their fellow singers. I am pleased to inform

Friday, November 21, 2008 the lamplighters light it up (paul)

I know that this is a rather tardy entry. There was just a LOT going on at the end of October (preparing to sing our Swan Song performance at convention; preparing to sing with 3 pick-up "ology" quartets in contest; preparing to teach not one, but two Audacity Classes; learning new music to sing with the Quartet Champions Association Chorus; preparing a set for Friday night at conven-

tion for "mic testing"; preparing for the QCA show quartet performance; and preparing for a show the following week with TR Gerard joining us on Bass for an October 26th show with our friends, the Livingston Lamplighters - WHEW!). But it was ALL worth it!

So now on to the much anticipated blog about singing with the Livingston Lamplighters. So who are the Livingston Lamplighters? Not a lot of people outside of Brighton know of them because they haven't been to a convention in years, but I'll tell you what, BRIGHTON knows who they are! They are a GREAT group of guys that really get what singing is about. FUN and giving back to the community! These guys do singouts all the time and I mean ALL the time. And they have a great chapter quartet, The Jesters. In fact, the Jesters just did two retirement homes the other day with 500 people in attendance for each show. Wow! --- I'm telling you the Lamplighters and the Jesters are a hit in their community! So how did we get the chance to hook up with the Lamplighters? Well, I had the pleasure of speaking with the director Ralph Le-Roy (and Tony Byk) and asked how we could help the Chapter, if at all. I offered up some coaching for the chorus and for the Jesters and he took me up on it. We established a Monday night and I and man, did I learn a lot about what a great group of men these guys are. It is clear watching these guys sing that singing is basically a means for these real friends to get together and enjoy making music and one another's company. And they included me in their friendship like I had been there for years. I know I already

wrote a blog about coaching so I won't go into all of the details, but suffice it to say that I had a great time and we made a lot of progress. It was all very exciting for all of us.

So back to the Lamplighter's Chapter show. As a bit of background, the Lamplighters hadn't done a chapter show for years (four years to be exact) so we were excited about getting to sing on their first show in a while. Leading up to the show the Lamplighters sold ads galore, put together a great show program with all of those ads, put together a great show package, worked hard at refining their performance, worked to bring in the best guest quartet that money could buy (they couldn't get them, so they got us), and sold lots and lots of show tickets. I think the venue was filled to 90% of capacity. For not having done this for several years, they really had their act together.

So the plans had all come fruition and the day of the show had arrived. The Lamplighters went beyond thinking just about the show. They thought about the presentation of the entire event. For example, when you walked into the lobby you were soothed with the sounds of the Jesters serenading live in the lobby and it really added to the event, because that's what it was --- an event. The next thing you noticed were the biggest professionally made poster boards I had ever seen sitting on easels and advertising the show. These things had to be around 3 feet by 5 feet and looked fantastic. I remember seeing them and thinking, "Hey this is a top notch affair." It was like the theaters of old with the playbill easels out for everyone to see. The posters were bright, upbeat and rather nostalgic. And then keeping with the fall season there were

cinnamon doughnuts and apple cider and coffee. I don't remember how many I had, but I really don't think I want to remember either. Let's just say that I'm still working them off. People milled about and those that knew each other glad handed one another and those that didn't took the time to introduce themselves to each other. It was like I was back home on the farm where people took the time to take an interest in the people around them rather than just finding their seats and waiting for the show to start. When you walked into the venue you noticed that there were two huge flatscreen TVs --- and I mean HUUUUGE; huge like "the tize that would force you to build an addition on to your house" huge; huge like large enough to give any man flatscreen envy" huge. These TV screens had photos scrolling through of the group in past performances and in more relaxed environments as well showing the behind the scenes stuff that was fun for the audience to see as well. We had done our sound check prior to the performance and their sound system and sound man were both exactly what the Dr. ordered.

So the stage had been set, and it was time for the show. Recall that this show took place just a few days prior to Halloween so the Halloween theme was odopted and well-placed into portions of the show. There was a very scary, but oddly polite, witch and her sidekick (a scarecrow if memory serves me) as the Masters of Ceremonies and there was the bubbling cauldron and other witchly amenities about. People had found their seats and Chordiology came upstairs to listened to the first song or two. After listening for a bit, it was clear that the Lamplighters had the audience in the palm of their hand. So we headed downstairs to our dress-

ing room to put the final touches on some songs and warm up.

Basically during this warm-up we realized that Dave has some very important information floating around in that head of his ---- the pitches to our songs. None of us knew the pitches for any of the songs and we found ourselves guessing on them. And at the same time poor TR Gerard, filling in for bass, had to learn some of our schtick while standing in the basement just moments before hitting the stage. I think most people would have been nervous, but we were all having a lark and a great time just singing and laughing (at each other in some instances). Not that we weren't taking the show seriously, because we were, but getting nervous wasn't going to help anyone. So without even saying anything we all just stayed calm, went through songs, went through some schtick, created some schtick and had a great time doing each of those things in turn.

Not too much later, someone came down and told us that the Lamplighters had a couple of more songs and then we were on so we finalized warm up and put the finishing touches on our costumes and headed upstairs. I say "costumes" because we decided to go with the Halloween theme as well. Rob went as a computer nerd (and it was so hilarious), TR went as a country hick with a Huck Finn flare, I went as Clark Kent with my shirt pulled open exposing my big Superman "S" and Cliff went as a destitute hobo with missing teeth and that likely had access to a still within walking distance.

We were standing in the wings and could hear the Lamplighters giving the audience a real show. It was great to peer out and see the guys giving it their all and seeing the audience rewarding their efforts with applause and appreciating every moment of it.

The Lamplighters sang their last chord on their last song and audience showed their full appreciation and Ralph started into our introduction. We popped out and sang the first song and wowed the audience. TR brought his A-game and we were off to the races! TR handled all of the schtick like a pro and played the part of a wife to a tee (this won't make sense until you see a Chordiology show). Actually, if we hadn't recognized TR during our show I'm guessing that a lot of people would not even have known that he wasn't our regular bass. We did have one false start on one song. Apparently the key that we guessed on for one of the songs wasn't quite right and about 3 notes in we all realized it and the audience laughed right along with us. Remind me to get those pitches from Dave. We finished to an applauding crowd with many of them standing. It's a great feeling when you bring people to their feet. I know that someone had emailed me a link to one of our songs that were performed that one of the audience members had recorded illegally. Here is the link. But don't go there, because it's illegal.

The Lamplighters came back out on stage to close the afternoon and we joined them on stage and joined them in soaking in the applause at the end of the show. Afterward we milled about and got to meet the audience over doughnuts and cider. People kept saying that they couldn't wait for the next show and I'm certainly hoping that the Lamplighters oblige their fans with many more shows to come.


