REVISED CONTEST AND JUDGING HAND-BOOK AND RULES

The MAR 2009 version of the C&J Handbook and C&J Rules are now posted on the Society web site by opening the Document Center tab and then scrolling down to Contest & Judging documents. You may also access and download the updated documents at the following URL links:

This version is effective immediately and includes:

All rules changes approved by the Society Board at their Nov 2008 and Jan 2009 meetings. All changes are black-lined in the margins. Several of these changes are also incorporated into The Judging System and the MUS, SNG, and PRS Category Descriptions Chapters 4, 5, 6, and 7 respectively. The last page of the C&J Rules has brief comments about the approved revisions included in this version of the rules.

Modification of all generic references to the district C&J person to 'District Representative for Contest & Judging (DRCJ)' to be consistent throughout the handbook.

A number of judge, applicant, and candidate procedural changes in Chapter 12 - AD-MINISTRATION & POLICIES OF THE JUDGING SYSTEM.

A new Chapter 17 has been added that provides in table format all of the specific qualification requirements for each International contest along with cross references to each paragraph in the C&J rules.

Camp is Rockin' Barbershop! For three days this August, the woodlands of Michigan will ring with youthful barbershoppers learning and loving our craft. The Pioneer District's harmony camp, Rockin' Barbershop, invades the campus of Interlochen Center for the Arts on August 27, 28, and 29, ending with a grand show in the Corson Auditorium that Saturday night.

We have contracted with Interlochen CFA for their facilities for 225 campers, both boys and girls – rehearsal halls, cafeteria, sleeping cabins, and recreation venues. Campers just entering high school, or just graduated, and in between, are all invited.

Talent? Have we booked talent! Our head clinician is James Estes from BHS. As well as

his other fabulous directing and teaching credentials, he was a section leader at the Rockin' Barbershop one-day events in Muskegon in 2006 and 2007. He knows us, and we love him.

For teaching the young women, we will host the skill and grace of Last Minute Quartet, of Nashville. Last Minute was International Young Women In Harmony Silver in 2007. They have many Regional medals, and have run YWIH clinics at Sweet Adeline regional events. See the Faculty page on www.RockinBarbershop.org for extensive credentials, and links to audio and pictures. Their pictures have also been added into the camp Photo page, titled "2009..."

Additionally, our own 2007 District Champions, Chordiology, has stepped up (do these guys ever rest?) to coach quartets and share their electronic rehearsal techniques with the youth.

The collegiate quartet to lead the boys sections is Prestige. In '08 Prestige qualified for Collegiate International Competition. Their home district is Johnny Appleseed and they are students of Bowling Green State University (Ohio).

We are still reaching out to Sweet Adelines and have made some contacts. I will be attending the Grand Rapids SA competition to promote camp.

How can you help? Camp needs you to inform prospective campers! Please lead every youth, educator, and choir director (your local school, church, community) you know to our website at www.rockinbarbershop.org Show them the Faculty page, with links to the Last Minute audio clip. Show them the smiling faces in our Photo page and Video page. Our mission is to introduce a joyous life-long hobby to our children, and we have an ideal circumstance to do it! The camp color tri-fold brochure is now version 6, and can be downloaded on the Forms/Info tab. Registrations have begun. You can sponsor campers, also.

Shoreline Chorus of Muskegon has pledged up to 10 full campers Sponsorships. Way to go!

School visits have begun on the west side, with Fountain Street Four collegiate competitors visiting four school (five choirs) on Wednesday, March 25. They wowed em!
