
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

International Convention, Toronto, 2013

Chorus Competition: The Mt. Pleasant MOUNTAINTOWN SINGERS tied for 25th with a 76.9 score (out of 29 choruses).

Collegiate Quartet Competition: WAVELENGTH tied for 23rd with a score of 69.1 (out of 26 quartets).

Quartet Competition: THE PARTY placed 34th out of 48 with a score of 76.7 EBB N' FLOW tied for 42nd out of 48 with a score of 76.1

There were a LOT of quartets very closely bunched from 32nd through 42nd place with just twenty-four total points separating them.

MASTERPIECE WINS QUARTET GOLD

Three past-champion singers plus a hot young lead combined to bring MASTERPIECE the gold medals in Saturday's world championship competition in Toronto.

Singing music ranging from **Kathy Mattea's** "Where've You Been" to American classics "Tennessee Waltz" and "Sweet Lucy Brown," the quartet emerged from a pack of fifty quartets at the contest.

Experienced singers Bass **Brett Littlefield** and tenor **Rob Menaker** sang in 1996 champion NIGHTLIFE; baritone **Alan Gordon** sang in 2004 champ GOTCHA!; and lead **Patrick Haedtler** previously sang in international competition with THE CRUSH.

The top five finishers were, in order::

- 2. MUSICAL ISLAND BOYS -- 8002 points, 88.9%
- 3. A MIGHTY WIND -- 7924 points, 88%

TORONTO NORTHERN LIGHTS CHORUS WINS "WORLD SERIES OF BARBER-SHOP HARMONY" IN HOMETOWN AIR CANADA CENTRE

Singing a hilarious medley of parody songs set in a vegetable garden, Toronto's NORTH-ERN LIGHTS Chorus captured the gold medal in the international barbershop chorus contest Saturday night.

"The Age of Asparagus," "Corn Free," "Lettuce Entertain You" and "Beet It" were among the classics lampooned by the 73-member chorus, which has earned second place five times in the past.

Toronto beat the WESTMINSTER Chorus by a mere 2 points, 2831-2829, a mere 0.06% margin. It is the first win in the chorus contest by a non-U.S. chorus since the Scarborough DUKES OF HARMONY captured titles in 1977 and 1980.

More than 1600 singers participated in the contest. The top finishers were:

- 1. TORONTO NORTHERN LIGHTS, 2831 points, average 94.36%
- 2. THE WESTMINSTER CHORUS, Los Angeles, 2829 points, average 94.30%
- 3. ALEXANDRIA HARMONIZERS, Alexandria, Virginia, 2750 points, average 91.7%
- 4. SOUND OF THE ROCKIES, Denver, Colorado, 2693 points, average 89.8%
- 5. THE ALLIANCE, Columbus, Ohio, 2602 points, average 86.7%

NEWFANGLED FOUR WINS COLLEGE CHAMPIONSHIP



NEWFANGLED FOUR

The NEWFANGLED FOUR, a quartet hailing from the Los Angeles area, beat out 25 other young quartets from around the world to capture the college championship.

Singing old standards "Mistakes" and "Georgia Mae," the quartet posted A-level scores comparable to those in the open division contest.

The NEWFANGLED FOUR quartet consists of **Joey Buss**, tenor, from Huntington Beach; **Jackson Niebrugge**, lead, of Los Angeles; **Ryan Wisniewski**, baritone, of Las Vegas; and **Jake Tickner**, bass, of Discovery Bay.

The foundation of their barbershop success has been as members of the WESTMIN-STER CHORUS, a two-time barbershop champ that sought its third gold medal, but was edged by the TORONTO NORTHERN LIGHTS Chorus. "We haven't spent a lot of time with coaches," said tenor Joey Buss. "Because singing with the chorus every week is like a clinic in barbershop excellence."

As champion, the quartet earns bragging rights, notoriety, and a springboard to the big contest, which has increasingly been dominated by past college champions, and off-shore quartets such as 2013 champs RINGMASTERS, natives of Stockholm, Sweden.

The top five college quartets were, in order:

- 2. The Sunny Boys, Bowling Green State University, Florida National University, Miami Dade College, Western Michigan University
- 3. The CON MEN, Capital University
- 4. The NEW EDITION, Schoolcraft College, University of Minnesota, University of Missouri- St. Louis
- 5. PHANTOM FIFTH, University of North Texas

That is after all, what it's all about. Have fun and give it your all. Don't leave the stage feeling like you could have done more. The MOUNTAINTOWN SINGERS didn't.

D.O.C Picnic



More then just Tulips on the Holland Show by James Hall

Nine members of the Lansing chapter were a part of the Holland Chapter show on May 4, which was one of the many events during the city's popular *Tulip Time Festival*. Held at the historic Knickerbocker Theater in downtown Holland, the many tourists had direct access to walk right into the show and add some barbershopping to their many Dutch-related pursuits.

This was also the second of four "Celebrate Harmony" shows that our chapter is connected with, and it was a lot of fun. The "Mega Chorus" as they called it, had 59 or 60 singers in it, and chapters represented in addition to Holland (and director **Kirk Wood**) were Lansing (and director **Steve Warnaar**), Grand Rapids (and director **Aaron Bouwman**), Gratiot County (and director **Chuck Moerdyk**), Battle Creek, Muskegon, and Livingston County.

The show format was similar to our show, but with fewer total quartets and no intermission. This made for a compact, 90-minute show that the audience seemed to enjoy. The show script used much of the Society's "Celebrate Harmony" script, so it was filled with history about the songs and the quartets that sang them. The Knickerbocker is an intimate performance venue with 500 seats, and it was almost full.

To start the show, the curtain opened to an empty set of risers on stage, while the chorus members entered from the back of the auditorium down the two aisles simultaneously. On the way to the stage, I heard several comments from the audience of "Wow-look at all of them!" as the continuous stream of singers filed smoothly onto the risers by row, with each man dressed in his own old time barbershop quartet outfit. One interesting addition to the show was having Tulip Time Festival's "Town Crier," dressed in traditional Dutch garb, step to the stage, ringing his bell and reading the official proclamation from Holland's Mayor announcing Barbershop Harmony Week.

Although there were several pitch pipe snafus (is this a trend for these shows?), the chorus songs went pretty well, and the audience especially seemed to like the energy of "Old Piano Roll Blues" and the patriotic attitude from "Arms Forces Medley."

After the chorus sang, the M.C. brought on the quartets: The WHOLE NOTES (from Gratiot County chapter), The EXTENSION CHORDS (1952 District Champs from Grand Rapids and Holland chapters), LIVE IT UP! (a fun Sweet Adeline quartet), and finally 2012 District Champs MAJESTYX (from Grand Rapids and Mt. Pleasant chapters. MAJESTYX was especially entertaining, and some of my favorite songs that they sang during the show and afterglow were "Mona Lisa," "Please Kind Sir," and "A Rainy Night In Rio."

After the show, the Holland guys hosted an afterglow at their barbershop hall, which is actually an immersion experience in Pioneer District, Barbershop Society, and Holland Chapter history. Outside the hall, they clearly announce to all who pass, who they are with their window displays: a quartet of 3 ft high singing barbershopper heads, several distinctive Windmill Chorus signs, and a 5 ft tall windmill with a blade that rotates. As you enter, you can't help but notice the 300+ mounted photos on the wall of great quartets and choruses, as well as various plaques, trophies, and other barbershop-related memorabilia. If you love barbershopping and especially barbershop history, the hall itself is a treat!

The 'glow featured more music from the show quartets and also Holland's own BREAK TIME, as well as lots of jokes about Irish drunks. In addition to the music, the homemade food was delicious. Personally, I also enjoyed spending time catching up with old friends and singing some tags, and helped close out the 'glow at midnight before starting the trek back home. If you missed the show and 'glow, you missed much! But remember -- you get another chance to sing on a Celebrate Harmony show later this year (September 28 in Gratiot County).

Celebrate Harmony Chorus Wows Audience in Grand Rapids from May 28 *Woodshedder* by James Hall

I'm happy to report that 18 of our Lansing Chapter members were able to participate on the Grand Rapids shows on May 18, and if you weren't there, you missed out on a busy and fun day. This was the third in the series of four "Celebrate Harmony" shows (with the 4th coming September 28 in Gratiot County), and the 66-man Combined Chorus again had barbershoppers representing six different chapters. Grandville High School has a beautiful auditorium and their music room and hallways were filled with trophies and photos that paid tribute to their wonderful music program.

The chorus seemed to take GREAT LAKES CHORUS director **Aaron Bouwman's** directions to heart and generally sang with a smooth, controlled sound that the audience enjoyed, while our own **Steve Warnaar**, the Midstatesmen's **Chuck Moerdyk**, as well as GREAT LAKES CHORUS Assistant Director **Pete Westers** all directed a song each. 4th Annual Great Lakes Harmony Brigade, 2013, May 31-June 2 by Mike O'Donnell

The 4th annual Great Lakes Harmony Brigade was held 5/31 - 6/2/13 at the Okemos Convention Center, Okemos, MI. Due to many last-minute cancellations the number of participants was down this year but we still fielded twenty quartets.

If you're not familiar with Harmony Brigading (or eXtreme Quartetting) think of it as Bush League on steroids. It is a "by invitation only" weekend of non-stop quartetting. Each man who applies receives a booklet of 11 championship-level arrangements and a learning CD of their voice part 4-5 months before the meeting. Their job is to learn the songs dead cold so when they show up they can sing them with as many different combinations of singers as possible. One of the highlights of the weekend is everyone who wants to try and sing with every man not of his voice part. If you reach this goal you get the *Tramp Award*. Nine men accomplished this!

The weekend started off with many men coming in Thursday night so we could get up early to go sing at Holt High School for two music classes. Then, it was over to Okemos High School for two more classes, an hour break and then back to Holt for the last two classes. We started warming up at 6:30 a.m. (that's not a misprint!) under the direction of **William Stutts**, **Jr**. and then car-pooled to the schools. We sang three songs for them, let them pick a quartet from those who raised their hands by voice part, and promoted the Lansing Chapter and the Harmony Explosion camp at CMU! We were done by 3 p.m.!

At the Friday night supper we are assigned tables to sit at and there we discovered who the other members of our quartet would be for the Friday night contest. The quartets all have to come up with a name. Once they do, they tell the contest administrator and song thev get the sing. Some of the names are quite... creative! We have about an hour to prepare and then it's showtime! Three judges score each performing quartet. Based on their score the top ten are chosen to sing Holt vocal students singing to the GLHB. Saturday night after the show.



Saturday morning we have a business meeting and pass out memberships to those who qualify. A Chorus of first and second year guys sings for the rest of us. This year was a first because there was only one bass in that group, but he nailed his part. Section unity was amazing! ©

After lunch was chorus rehearsal time on the eleven songs we learned. Each director is given about ten minutes to run through the song/s he directs. This is mostly for the benefit of the singers to see how the director actually directs and to add any choreography! There is some down time after the rehearsal except for the top ten quartets who try to run through all eleven songs. The reason for that is because, for the finals, each quartet draws a song at random and immediately sings it...no rehearsal time!

Showtime was at 7:30. Attendance was disappointing, but that didn't deter the men from singing all eleven songs as if they were singing for 1000 people. Our guest quartets were The HARMONY HOUNDS and EBB 'N FLOW. The HOUNDS spun their humorous magic and cast a funny spell over everyone there. I've seen those skits 15 - 20 times and they are still just as funny as the first time I saw them! EBB 'N FLOW showed why they deserved to qualify for the 75th Anniversary Convention in Toronto this July. These guys can flat out sing and I'm

expecting great things from them. One of the things that really came across was how much they enjoyed singing with each other!

After a short break to take down the risers. reset the stage, and put back the tables and chairs, the finals contest was held. There were some funmoments nv during the contest and some really good singing as

Additional Notes by John Cowlishaw

Sixty-five men from Michigan and around the country and Canada gathered for the two -day experience. The selected songs included: "I Want You, I Need You, I Love You," "Mona Lisa," "Sold (Grundy County Auction)," "When I Fall in Love," "Bye, Bye, Blues," and six others.

The weekend got off to a wonderful start singing for high school students. Under the direction of **William Stutts Jr.**, about 20 men convened early Friday to sing at Okemos and Holt High Schools to six different groups of students. Nice to be cheered like rock-stars! William led us thru a program of four of the 2013 Brigade songs, three by the chorus, and one by an impromptu quartet of guys picked out by the students. Each performance included an explanation of what brought us together for the weekend, a promotion of this summer's Harmony Explosion, the teaching of a couple tags, and Q&A.

By late afternoon, men had arrived from as far away as Los Angeles and Florida. Each man gets a "dance card" with all of the participants listed by voice part. One attempts to sing with as many other voices as possible, while firming up all eleven songs. (This year there were nine "quartet tramps," i.e., guys who sang with every other member, filling their cards.)

Following dinner, men were grouped randomly into quartets, given one of the eleven songs to present, an hour to practice, and then to perform in the evening contest. Ten of the 20 quartets were chosen to go on to the Saturday night finals by the three judges. Roger Lewis, KJ McAleesejergins, a charismatic promoter from Harmonv Foundation, and Matt Snell, a vivacious Michigan high school music teacher with lots of talent but new to barbershop.

In the afternoon, all voices joined to practice the eleven songs as a chorus.

The evening show began with that choral presentation, interspersed with interesting historical tidbits from emcee **Rob Halsev**.

The second half featured two "step-out" quartets from the chorus plus special guests HARMONY HOUNDS, and EBB N' FLOW.

After that, the room was reconfigured for the quartet finals. Top place went to WHAT THE HELL WAS THAT? CHICKEN? (Bass: Steve Zorn: Lead: Mike O'Donnell: Bari: William Stutts Jr.; Tenor: **Paul Keiser**)

There has been some decrease in GLHB attendance over the four years, and experienced quartet singers are urged to consider this wonderful opportunity, next year.

It is also a shame that more folk don't take WHAT THE HELL WAS THAT? CHICKEN? advantage of the Saturday night show, which



this year, once again, only drew 57 people to what is a remarkable musical experience. (Where else can one hear a barbershop chorus of this caliber, live, without going to International?)

Preparing for Brigade (and learning music in general) by John Cowlishaw

Why do I put myself thru this? I sang in the 1st and 2nd GLHB, but only took photos at the 3rd.

This 4th year, since the rest of my quartet, ON THAT NOTE, was going, I thought that I should, especially since we were a quartet that was defined by our "Brigade-ness."

The CD and scores of 11 songs arrived around the holidays.

At first it's just mind-play, putting off the real work. Make a spread sheet of the 11 songs, their order in the book, the order in which I will learn them, neat printed starting dates. (Two I already know, two more I have to learn by Pioneer District Convention in April; and I'll put off the optional "Bye Bye Blues" til the end.) Now I have a nice neat orderly schedule sheet of titles and keys and starting dates for learning each one.

Horrors! Woe is me, that schedule covers up a million words, flats, sharps, surprising melodic lines, changes of tempo, pickups, pauses, holds, incidentals, twists of word order. "Oh my; oh me, oh my!" (To quote from "Undecided Medley")

Time to get to work. A new song every two weeks. I start by just listening to the song three or four times. I'm trying to get the flavor of the song. Is it a rhythm song? A melody song? A lyrics song? Sometimes I listen to the four-part track to catch the melody. Sometimes Bari-dominant to just hear my part.

Then I type out the lyrics, it adds to my muscle memory of the lyrics. Then I just read the lyrics out loud, as if an actor in a drama, trying to get the message.

Next I just try singing thru the song a few times with score in hand and the Baridominant track going. Looking for the problem areas. Key changes. Mood and tempo expressed by the recording artist. I'm sloppy, of course, but that's ok at this point.

I use *Jodix Free WMA to MP3 converter* to convert the CD files into mp3s so that I can upload them into Audacity. As the music scrolls by in Audacity, a simple slider allows me to shift the right-left balance. I can see the phrases and breathing points because the volumes are pictorialized. I can highlight the song, or just a section, and then use the tempo slowdown in the fast and tricky parts. And the highlighted area can be repeated and repeated. (And repeated!)

Now it's time to block and tackle. A phrase at a time. Until I can sing along accurately with Tim, or Sean or Simon. Then without them. Then the next phrase.

At this point I pretty much know the music, but not the words. There are still some tricky spots in the music, and I can annotate my lyrics typescript so that it becomes a pretty complete cheat sheet.

Since I'm not a multi-tasker, I may spend some time just saying the lyrics as the music plays, then humming the music without the words (a la **Jay Giallombardo**). The recording artist is so patient!, correcting my word mistakes time after time.

Then something marvelous happens. Gradually, in bits and snatches, the right word begins to pop into my head.

The coming melodic line I can see out there ahead of me. I'm ready - for the pickup, the pause, the funny transition. I no longer sing thru the rests, and I nail the pickups. I am singing my feelings and word-sounds and conveying the message.

It begins to be fun! And I think, "Hey, Brigade is not so bad after all." Looking forward to the weekend, and re-meeting all those old friends!

David Gillingham Stepping Down as Director of MountainTown Singers by David Gillingham

Dear Pioneer friends,

After eight years as the Musical Director of the MOUN-TAINTOWN SINGERS, I have made the decision to "hang up the pitchpipe". I have made this decision based on several factors: 1) my anticipated retirement from Central Michigan University as Professor of Composition in May of 2014, 2) my return to quartetting, and 3) my writing schedule (upcoming commissions). After being diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2011, my ensuing treatment and battle with the disease caused me to change my priorities. I am sure that all of my colleague directors in the Pioneer District will agree that being a director requires much Dr. David Gillingham physical and emotional stamina. Eight years of this rigor



has taken its toll and I am ready to focus my energy in other directions.

This coming year I am composing a major concerto for Bass Trombone and Wind Ensemble. The piece is being written exclusively for **George Curran**, Bass Trombonist of the New York Philharmonic (and who is a CMU alum!). CMU has given me some release time this year to complete the project, but, unfortunately, I have three other commissions for band to complete as well. Hence, time is a valuable commodity for me this year.

My resurgent interest in quartet singing has precipitated some "trial singing" in the district with three other guys. This is exciting for me. When you are my age, you hope that the voice will still "work" when other parts of your body don't work anymore!! In a couple years, Linda and I plan to move from Mt. Pleasant to an area where we can regularly hear a major symphony orchestra and where I can have an opportunity to sing with a major barbershop chorus. So, I am hoping my voice can make the grade for both quartet and chorus singing!

I started the MOUNTAINTOWN SINGERS in the fall of 2004, after a hiatus from the Barbershop Harmony Society of quite a few years. In the late 80's and early 90's, I founded a very successful college men's barbershop chorus at CMU called CENTRAL HARMONY. This chorus was started because I dwelled a lot on the barbershop style in my Ear Training/Sight Singing classes on how the style was a great way to "train the ear". Finally, there were a multitude of men interested in pursuing the style and the chorus was born. In fact, we created a course number for the chorus and it is still on the books. In fact, college men wishing to get credit for singing with the MOUNTAINTOWN SINGERS can do so every semester under the same number (Mus 188: Men's Barbershop). When my composition career started to take off in the 90's, I found that I no

longer had time to direct Central Harmony. This was unfortunate as our concerts every semester were extremely popular and most were "standing room only" in Plachta Auditorium! Therefore, in 2004, I couldn't stand my absence from barbershop any more and started calling people and began looking for college men interested in singing this contagious four part harmonic a cappella style. **Jeff** and **David Rayburn** were at the top of my call list and......the rest is history!

The Mountaintown Singers chorus is an eclectic group of guys. Only several men are from the Mt. Pleasant area. The rest of the men drive from various locations in the central Michigan area (Indian River, Harrison, Grand Rapids, Lansing, Canadian Lakes, Midland, etc.) or are college students at Central Michigan University. The college students that have graced this chorus over the years have brought me joy beyond any expression in words. The mission of the Mountaintown Singers has been, from the very beginning, to bring young people to this great hobby. We have seen many young and enthusiastic guys come through this chorus and we have seen many leave and continue to enjoy the hobby in locations all around the United States. We have felt a great sense of satisfaction in nurturing all of these young men. They are our future and we can be assured that this society will go on forever.



Circle of Fifths

"When did Barbershoppers first discover that they were using the circle of fifths?"

The Circle of Fifths is a pictorial representation of the sequence in which barbershop music moves thru the keys. I suppose that progression around the circle of fifths has always been a part of barbershop.


But when did barbershoppers realize that is what they were doing? When did barbershop practice meet up with music theory? Was the phrase used in the earliest judging criteria?

I posted this question on the Harmonet May 7, and immediately got this response from **Brian Lynch**.

"John, you are correct in your suspicion that circle of fifths movement has been long understood as a vital component of barbershop harmony. One of the early giants of the Society, **Maurice "Molly" Reagan**, published his "Clock System" in The Harmonizer

back in 1943 -- and you can read it today online at http://barbershop.org/harmonizer/ Harmonizer vol2 no4 may1943.pdf

"You can also read about Molly Reagan in the Heritage of Harmony History book" http://barbershop.org/history/HeritageofHarmony_50Years.pdf



Here is part of Molly's original drawing from 1943.

For example, in the inner circle on the left, starting at 3 o'clock, and moving counter-clockwise around the circle, an A7th chord can resolve to a D7th chord, to a G7th chord, back to C. That's what "Five Foot Two" does. It feels right, harmonically.

Transitions

Lowell Boyer

Lowell Boyer joined the Gratiot County Chapter of SPEBSOSA, inc. in January, 1947, approximately a year after its charter was issued. Since then he served the chapter in every capacity from President to assistant director to show chairman to treasurer and everything between. His active membership continued until just weeks before his death on July 17, 2013, at the age of 95.

Over the past 65 years Lowell had sung in four registered quartets. The longest running foursome was the IMPUREAIRES, spanning over 20 years. As the bass in the Gratiot COUNTRY GENTLEMEN, he held his own against two tenors and a lead. In the early 50's these fearless fellows sang live on the Alma, Michigan radio station on Sunday afternoons. They adopted the radio name of the TIMBERTONES, reflecting their sponsorship by a local lumber company.

Over the course of his singing career, Lowell sang in 65 consecutive MIDSTATESMEN'S

annual Fall Shows. Before retiring from carpentry in 1980, he was a part of every one of the chapter's Pioneer District competitions. For 25 years he held a dual (winter) membership in the Harmony Hills chapter of Zephyrhills, Florida. Singing in the chorus and various quartets, he had performed in 23 of that chapter's annual shows.

While not a prominent figure on the District or National level, Lowell, through his love of Barbershop harmony and the fellowship it creates, has set an example for "Joe Barbershoppers" everywhere.

A memorial will be held at the 1st United Methodist Church in Alma, MI on Saturday, Sept 7 at 11 a.m. There WILL be singing and lunch!


