As many of you know, the Pioneer District was a proud sponsor of the most recent Youth Chorus Festival in Orlando at the Mid-Winter Convention. The district's chapters help raise \$10,000 for that sponsorship. At the convention in Traverse City, the Pioneer District Board of Directors voted to try to become a sponsor once again for the 2014 Festival in Long Beach, California. 

Have you been noticing anything different in Pioneer lately? I sure have, and I'm loving it!

We've got THE PARTY (woo hoo!) going International AND it is VERY possible that both EBB N' FLOW and MAJESTYX will be invited as well! Possibly THREE, count 'em, THREE quartets from Pioneer going to International!

But, that's not all. There are all kinds of things happening in Pioneer. Let's start with the quartets. Two years ago at the Spring contest there were only two quartets that scored above 70; last year there were four. This year there were EIGHT quartets scoring over 70!: The Party, EBB N' Flow, Majestyx, Four Man Fishin' Tackle Choir, Chordiology, Wavelength (college contest and Midwinter reps - way to go guys!), Right on Q, and G-Fours (college contest). Not to mention that the The Blendy Boys would likely have made it nine quartets scoring in the 70s and with Band of Brothers and Singers Local #4 at the cusp of 70 not to mention that with quartets like Meta-4 and Quad Pro Quo charging hard we could have nearly a dozen quartets scoring in the 70s in the next year! And you know what comes after 70s, don't you? The 80s. Pioneer, HO!

Did you notice that we had TWO college quartets scoring over 70 again? We had two

quartets this year and two quartets last year that scored over 70. Previous to last year, when have we had two college quartets score over 70? Ummm --- never. Pioneer, HO!

And how about our Midwinter Seniors Reps, HARMONY ROAD? They scored 37 points higher than their score just 90 days ago at Midwinter. This will really move them up in the rankings and they have nine more months to prepare! Additionally, we had three Seniors Quartets scoring in the 60s (HARMONY ROAD, CLASSIC FIT and OLD RULES, with LIMITED EDITION and ON THAT NOTE toeing the line). You might ask, "When was the last time we've had three Seniors Quartets scoring in the 60s in the same contest?" It hasn't happened for 20 years! Pioneer, HO!

And let's not forget our 2013 District Chorus Champions, the GENTLEMEN SONG-STERS of the Detroit-Oakland Chapter who are again consistently scoring 70s. Way to go D.O.C!

I'm thinking that with Quartet Boot Camp, Top Gun, and quartets helping one another, we are really seeing the benefits. I'm telling you there are amazing things afoot here in Pioneer and there is even more to come. I won't let the cat out of the bag, but a guy I know named **Cliff Dake**, is working on some really awesomely cool stuff for choruses too! Yep, we are going places in Pioneer. Pioneer District Convention – April 19-21 – Grand Traverse Resort, Traverse City

A great weekend! A total of 20 quartets and 14 choruses sang.

The International Quartet competition was won by THE PARTY, scoring 76.1, and drawing much laughter from the audience at their creative parodies. They will represent the District in Toronto. EBB N' FLOW and MAJESTYX tied for 2nd and were just outside the range necessary for automatic qualification. THE ALLIES, from Ohio and

singing out of district, scored 83.5, and will also compete at International.

THE PARTY (Kevin Morey – T, Toby Shaver – L, Mark Spear – Br, and Wally Krause – Bs) was born from the ashes of PARTY OF FOUR in 2009 (when that name was no longer available). They have represented us twice at International – 2009 in Anaheim,

and 2010 in Philadelphia.

In the Seniors Quartet competition, last fall's winning quartet, HARMONY ROAD, won with a score of 64.9, with their new Lead, **Bro. Giles Hanover**.

Rochester Guardians of Harmony and Grand Rapids Great Lakes Chorus also scored in the 800-point range.

The audience also got a chance to hear 32 of this year's Great Lakes Harmony Brigade members sing three of their songs. The performance is online at http://www.youtube.com/watch? If you liked them, come hear the full, better-prepared group sing in Okemos June 1 - more than three times as many men and songs.

David Calland represented the BHS in his first term as an International Board Member. He has taken THE ALLIANCE CHORUS to International thirteen times, winning two bronze medals. He was a Medalist in UPTOWN SOUND. His current quartet, THE ALLIES, has won 5th place International, and we had the pleasure of hearing them sing at the convention, as they earned an 83.6 in order to qualify for International in Toronto.

The convention ran smoothly, thanks to Roger Lewis, Jeff Woodworth, Don Kill, Ron Eubank, Larry Parker, Brian Dunckel, James O'Dell, and the host chapter crew – Jason and Amy Lynch, Chuck Jewell, Dawn Spear, Chad Hall, Aaron Gramza, Linda Nugent, Amy McCall, George Tatro, Phil Knapp, and Maurie Allen.

Weather interfered with the arrival of three of the judges, requiring a few extras to be called into service Friday evening.

Mt. Pleasant put on its fund-raising show Friday evening. **Aaron Bouwman** and **Steve Warnaar** led the Joe Barbershop Celebration Chorus thru "Celebrate Harmony" by **Joe Liles**, and "Sweet Adeline." The Sunday morning worship service was led by **Phil Knapp**, and featured The Shoreliners, Quad Pro Quo, and Limited Edition quartets.

An added feature of this Convention was a wineries tour Friday afternoon to Peninsula Cellars, Chateau Chantal, and Chateau Grand Traverse. And the QCA raffled off appearances by MAJESTYX, EBB N' FLOW, and THE PARTY.

It was created by District Historian **John Baker** and was simply an amazing collection of photos, newspaper clippings, artifacts, and more chronicling the great quartets, choruses, and leaders who helped "pioneer" many things in the Society's first twenty years as well as all the fun we've had since.

House of Delegates Meeting

as recorded by John Cowlishaw, Troubadour Editor

President **Doug Weaver** convened the meeting.

James O'Dell (PR and Marketing) emphasized that the 75th anniversary celebration goes on all year.



Cliff Dake (Music and Performance) spoke of the Top Gun workshop Feb 22-3. Over 200 people attended the follow-up show. Sponsorship will be taken over by the QCA in 2014. The Standing Ovation program will be revitalized. There are plans for a Top-Gun -type program for choruses, and a Music Mentor program for directors. Harmony Boot Camp is July 20. Many chapter websites have old, erroneous information.

Joe McDonald (Chapter Support and Leadership Training) spoke of the Pioneer Scavenger Hunt. There have been mailings to all 27 chapters, but in addition, individuals can post their points online. http://www.pioneerdistrict.org/District_Events/ScavengerHunt/ScavengerHuntActive.htm

David Calland (International Board) said that 51 states and provinces have received 75th Anniversary proclamations from their legislative bodies. The Toronto convention has 5200 registrations already, 19% above Portland registrations at this time last year. Harmony University enrollments are also up; a featured presenter will be **Tim Sharp**

of the American Choral Directors Association. Calland also described the Society's 23K project.

Sean Devine (Harmony Foundation) described the celebration April 11 in Times Square, which featured a flash mob and a program emceed by **John Miller** that included RINGMASTERS and New York mayor **Michael Bloomberg**. Three Pioneer directors have been granted scholarships to attend Harmony University Directors' College. Pioneer District has 144 participants in the Ambassadors of Song program and 24 in the President's Council. Of the 2012 contributions from Pioneer District, \$18,802 came back to the District, including \$4000 directly to District programs. The latter is what helped Pioneer be a \$10K sponsor of the Youth Choruses last January, two-

thirds of whose participants had no prior exposure to barbershop. Awards were handed

out for Harmony Foundation financial participation.

President Doug Weaver recommended *Visions of Excellence*, in which twenty-five of our best BHS directors tell their secrets. "Every chapter should get one for directors."

One new officer was announced - **Evan Boegehold** (Bass of WAVELENGTH) takes over the Youth in Harmony program.

The attendees confirmed the unification of the fivemember Pioneer Board of Directors and the eightmember Pioneer Management Team, now coalesced into one thirteen-member directorship, a move taken by most other districts also.

Larry Parker (Treasurer) announced a District balance of \$97,011.

Greg Humbel (*Troubadour* co-editor) urged the use of Constant Contact to be automatically linked to new issues of the *Troubadour*. Delegates praised the "spectacular job" being done by the *Troubadour* editors.

Roger Lewis (Events) spoke of available slots for convention hosting – beginning Fall, 2016. Harmony Explosion is July 11-13, and there is a three-minute video online to enlighten prospective enrollees and sponsoring chapters. Click on *Camp Video* at http://mountaintownsingers.org/

Doran McTaggart distributed tickets to the Windsor Send-Off Show, June 7. He also encouraged viewing of http://www.musicmonday.ca/ where **Chris Hadfield**

(first Canadian astronaut) invites everyone to "fill the skies with music" on Music Monday, May 6, supporting the Coalition for Music Education.

75th Diamond Anniversary of the Society



Spotlight On A Chapter – Rochester Guardians of Harmony by John Cowlishaw

Taking 2nd place in the chorus contest this spring was the Rochester GUARDIANS OF HARMONY chorus, a fine result for a chorus that is technically only four months old. The members of the Rochester chapter and the Macomb County chapter voted overwhelmingly to merge, under the Rochester charter, a merger that took effect on January 1, 2013, although it had been in the works for some time. The merger brought together the established brand and competitive experience of the GUARDIANS OF HARMONY chorus with the long tradition of community involvement of the Rochester Chapter. The new chapter has 53 members, of whom 28 were on stage Saturday. Rehearsals are Thursday evenings at University Presbyterian Church, 1385 S. Adams Road, Rochester Hills, MI 48309.

I interviewed directors **Matthew Tipton** and **Michael Hartrick**.

Troubadour: How was the decision to merge made?

Rochester: The *decision* was not made quickly or lightly and took many months. We did two shows together and entered two contests together (with all Rochester members becoming dual Macomb members) before deciding if this was the right way to continue. In the end, our problems were much the same, but our strengths were complimentary to one another and our values, while not the same, were also complimentary. We felt we would be able to *adopt* each other as we were, without having to lose anything we valued. So when it came to the final decision point and the actual merger, it was not nearly as difficult as it could have been.

Troubadour: What did BHS require for you to merge the choruses?

Rochester: The BHS was mostly concerned with us following the letter of state law for merging organizations and making sure all members were given a chance to speak up and vote. Both organizations had to have a separate meeting and vote of the membership.

Troubadour: Last fall, Macomb sang the same two songs – "Bright was the Night" and "Jeannie with the Light Brown Hair" – to a score of 62.7. Your 69.9 this spring is a fine increase. How has that much improvement occurred so quickly?

Rochester: The judges finally saw the light. $Big \odot$. In actual fact, we changed very lit the over the last year in our approach. We have simply remained steadfast in our commitment to singing quality. That doesn't happen quickly, as the scores might suggest. The payoff, from our perspective, was quite delayed. When the payoff isn't immediate, it can be hard to maintain your resolve. Matt: I will confess I had my own doubts at times. I was nowhere near giving up, but I am very happy

we were able to bring that performance to that stage at that time. The validation was worth the wait.

Troubadour: I think the last time that Rochester competed was spring, 2010, three years ago, with only 12 men on stage.

Rochester: *Mike:* Well we did compete as Macomb members in the last two compete tions, of course. However, competition has never been a priority in the Roches ter chapter. It was one of the bigger issues that had to be worked out prior to merging. We had to be sure competition was not going to become a *drag* or dis tract us from our mission to support our community. *Matt:* Our concern as Ma comb members was the mirror opposite. In the end, it was an easy blend howev er. Supporting the community is our primary mission and going to contest and being judged frequently is a tool to make sure that the support we give is of the best quality. Something the community can be proud of.

Troubadour: Your Music, Presentation, and Singing scores this spring were about 68, 70, 72. That is a bit of a spread. Were you surprised that your Singing scores were that much higher?

Rochester: *Matt*: Considering we spent the *majority* of our time on singing and some on presentation and a bit here and there on music, I would say the judges nailed it. The scores were as consistent as I can ever remember. Surprised? I was *pleased*.

Troubadour: How are the directing responsibilities divided up?

Rochester: *Matt:* We draw straws. Well, not exactly, but close. I am the director and Mike is assistant. I have the preponderance of the training, but Mike is extremel y capable and a quick study. *Mike:* It is our goal for both directors to be able to direct all songs equally. We are darned close to that goal and we trade off direct ing duties in rehearsals quite a bit with the other director usually remaining out front to coach.

Troubadour: How is repertoire decided?

Rochester: We are still pretty new here. But the two of us just talk a lot and work out what we think is best. There isn't too much formula to it. Right now we are just trying to maintain a list and keep track of what we know and how well. With the merger, that in itself is difficult enough.

Troubadour: You meet at the University Presbyterian Church in Rochester Hills. Has it been tough on Macomb members to make the geographical switch?

Rochester: *Matt:* One of the problems we had at Macomb was that very few mem bers lived close. The *average* drive to rehearsal was about 40 minutes. The aver age change in driving time was about a 10 minute *decrease* in drive time for for mer Macomb members. There are a couple of guys that have to drive further now. It wasn't a non-issue, but nobody complained once it become obvious that the merger was the best thing for the group.

Troubadour: What outside coaching have you had during the recent period?

Rochester: We have availed ourselves of the BHS staff members as they visited the district. That has been quite valuable and is recommended to any chapter at any level of accomplishment. But our most valuable coaching up to this point has been internal. We ask members to step out and observe and comment often. Some have quite a bit of experience even if they aren't coaches per se. The fact that the members have a sense of what we have been working on and are trying

to do - where we have been and where we are going - is something an outside coach cannot provide. And sometimes the least experienced have the most inter esting take and are more likely to remind us that even when we aren't as good as we'd like, we are still pretty darned good.

Troubadour: Your announcement of merger said that "plans are being made to in crease the number of quality musical performances in the Rochester community." Can you talk about that?

Rochester: Macomb was never able to establish good community ties. It wasn't for a lack of trying, but they never really "struck a chord" with their surrounding community. Rochester has a wonderful community involvement but hasn't always been able to provide the best musical performances for some of the events they were requested to sing. We really hope this new chapter will be able to not only support the community with our presence but with a musical quality that will be valued and remembered.

Troubadour: Do you intend to compete twice a year?

Rochester: Yes. Until we win and have to sit out, of course. ©

Troubadour: How many (and which) registered quartets are now affiliated with the chorus?

Rochester: RIGHT ON Q (2010 district champs) are all members, though Rick has a conflict that keeps him from rehearsing and performing with the chorus. We have two from CLASSIC FIT (current Bush League champs and senior contend ers) on the risers as well as two from SHARP ATTACK. There is at least one oth er unregistered quartet in our ranks.

Troubadour: If any new singers wanted to join you, what should they do?

Rochester: Stop by! We are really working hard to get singers in the Rochester area through our doors. And we are having some success with that. But, as I am sure most any member can understand, our level of commitment can be a bit daunt ing for the uninitiated, starting with a three hour rehearsal every week. We try to emphasize that we are not exclusive, and we really aren't. But our commitment to our craft has been a stumbling block for some good quality singers who have visited... and it can be discouraging. But like our contest success, we expect that eventually there will be a payoff.

Troubadour: Do you still have post-practice gatherings?

Rochester: We still gather as we have for years at Eastside Mario's on Crooks just north of M-59. All are welcome there, too!

What I hadn't realized from the reviews is that the plot is not only about retired musicians, but the actors and musicians are actually "retired" British musicians and actors. Hoffman must have put out an unusual "cattle call" for participants, because the musicians he hired – and who play in the Beecham Home for Retired Musicans in the movie, are all experienced pros. So too with most of the actors who play non-musician parts.

A Complete Guide to Contemporary A Cappella Singing

Wayne Oberstadt found this fine site linked to ACDA. http://www.brodymcdonald.com/?p=136#comment-11. Here you will find "Repetition is the mother of all learning" applied to vowel sounds.

What singers need most is consistency. In order to make that happen, they must treat every bit of singing as a chance to enhance. We should not let repetition be for warm-ups, sight-reading or drills. We should build a mentality of repetition into every rehearsal.

Let's take vowel purity as a test case. How many pure vowels are there anyway? I tend to stick to 7: EE (meet), IH (hit), EH (red), AH (father), AW (tall), OH (boat), and OOH (moon)... We can base almost ALL singing off of these seven, then add variation as needed.

So, assuming we're working from seven vowels, then every time we sing, we're practicing our consistency producing those vowels. Around 90% of our singing is on vowels, so taking the mindset of constantly practicing vowel production always is nothing but beneficial. When a vowel is corrected in rehearsal, an OK singer will think "I need to sing taller on this note," but a great singer will think "all my AH vowels need to be like this."

You're young, you're scrappy. You want to be the best. You started singing in school, like everyone: choir, maybe a couple musicals. Karaoke with some friends, talent shows. Then some collegiate a cappella.

But you don't want to just be fine. That's not enough. You want to be great. You want technique, you want moves. You need to learn karate... except contemporary a cappella doesn't have a traditional refined martial art... does it?

It does. It's called Barbershop. And you're about to get the best schooling a young'un can.

Sharon then lists its attributes: blend, tuning, dynamics, rubato, phrasing, rehearse, performance, community.

"I'm not saying you have to learn Barbershop to be a great a cappella singer... but I am promising you if you do sing Barbershop, you'll be better than if you don't."

[Deke Sharon founded CASA (and other stuff), makes TV shows (*The Sing-Off*), movies (*Pitch Perfect*), sings (The House Jacks), produces albums (*Straight No Chaser, Street Corner Symphony, Committed, Nota, Bubs*), wrote a book (*A Cappella Arranging*), publishes sheet music (Hal Leonard), and custom arranges music (over 2,000 songs)].

The Sing-Off was never officially canceled after its super-sized third season, which earned lackluster ratings in fall 2011, but NBC passed on picking it up for a fourth go-round in 2012. Still, in the time that has transpired, a cappella's popularity has surged. The Sing-Off's Season 3 winners, PENTATONIX, have become viral staples with their inventive covers and originals, (outselling *The Voice* winner, **Javier Colon**) and the huge success of PITCH PERFECT (for which

Deke Sharon arranged the music) has breathed new energy into the genre.

The upcoming season's structure is expected to return to the holiday format used in Seasons 1 and 2.

Phonation: Vocal Cords In Motion

The March 4, 2013 New Yorker has an article on vocal medicine entitled "Giving Voice: A surgeon pioneers methods to help singers sing again." By John Colapinto. It features **Dr Steven Zeitels**, founder and director of Massachusetts General's Center for Laryngeal Surgery and Voice Rehabilitation. It is he who operated on Grammy Award winner **Adele**. He's also worked on **Steven Tyler**, **Keith Urban**, **Roger Daltrey**, **Cher**, **Lionel Richie**, **James Taylor**, and **Julie Andrews** (after her unsuccessful surgery by a different surgeon), apparently all successfully.

The article is relevant to us because:

- it describes fresh young clear-sounding vocal cords
- how they perform their function, (the guitar string analogy is wrong)
- how vocal stress, not aging per se, deteriorates the cords
- Zeitels' surgical procedures for repairing them

After reading it, I got real interested in vocal cords (vocal folds) in phonation and found the following excellent videos. I've arranged them in an appropriate sequence.

http://www.youtube.com/watch?feature=endscreen&v=JzyHKYQzPBk&NR=1 This is a clear, though static, cartoon of the anatomy of the whole vocal apparatus, but it doesn't show the cords vibrating.

http://vimeo.com/13591762 Now here is a great cartoon of the vocal cords in motion during the mechanism of phonation. Notice how muscle contraction brings the vocal folds repeatedly together and how that generates "pulses" of air, which are the actual vibration that we hear. (Lots of ignorable anatomical terms.)

http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=UpOXecWC5Dw Now we see the vocal folds in real video. It looks like the folds are moving slowly, but that is because a stroboscopic light is only illuminating the folds periodically. Notice how a high pitch is generated by stretching the length of the vocal folds. The cricothryoid muscle contracts and lengthens the vocal cords at the higher pitch.

http://www.youtube.com/watch?feature=fvwp&v=bowRggzZ2q4&NR=1 Just a few seconds of this one give you the idea. The vocal cords are moving so fast that it looks like they are stationary.

The next two videos are quite similar, but emphasize different points.

http://www.youtube.com/watch?NR=1&v=tfXCdRhxxdk&feature=endscreen Wonderful 9-minute video in which a surgeon prepares a patient for a laryngoscopy. The role of stroboscopy to slow down the apparent movement of the vocal cords begins at 7:40.

http://www.youtube.com/watch?NR=1&v=HI3gqArxr 8&feature=endscreen This 10'-long video is more focused on pathology than the previous video. You can start at 2:18.

Then it gets VERY good. At 3:37, he turns on a strobe light. Vocal nodules are calluses. Notice how they affect the motion of the vocal cords, as a function of pitch. Slow motion at 5:18. Jumping in pitch at 5:40, and even two simultaneous pitches. Look at the mucus (phlegm) at 6:15. Look again at 7:22. Clearing out the phlegm is not harmful (7:58). This is a trained singer (9:16) and is shown here without strobe so it looks like the folds aren't actually colliding.
