

Society and Pioneer Direction for 2015

Membership

Recruiting new members, and retaining what we have, is vital. Some of the strategies developed at the Society level include the Story Tellers initiative, where chapters and individuals share their stories to help spread the joy of making music; a new Membership Application, already online; a new designation of membership: Member-At-Large; a general overhaul of Membership Services.

Another aspect of membership is Outreach. Formerly, we used such terms as Youth In Harmony, Youth Outreach, etc., but we are now expanding the concept of Outreach to include other groups, such as seniors, and baby boomers. Part of this initiative includes making our chapters more visible in our communities, not just through singing and performing, but *serving* our communities. I will speak more toward that a little later.

Keeping and attracting members really centers on one key person in the chapter: the Chorus Director. We can provide opportunities for our directors to improve their skills and develop strategies to enhance everyone's musical experience (members and audience).

Harmony University

I'm sure everyone knows by now that HU has moved from our long-standing home in St. Joseph to Belmont University in Nashville. But there is much more to HU than just the brick-and-mortar facilities there; there is an increasing number of courses being developed for online delivery. For example, there are videos on the Society website offering training for Secretaries and Treasurers. Future offerings include a 6-part, 12-hour Director Training course, and David Wright's History of Barbershop (one of the "must-take courses" at HU).

New Music

We had 29 new publications in 2014. We had 34 new learning tracks made available. In the first quarter of 2015, the Society plans to publish ten new arrangements, plus a new Polecat II book. (I'll let you in on a secret: one of the songs is "Hello, Mary Lou.")

We Sing, We Serve

Our focus as barbershoppers has always been on singing, performing, and competing, and that will never change; it's what we do. But we want to reach out more to our communities. We want to be known as people who like to help others.

At the Leadership Forum in Nashville last November, the group of 90 or so men were divided into two groups, each with its own bus. The *We Sing*

bus went out into the community and performed at a couple of different locations. The *We Serve* bus went to an area that was damaged by a horrific flood a few years ago and collected mounds of debris. What do both of these things have in common? *We are bringing joy to others*.

Many of you in your chapters already do stuff like this, whether you help with a local school music program, or perform for free at a seniors' residence. I suggest that there is much more we can do. Every community has areas that could use our help. Coats for Kids, local Food banks, and so on, are always looking for assistance. Why can't we do this as barbershop chapters? There are many benefits to this; we are bringing help, and joy, to others; it makes us feel good about ourselves; it increases our standing and visibility in our communities; it may even help with membership. How? Maybe the guy who may be a marginal member, the guy who doesn't sing very well, the guy who comes only every other week, this guy now has more purpose and focus being part of an organization that is *doing* something that he can really be a part of.

I will issue a challenge to all Pioneer chapters: let's see how many cans of food we can bring to Battle Creek this Spring Convention. I'm sure the local food bank would be glad for our help, and we would truly be "Bringing joy through music". ..."Bring Joy Through Music"

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Pioneer District Officers' Corner

From Brian Dunckel, Director of Contest & Judging

Need a little something to get you through another cold, wintry week? The Pioneer District Convention in Battle Creek is just twelve weeks away, and as usual, we have a couple of top-notch activities already lined up!

Friday afternoon FOUR TIME International Quartet Gold Medalist Joe Connelly will teach a class called "The Quartet Experience" at 3 p.m. If you have been a quartet singer, are a quartet singer, or want to become a quartet singer, you don't want to miss this! Plenty of barbershoppers arrive in time for lunch- so why not come early, meet some new friends, sing a bit (or a lot), and even take in the HOD meeting before the classes begin!

On Saturday morning the Joe Barbershopper Chorus will serve as the Mic Tester for the Chorus Competition, in which we will determine our 2015 Pioneer District Chorus Champions. Plan to be a part of that chorus under the direction of Joe Connelly. Joe is not only a four-time gold medalist on the quartet side of our hobby, but he has also directed on the International stage! Don't miss this opportunity to sing for a barbershop legend! Perhaps we can even set a new record for the size of the chorus! Stay tuned for more details including the JBC songs....

From Jim McMahan, Pioneer District Secretary

This is a message primarily to chapter secretaries. However, if you are not the chapter secretary, but you know one---be sure he gets this CRITICAL message!

Every chapter has an obligation to submit three documents annually to the Society through the "Financial Filings" link on your chapter's webpage within the **.ebiz** website.

First, let's deal with a nomenclature issue. Many of you feel that you "filed" the necessary documents with the State of Michigan, or with the Internal Revenue Service or Canadian Tax Authority. In fact, I have found evidence that many of you have done so.

What you really must do is to "archive" the existence of those documents with the Society to prove that you are doing the legal tasks essential to the continued existence of your chapter, and by inference, the Society. Therefore, you will see me use verb forms of the word "archive" from this point forward.

There are three documents that you should have archived in 2014:

• Your 2014 Certificate of Continued Existence (COCE)---which should have been submitted to the State on or before October 1, 2014). (NOTE: The Ontario District Secretary has told me that Canadian chapters do not have a comparable obligation.)

• Your 2013 report to the IRS (US chapters---990N or 990M), or your 2013 report to the CTA (Canadian chapters—T2 Short or T1178 Short). Reports to the IRS should have been submitted to the IRS on or before May 15, 2014. (NOTE: The Ontario DS could not confirm to me that there was an income level below which Canadian chapters had no reporting obligation.)

• Your annual review of your chapter's financial records for FY 2013. This document should have been prepared and archived on or before May 15, 2014.

When I last checked, only five Pioneer chapters archived these three documents during 2014---Detroit-Oakland, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Mt. Pleasant, and Saginaw Bay.

Some additional comments must be made about your annual financial review. Understand that a "review" is not an "audit." (Those are expensive.) Also, it is not just a statement of your chapter's starting and ending balances, plus totals of your income and expenses for the year. However, there is a form for summarizing that data, and it may be a part of the review document.

A "review" is an independent examination of the management of the chapter's finances for the year. It should not be performed by the chapter treasurer, but by individuals who were not involved in the chapter's finances. The reviewers could be members with some financial savvy, or members of another chapter, or even bookkeepers in a nearby non-profit organization that wants to engage in mutual back-scratching.

Failure to submit a COCE to the State of Michigan for three years in a row can result in the loss of the chapter's incorporation status. That can expose the chapter's officers and members to possible lawsuits against them as individuals.

I am sure there must be penalties for failure to submit tax returns to the IRS or CTA. Your chapter treasurer is more qualified to tell you more about that topic than I am.

The ultimate penalty for failure to submit the previous two documents is related to insurance. The firm that provides insurance coverage for the Society has asserted that it may not provide third-party liability coverage for chapters that are not in compliance with federal, state, or provincial laws!

The overall principle behind archiving of documents is to give the Society's leadership the confidence that everyone is doing his part to protect the Society's status as a 501(c) (3) organization, and to allow us to continue to do what we do best----SING!

Our District reps, ROLLS VOYCE and THE VOICE, drew praise for their performances at BHS Midwinter in New Orleans.

Seniors Quartet Competition

SATURDAY EVENING POST, a quartet from Colorado Springs, bested 26 other groups to capture the gold medals in Saturday's International Seniors Quartet Contest.

Singing "Tin Roof Blues" and "That's A-Plenty," the quartet earned the highest score ever posted for the Seniors contest, an 81% score that would be comparable to semi-finalist quartets in the open class International championships. (For comparison, Pioneer District's RESISTING-A-REST was the Gold-medalist in 2010 with a score of 74.2.)

All four singers are past medalist and champion-level singers.

- Bobby Gray, Jr., age 57, tenor
- Allen Gasper, age 59, lead
- Brian Beck, age 74, bari
- Tom Wilkie, age 55, bass

SATURDAY EVENING POST competed in the International open competition in 2004, and came in 5th with Scott Delude singing tenor. Brian Beck sang bass, Bobby Gray Jr. sang baritone, and Allen Gasper sang lead.

To compete in the Seniors Quartet Contest,

- all singers must be at least 55 years old, and
- cumulative total of ages of quartet members must be at least 240 years.

SEP must have been eagerly awaiting Wilkie's turning 55. Brian Beck at 74 satisfied the rest of the age requirement, raising their sum to 245 years. Beck has medaled in various quartets in all four voice parts.


Gaylord







Paul Teska honored with A Celebration of Life, January 10



Lewis Joseph Stuart "Mickey" Contini passed away on Sunday, December 7, 2014 at the Sault Area Hospital. Mick was born in a railway car (his favorite story) in Ignace, Ontario. A life-long resident of the Sault, a graduate of the University of Western Ontario and the University of Toronto, the former Director of Education of the Sault Ste. Marie Board of Education, and the former President of the Retired Teachers of Ontario (RTO) and the Ontario Public School Men Teachers' Federation, Mick spent 35 years as an educator in the Sault, including as the Director, and

as a Superintendent, Principal and teacher, and served the community as a member of numerous charitable boards and committees. A talented athlete and an avid hockey and baseball coach, hunter, barbershop singer, and pool player, remembered by his family for his wonderful sense of humor, and for the grace with which he bore many years of debilitating arthritis. He was especially proud of being a member of the Ontario Teachers' Curling championship team in 1969.

He was also a past chapter president, and one of the earliest of the barbershoppers in our chorus, but dropped out for a number of years for professional reasons. He came back after retiring, and added much to our chorus' progress as a mentor, guide and singer. He also served on our board for many years, in many capacities.






