

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What Are PIO Choruses Doing?

They're s	singing,	of	course!	And	connecting.
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We all miss singing. We all miss getting together with some of our dearest friends, and choruses still must wait for the right time to gather — even with the governor rescinding her stay-at-home orders. So we asked choruses around the district to share any advice they have for others and what they're doing in lieu of rehearsing in person.

We have been sending weekly resources (such as new songs to learn on our own and summaries of the happenings from BHS). We've had many virtual meetings with the chapter and the board. We've shared instructions on how to use an app to create virtual harmonies individually (then combined via the app) and used those recordings to post on our social media platforms to ensure new content goes to the public. We've been very active via social media so we stay on everyone's radar. We also created an 'if we return to rehearsal' survey for our members to express their feelings with what they would need when we get back together again. We had 95% participation on this and got some really good feedback. (Pioneer will share a survey tool soon!) Note: We LOVE the new song released by the BHS - "It's the Music That Brings Us Together." It will certainly become a chorus number once we return to rehearsals.

Advice: Reach out to members who are not actively joining virtual events. Many of our members lack the technical resources to do online events, but they'll still answer the phone!

This has been a great help for keeping the camaraderie and our spirits high.

Our chorus is hosting 1- to 2-hour Zoom sessions each Monday night, as it would align with traditional chorus rehearsals. For the last three weeks, we've done a deep dive into our three judging categories with current or formerly-certified judges in BHS. We've also celebrated our two-year anniversary as a chorus with a Zoom "birthday party," featuring former chorus director and two-time international quartet champion Mike Slamka! Moving forward, we are planning more events to bring our membership together and serve them with educational/singing opportunities.

My advice for current choruses or singers: Spend time evaluating others' performances and your own. Spend time working on skills that need to become habits, such as posture, breathing, etc. This also is a great time to re-evaluate chorus culture, trajectory, and branding. How we present ourselves to our community of singers directly impacts our success within that community!
