Designing a New Path Forward

While it is a bit uncomfortable to be outdoors right now, I find myself looking forward to the thaw ... actually, two thaws. The first is the certain thaw that comes every April, the one that can be messy and made up of fits and spurts of nice weather one day and a blizzard the next. The other thaw is certain, too, and also will feature fits and spurts. I am referring to getting back to singing. Let's talk about that elephant in the room.



My elephant is lime green like a MountainTown Singer, has a big black hooped earring and a polka dot necktie. Hard to miss. His name is When. As in when will we be singing together again?! My answer is when each person in the room has weighed the risk and made a decision that considers their personal health, the health of their household, their extended family and friends and even co-workers. That is a lot of responsibility, and each of us will get to that point one day, on our own timeline.



My assessment of the current situation concludes the answer is "not quite yet." I read everything I can find on COVID. Both sides of the issue and the medical information from multiple sources. I find hope for the future of singing together, but again, not quite yet.

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Insights on the return to singing

Cherry Capital Men's Chorus president, an infectious disease epidemiologist, weighs in

As vaccination against COVID-19 progresses, the Pioneer District continues to encourage chapters, choruses and quartets to shape their plans for a return to singing.

"With people so hungry for social interaction, it's time to plan how we'll move forward and start to generate excitement," Pioneer President Joe McDonald said. "If we wait, we'll miss an unparalleled opportunity to create community."



The district's role isn't to declare when it's safe to sing again; that is up to individual chapters and singers. However, McDonald said the district will share educational resources and insights such as those cited here from Roger Racine, president of the Cherry Capital Men's Chorus and

an infectious disease epidemiologist for the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services.

We're also following that with information from the Mayo Clinic about vaccines.

Personal thoughts from Roger (speaking on his own, not as a representative of the state):

- Vaccination could be a silver bullet for a return to singing. There's light at the end of a
 long tunnel; we're just unsure how fast we're traveling. I urge caution. Be patient as the
 vaccine is administered. It appears highly safe and effective, and we can anticipate a
 decline in cases with the onset of herd immunity.
- Once we all have the chance to receive the vaccine, the government's responsibility to
 protect people will be met and I expect the limits of this past year to be lifted.
- Singing requires air to be forced from deep within our lungs. Early in the pandemic, we
 recognized the extreme risk of infection from group singing. I can't condone such risky
 activity unless folks have been documented as infected and recovered or vaccinated.
- Consider starting to plan summer practices and smaller-scale performances for this fall
 and winter. Start planning membership drives and fundraising, too, and know that we
 need all hands on deck to implement such efforts.
- One possibility is to start live rehearsals with quartets of vaccinated members.
- Choruses could band together to share ideas and strategies for recruitment/retention and fundraising. Let's limit the times we reinvent the wheel!

Vaccine information from the Mayo Clinic: It takes about two weeks for your body to build up protection after both doses of a COVID-19 vaccine. Even then, you could become infected. The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is 95% effective in preventing COVID-19. The Moderna vaccine is 94% effective. While your risk of getting COVID-19 after vaccinated it possible. being is low. is

It's not clear if the vaccines reduce the spread of COVID-19. It's not known if a person who is vaccinated could be a carrier and spread the virus to others, even if he or she doesn't become sick. More research is needed to determine if you can be contagious after being vaccinated.

Andrew Badley, M.D., Mayo's COVID-19 Research Task Force Chair, <u>notes you should get vaccinated even if you've had COVID-19</u>. He said the duration of immunity received from having COVID-19 varies. Current estimates are that it goes away over about three months — which is why the vaccine is recommended.
